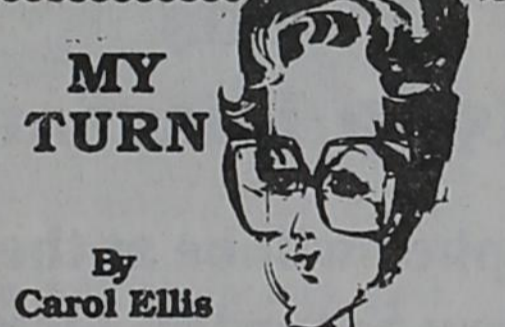

IMPROVED COOPER VISITS

Playoffs On Line For Chiefs Here Friday

With the new three-team playoff system in place by the UIL, a post-season appearance is the incentive for a Chieftain win tonight (Friday) when the Chieftains host Lubbock Cooper in a district encounter. Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m. The Pirates are definitely improved from last year's

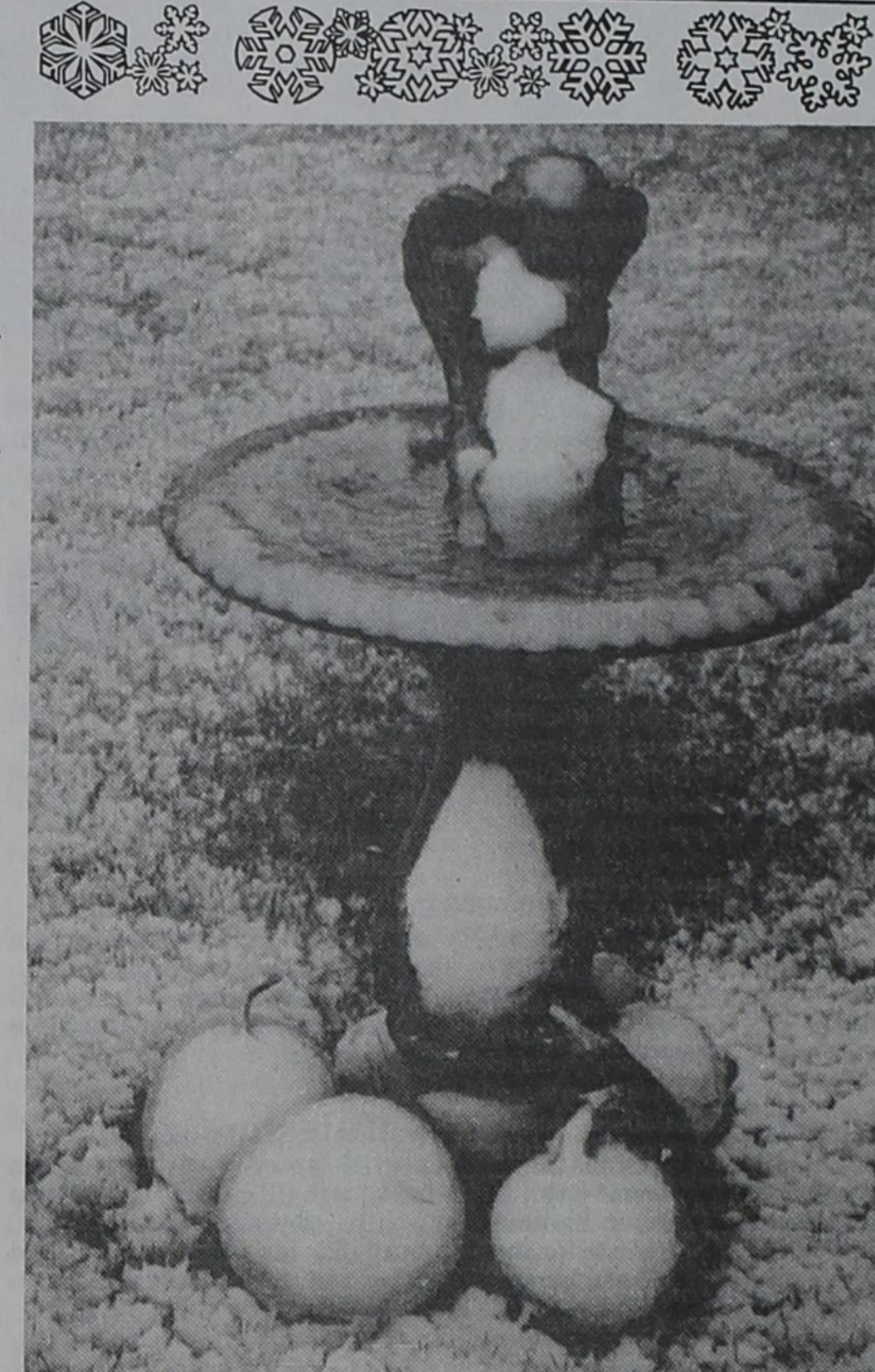
team, which went 3-7 for the season and 1-5 in district. Cooper stands 3-4 and 1-1 coming to Friona. "They are a dangerous football team, capable of scoring a lot of points. One of their problems this year is they haven't played real good defense, but they are highly capable on offense," said Coach Mike Scott.

Through seven games this season, Cooper is averaging 279 yards per game, which ranks the team third in the area, behind Friona and Lamesa. The Pirates have scored 175 points for the season, which is an improvement of 60 points from what Cooper had scored at this time a year ago. Running back Roderick Boyd and quarterback Stan Finch pace Cooper's backfield returners who have run up a total of 2404 offensive yards, which rank the Pirates a close third to Lamesa on the South Plains "top ten" list for class 3A teams, averaging 343 yards per game. Friona, by comparison, is averaging 361 yards per outing. Boyd is second in the area with 881 yards rushing. Noel Grajeda leads Friona with 758 yards and Joseph Bandy has 608.

