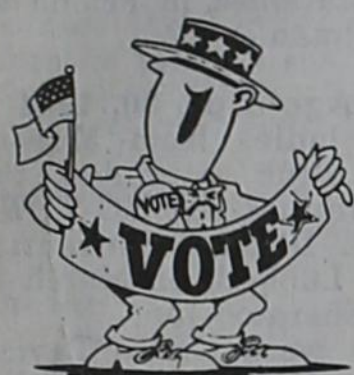

Friona ISD Receives Academic 2000 Literacy Grant

Friona ISD has been notified that the primary and elementary campuses will receive \$150,000 for literacy.

The primary objective of the Academics 2000 grant is to promote reading proficiency for students in kindergarten and first through fourth grades.

Friona ISD's Academics 2000 goals are: to impact family literacy; to provide sustained, quality staff development in reading for kindergarten, first and second grade teachers; and to provide instructionally appropriate books to support the individual readers.

The grant will enable each child in grades K-2 to acquire a hard back book each six weeks. The books will be used in parent training sessions to teach parents to be effective reading teachers at home.

TxDot Employees Lauded For Service and Safety

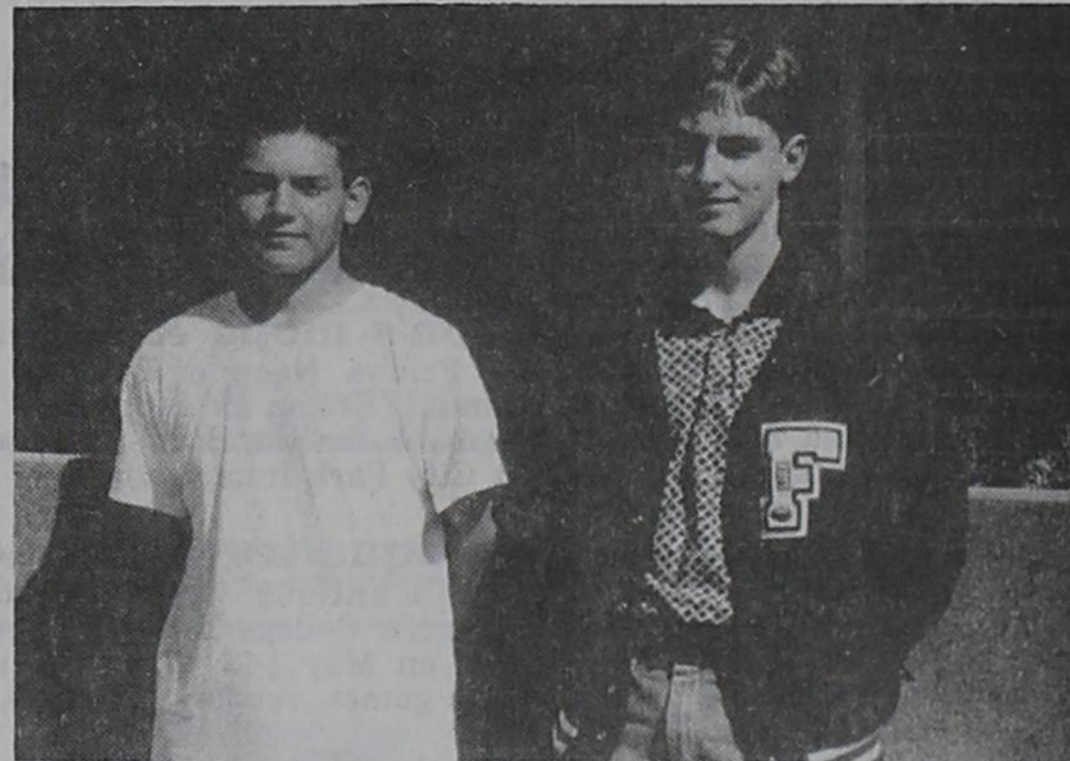

RECORDS ARE MADE to be broken. That's usually the statement that an aging athlete will make when some "young buck" breaks whatever record the oldtimer had held, and providing that the elder statesman has just a little class.

About the only record that Ye Editor can think of that he has held had to do with the presidency of the Panhandle Press Assn. Some years after I had served as president of the press assn., after talking to various of the older set, it was determined that I had been the youngest man to hold the office of president of the PPA, when elected in 1969.

I had to use the word "man" here, as there have been seven ladies who've served as PPA president in the 28 years since I was in power, and it isn't polite to ask some ladies their age, you know.

At any rate, when Roger Estlack of Clarendon was elected in 1998 as the press assn.'s fearless leader, he definitely broke my record. I was 32 when elected. Estlack was a mere "babe," at 28. He finished his term this month.

He should have definitely been the youngest "guy" president for the organization. Linda Haynes, Sandy Woods, Laurie Brown, Judy Luce, et al, will have to start a record for being the "youngest gal" to head PPA.

Roger Estlack also has a tie to Parmer County, in that his mother, Helen, is the former Helen Hartzog of the Oklahoma Lane community. Ye Editor attended school at Okla. Lane in the not-too-distant past!

