THE FIRE DEPARTMENT; CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Some Useful Hints on How to Guard Against Fire; The Cooperation of Citizens Earnestly Requested.

It is the hope of this Department of the local Chamber of Commerce to give in these series of helpful hints something that may be useful to the citizen who is called upon daily to fight the possibilities of fire.

Be careful of gasoline or coal oil stoves. Careless use of such articles have been the cause of many disastrous fires and quite a few deaths. When the fire is lighted in a stove of this class be careful about turning on more than one burner at a time. Do not light a fire if oil is spilled on top of the stove until same is wiped dry. Keep curtains, etc., away from positions where the wind might blow them over a burner. When leaving the house never such a stove as this lit.

Do not pour upon a lighted fire of any kind, kerosene from a closed can. If you feel the need of this aid use an open can and dash just a bit on the fire being sure that lids are off or stove door open.

Never leave an open fire in a house alone without using a fire screen. Sparks are dangerous things and a little one may cause you to lose your dearest possessions.

If you wake at night and find the house in flames, above all, Keep Your Head. First close all doors possible confining fire to one room. Secondly open or break window in room where people are sleeping to get rid of smoke. If too thick soak a large towel in water and wrap ov-

er mouth and nose. If you must dash through flames in order to get out do this and wrap in heavy comforter or blanket. Turn in alarm as rapidly as possible. When firemen respond tell them as quickly as possible the location of your rooms. Be Sure And Tell Them Where Ammunition Or Cans Of Oil Are Located.

More lives and property can be saved by Coolness than any other one thing. If any people remain in a burning house tell the firemen at once in what room they are and the location of the nearest window or door.

It would be the best thing you could do if you would buy a small fire extinguisher. Keep same on wall in the kitchen. That is where most of the fires start. When using one direct same at bottom of fire and work up. Never start at the top or middle of blaze.

Christmas is coming. Do not use lighted candles on a tree unless one and put them out when they burn. Adult person agrees to watch them down near the branches.

Please give us your hearty co-operation. Because Marfa has never had a bad fire no sign sign it will not have one. Using these methods outlined each week much can be done to insure the safety of lives and property. By the way, are you keeping your matches in a covered tin can?

Thanksgiving Proclamation

"The season has come when, alike in pursuance of a devout people's time honored custom and in grateful recognition of favoring national fortunes, it is proper that the president should summon the nation to a day of devotion of thanksgiving for blessings bestowed and of prayers for guidance in modes of life, that may deserve continuance of divine favor.

"Foremost among our blessings is the return of peace and the approach of normal ways again. The year has brought us again into re-union of amity with all nations after a long period of struggle and turbulence. In thankfulness, therefore, we may well unite in the hope that Providence will vouchsafe approval to the things we have done, the aims which have guided us, the aspirations which have inspired us. We shall be prospered as we shall deserve prosperity, seeking not alone for the material thing, but for those of the spirit as well, earnestly trying to help others, asking before all else, the privilege of service. As we render thanks anew for the exaltation which came to us we may fittingly petition that moderation and wisdom shall be granted to rest upon all who are in authority in the tasks they must discharge. Their hands will be steadied, their purposes strengthened, in answer to our prayers.

"Ours has been a favored nation in the bounty which God has bestowed upon it. The great trial of humanity though indeed we bore our part as we are able, left us comparatively little scared. It is for us to recognize that we have been thus favored and when we gather at our altars to offer up thanks we will do well to pledge, in humility and all sincerity, our purpose to prove deserving. We have been raised up and preserved in national power and consequence as part of a plan whose wisdom we cannot question. Thus believing, we can do no less than hold our nation the will ing instrument of the Providence which has so wonderfully favored us. ROY WILLIAMS MURDERED; BODY IS FOUND IN WELL

Dalzell, Alias Whitehead, Held at Marfa Charged With The Murder.