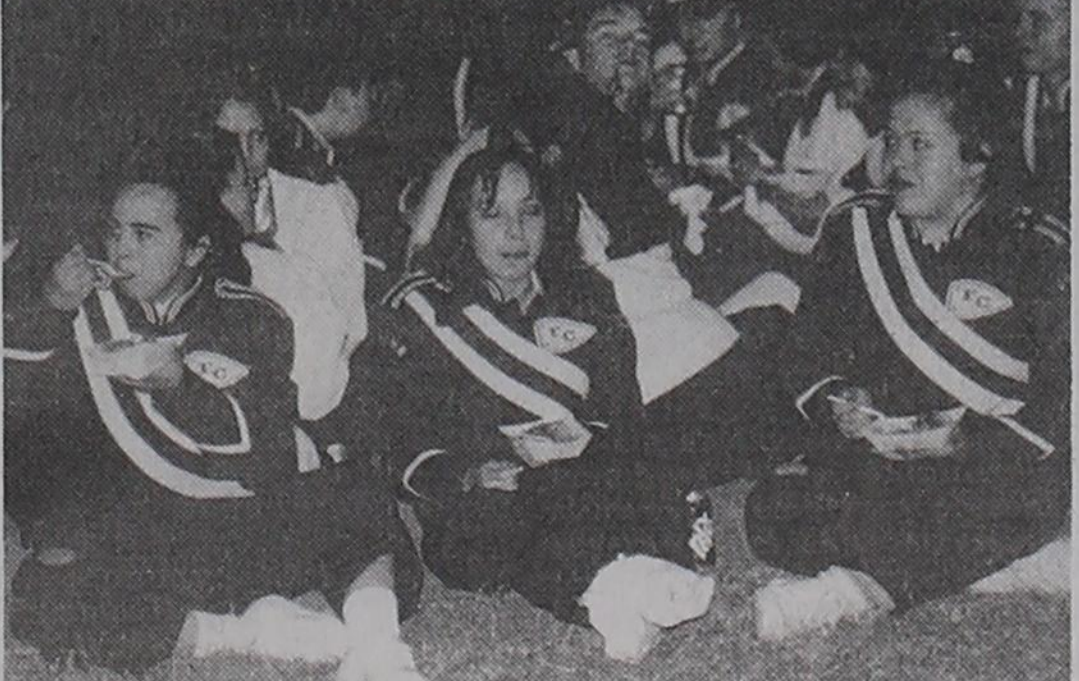
Calvary To Host Fall Festival

We have emphasized that as much as possible to the players this week. If we win we'll be in the playoffs; it's just that simple. It's our most important game so far," Scott said. The Chieftain mentor said the team had had a couple of good workouts going into Wednesday. "We need one more good one, and the rest will be mental," he concluded. Friona's big lineman Daniel Rosales (5-11, 200 pounds) came out of the Roosevelt game early last Friday with a sprained ankle, and the coach was hopeful that he could play this week. Receiver/defensive back Colby Ingram is still being slowed with a knee injury. Cooper started the season with 16 of 28 lettermen returning, which included seven offensive and eight defensive starters.



Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of The Friona Star

70 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 25, 1929

One of the most lamentable accidents that has visited this area in many years occurred a few miles northwest of Friona last Sunday shortly after noon.

James A. Wyly, a prominent farmer living in the south part of Deaf Smith County, was killed, and his wife and five children injured when their truck overturned while returning home from church services in Friona.

Something apparently went wrong with the steering mechanism, causing the truck to go out of control.

65 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 26, 1934

Last Friday afternoon and night and the greater part of the day Saturday, Frio Draw, which passes through the south edge of Friona was filled to overflowing with water as the result of a heavy rain that fell Thursday night over in New Mexico, over and to the south of Grady.

The entire portion of the road leading south from town was covered with the flood from the bridge that spans the draw north to Highway 33 and the highway itself was covered from the large bridge west of town to a point nearly a mile west of town.

60 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 27, 1939

Roy Wrigley of Davis, Oklahoma, who is employed on the farm of Mr. Wayne Moody three and one-half miles south of Friona killed an eagle out there the other day. Eagles are not too common in these parts, and we think this is news. The wing-spread was between four and five feet.

50 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 21, 1949

Rev. E. E. Houlette was in the Star office Monday and stated that he had accepted the pulpit of the Pentecostal Church at Portales, and he has already begun his

pastorate there. He will continue to live at Friona for a season at least until suitable arrangements can be made for moving to Portales.

45 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 21, 1954

Maize Harvest in Parmer County began in earnest this week and even at this stage of the harvest local elevators are taxed to handle the many loads without long truck lines being formed. The maize is said to be of excellent quality. Yields have been reported from 4,000 to 7,400 pounds per acre!

40 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 22, 1959

Scoring the first time they got the ball, and then coming from behind at halftime with a score of 28-8, the Tulia Hornets defeated the fighting Chiefs by a score of 34-28 at Chieftain Stadium Friday night. It was a district opener for both teams.

35 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 23, 1964

The 1964 Friona Chieftains can boast of something no local team has been able to claim for the past 30 years. By beating Dimmitt 28-6 last Friday, the

Chiefs now hold a two-game winning streak over their old rivals.

25 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 27, 1974

Friona women attended the area convention of the Women's Missionary Union, Amarillo Baptist Association, held at Claude Tuesday. They were Mrs. Doyce Barnett, named Area Acteen Director; Mrs. Clark Andrews, chosen to head Mission Study; and Mrs. Joe Talley holds the office of Nominating Chairman.

