DR. ROBT. J. ORR, NOTED PHYSICIAN AND SURGEON SUDDENLY PASSES AWAY

Last Friday evening at 10 o'clock at his home in Marfa, Dr. Robert J. Orr, following an attack of acute indigestion, after his friends thought all danger was over suddenly passed away. Never in the history of Marfa was there ever a death which caused such universal sorrow and regret as that of Dr. Orr. He had not lived here very long, probably not longer than four years. Yet in that time he built up a large practice, which was daily growing, and had by his skill and humanity cleared himself to many in every walk of life.

The funeral services were held from the Methodist church of which he was a member. The Pastor Rev. J. L. Henson, conducted the services, assisted by Rev. C. S. Harrison of the Baptist Church and Rev. J. S. Stockard of the Church of the Disciples. Amos Kerr, F. M. Smith, H. A. Anderson, Russell Kleinman, Hans Briam and John Highsmith, acted as pall bearers.

Sunday morning at the Under-aker's parlors, the casket containing the body was opened and the public was permitted then to view the remains. From 10 o'clock a. m. until 3 o'clock p. m. a continuous stream of people, mostly his Mexican friends passed by and with bowed heads and with tears streaming down the faces of many, looked for the last time on the silent, still face of the physician.

At 3 o'clock the funeral director G. Young accompanied by the pall bearers conveyed the body to the church, and there in part was held the last sad rites for the departed. At the door of the church garlands of beautiful flowers were heaped up

on the casket, and then the pall bearers bore it before the altar, which too was nearly buried with beautiful tokens of sympathy and love which friends had brought. Every seat was taken, the gallery was filled and many could only find standing room. After the services the body was taken to the cemetery where amidst a very multitude of people, the final offices of the church were held.

Dr. Robt. J. Orr was born in North Carolina 51 years ago. He was the only son of a Baptist Minister and was of Scotch-Irish descent, his people being among the descendants of that large colony of Scotch-Irish who settled in the old North State during the stirring times of the Revolution. He was related to the famous Author Thos. J. Dixon.

He is survived by his wife and several children. Only his wife being present at the time of his death, two daughters being in California, and a son attending school at Sherman, Texas.

Dr. Orr, at the time of his death, besides conducting the Marfa Clinic associated with Dr. J. H. Simpson, was county and city health officer. Some of his most intimate friends now claim that the cause of his death was overwork. He would never consider self—it was the need of others which compelled his service. Often he has been known to rise from a sick bed to go and minister to someone in distress or sickness when he himself needed rest and care. His loss will not only be felt in Marfa but throughout the county and in neighboring towns—and the place he filled in the hearts and confidence of the community will indeed be hard to fill.

In Memoriam

On the death of Dr. Robert J. Orr, who died at Marfa, Friday, the 18th of November, A. D. 1921.

The physician lay sick. He who so often with kind words and infinite skill had ministered unto others, was being attended by the loving and watchful care of an other. It was not dreamed the end was so near, that the black shadow of Death was just hovering outside the chamber door. He would arise in the morning—the need and care of others called him to duty. But not so, quietly and peacefully as a tired child, or as one during the toil of day was weary with the load stops awhile on the way, he closed his eyes in the sleep that knows no awakening here, and the brave, kind and gentle spirit left the precincts of the day. And to us the physician was dead.

The word was whispered near, then carried far—our friend is dead! It was so sudden, strange, so unexpected. How could one so busy, so full of life, so intent on helping others, die and leave his friends, the afflicted and suffering, his loved ones? How he will be missed. His place, how difficult to fill! The lame, the halt, the afflicted, the rich and poor, the old and young, all, the city, the county, humanity have suffered a great loss. His passing was a tragedy—filled with sorrow and tears. Yes, the great loving physician has gone on a long journey—he will not return. The call for him will sound in vain now—he has gone to that bourne whence no traveler ere returns.

For hours the casket lay open for his humble friends to pass by and look for the last time on the still form—upon whose kingly lines the seal of mystery had been placed, to gaze on those marble cold hands once so skillful to touch with the healing art natures adversity. Hundreds passed by, the poor, the old, the outcast and the alien. He was a friend to mankind—and the universal cord of human sympathy was touched. He lived for Service. He visited the poor, and sat by the bedside of the lowly, and with ready touch and sympathy his healing art had ever been given freely and without price to the afflicted ones. They remembered—and now he is soon to be taken away from them. They wanted to see him for the last time, and so with silent steps and slow—with sad faces and tears falling, they paid their only tribute—a tear.

