### MRS. ANNIE AMERICA LACKEY

Marfa was grieved at the sad news of the recent death of Mrs. Annie America Lackey, which occurred at Alpine. Following is a mention, copied from the Alpine Avalanche.

Mrs. Annie America Lackey comes of an honored ancestry, long in favor with God and man. Her mother, as Mrs. Mary Bennett Hill, was married, first to Andrew P. Knox, and upon his death afterwards to Rev. Jesse Hord. To this union four children were born: W. J. Hord, Mrs. H. L. Lackey, the subject of this biography, Jesse and Sidney Hord. Rev. Jesse Hord was a pioneer Methodist missionary of the long ago, among the first settlers of Texas. On horseback, with saddlebags he traveled far and wide preaching the Gospel in the then sparsely settled woodlands and plains of Texas. He afterwards settled in Goliad, where he was the first day school teacher, and the first Sunday School Superintendent in Goliad County. Mrs. Lackey's mother died in Goliad County, March 13th, 1882, and her father, Rev. Jesse Hord, January 17th, 1886.

Mrs. Lackey, familiarly known in the large and goodly company of relatives as "Auntie," was born in Goliad March 2nd, 1846. She was committed to God in baptism the same year, another pioneer Methodist Missionary, Rev. Daniel Carl, performing the rite. She was converted and joined the Methodist Church in early girlhood, and remained true to God and, as well, to all the relationships and obligations of life to the end of her life. On August 24th, 1865, she was married to Herschel Lothgrove Lackey, in Goliad County, at a place then known as Middletown, and afterwards as Weesatche. Here they lived till November, 1883, when they moved to Alpine, being among the oldest settlers at Murpheyville, as Alpine was then called, no one coming here earlier, so far as the

writer can find out, except J. C. Bird and William Phelps, that is, among those now here. On August 12th, 1914, Mr. Lackey died here, and now Sunday, March 4th, 5:30 a. m., his worthy helpmate followed, aged seventy-seven years and two days. Like Zacharius and Elizabeth, they were both blameless in the sight of God and man. Good citizens, strong supporters of the Church they loved so well, kindest of friends to every body, as children of the Great King, together at last they are entering into their "Father's House of many mansions," in the city that hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God.

The funeral services were held at the Methodist Church Monday 4:00 p. m., conducted by the pastor, assisted by the Presiding Elder, Rev. S. E. Allison, of El Paso, once her Alpine pastor, and by the local Alpine pastors, after which interment followed in the Alpine cemetery.

Twenty-six relatives were in attendance upon the funeral from Austin, Victoria, El Paso, Presidio County and Alpine. Five great nephews, and another young man, a dear friend of hers, were pallbearers. Among the wealth of floral offerings that more than covered the grave, that to "Auntie" was conspicuously beautiful and large. The pastor adds his prayers and tears to those of the hundreds of Texas friends, and joins in the unanimous conviction that one of the most beautiful characters that ever blessed the world and graced the West Texas Highlands has been transferred to the church roll of the church triumphant.

Soon, we trust, a beautiful church building, so much needed by the Alpine Methodists, and desired by her, to be known as the Lackey Memorial, will be an outward token of the love, respect and honor that shall ever be associated with the names of HERSCHEL LOTHGROVE AND MRS. ### ADJOURNMENT OF 67TH CONGRESS

President Signs Farm Credits Measure and Many Others—Closing Scenes.

Washington.—The sixty-seventh congress, which had spent a greater proportion of its two-year span of life in actual session than any other in the history of the country, adjourned sine die at noon Sunday.

During the last few hours of the session President Harding, spending part of the time at the capitol, signed the farm credits bill, the Sweet bill for the liberalization of the veterans' bureau act and other measures. No legislation was vetoed.

Vice President Coolidge's gavel fell sharply at noon, after an almost colorless morning senate session of two hours, and the house adjourned at 12:06 p. m. after a concert by a section of the Marine Band and a chorus of popular songs by members and spectators.

The president reached the capitol at 11:25 o'clock and was kept busy reading and signing the final avalanche of bills. The last bill to become law was the "better butter" measure, changing butter fat standards. An important measure placed on the statute books at the last moment was the one providing for return to enemy alien owners of all seized property worth \$10,000 or less.