Parmer County has been represented on two other occasions in the office, as one of the earlier PPA leaders was W.H. Graham, Sr., of Farwell, in 1938-39.

The late John Getz, also a Tribune publisher, held the office in 1971-72. John and Jo Ann were about the most regular attendees that the PPA has had, at least as long as the Ellises have been involved.

A former editor of the Friona Star, Dave McReynolds, served two terms as our PPA president. He was the publisher at Stratford by that time.

Longtime Blade publisher Dolph Moten was also an active member of the PPA, but didn't get into the organization's "politics." And now that our managing editor Ron Carr is becoming involved, we'll have to boost him along this line, so he can keep Parmer County's tradition going.

It's been my privilege during my PPA membership, to have known several people that I consider "legends" in my profession, including:

Longtime Amarillo Globe-News editor Wes Izzard, Jimmie Gillentine of Hereford, Doug Meador of Matador, Ben Ezzell of Canadian, Harold Hudson of Perryton, Wendell Tooley of Floydada and Tulia, just to name a few.

A Globe-News photographer once snapped me with Mr. Izzard, whose "A to Izzard" column for the Globe-News was a page 1 fixture for years. The photo has adorned my office wall for quite some time.

Oh, well...records are made to be broken, they say.

Jimmie Cassity Winter was born in Corpus Christi. She graduated from Cuero High School at Cuero, Texas. Jeff and Jimmie were married in 1992 at Liberty, Texas. They moved to Amarillo in 1996. They founded World Family Harvest Church, a ministry to the unchurched of Amarillo, in 1996. Jordan was born March 31, 1998, at Lockney.

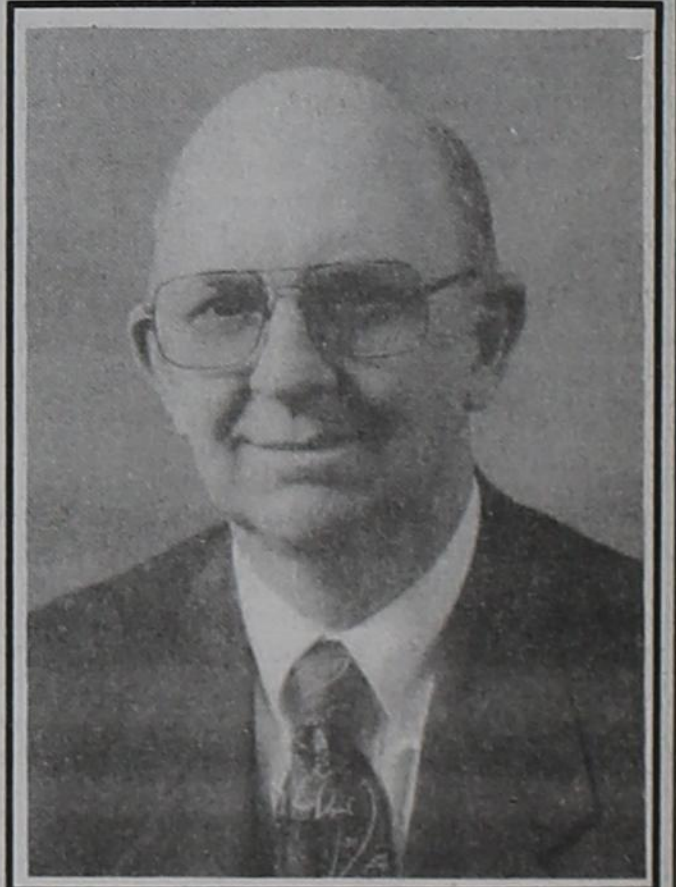

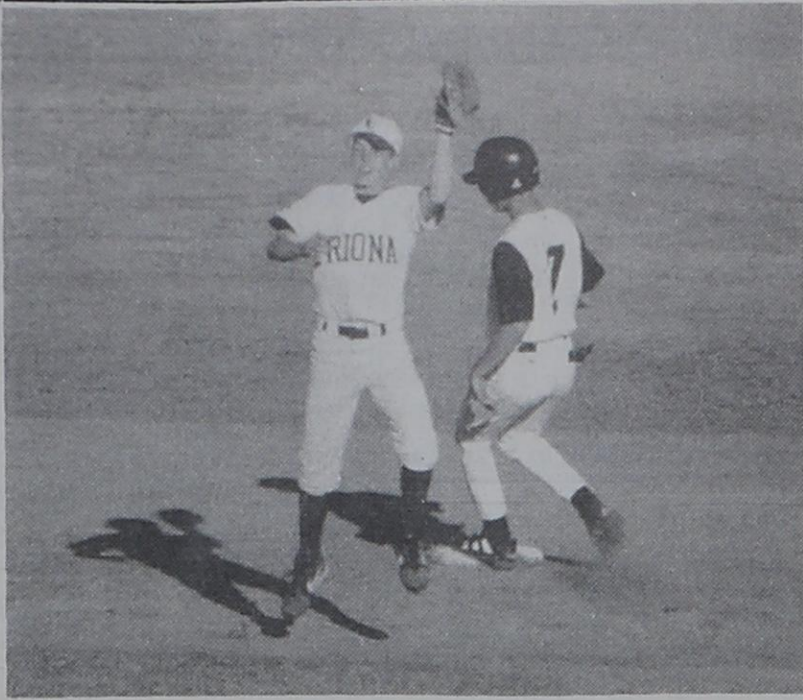

The Chieftains finished 2-8 in district and 6-12 overall.