Then the body was taken to the church house, and there were many, who, on account of the crowd and the press had not seen him, followed. The casket, as it entered the Sanctuary was laden with flowers, and there being no more room, were heaped about the railings of the chancel, even up to the altar. The throng being so great many stood throughout the services for the dead and the words of consolation and exhortation to the living. The flowers and the crowd—and here were tears and sorrow too—these were the tribute of the living. For the physician went about in many places doing good and waiting on those who were imprisoned with pain. Whether in high places it mattered not—and they mingled their tears with those that followed. The great Leveller had struck—a shining mark had been touched, and many of the man-made things disappeared. Sorrow enters with death alike the abodes of all, whether it be the lowly home of the peasant or the lordly dwelling of the prince. The silver cord had been loosed and the pitcher broken at the fountain. The good physician was dead.

And they took his body to the sepulcher in the city of the dead and a great multitude followed. The young and the gay, the old and sad, the rich and poor, the lowly and those of a high estate, all followed to witness the final scene—to place on his grave the flowers and whisper good bye to the loved physician—for he was gone—Dead!

"There is no death; what seems so is transition;
This life of mortal breath
Is but a suburb of the life Elysian,
Whose portal we call Death."

Now death where is thy sting? And Grave, where is thy victory?

The Good never die. They will live among us in the memory of deeds and in the glorious lessons of service. The truly great live on—they are immortal! And we shall not always sleep in that silent place of the Dead. The good physician will rise again. The call will be given for him in that last day, and the Great Physician over all will call him home to Glory, saying as he enters in at the gate: "Well done thou good and faithful servant, enter into thy rest."

ROBERTO NUNEZ SLAIN AT RUIDOSA

Two Suspects in Jail at Marfa; One Held by Officers in Mexico

Last week the town of Ruidosa on the banks the Rio Grande, was startled on learning of the assassination of Roberto Nunez. For some time Roberto was the carrier of the U. S. mail from Candelaria to Ruidosa. It seems that he was at home with his family, and about 9 o'clock p. m. was called to the door by some one. On reaching the door a gun was placed at the side of his head by someone standing at the side and he was instantly shot to death.

The next day two Mexicans were arrested as suspects or of knowing who the guilty party or parties were. These two men were brought to Marfa Wednesday evening and lodged in jail.

Mexican officers on the other side of the river arrested a Mexican who it appears was implicated in the murder and he was carried to Ojinaga and he will probably be turned over to the American authorities.

A great deal of excitement and indignation is felt by all classes at Ruidosa over this foul murder. The Nunez family is one of the best known and respected in this little border town. His father Rujino Nunez with his sons being engaged in merchandising, farming and ranching.

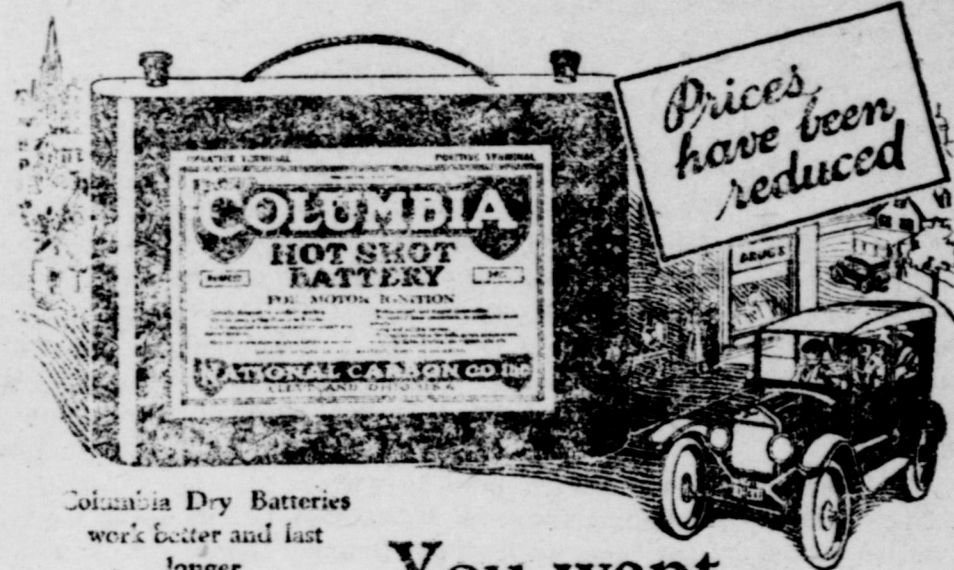