Reassembling at 10 o'clock, the senate heard "swan songs" by Senators Frelinghuysen, republican, of New Jersey, and Sutherland, of West Virginia, a tribute to Senator Williams, democrat, of Mississippi, by his colleague, Senator Harrison of Mississippi and tried vainly to pass a few more bills. A fifteen-minute filibuster by Senator Dial, democrat, of South Carolina, enlivened the proceedings before the vice-president's gavel fell in the midst of Senator Dial's speech against an omnibus pension bill pressed by Senator Bursum, republican, of New Mexico.

Previously, Senators Lodge, of Massachusetts and Robinson of Arkansas, republican and democratic leaders, appointed to confer with President Harding, had advised the senate that the president had "no more communications to make." Mr. Coolidge declared the senate adjourned "without day."

The final hours in the house were more colorful. The Marine Orchestra playing in the "well," vied for favor with a hastily organized quartet of members whose rendition of old favorites soon drew the entire house and most of the spectators, who overflowed the galleries onto the floor.

"Dixie" had its usual place on the Marine Orchestra program, and as its stirring strains filled the chamber cheers went up from the floor and galleries with the piercing "rebel yell" rising above the din. The Southern cohorts were led by Representative Ward of North Carolina.

Farewell eulogies occupied much of the time of the hour and a half the house was in session. Representative Fordney of Michigan, Campbell of Kansas, Kitchen of North Carolina, Alice Robertson of Oklahoma and Mrs. Huck all were given ovations, but Uncle Joe Cannon received the greatest tribute.

After praises of the retiring veteran of forty-six years of legislative service had been said by Representatives Hicks, republican, of New York, and Sisson, democrat, of Mississippi, Mr. Cannon was escorted down the center aisle by Representative Rodenberg of Illinois, while members and spectators stood, applauding and cheering.

Before the close of the session the democrats were placed in charge of the house while a resolution was adopted by unanimous vote, thanking Speaker Gillett for the "able, impartial and dignified manner" in which he had presided for the past two years. Representative Collier of Mississippi replaced Representative Campbell, the speaker pro tempore, and Representative Garrett of Tennessee, the minority leader, offered the resolution.

**Marshall Field Estate \$130,000,000**  
Chicago, Ill.—Property valued at nearly \$130,000,000 is included in the estate of Marshall Field, it was revealed this week, when Judge D. E. Sullivan ratified the investment of income from the estate in government bonds by the trustees of the property.

**Filipino Women Can Have Vote**  
Manila, P. I.—The Philippine senate has passed unanimously a bill granting Filipino women the right to vote. It provides that the law is ineffective until the Filipino women themselves decide by referendum whether they desire to accept their right of franchise.

**Pays for Ship Seizure**  
Washington.—Payment of \$12,239,852.47, the amount of the award rendered last October by the tribunal of arbitration, which passed on the claim growing out of the seizure during the war of Norwegian ships, was made to Norway Tuesday, by the United States.

**Corn Planting to Begin**  
Waller, Tex.—Farmers in Waller vicinity are preparing to plant their corn and other feed crops.

### THE KITCHEN CABINET

The test of friendship is its fidelity when every charm of fortune and environment has been swept away, and the bare, undraped character alone remains; if love still holds steadfast, and the joy of companionship survives in such an hour, the fellowship becomes a beautiful prophecy of immortality.

#### RAISINS AND FIGS

There is something yet in store for the person who has never eaten a ripe fig picked fresh from the tree or preserved and pickled when just in the proper stage of ripeness.

**Fig Dessert.**—Mix one cupful of fresh fig jam with two cupfuls of stewed rhubarb. Line a buttered baking dish with slices of buttered bread, pour over the fig and rhubarb, cover with a light custard, using a cupful of milk, an egg and a very little sugar. Bake until the custard is firm. Cover with a meringue and brown in a medium oven.

**Delian Raisin Pudding.**—There are raisins and raisins, but the meaty, rich, flowerlike, flavored raisin which is grown and cured under the skies of southern California is a fruit of which one never tires.

