COMMISSION FIXES GAS

RATES EQUITABLE TO ALL 'The Kansas state public utilities commission recently adjusted gas rates in He is known to have partially or wholly that state on a basis which the regulatory authorities believe will be more equitable to all consumers.

Instead of a flat rate such as is in effect in most parts of the country, the Kansas commission established what it calls a three-part rate and which has now been installed practically throughout that

The commission's investigation and inquiries made by regulatory authorities in other states has disclosed that a considerable percentage of customers are furnished with service at an actual loss to the companies, and that this loss must be made up by the average customer. Invariably these surveys revealed that the customers of the working class used more gas than such customers as the families of business and professional men.

Then, too, there is another class of customers, such as physicians, dentists, lawyers, meat markets, grocery stores and the like where the monthly consumption of gas is far below the average and some Fronths use no gas at all. 