Alpine, Texas, Nov. 14—Leroy Williams, wealthy ranchman, who lived alone among his cattle 80 miles south of here, was shot to death from behind, Friday afternoon by an assailant at his ranch and his body thrown in a well. This was made public today by the sheriff's office following an executive investigation that resulted in the arrest of "Bud" Dalzell, or "Whitehead", as he is variously called. Dalzell or "Whitehead", is held in jail for investigation in connection with the homicide. He drove into Alpine at dusk Friday afternoon and reported that Mexican raiders had crossed the border to Williams' ranch and killed the proprietor. He was not arrested at that time. Officers and friends of the ranchman went to his home yesterday and found the body.

A trail of heel tracks along the ground showed where Williams' body had been dragged and carried 75 yards from the place where a pool of blood marked his fall, to a well. Tracks around the well were thick. The well is 25 feet deep with about seven feet of water. Late Saturday night the body was recovered from the well.

Williams had been shot once, the and coming out under his chin. Physicians said the wound was a mortal one and resulted in instant death before the body was put in the well.

Dalzell's arrest followed the cashing of a check Saturday morning drawn on a local bank for \$75, and bearing Williams' signature. He bought a ticket to Nebraska Saturday morning under the name of Whitehead. He was known here as "Bud" Dalzell. He came to Alpine recently under that name and went

to the Williams ranch. When he was arrested, Williams' car, saddle, rifle, pistol and much of his clothing were found in Dalzell's possession.

Relatives at Carrizo Springs said his body is being prepared for burial. Undertakers are awaiting instructions from relatives at Carrizo Springs. The young ranchman came here about 10 years ago. He was unmarried. He lived alone on his ranch. None but ranch hands were in the big place. No statements from any of them as to knowledge of the time or cause of the shooting to death of Williams has been made public.

Doubt Mexican Raid Story

Department of justice officials in El Paso, which is the headquarters for all of southwest Texas department of justice work, last night discounted the story of the Mexican raid that Dalzell told in connection with Williams' death. They said no such raid had been reported here and that in the normal course or official routine that such a raid would be reported in El Paso at once. Yet it is alleged taken place three days ago.

Local cattlemen who are familiar with the country where Williams lived told the interviewer that it is a wide stretch of hills and rocks. Houses are few and far between. Alpine and Marfa are the only big towns within several hundred miles of Williams' ranch, and Alpine is 80 miles from the ranch.

Williams was a nephew by marriage of J. M. Nichols, a banker of Kennedy, Texas, and has a number of relatives in Brewster and Presidio counties. Dalzell is now confined in jail at Marfa.

TROOPS TO PROTECT RANCHERS IN BIG BEND DISTRICT

Rep. Claude B. Hudspeth's recent protest to the state and war departments against raids by Mexican bandits on American ranches in the Marfa neighborhood has resulted today in action by Maj. Gen. J. L. Hines, Commander at Fort Sam Houston.

Gen. Hines wired Hudspeth he had ordered a special patrol to go up and down the Rio Grande in the neighborhood of Marfa, and investigate at the various ranches close to the river concerning the raids.

The last raid was at the Tignor ranch when a large number of cattle, sheep and goats were driven off by the Mexicans who escaped across the river with the livestock.

Gen. Hines wired Hudspeth as soon as he could get a report on the situation he would telegraph again. Wednesday Hudspeth made another vigorous protest at the war department and demanded that something be done to protect the Marfa ranches from the bandits.

Reports have reached Texas congressmen that some of these raids have been conducted by Mexican soldiers, disguised as bandits, who it is believed are after some of the ranchers in the Marfa section who testified regarding Mexican conditions during the last congress, before the Fall investing committee.

J. F. Tignor, whose ranch has been repeatedly raided was one of the witnesses before the Fall committee.

In December 1917, Mexican raiders killed the foreman of this ranch. Later a few American troops were ambushed at this ranch and had a pitched battle with Mexicans, in which Tignor played an important part.

The raiders were driven off after several had been killed. It was reported at the time that the raiders were Mexican troops posing as bandits.

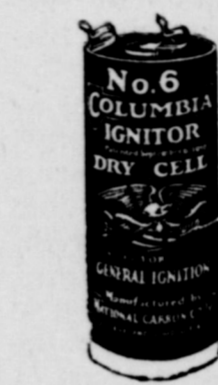