Mix four tablespoonfuls of cornstarch with four tablespoonfuls of brown sugar and four tablespoonfuls of cold water to a smooth paste. Heat two and one-half cupfuls of milk in a double boiler and stir gradually into the cornstarch mixture; cook until smooth and thick. Add three-fourths of a cupful of seedless raisins and cook thirty minutes. Remove from the fire and stir in four tablespoonfuls of broken nut meats, one teaspoonful of vanilla extract and one-half teaspoonful of lemon extract. Pour into a mold and chill. Serve with an orange custard.

**Fresno Raisin Pie.**—Pour one and one-half cupfuls of boiling water over two cupfuls of seeded raisins and cook five minutes. Mix one-half cupful of sugar, two teaspoonfuls of cornstarch, a pinch of salt; stir into the raisin mixture and cook until thick. Add one tablespoonful each of orange and lemon rind, four tablespoonfuls of orange juice, one-half cupful of broken walnut meats and a tablespoonful of butter. Pour into a pastry-lined pie plate, cover with pastry and bake in a moderate oven forty minutes.

#### WAYS WITH MEAT

**Ham** If properly smoked and prepared from young well-fed pork is one of the most appetizing of meats.

**Grilled Sugared Ham.**—Slice cold boiled or baked ham as for the table. Cut off most of the fat and fry out in a frying pan. Rub both sides of each slice plentifully with mustard, then with brown sugar. Fry in the ham fat until the sugar is melted and the ham nicely browned. Remove to a hot platter and garnish with sprigs of water-cress.

**Lamb Chops With Pork.**—Remove the fat and bone from six chops cut two inches thick. Wrap around each a thin slice of fat salt or fresh pork, overlapping and fastening well with a toothpick. Place on a greased broiler and cook until the meat is well done. Season with salt and pepper, spread with butter and let stand in a hot oven for three minutes. Remove to a hot platter, garnish with parsley and serve.

**Hot Ham Sandwiches.**—Chop some cold boiled or baked ham, mix with enough creamed butter to form a paste and season with mustard and paprika. Spread on bread which has been buttered and press together. Beat an egg slightly, add one-half cupful of milk and a little salt. Dip the sandwiches and fry in butter until brown.

**Macaroni With Ham.**—Cook a cupful of macaroni until tender, season with salt and cayenne and mix with a few tablespoonful of minced ham. Put into a buttered baking dish with a cupful of white sauce and a hard-boiled egg or two, cover with buttered crumbs and bake until the crumbs are brown. Serve as a luncheon dish.

**Veal Birds.**—Take veal steak, cut one-fourth-inch thick from the leg. Cut into pieces 2 by 4 inches. Lay on a piece of salt pork, roll and fasten with a toothpick. Brown in pork fat, season with salt and pepper. Put into a baking dish and cover with rich milk; bake in a slow oven for an hour and a half. Serve with the gravy slightly thickened in the pan. If the meat is rolled in seasoned flour before browning the gravy will be thickened by the time the meat is cooked.

Such vegetables as raw carrots, cabbage and green leaves are rich in vitamins.

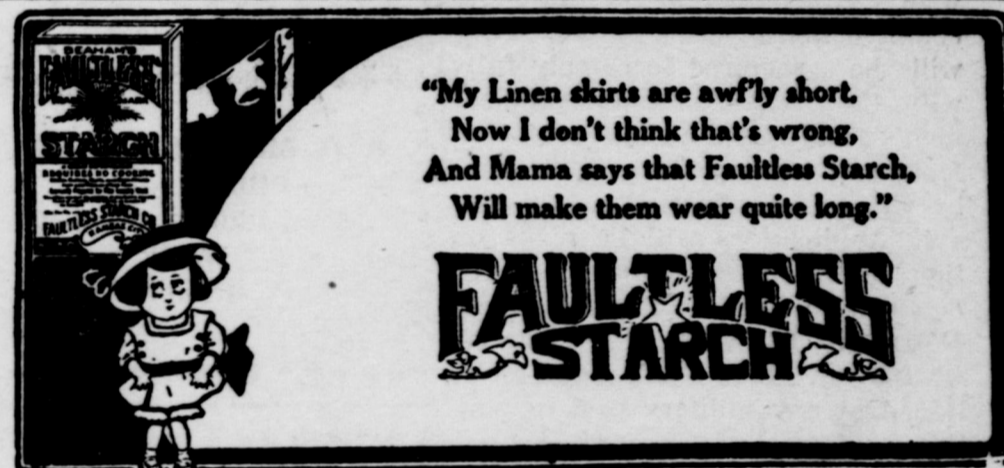

### SIMPLE EXERCISE FOR EYES RATHER APPEALED TO HER

Worth Remembering When One Has Been Forced to Overwork the Organs of Vision.