15 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 28, 1984

A former Friona resident, Michael James Murphy, will appear in a local concert on Saturday at the junior high auditorium. Murphy is the son of Rev. and Mrs. C. H. Murphy, former Friona residents. Rev. Murphy served as pastor of Friona's First Baptist Church.

10 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 21, 1989

Parmer County Memorial VFW Post 1413 was chartered in Friona on September 12, 1989.

Gail Thompson will become the first female member of a Friona Lions Club when she is installed as a member of the Friona Noon Lions Club.

5 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 22, 1994

Julia Warren of Friona is one of 48 first-year medical students who started classes this fall at the Texas A&M University College of Medicine. She is the daughter of James and Gretta Warren of Friona.

Jimmy and Rhonda Murphree are the parents of a baby girl born Sunday, October 9, 1999 in Hereford Regional Medical Center.

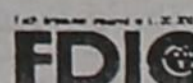

Chiefs Pound Eagles For Sixth 1999 Win

The Friona High School Chieftains scored on their first three possessions last Friday, and went on to post a 44-0 win at Lubbock Roosevelt, running their season record to 6-1 and their district record to 2-0.

"The team stayed focused. We played well in spots, and not so well in others. We had had a good week of practices, and got after them," said Coach Mike Scott.

On Friona's first two possessions, two members of Roosevelt's defense sustained injuries. The game was stopped for 15 or 20 minutes after Friona's first play on offense, while the injured player could be taken off the field on a stretcher.

The Chieftains managed to keep their composure, rolling 48 yards paced by the slashing runs of fullback Noel Grajeda, who had gains of 11, three, ten and one, the final yard being the game's first touchdown. Trent Cook came in to kick the PAT, giving Friona a 7-0 lead with 6:51 left in the opening quarter.

Kyle Wiseman sacked the Roosevelt quarterback on third down after the second short Eagle punt, Friona took over on their opponents' 48 yard line.

QB Nathan King hit Grajeda over the middle on a roll-out pass, good for 17 yards. Grajeda then blasted for ten yards, shaking off tacklers as he went. Two plays later, Joseph Bandy picked his way 15 yards for a touchdown, following his blockers, who led the way.

Cook's second kick was perfect, and the lead became 14-0 with 2:06 left in the opening period.

Roosevelt scored their only "earned" first down on the next series, but again were forced to punt.

Grajeda, King and Bandy took turns moving the ball upfield, after Friona took over on their own 30. King ran for eight yards on the option. He had ten more yards, but an early whistle ended the play.

The diminutive FHS signal-caller again rolled out for eight yards to the Roosevelt 27. Jesse Allen ran for seven, King hit Bandy for five yards, and then spotted Grajeda open in the end zone

with a perfect strike. Cook's PAT boot made it a 21-0 game, with 6:26 left in the half.

with a perfect strike. Cook's PAT boot made it a 21-0 game, with 6:26 left in the half.

Interceptions broke Friona's three straight scoring drives, but the Friona defense got into the act, when Josh Burleson sacked the quarterback, made him fumble, and picked up the ball and advanced it to the Eagles' 20.

Friona quickly said "thank you," as Grajeda powered his way 26 yards up the middle. Cook became four for four, and the score became 28-0 with a minute left in the half.

The Chiefs took the second half kickoff and set out on a meticulous seven-play scoring drive.

Bandy got around right end for 11 yards, Grajeda added nine and six. King hit Bandy for a 20-yard gain, but the play was erased by a holding penalty.

On the next play, Bandy exploded into the secondary, and raced 25 yards to the Roosevelt 30. Grajeda had a 13-yard run, and Bandy went around right end, untouched into the end zone from 12 yards out. Cook missed his first kick, but Friona's lead became 34-0, with just 4:50 elapsed in the third quarter.

The Chieftains had gone 71 yards in seven plays for their fifth score.

The defense again refused to allow a first down, and

forced Roosevelt's fifth punt in six possessions (Friona recovered a fumble on the other one).

With reserves taking over in the backfield, Adam Bandy broke off runs of nine and 29 yards, sparking a drive to the Eagle ten.

On the first play of the final quarter, Friona's German exchange student, Kai Pawlowski, kicked a perfect field goal from 28 yards out, hiking Friona's lead to 37-0.

Showing how luckless the winless Eagles are in '99, the kickoff was returned out to the 45.

Nathan Haile ran ten yards on a sweep to the Roosevelt 30. Oswaldo Almaguer had gains of nine and four, and crashed over from the one for a score. Luis Arguelles kicked the PAT, and it was a 44-0 game.

On their last possession, Haile broke through for a 38-yard gainer, almost going all the way, but was caught at the Roosevelt six.

Officials allowed the clock to run continuously in the second half, giving mercy to the outmanned young Eagle team.

The Chieftains held Roosevelt to minus two yards overall, and Friona never had to punt in the game.

"It's always hard, when you're playing a winless team, to stay focused, but we managed to," Scott said.

