The Baptist Campmeeting

Last Sunday was a big day at the tabernacle, it being estimated that fully 800 people attended the evening sermon.

There are visiting Baptists from all over Texas in attendance, and they have come in automobiles mostly, prepared to camp on the grounds through the entire meeting.

Every convenience for the campers has been arranged for—running water, electric lights, a big kitchen and out of doors mess hall—a fine camping sight, with well erected tents, large enough to house a whole family. In fact, nothing has been left undone to make the stay of all visitors very pleasant.

Some of the best preachers of the country have preached during this meeting and every service has been beneficial to the lives of men, women and children in attendance.

This Baptist campmeeting ground is located in the most picturesque spot in the Paisano Pass mountains and is an ideal spot to praise our Lord for the blessings He has bestowed upon us and to preach the Gospel to the masses.

The elevation of the camp grounds is an even 5,200 feet above sea level—it is the highest point on the Southern Pacific route from the Atlantic to the Pacific ocean, surrounded by high mountains on all sides, is only a few blocks from the railroad, in a thicket of live oak trees, and abounds with high grass, wild flowers and plenty of spring water.

We have seen many campmeeting grounds but none can surpass the Baptist campmeeting grounds at Paisano Pass—it is simply all that human hearts could wish for—and the Christian people who have been instrumental in dedicating this piece of West Texas soil to the work of God cannot be praised too much, for they have perfected the ways and means of converting souls of many a hardened sinner, for the beautiful scenery, the song of wild birds and fresh cool, bracing air, mingled with the songs of Christian people and sermons preached by able ministers, will turn the hearts of every one to praise the Lord for having led them to this enchanting place.

All those who failed to attend this wonderful campmeeting have indeed missed something worth while, for it was a chance of a lifetime to hear the word of God preached by some of our country's most noted preachers of the Gospel.

The bear was about a year old and was making his way from the Paisano mountains to the Davis mountains, following the railroad right of way to within sight of Marfa.

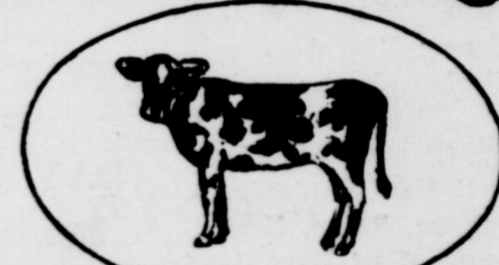

NOTICE TO OUR PATRONS

It becomes our duty to inform our patrons of the fact that as a result of a Government analysis of our ice and water, we would caution them not to use our ice but for refrigerating purposes only. Do not use for ice tea or consume it in any other way, nor to use our water for drinking purposes before boiling. We make this announcement in justice to the public and to our selves, for all we can say in regard to the matter is what the following letter of Maj. McMillan reveals and which reads as follows:

Dear Sir:—I am enclosing you herewith copies of Bacteriological examination of water used by you in the manufacture of ice, also same after it has been frozen. You will note both are grossly contaminated with colon bacilli, showing that your well is being polluted by cess pools or similar sources.

Your product is unfit for human consumption and its use should be limited to refrigeration only.

It is with regret that I find it necessary to recommend that the purchase of your product by the troops stationed here be discontinued.

We further wish to announce that we have made arrangements with the Government to tap their water main and to use the water pumped from the deep Government wells for the manufacture of ice temporarily.

To do this it will take us from four to five days, so for that length of time we would caution our patrons to use our ice only for refrigerating purposes.

We have also taken samples of our ice and water from our wells and reservoir and sent them to our general offices at San Antonio, for further analysis.

What our further plans are in remedying this evil we do not know at this time nor can we say what they will be until further developments, but whatever we decide on will be made public through the columns of this paper, so as to post all of our patrons.

We regret very much that this evil exists and feel that it is no fault of ours, but is caused from sources unknown to us.

It may be that we will have to case off the first two stratas of water in both of our wells and use only the water from the 350 foot level or we may have to dig our wells still deeper to insure purer water. At any rate we will leave nothing undone to give our patrons pure ice and water just as quickly as possible. Until then they should heed our warning.

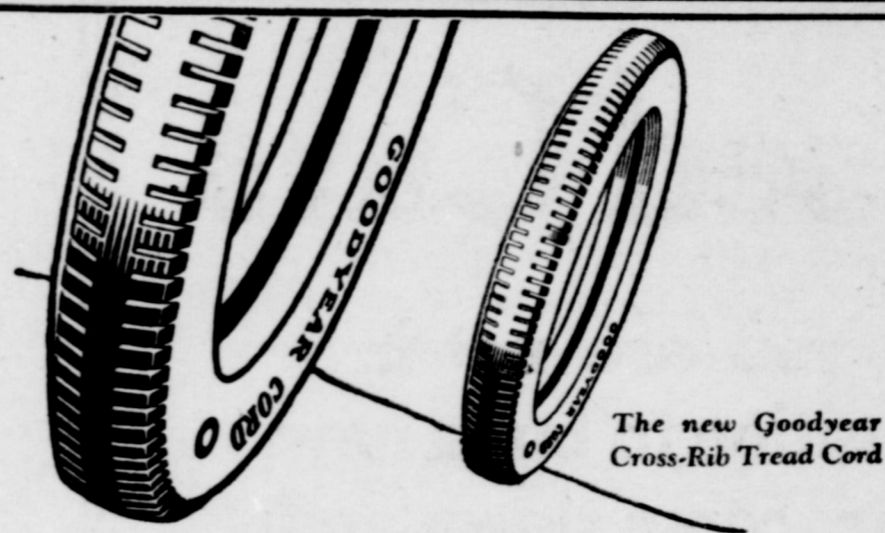

FLOUR MILLS BUSY