Memorandum No. 28.  
Appointment in the Medical Corps of the Regular Army

1. The preliminary examination of applicants for appointment in the Medical Corps of the Regular Army will be held at various stations in the Eighth Corps Area during the period of July 16-20, inclusive, 1923, under the provisions of Army Regulations 605-10.

2. To be eligible to take the preliminary examination, the applicant must be a graduate of an acceptable medical school legally authorized to confer the degree of Doctor of Medicine, must have at least one year's hospital training subsequent to the completion of a four year course of instruction in such medical school, or in lieu thereof, have served one year as a medical officer of the United States Army between April 6, 1917 and July 1, 1919, and must be between the ages of 22 6-12 and 31 6-12 years at the time of the preliminary examination.

3. Former officers of the Medical Department, Regular Army, honorably separated from service, and within the age limits and otherwise eligible, will be permitted to compete in the examination. They will be required to comply fully with the examination requirements and will not be exempted from any part of the examinations by virtue of prior service.

4. Applications will be made on the blank form for application for commission in the Regular Army (Form No. 88, A. G. O. see par 30, AR 605-10). This blank may be obtained at any military post or station or from the Adjutant General of the Army. The information given in the application must include names of medical schools attended, date of graduation, post graduate work completed, time spent in the practice of medicine, and a complete statement of military service, if any. The application must be accompanied by evidence of citizenship, if the applicant is of foreign birth, by evidence of the required hospital internship, and by certificates, based upon personal acquaintance, from at least three reputable persons as to citizenship, character, and habits. Applications should be promptly forwarded to Corps Area commander, 8th Corps Area, Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

5. Candidates who are found qualified by the Central Medical Department Board and who are not already members of the Medical Officers' Reserve Corps, will be recommended for commission as first lieutenants therein. Such candidates will be ordered to active duty under their reserve commissions to report to the Medical Field Service School, Carlisle Barracks, Pennsylvania, or to such other place as the Surgeon General may recommend, for observation and instruction.

6. At the expiration of a period of approximately four months observation and instruction, candidates will be given a final examination.

7. As a result of the final examination qualified candidates will be appointed first lieutenants in the Medical Corps, Regular Army. Candidates found not qualified, or not desiring to accept appointment in the Regular Army, may be ordered to their homes, and relieved from active duty, or discharged from their respective commissions in the Officers' Reserve Corps.

8. Any additional information will be furnished upon application to Headquarters, Eighth Corps Area, Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

9. This matter will be given wide circulation in the vicinity of your command and a copy of this memorandum should be furnished local newspapers.

LAWMAKERS HOLD BUSY SESSIONS

Latest Proceedings of Texas Legislature Now in Session at Austin.

Legislature to Adjourn March 14. Austin, Texas.—March 14 was definitely set as the date for adjournment of the Thirty-eighth legislature when the house Monday accepted senate amendments to the house sine die adjournment resolution. The session will end at noon March 14 under this agreement. The house originally had fixed next Saturday night for the close of the session, but concurred in the change made by the senate for the purpose of taking up all pending revenue measures.

Monday's Senate Proceedings.

Austin, Tex.—The following bills were passed finally by the senate Monday: By Wood—Changing the names of the normal colleges by omitting the word "normal," and designating each as a teachers' college and prefixing each with "the," making the titles read this way: "The North Texas State Teachers' College" of Denton. By Murphy—Increasing the pay of county authorities \$50 per month up to a maximum of \$3,600. By Witt—Empowering the state to condemn land along water courses as sites for machinery for oil development and sand and mud-shell shipments.

Monday's House Proceedings.

Austin, Tex.—The house Monday passed and sent to senate Lackey state ranger bill after striking out provisions for two additional ranger companies and for \$50,000 appropriation for their upkeep. Finally passed two bills carrying appropriations for new buildings at A. and M. College of Industrial Arts and North Texas Normal College.