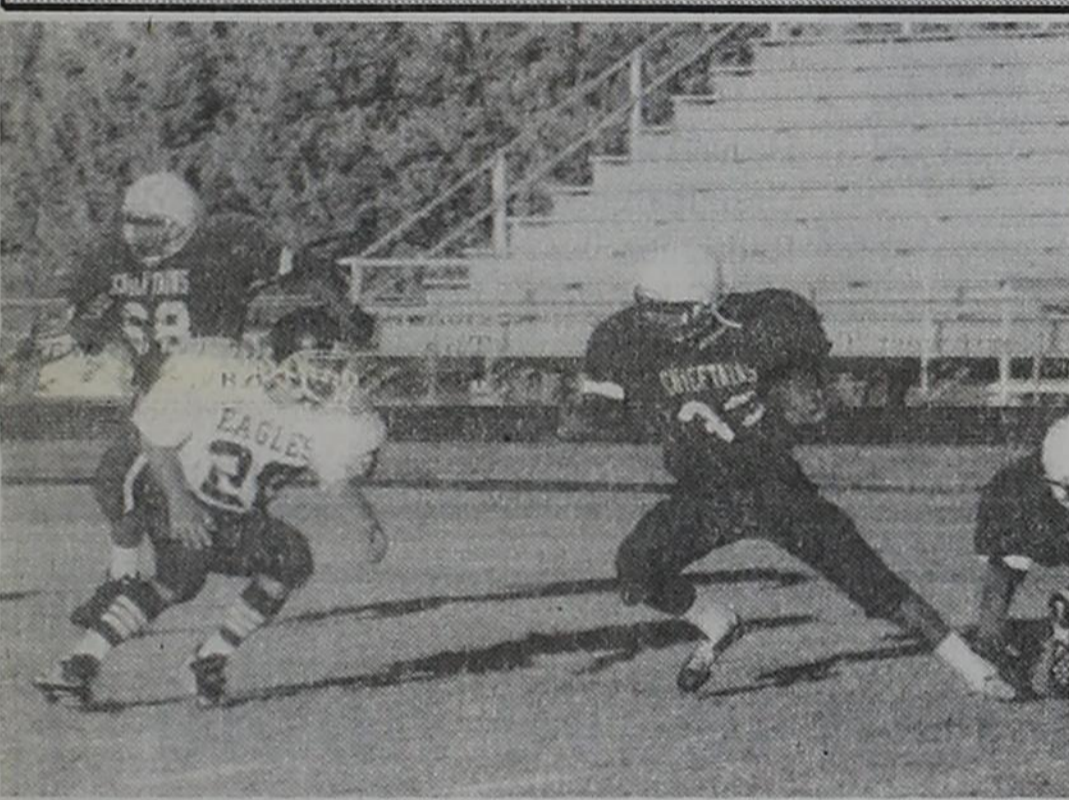
Friona placed ninth in the JV girls' division among 13 teams competing, which included classes A through 5A (Amarillo schools).

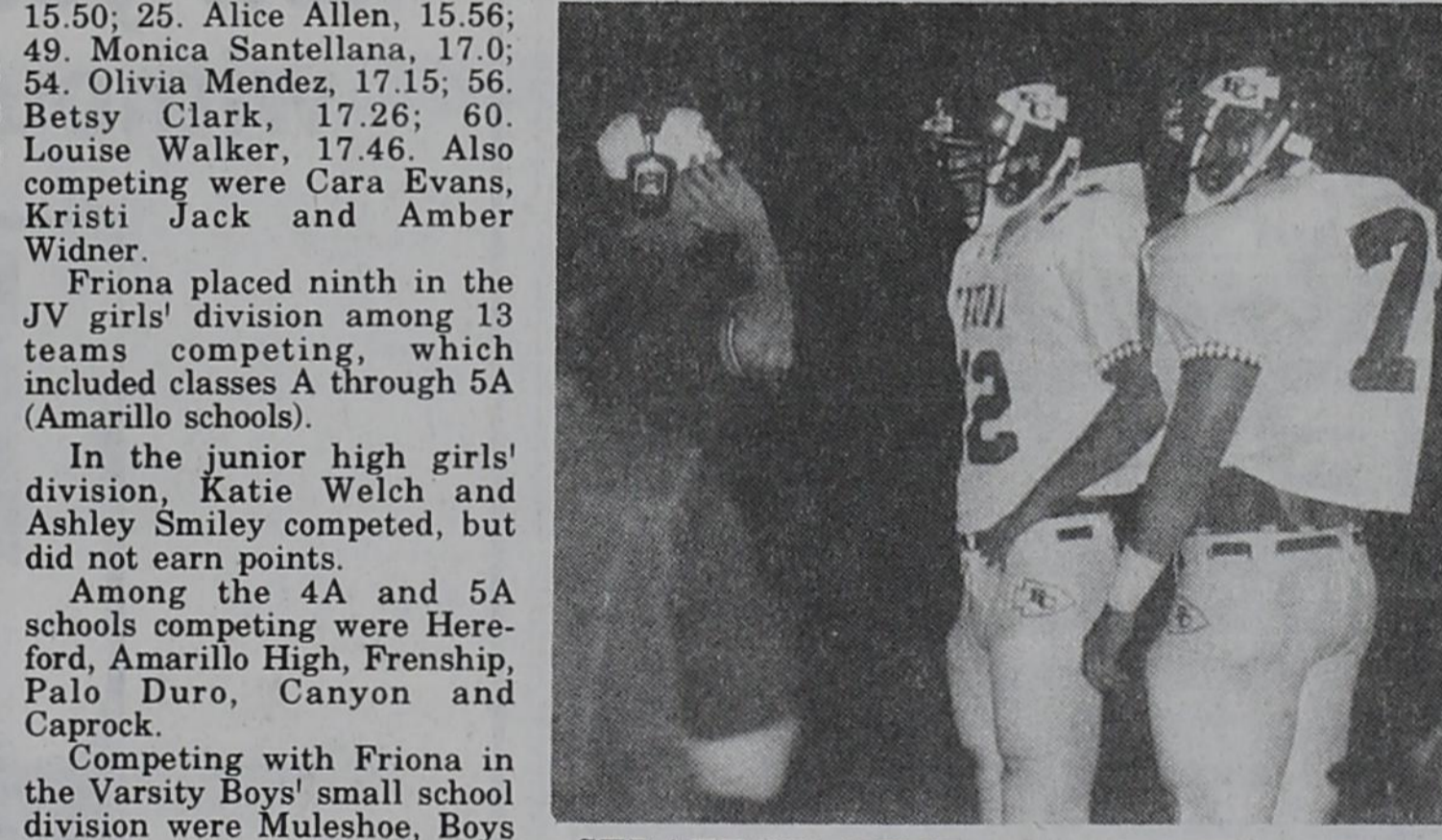

The United Way of Friona helps support Friona's Empty Stocking Fund. This organization helps to provide needy children warm clothing, coats, socks and other necessities.