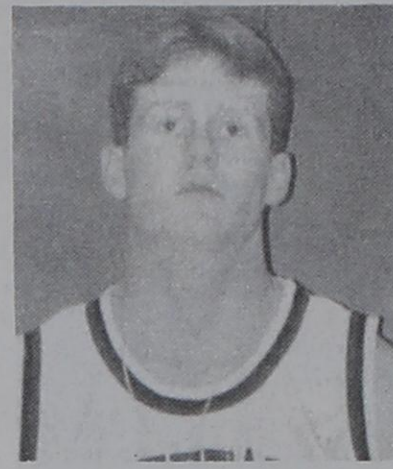

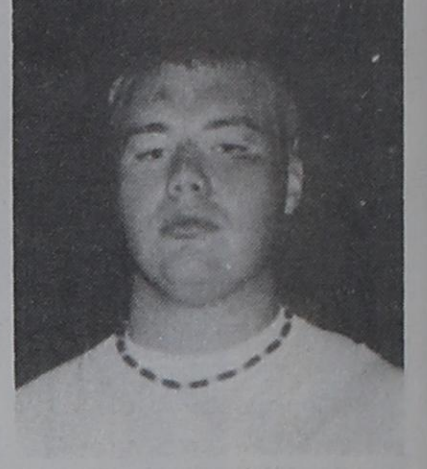

Duo Carries Chiefs' Colors To Regional

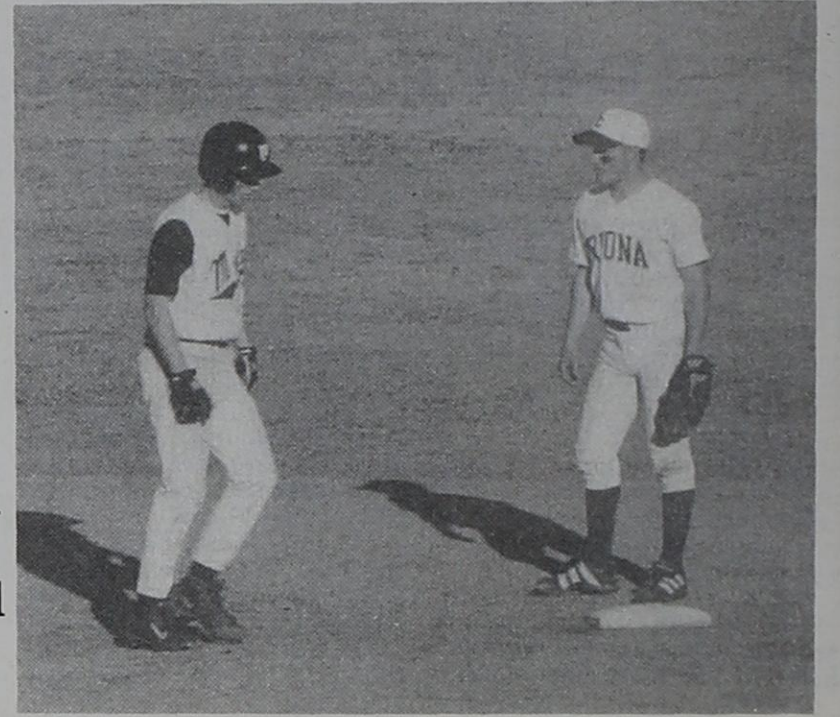
Senior Justin Daniel and junior Daniel Wiseman are the Friona Chieftains' entries in this weekend's regional track and field meet at Odessa.

Daniel competed last weekend at Abernathy's regional qualifiers' meet, and placed fourth in the hurdles race with a 14.8 clocking.

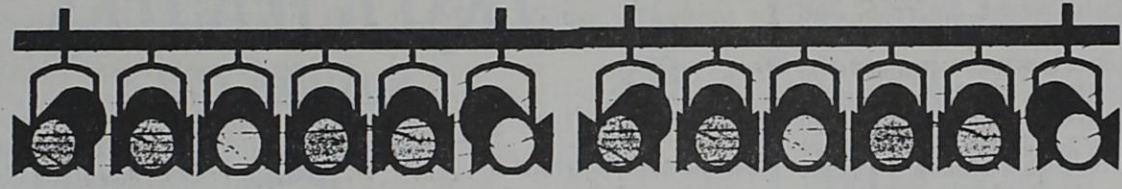
Last week's events, like those all spring, was held in cold (even rainy) weather, and the weather for the regional meet isn't expected to be much better.