Saturday's House Proceedings

Austin, Tex.—Local bills were given the right of way in the house Saturday and many thus cleared off the calendar. Senate bills were passed creating the Santa Cruz, the Ennis, the Midway and Palo Alto school districts, and house bills creating the Carbon, Bayside, Union Hill, Brownsboro, Denson, Lakeview and Knox City districts.

Friday's House Proceedings

Austin, Tex.—A bit of patriotic legislation was given right of way when the senate convened Friday, reflecting the spirit of the day, the anniversary of the signing of the Texas declaration of independence. The bill in question is that officially naming the fifty-acre tract of land purchased some time ago by the state in Washington County as a state park, the bill designating the land as "The Washington State Park," was passed finally, 28 to 0.

Friday's Senate Proceedings

Austin, Tex.—The house Friday refused to recognize the rule setting apart Wednesdays and Thursdays of each week to consider senate bills and continued to hammer away on house bills. No senate bills have been considered during the week.

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SENATE AND HOUSE APPROVE FARM BILL

Measure Formed to Aid Agricultural Interests of the Country.

Washington.—Both the senate and house approved the conference report on the farm credits bill Saturday, and President Harding signed the bill Sunday.

It was late Saturday night that the safety of the legislation was assured through the adoption, without a record vote, of the conference agreement by the senate. The house a few hours previous had approved it, 277 to 34.

Appropriations of the present session aggregated \$3,939,809,026.80, according to a statement by Senator Overman of North Carolina, ranking democrat on the senate appropriations committee. He said this was an increase of \$264,800,000 over those for the present fiscal year and much larger than the last pre war year of 1915, when the total was \$1,107,000,000.

The \$156,000,000 deficiency bill, with its appropriation of \$400,000 for the federal coal commission was prepared during the morning for transmission to the president. Another bill to which final approval was given was that of Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, extending the authority of the coal commission.

Washington.—The farm credits bill, proposing to establish two new banking systems, one government and the other private, to meet the financial needs of the agricultural industry, was passed Thursday by the house.

The vote was 305 to 36, chief opposition being registered by members from New York and the New England States.

The new federal banking system proposed would consist of 12 "intermediate credit banks" located in the same cities as the Federal Farm Loan banks, and with a capital of \$5,000,000 each. They would be authorized to issue tax free debentures up to a total of \$600,000,000, giving them aggregate resources of \$660,000,000, or nearly twice the amount which the war finance corporation has been called upon to advance to the agricultural industry.

Private credit corporations which will be authorized by the bill would have a capital of not less than \$250,000 each and their number would be unlimited.

It is these organizations that will make advances to producers of live stock on long term paper. There also would be private rediscount corporations having a capital stock of not less than \$1,000,000 each. Under an amendment adopted by the house the war finance corporation would continue to function until next January 31, by which time it is assumed that the new farm credit systems will be in operation.

German Debt Grows

Berlin.—Germany's floating debt, during the 10 days ending February 20 increased by 514,000,000 marks. This brings the total to 2,229,800,000,000 marks.

Fifty per cent of the miners in the Ruhr Valley of Germany, are to be given a vacation on full pay during March and the others are to be granted April on the same terms, according to information received by the French. It is conceded that such vacations would reduce the present production of the Ruhr mines approximately one-half, or to about one-fourth of normal.

New Rail Commissioners Named

Austin, Tex.—W. M. W. Splawn, professor at the university of Texas, and W. A. Nabors, of Wimborsboro were Tuesday appointed railroad commissioners to succeed Earle B. Mayfield, resigned, and Allison Mayfield, deceased. The former will succeed Earle B. Mayfield, while the latter will succeed Allison Mayfield.

Gets Insurance Credit

Smithville, Tex.—Smithville has been given a three per cent insurance credit on fire insurance rates beginning March 1: This credit is the result of small fire losses and a well equipped volunteer fire department.

Board of Equalization Named

Hempstead, Tex.—The board of trustees of Hempstead School District has elected J. H. Garrett, Sr., G. M. Lay and Jesse Sapp to serve as a board of equalization for 1923.