This organization is funded entirely through the United Way and private donations. All funds stay in Friona and are used exclusively for Friona and area children.

Since 1983, referrals have been received from the schools, Ministerial Alliance and community as to children in need.

In 1998 over 30 children were provided coats, warm clothing, underwear and shoes. By working closely with the local schools, this organization is able to ensure that the child will have a suitable warm coat for recess.

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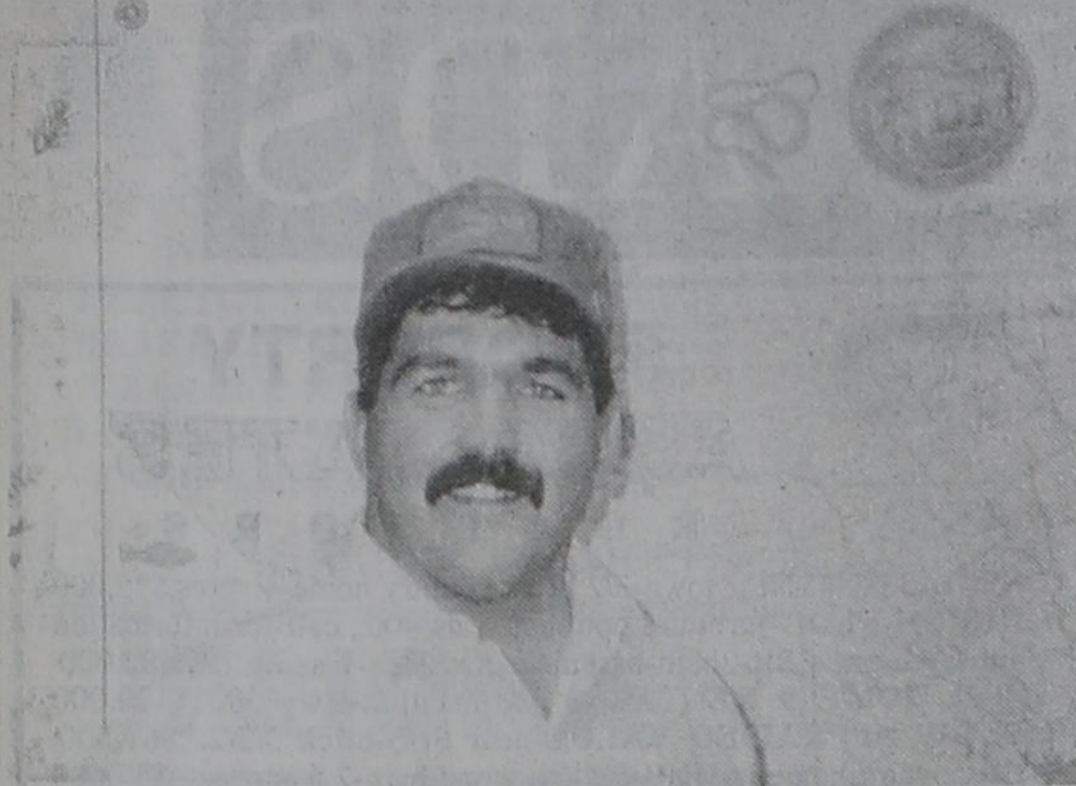

Soil/Water Conservation District Director Elected

Kevin Welch of Friona was elected to the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District board of directors on Wednesday, October 6 at the Friona State Bank Community Room. Welch represents Zone 3 of the district which includes all land in the south Friona school district.

The purpose of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District, with headquarters in Friona, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on agricultural lands within the district. In addition, the district serves as a voice for farmers, ranchers and local community entities on conservation matters.

The board of directors coordinate the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

The five members serving on the district board of directors are responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas Soil Conservation District Law.

Welch is currently active with the Farm Bureau where he holds the position of vice president. He has previously been involved with the Friona Wheat Growers and boll weevil eradication steering committee.

In Texas there are 216 Soil and Water Conservation Districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state

government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation board.

Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCD's do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the SWCD's programs.

Comptroller Delivers Sales tax

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander has sent a total of \$175.8 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,097 Texas cities and 118 counties, a 1.2 percent increase over the same period in Oct 1998.

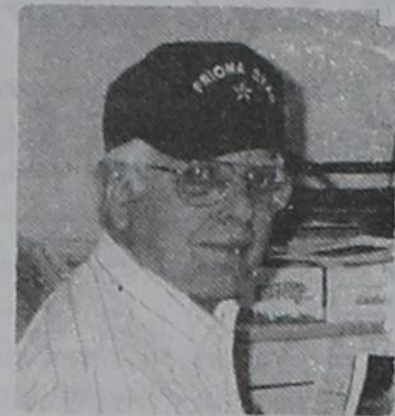
October sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in August and reported to the Comptroller in September.

Parmer County received \$29,913 this period, with Bovina receiving \$2,320; Farwell, \$4,446; and Friona, \$23,146.

The amount represents a 47.46% increase for the county over the same period in 1998.

