Army Officials Brite Cattle Visit Marfa Make Clean Sweep

On Tuesday at 10 a. m. Assistant Secretary of War Wainwright, accompanied by Gen. James G. Harbord, deputy chief of staff, with headquarters in Washington, arrived in Marfa. Major Gen. John L. Hines, commander of the Eighth corps area, with headquarters at Ft. Sam Houston, San Antonio and State Senator John M. Dudley of El Paso, were with the party.

The squadron located here of the 7th cavalry, with Col. F. T. McNarney commander, were at the depot to welcome the distinguished visitors. Also they were met by many of Marfa's officers and prominent citizens.

At one o'clock a luncheon was served at the opera house by the Chamber of Commerce in honor of the visitors and a number of invited guests. The dinner was arranged by the ladies, with a number of Marfa's fairest daughters acting as waiters. The opera house was beautifully decorated and the service and viands were excellent.

H. O. Metcalfe in a splendid speech, welcomed the honor guests of the city. His address was responded to by Gen. Wainwright, Maj. General Harbord, Maj. General Hines and Col. McNarney.

A telegram was received at Marfa stating that at the Fat Stock Show recently held at Wichita, Kansas, the Brite cattle won first, second, third and fourth on yearlings, first and grand champion cup on calves. W. T. Jones won second on calves.

The Big Bend has surely been placed on the cattle map of the United States. In a recent editorial of the Denver Daily Stockman, the writer, in telling of the achievement of the W. T. Cattle Co., in placing Marfa on the map, having won a grand championship cup, wrote: "It is peculiarly within the power of breeders of live stock to advance his community. His own individual fame spreads when he attains extraordinary success in the production of animals that catch men's eye. Though his home address may be a mere whistling station, it rises at once to prominence when the world proclaims prowess of its inhabitants in owning the best bull, the best herd, the best drove, the best heifer or the best sow. It takes stock shows, fairs and printer's ink to do the business."

Marfa is now on the map again, and it will stay there in big capitals.

Judge Mead, since moving to Marfa, has shown that his reputation as a lawyer has not been misrepresented in the least. And without doubt he is a high class gentleman, and a citizen ever interested in the progress and well being of his country.

Presidio County, now the largest in the point of population in the district, has never had the honor of having one of its citizens in any district office. It seems that the time has come when a change should be made in this respect. If elected, Judge Mead will administer the law without fear or favor, and without question, will prove one of the most competent judges that ever sat on the bench in Western Texas.

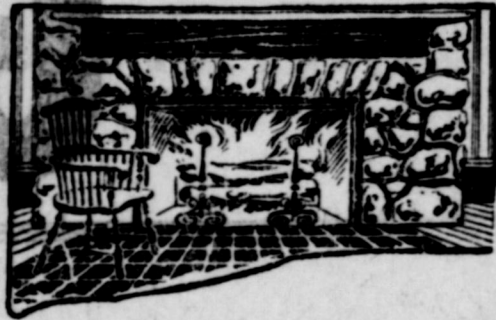