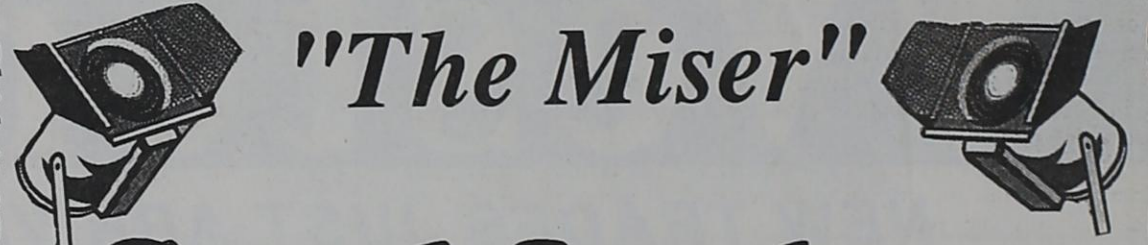
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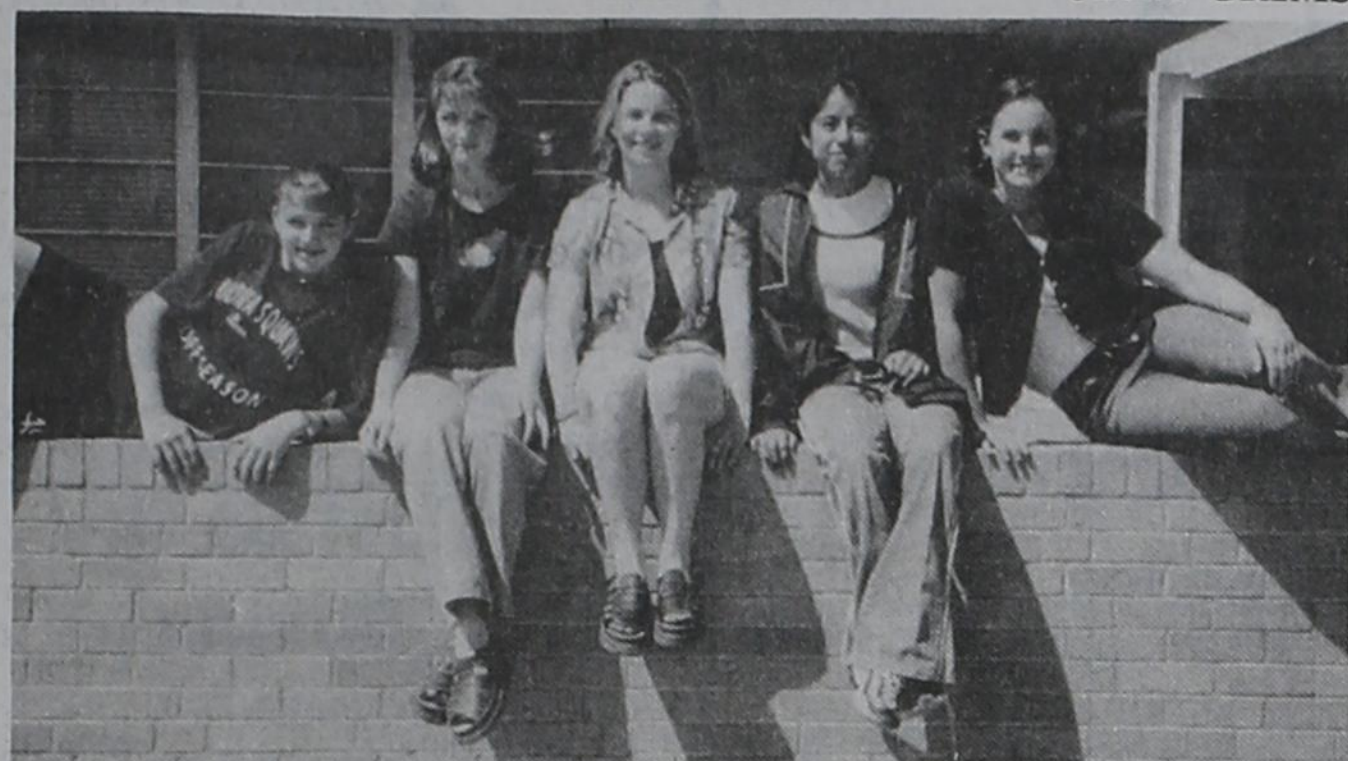

Squaws Enter Six Events At Regional

Eight members of the Squaws' track team are competing in the Region 1 track and field meet this weekend in Odessa.

Senior Whitney Ellis qualified for three events, the 100-meter hurdles, long jump and triple jump. Last Friday, she won the hurdles race in a regional qualifiers' meet at Abernathy, with a time of 15.07.

PLANNING FOR DISASTER

It's a familiar scenario: Large parts of our state are braced for a severe drought. This will be the second consecutive year that Texas agriculture faces hard times.

Already, extreme fire hazard conditions exist across a 167-county area in Texas. State and local authorities are talking about imposing water conservation plans and banning outdoor burning.

The governor and I are already requesting federal assistance to aid state and local fire fighting units so they will be ready to suppress the anticipated fires when they begin.