Payments to date in 1999 to the county total \$252,587 compared to 1998 payments for the same period of \$287,455, a decrease of 12% in sales tax revenue from 1998.

 "At Least Tell 'Em We Are Nice!"



I had planned to lead a discussion about the Nuclear Test Ban Treaty until I met a nice lady at the Lubbock Roosevelt game.

The Lubbock Roosevelt Schools are about 10 or so miles east of Lubbock. They are the smallest enrollment school in District 2-3A.

Lubbock Roosevelt Schools are not in a town unless you consider Acuff, population about 20, as a town. Acuff is so small it is not in our Atlas.

Clint Mears, Mike Hutson, Bill Ellis and I converged on Lubbock Roosevelt Schools last Friday to cover the Chieftains-Eagles game.

We found the football field, FFA Farm, and school buildings clumped together out in the middle of nowhere after dining on Mexican food at an obscure Lubbock restaurant that Mike had found earlier.

To locate Lubbock Roosevelt Schools we used our highly sophisticated football field location system by peering out the car window and declaring, "That looks like some lights over there." Works every time, especially after dark.

The four of us hauled all our gear to the ticket gate and went into our well rehearsed routine of talking our way in without paying.

Clint and Mike, the younger duo of the four, wear these golf style shirts in Friona colors with "Chief & Squaws TV" stitched neatly above the left breast where a pocket is supposed to be.

They look soooooo'... official. As long as they don't speak, most people are lulled into actually believing they are a TV crew.

Bill and I shuffle up to the gate trying to keep from stumbling over any low-lying objects or avoid running into the chain-link gate pole.

The only thing showing above our left breast pocket

would be guacamole salsa, dribbled there back at the Taco Village in Lubbock.

We usually do have at least half a shirttail tucked in as we fumble around for an official Press Pass.

We were engaged in some friendly jawing with the ticket takers, who took one look at us and said we sure looked like newspaper guys alright.

I asked if Roosevelt had a newspaper. The nearest one is in Slaton, 10 miles away.

One old fellow said he hoped the Roosevelt Eagles would play good enough this night to give us something to write about. Coming into the game, Roosevelt had scored only 12 points in six games and had given up 291.

A nice lady ticket taker, referring to Roosevelt's dismal season, said to us, "Well maybe you can at least tell them that we are nice."

There wasn't much for Eagles fans to cheer about this night but they cheered anyway.

Two of their players were carted off the field on stretchers in the first quarter.

They only managed two first downs in the entire game. One time, one of their youngsters brought a kickoff back to the 50-yard line on a nifty run only to fumble it for a Chieftain recovery. The fans cheered anyway.

In the second half, the Eagles defense intercepted two Chieftain passes. The fans gave a standing ovation each time.

The Roosevelt Band, fresh off a first place rating in a Lubbock marching contest, performed smartly to the whistles and claps of the parents and grandparents and fans of the Roosevelt kids. The stands were as full of fans as any game we have seen this year.

One of the men carrying the chains on the sideline told me that most of the kids that attend Roosevelt Schools are from the nearby Boys Ranch and Girlstown facilities. Many are at-risk children, he said, that have been abused and ended up in trouble.

I suppose that set of circumstances further complicates the coaching staff's challenge. When Friona left this night, Roosevelt had still scored only 12 points through 7 games and had given up 335.

The chain guys carried the chains with great energy. The announcer called the action with enthusiasm. The concession stand inside a nearby building was clean and bright and staffed with plenty of friendly volunteers.

After I packed my camera away and folded my folding chair and headed to the car for the long drive home, another lady near the ticket place said to several of us, "Ya'll be careful going home and thanks for coming."

Clovis Man Is Crossing Casualty

A Clovis, New Mexico, man was killed in a vehicle-train wreck at a crossing three miles east of Farwell early last Saturday morning, October 16, 1999.

Stephen Glen Farris, 44, of Clovis, New Mexico was pronounced dead at the scene. He had lived in Clovis three years, moving from Tennessee.

Farris was born August 10, 1955, at Littlefield.

He had served in the U.S. Army in Vietnam.

