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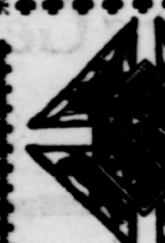

## LETTER FROM OLD MEXICO

The following letter was received by the editor from Harry E. Craig, a former citizen of Marfa who lived here many years ago when we first landed in Presidio County, and it makes us feel good to know that he is still in the land of the living, even though in a foreign country.

Mr. Craig was at one time one of Marfa's leading business men and a real good hustler, but being a great lover of the outside life, Marfa became too much civilized for him so he departed for Old Mexico.

He left Marfa many years ago and served in several revolutionary armies in Old Mexico as a physician and finally located in Las Esperanzas, Coah. where he is now practicing medicine.

Mr. Craig has many friends in Marfa and Presidio County who will be glad to hear from him, and for that reason we publish his letter in full:

Las Esperanzas, Coah., Mexico.  
Mr. Henry W. Schutze,  
Marfa, Texas.

My Dear Old Friend Henry:—

I am just in receipt of the New Era, mailed to me at the wrong address. I received same with thanks. I am sure I read every word and got world of news from Marfa and its surroundings. I saw many names mentioned of whom I know so well, such as Judge Bogel, L. C. Brite, W. A. Wells and family, Jack Knight, Fletcher Tigner, E. C. Booth, Jack Rawls, John Humphris and many, many others to numerous to mention—all old timers of Marfa. I can truthfully say with considerable experience traveling around that take it as a whole, the best people on earth are the Marfa people. I hope some day to drop in for a little visit and give them all the once-over again.

This year will complete seven years for me here in Mexico. The first two years were rather trying, as the revolution was very bad and a "gringo" was a rather unfavorable person some time, though I got through without a scratch.

This part of the country often reminds me of Marfa when I first landed in Marfa nearly twenty years ago. For the last six years I have been living in mining towns and camps as well as on ranches and farming country also.

People here always draw their pay on Saturday and business of all kinds is at its full capacity Saturday afternoon and all night, Sunday all day and all night, in fact, Sunday is always the big day here in Mexico. Plenty of gambling, drinks of all kinds and cock fights the main sport.

What I like mostly is the good hunting and fishing grounds close at hand. I can hunt to my heart's content for deer, bear, panther, wild Mexican hogs, turkey, quail, ducks and squirrels. Then if I wish to go fishing, I crank up my Old Tin Henry and in thirty or forty minutes I am on the bank of a beautiful mountain stream where the bass are very plentiful, though uneducated to these artificial baits. So with my reel and rod I soon have all the fish I care to drag or carry to the car. Then I am off for home again, and that night to dream of the big one that broke my 24 or 26 pound test line and got away with my favorite Dowagiac. This is why I love Old Mexico. Not many fences and no land posted, telling you to keep out.

I have been practicing medicine since I have been here in Old Mexico. Though times have been hard I have managed to pull through.

Henry, any time you or any of my Marfa friends would care to come down here on a visit, I can assure you nothing would please me better, or any information I could send them, would be granted with great pleasure.

Write me how you and your family are. Send me a New Era now and then when you have an extra one to spare, for it is like getting a letter from home to get the New Era.  
With no more news, I will close

by wishing you and family, as well as all my Marfa friends, the best of health and success.

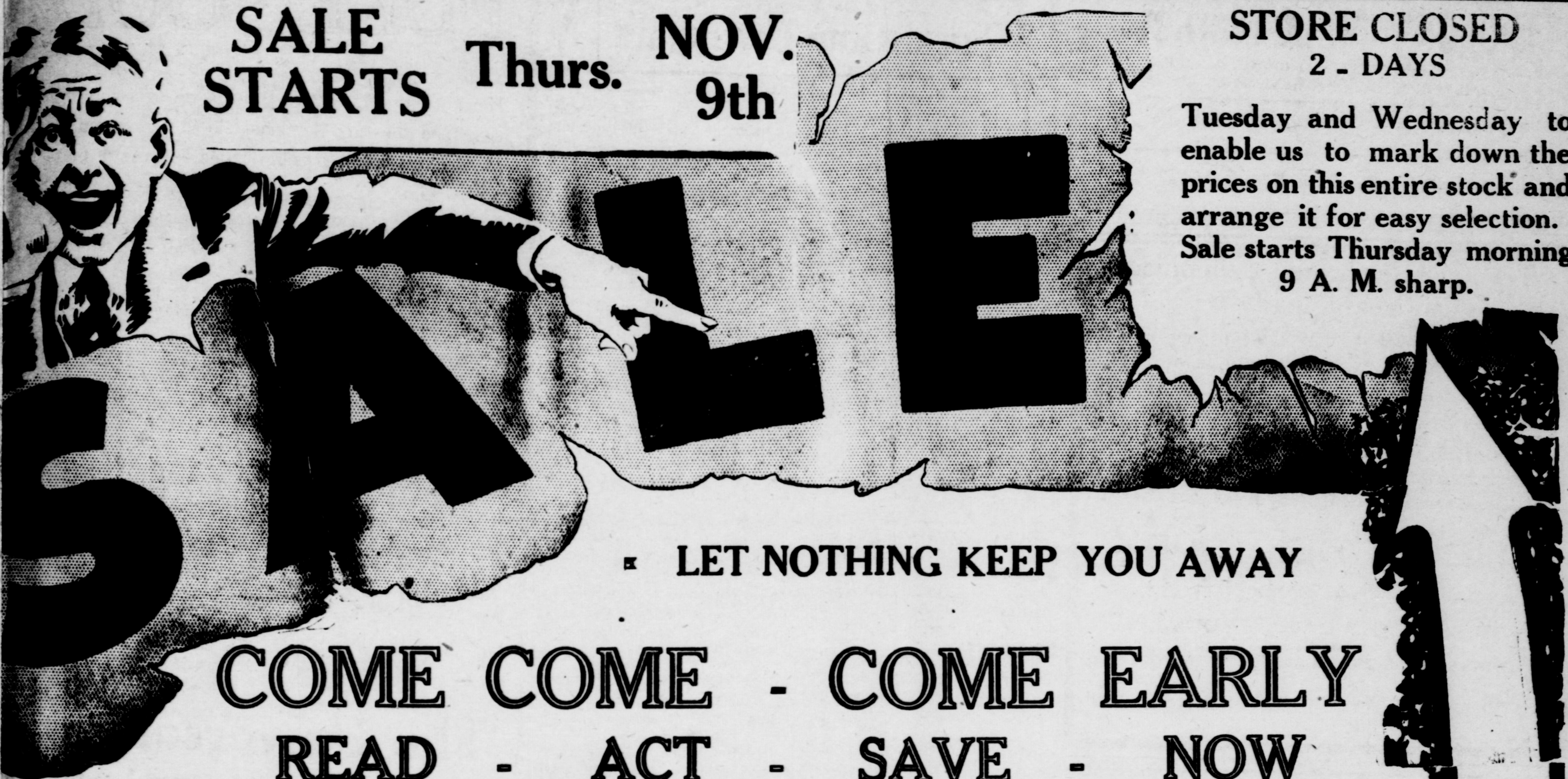