Such drastic measures are not usually needed until well into the summer. But we've learned from experience.

Last year's drought led to a \$2.4 billion drop in farm and ranch production, and the businesses that depend on farming and ranching — the implement dealers, feed suppliers, processors and the like — lost \$8 billion.

When ranchers sold their stock last year because they were unable to feed their herds, already low cattle prices dropped through the floor and made a tough situation worse.

Families plan for emergencies, the federal government should, too. Earlier this year I proposed that Congress create a special commission to examine the question of emergency spending by the federal government. The commission's purpose would be to develop a process by which Congress could set aside a certain portion of the surplus for true emergencies. Once such a fund is established, it could be tapped without throwing the rest of the federal budget out of balance. You'll recall that last year a \$6 billion emergency bill ballooned to \$20 billion in emergency spending at the end of the fiscal year. I want to avoid repeating such last-minute, crisis budgeting.

Texas has a rainy day fund that has helped it get through hard times without tax increases. I want the federal government to do the same.

It is true, though, that a number of emergency measures were called for in 1998. I successfully petitioned President Clinton for a speedy Emergency Declaration to get federal disaster assistance relief to Texas as quickly as possible. This enabled Texas farmers and ranchers to receive low-interest disaster loans and spurred the release of \$32 million to Texas in emergency federal funds.

I passed the Emergency Farm Relief Act to give farmers the option of receiving their Agricultural Market Transition Act payments for fiscal year 1999 on October 1, 1998, instead of waiting until January and September of this year. That bill made more than \$437 million available to farmers in Texas much earlier to help them cope with the cash shortage that they experienced due to low prices.

This was, literally, a matter of survival for many hard-pressed farm and ranch families. It allows farmers to use their payments as collateral for loans, or buy seed for this year, or pay their living expenses because the drought wiped out last year's crops.

In addition, I pressed Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman to ease the rule for emergency haying and grazing on Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) land. He did and it provided relief to livestock producers and helped minimize fire hazards.

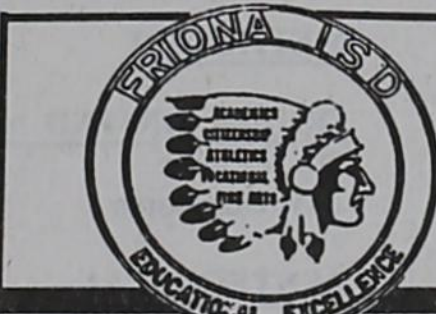
Americans have always responded to disaster with a helping hand. I want to take that tradition one step further, and ensure that when it's needed, help is already there.

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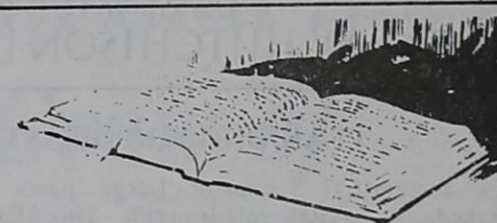

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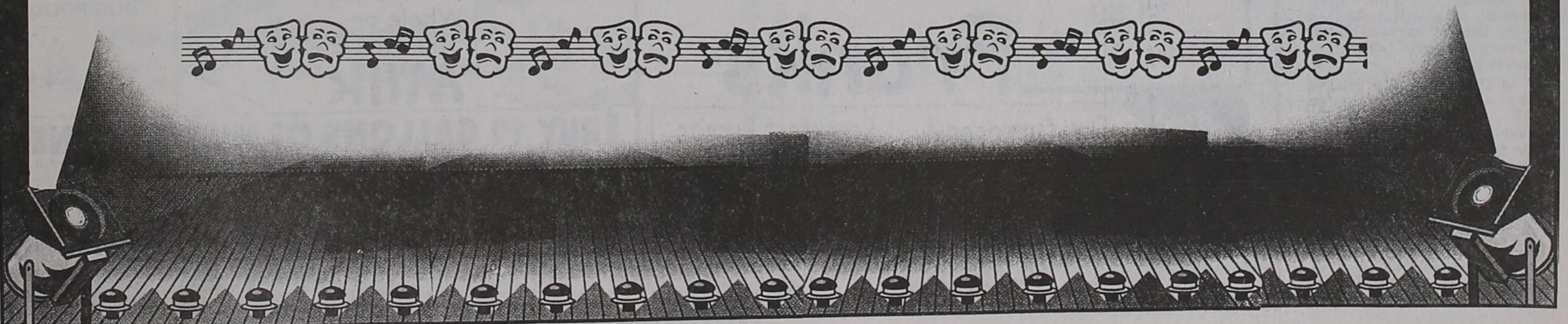

USDA Farm Service Reports News Update

Due to the heavy disaster workload, the final date to file an acreage report on small grains has been extended through June 15, 1999. However, the acreage report must be filed prior to harvest of the crop. Producers who will harvest small grain for hay and/or silage need to be sure to file their acreage reports prior to swathing and/or ensiling the crop.