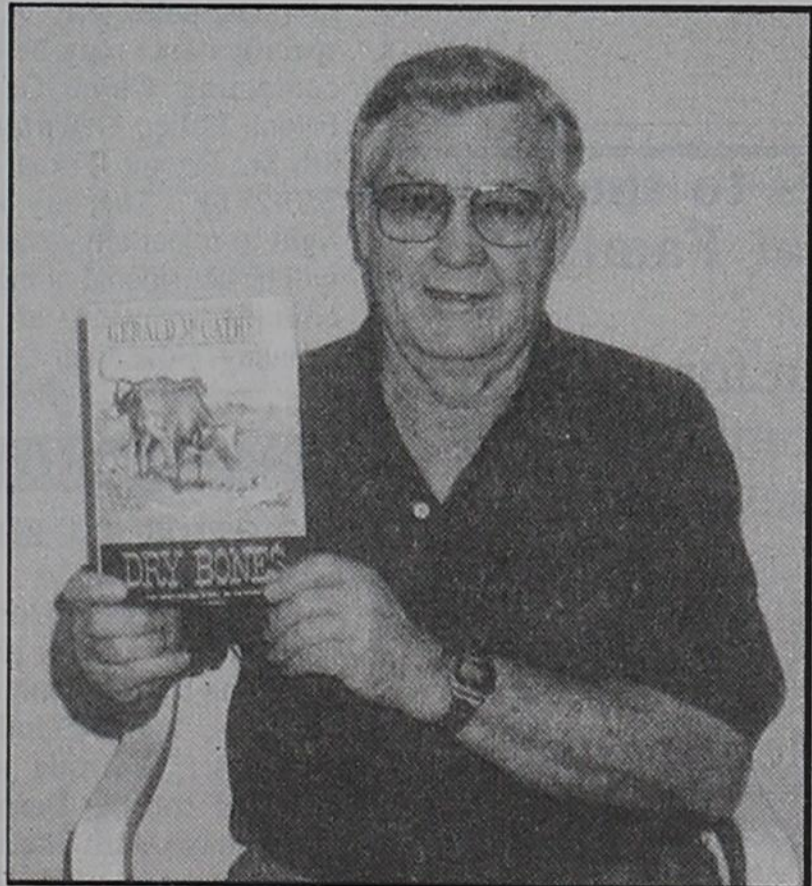

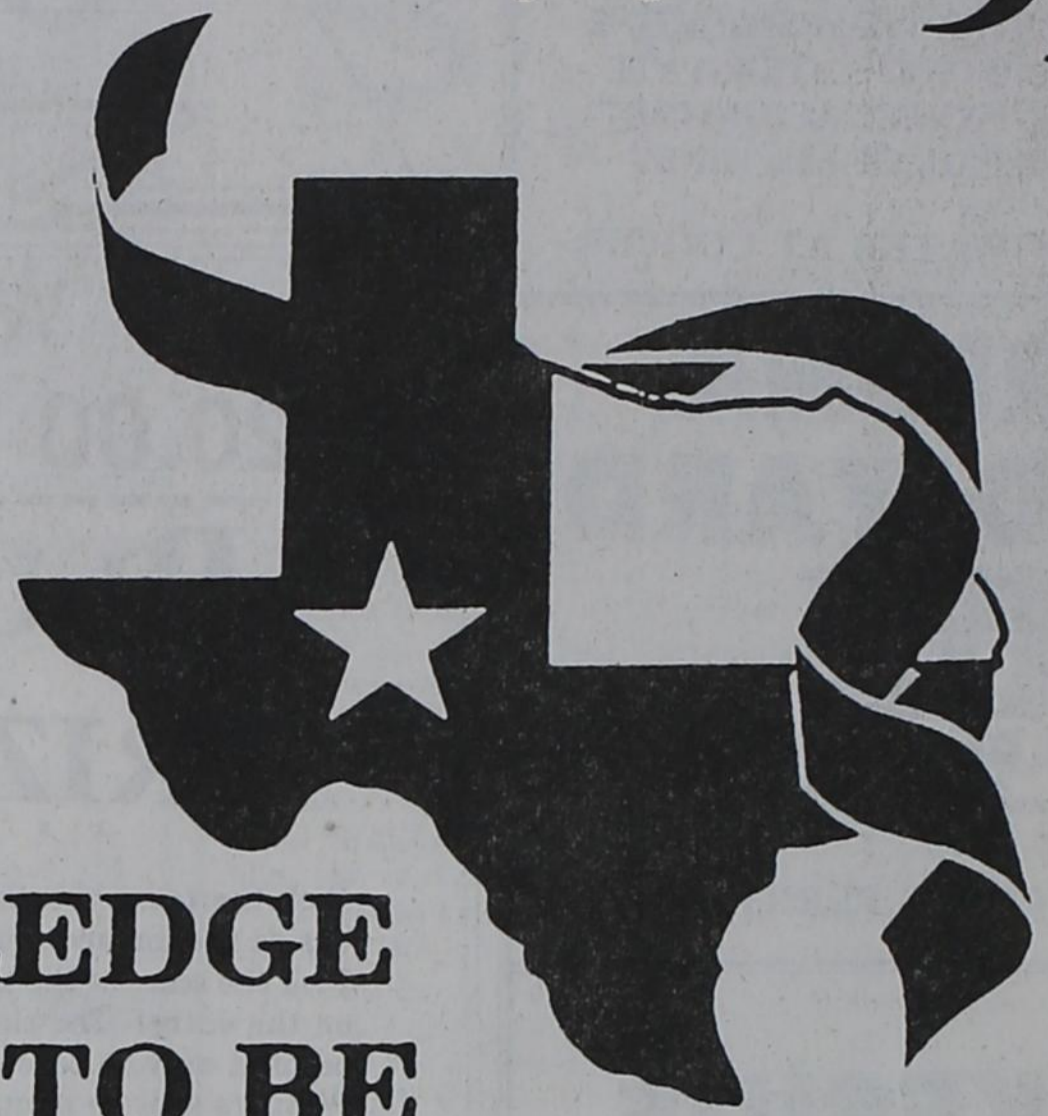

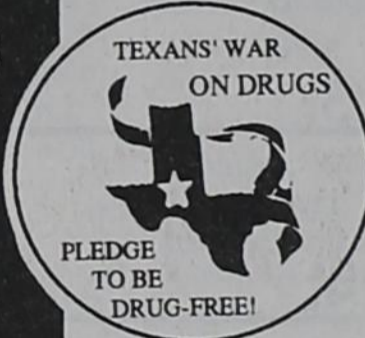

Lafuente was born and attended school in Smyer and was a graduate of Amarillo College. He also attended West Texas State University, and was a self employed bookkeeper for many years.

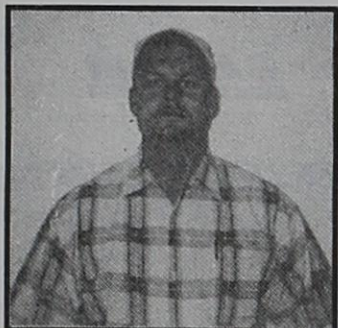

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Five Friona Students Get Mesa Scholarships

Sixty-one West Texas A&M University students will receive Mesa Scholarships for Academic Excellence for the 1999-2000 school year.