We have discontinued mailing out appointment cards for a couple of weeks to allow our staff to complete Crop Loss Disaster Assistance Program (CLDAP) activities. We will resume mailing appointment cards out as soon as we get our heads above water on the CLDAP. Even if you do not receive an appointment card, you are not relieved of the responsibility of reporting all small grain crop acreage prior to harvest.

We will do our best to process your acreage reports when you come in. For the time being, acreage reports will be handled as best we can as you come in to the office. You may have to wait a little while to allow those accepting acreage reports enough time to complete work on other producers files. Thank you for your cooperation.

Producers who have received letters informing them of specific actions that need to be completed before their request for CLDAP benefits can be finalized, need to pay close attention to the required actions and deadlines for completing these items. We simply do not have enough time to follow up on each case to insure that all actions have been completed, so we are depending on you. If you have any questions, contact our office.

The following guidelines need to be followed to request "Wheat Loan Deficiency Payments and/or Wheat Loans."

All acreage of wheat planted for harvest as grain, hay, and/or silage must be certified in the county office before they are harvested. The fact that you have not been notified that you have an appointment and that you need to file your acreage report, does not relieve you of the responsibility to timely file the acreage reports and request for a loan deficiency payment.

Loan Deficiency Payments, CCC 709: If you will have production delivered for immediate sale under: 1) a contract, or 2) sold as it crossed the scales at the point of delivery, 3) or harvested on the 1/2s, you need to file a CCC 709, request for a "Direct Loan Deficiency Payment", before you start harvesting. The LDP payment rate will be based on the date of harvest and/or delivery (when beneficial interest is lost).

In 1998, several producers were unable to obtain an LDP on wheat delivered under contract or wheat that was sold as it was delivered because the CCC 709 was not filed before starting harvest.

Loan Deficiency Payments, CCC 666 LDP: If you will not sell your wheat when it is delivered you may request a LDP at any time after harvest is complete. To request a LDP following

harvest, you will need to file a CCC 666 LDP, request for a "Loan Deficiency Payment Application and Certification." The LDP payment rate will be based on the date your request is received in the County Office. This form must be filed prior to losing beneficial interest in the wheat, hay, ensilage, wheatlage, etc.

Wheat Loans: Another option to keep in mind is the availability of the regular nine month CCC Commodity Loan. The county loan rates are not available at this time. However, we don't expect much deviation from the 1998 county loan rate of \$2.67 per bushel.

Producers will have two repayment options: 1) repay the principle plus interest, or 2) use the marketing loan repayment, which allows you to repay the value of the grain based on the Posted County Price in effect on the date of repayment. Interest charges are waived when this option is used to repay the loan, and a marketing gain will be earned.

Effective April 19, 1999 the Farmer County FSA Office will be open to the public continuously between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. The Texas State FSA Committee has established these hours of public service for all county offices in the State.

Effective April 28, 1999 we will be closed each Wednesday morning to complete work on CLDAP activities. We expect to resume our regular schedule after CLDAP activities have been completed.

COTTON NEWS

From Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

With a lot of road yet to be traveled, Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. (PCG) continues to advance its thoughts and concerns about crop insurance to fellow industry members and to the legislators that will eventually put forth a reform plan.

PCG has worked on crop insurance issues for many years. What appears to be different this time is the emphasis placed on improving the overall performance of the agricultural safety net following 1998's adverse weather and price situation.

Both House Agriculture Committee Chairman Larry Combest and Ranking Committee Member Charles Stenholm have commented on the lack of protection afforded by current insurance products and have called for an overhaul of the system.

PCG officials have been working to develop a crop insurance priority list that includes changes producers feel are necessary to make insurance a viable risk management tool.

PCG representatives traveled to the American Cotton Producers (ACP) meeting in Dallas this week to discuss crop insurance and other important cotton related issues. ACP is the producer arm of the National Cotton Council.

The week of April 26 will find PCG representatives and members of the Texas Cotton Producers organization in Washington, DC visiting about crop insurance issues with members of the House Agriculture Committee staff, USDA and the National Cotton Council.

Key concepts being communicated by PCG at this time include:

1. The importance of providing yield coverage levels that track producer expenses during the growing season so they have opportunity to recoup production costs through the time a loss occurs.

2. Provision for a harvest incentive that encourages producers to produce.

3. And, the need for programs that protect against price fluctuations beyond the control of individual producers.

PCG will continue to "put meat on the bones" of crop insurance reform as the process moves forward and communicate the latest developments to producers.

Signing of an agreement between China and the United States on agricultural trade issues could mean positive changes are on the horizon for cotton exports.

The agreement, signed April 10, is part of the effort by China to gain membership in the World Trade Organization and should significantly open Chinese markets to U.S. agricultural goods.

For cotton it means the establishment of Tariff-Rate Quotas (TRQ) which will allow cotton imports up to the quota level to be charged a minimal tariff (1% for cotton). For cotton this means that up to 3.4 million bales of cotton a year, growing to 4.1 million bales in 2004, would qualify for the minimal TRQ rate.

Under the agreement 67 percent of the imports would be available to private sector in China and 33 percent would be available to the state-run textile business, Chinatex.