Established from funds provided by Mesa Limited Partnership, the scholarships were first awarded in 1987 and are given to reward and recognize freshmen and continuing undergraduate students who portray high academic standards.

"Recipients of the Mesa Scholarships provide leadership for the university," Lila Vars, director of admissions, said. "The students are looked at heavily on what activities they are involved in."

All entering freshmen selected as scholarship

recipients must acquire a composite score of 25 or higher on the ACT or a combined verbal and math score of 1150 or higher on the SAT and a top-quarter class ranking. A minimum grade point average of 3.40 on all college work attempted is required of the continuing students.

Each applicant must also submit two letters of recommendation and formal application.

Friona students receiving scholarships were Courtney Carthel, a senior mathematics major; Jeff Hamilton, a sophomore general business major; Jenny Hamilton Riethmayer, a senior reading major; and Michael Rushing, a senior agribusiness major.

James Evans Has Been Named An AP Scholar

James Evans, 1999 graduate of Friona High School has been named an AP Scholar by the College Board in recognition of his exceptional achievement on the college-level AP Examinations. Approximately 23 percent of America's graduating seniors taken one or more AP Examinations in May 1999 performed at a sufficiently high level to merit such recognition.

The College Board recognizes several levels of achievement based on the number of year-long courses and exams (or their equivalent semester-long courses and exam). Mr. Evans qualified for the AP Scholar Award by completing three or

more AP Examinations, with grades of 3 or higher.

AP Examinations, which students take in May after completing challenging college-level courses at their high school, are graded on a 5-point scale (5 is the highest). Most of the nation's colleges and universities award credit, advanced placement, or both for grades of 3 or higher. More than 1,400 institutions award a year of credit (sophomore standing) to students presenting a sufficient number of qualifying grades. There are 32 AP Examinations offered in 18 subject areas, each consisting of multiple-choice and free-response (essay or problem-solving) questions. In the 1998-1999 school year Friona High School offered 8 AP courses in 6 subject areas. This past May 59 Friona High School students took 102 AP Examinations with their fees paid by Friona ISD.

YOUR EYES

What Is 20/20 Vision?

20/20 vision represents normal sight. If you have 20/20 vision, you can see clearly at 20 feet what a person with normal vision would see at that distance. If instead, for example, you have 20/40 vision, you must be as close at 20 feet to see what someone can normally see at 40 feet.

The ability to see objects with 20/20 vision is affected by many factors, such as nearsightedness, farsightedness, astigmatism or eye diseases. A thorough eye examination by a vision care professional can identify the specific causes affecting eyesight. In most cases, glasses, contact lenses, or a vision therapy program can help improve your vision. If the problem is due to an eye disease, medication or other treatments such as vision surgery may be necessary.



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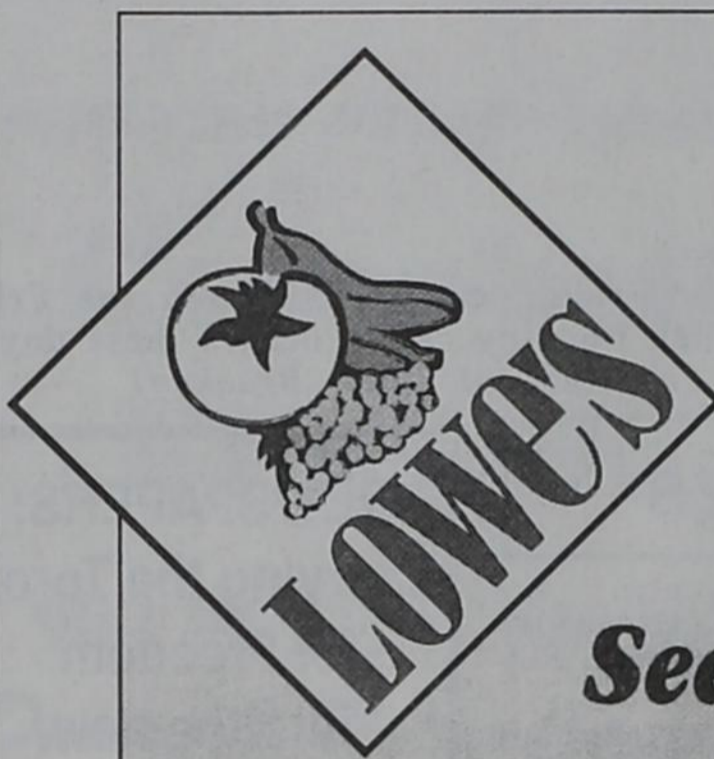
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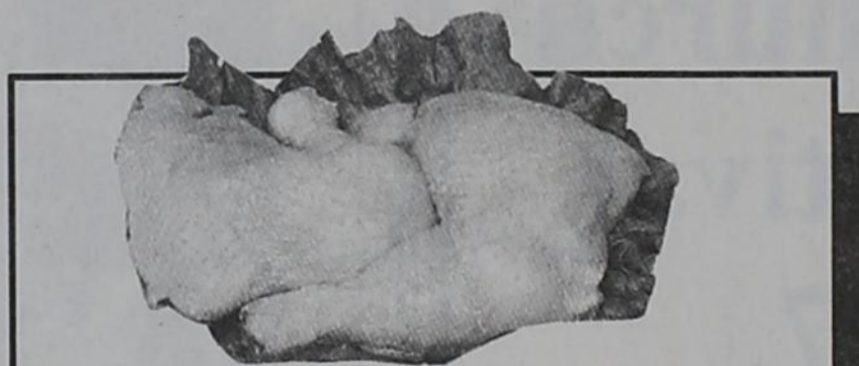