Federal law provides, under Step 3 of the Cotton Competitiveness provisions, for the opening of raw cotton import quotas following 10 consecutive weeks where the price of U.S. cotton exceeds the world price by more than 3 cents per pound.

The Texas Lions Camp also offers a specially designed summer camping session for children who are diabetic, ages eight through 15. In addition to the recreational activities which make camp life fun, a medical team joins the camp staff in helping campers learn to control their diabetes. Individualized attention in health care encourages control of diabetes while children learn to eat properly, monitor their blood sugar, and give

their own insulin injections. "Diabetic children face a challenge to take proper care of themselves and take an active role in controlling their disease. Our goal is to assist them with these needs," says Stephen Mabry, Executive Director. Parents are also provided with instruction to help them continue to assist and encourage their children after camp is over.

Since its first camping session in 1953, the Texas Lions Camp has provided over 40,000 children with physical disabilities and diabetes with opportunities to learn from and enjoy the outdoors. The camp is a nonprofit organization, funded by Lions and private donations. Children attend the camp at no cost to themselves or their families.

Annual Reports Contain Valuable Information

Looking for a good read? How about the annual reports of your stocks and mutual funds?

Many people limit the study of their investments to watching market values fluctuate. But if you want to know why your stock or mutual fund performs the way it does, check out its semiannual or annual report.

The first thing to look for is the report to shareholders. This is a "state of the company" address by the CEO or president explaining to you, a shareholder and owner of the business, events that influenced your company's performance in the past year. This report typically relates economic and political conditions to your investment, attempts to explain why the market reacted in the way it did, and compares your investment's performance to that of similar investments.

For example, the annual report of a typical bond mutual fund might discuss how the currency crisis in Southeast Asia helped keep inflationary pressures in check and U.S. interest rates low. It might further examine how the concerns about world stock markets increased the demand for domestic bonds. Finally, it would probably compare the fund's results to the recognized bond indexes.

Reports to shareholders not only review past and current conditions, they also discuss circumstances that may affect your investment's future performance. These valuable discussions allow you to evaluate the reasoning and

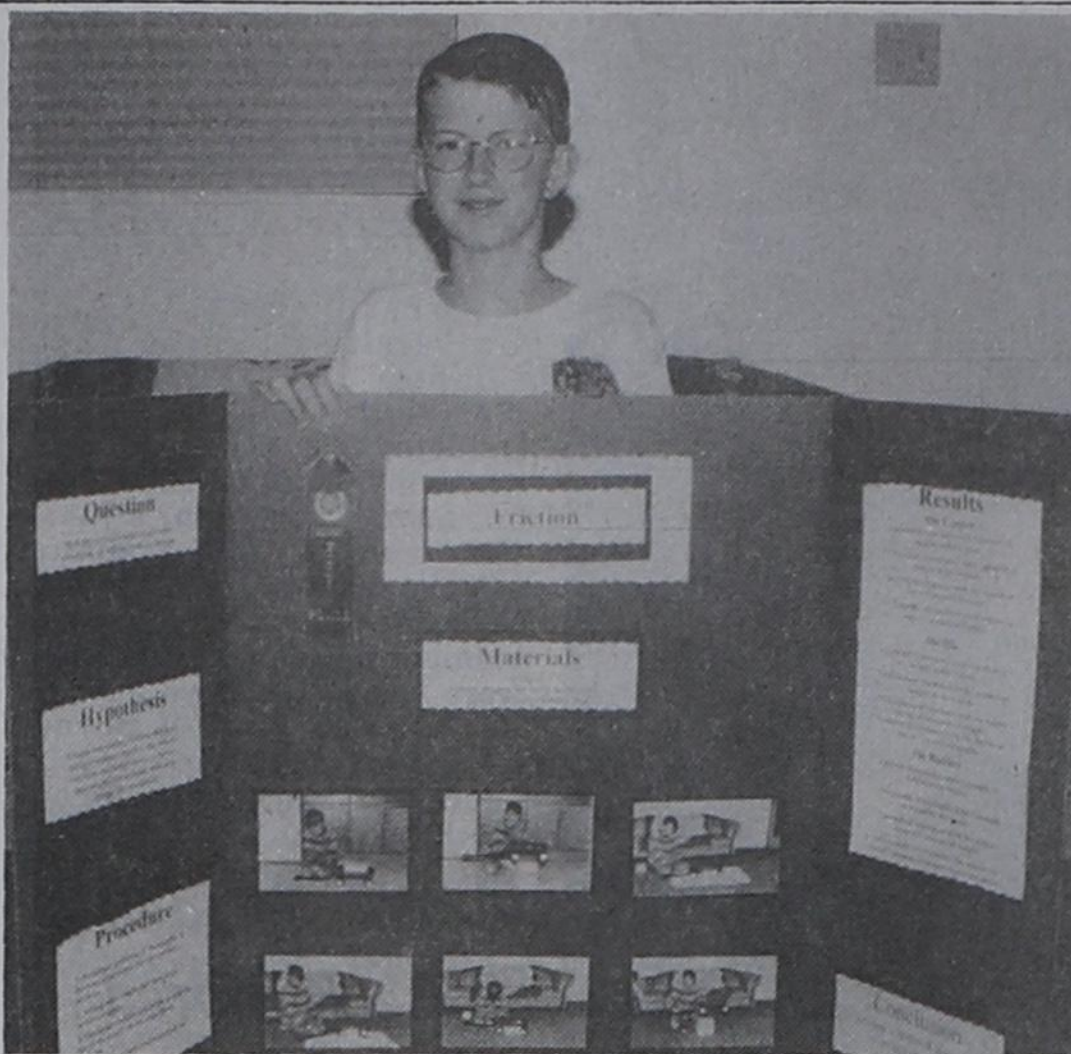
thought process of management.

In a mutual fund annual report, the statement of investments provides a detailed list of financial holdings, organized by asset category: common stocks, corporate bonds, government securities, etc. These categories are further divided by industry. Here you can see the names of all the individual securities, the number of shares held and the market values at the end of the reporting period. This section reveals exactly what you own and illustrates the diversification you enjoy from your investment.

Similarly, company annual reports include a section called "Products and Subsidiary Business." Here you can see the diversity of your company's products, and you may even discover profitable subsidiaries you might not have been aware of.

Finally, look for the performance summary. This section provides the dollars and cents on company performance and investment value. Mutual fund annual reports offer an easy-to-read summary of their average annual and cumulative total returns over different time periods. Typically, there's also a line graph comparing your fund's performance against one of the widely accepted benchmark indexes.

Companies spend a lot of time and effort to keep shareholders informed through their annual reports. They may not make the Book-of-the-Month Club, but annual reports are a must-read for any investor serious about financial success.

YOUR EYES

Contact Lenses-- And Glasses Too

Most contact lens wearers used to wear glasses. Most are glad they made the switch to contacts. Yet the truth is that contact lens wearers sometimes need glasses, too.

Sunglasses are a must for eye protection and greater comfort outdoors and when driving. They reduce glare and brightness.

Reading glasses may be advised for contact lens wearers. Some who wear contacts adjust well to bifocal lenses or wearing one lens for distance vision and one for close work, but others prefer supplemental reading glasses.

Safety glasses should be worn by anyone who works with machinery that creates dust or throws off debris. They are also indicated for sports like racquetball, basketball and underwater swimming. Safety glasses can be ground to prescription or worn over lenses.

Also needed: a pair of glasses with a current prescription to wear when eyes are tired or when contacts are lost or torn.

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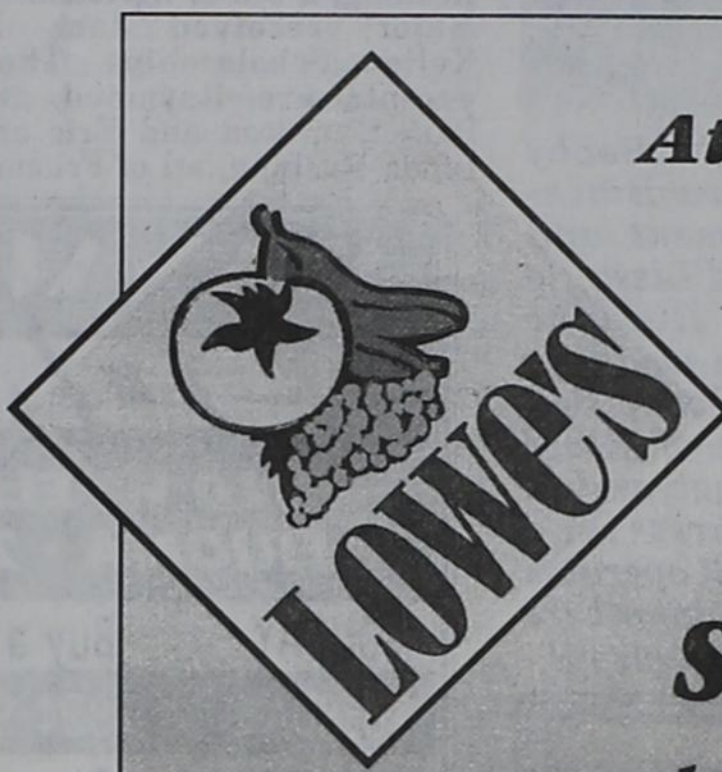

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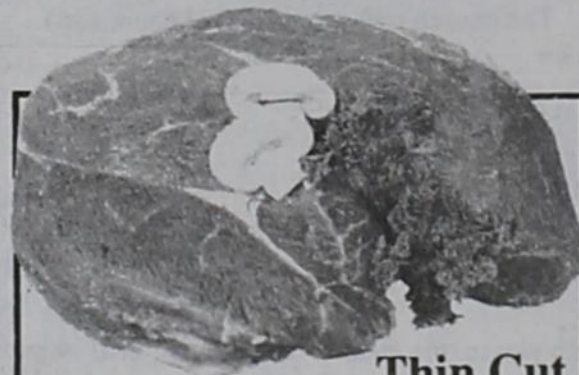
