

Trick Or Treating Set For Saturday In Friona

Based on input by parents and citizens, city officials have declared Saturday night, October 30, as the official "trick or treat" night for the community youngsters.

All residents are encouraged to leave their porch lights on Saturday night if they will be giving out goodies to the little spooks and goblins.

Parents are asked to take their little ones around Saturday night instead of Sunday. Police Chief Randy Geries advises that trick or treaters can stop by the police station too. The department will be handing out treats.

AMONG OTHER THINGS which will happen in the year 2000 is the decennial (every ten years) federal census. Congress passed a law in the late 1780s to do a "head count" of the country's residents.

As every good genealogist Bill knows, the first federal census was taken in the year 1790. The Ellis upcoming census will the the 22nd one taken for the nation.

The decennial census also allows Congress to re-apportion its districts in the various states. States such as Texas always gain U.S. representatives after each census.

Unfortunately for folks who live in our area, the Congressional District has been growing after each census, due to the fact that the rural areas aren't growing, or not keeping

pace with the metropolitan areas. State Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander published some interesting figures related to our state's population growth from 1990-2000, and the projected growth for the first decade

of the 21st century. Ye Editor has always taken a particular interest in census figures. Did you know that when Texas joined the union in 1845, its population was less than 200,000 people? And we suppose this includes all of the original state, which now includes most of Oklahoma and New Mexico, as well as a generous chunk of Colorado and smaller pieces of a few other

Texas finally passed the million-people mark with the census of 1880, when the count was 1,591,000. When the head count was made at the beginning of this century, 1900, we had grown to 3,048,000 people.

The lowest growth during the 20th century for our state was the 1930s decade, when the Great Depression was still lingering, and many residents, particularly in the Western half

of the state, left to seek more promising circumstances. That decade, the population grew from 5,824,715 in 1930, to just 6,414,824 in 1940.

Ever since 1940, the state has been growing at a rate of approximately 20 per cent. At the last census, in 1990, Texas stood at 16,986,335 people. If the estimate holds true, when the new count is made next April, it will discover 20,497,486 of us Texans.

When it was announced earlier this month that the world's population had hit the six-BILLION mark, some Texas mathematicians came up with interesting ideas.

One said that in spite of the population glut in many countries, you could bring all six billion people to Texas, and each one could occupy 3/4 of an acre! What population glut??

Another quote we heard was that there would be room in Texas for all 6 million world inhabitants, and that each could live in a house with 1500 square feet.

There is a lot of land from Abilene to El Paso, to Laredo

and back to Abilene where mostly jackrabbits and prairie

True to form, the estimate for the state's main population growth for the next ten years is for it to be centered in the state's five largest metropolitan areas. So this area we mentioned will continue to be people-challenged.

In 2000, Houston is projected to have 4,016,925 residents. The Dallas area is pegged at 3,477,318; Ft. Worth-Arlington will hit 1,845,025; San Antonio will count 1,571,623, and Austin-San Marcos will top out at 1,068,804 souls.

While all of these are expected to grow by at least 20% during the next decade, the Ellises plan to just stay in Parmer

County. I'm a lot like my great uncle Jim Ellis. When the population of Montague County neared 1,000 in the 1880s, he loaded up his family and set out for Oregon. We Ellises never have wanted to be overcrowded.

Mules scored a 21-6 win over the Chiefs, in a game that took two days to complete, due to a rainy, stormy night.

Some things will be different this year, not the least of which is the game site. And--although the beautiful Indian Summer that has blessed the area is expected to deteriorate somewhat, maybe we at least won't have the "flood" of rain that we had a year ago.

Friona received about four inches of moisture on last year's game date, and Muleshoe's Douglass Stadium became a quagmire, especially by the time the game was completed on

Saturday afternoon. Although this Muleshoe team may not appear to be as tough as last year's on paper, Coach Mike Scott says the '99 Mules "don't have a weak spot from top to bottom."

Last year Muleshoe posted a 10-2 record, winning district with a 5-0 record. They beat Sanford-Fritch, 14-13 in bidistrict before losing to Crane, 28-14 in the area round.

The Chieftains come into the game more "beat up" than they have for any game this year. Friona's "walking wounded" include the brother running-back duo of Joseph Bandy and Adam Bandy.

Joseph missed practice sessions this week with a bad thigh bruise, and Adam had a hip injury. Both were improving late in the week, but hadn't worked out to speak of.

sustained a sprained ankle against Cooper, and Daniel Rosales, who sprained his ankle against Roosevelt, is still slowed. Josh Burleson was last year at Muleshoe.

also has a knee problem. Scott said all of these

players were improving as the week progressed, and all definitely want to play.

On the positive side, receiver-defensive back Colby Ingram is expected to rejoin the team after missing three games with a knee injury.

"Muleshoe's team is very similar to last year's. They don't have a 300-pounder like they did last year, but they have several 200s, some in the 220-pound range, and a couple in the 230-240 range,"

Scott said. Jeff Shelburne, a 230pound lineman, had 11 tackles, forced a fumble, and recoverred a fumble for a touchdown as Muleshoe pounded Roosevelt, 62-0.

Scott discounted any "revenge" motive from last year's game as being a factor. "We're just going to have to keep our poise, and play like we have all season. We're going to have to play our usual game. We know Muleshoe is the best team we've played so far this season, but at the same time, we're definitely the best team they have played," the Friona coach said.

Scott called Muleshoe a "big play" team, which has some "weapons" that can hurt you at any given time.

Last season's Muleshoe win broke a five-year winning streak for Friona in the long rivalry. It also was only the second time since 1983 that the Mules had beaten the Chieftains, who lead in the In addition, Garland Buske all-time series, 25 wins to 22 for MHS, and one tie (1958).

Friona Rites Held For C.L. Lillard

Funeral services for C.L. Lillard, 77, were held Sunday, October 24 at Sixth Street Church of Christ, with Leon Talley, minister, and D.L. Harguess officiating. Burial was in Friona

Cemetery, under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral

Lillard died Friday, October 22, at Prairie Acres Nursing Home. He had been a lifetime resident, having been born March 24, 1922, at Clovis, N.M. He was the son of Claude and Carrie Lillard, whose families came to the Friona area in 1905 and 1908.

C.L. was born while his father worked as a railroad agent in Clovis. He married LaVelle Scott February 5, 1949 in Clovis, N.M.

Having attended Friona schools 11 years, C.L. and three other friends, Joel Landrum, Murl Sylvester and Roy Hughes went to Riverside, California "to make it big in football." After graduating from high school in California, the boys made their way back home to Friona.

Lillard was the first 19year-old drafted from Parmer County, and went into the service in October of 1942. He participated in the European Theatre in World War II, and was among the thousands of American soldiers who took part in the Invasion of Normandy ("D-Day), which helped to turn the tide toward the U.S. and its



Commissioner "The Health and Human Services Commissioner is appointed by the governor to a two-year term, subject to approval by a two-thirds vote of the Senate. The commissioner oversees and coordinates the health and human services programs that are provided by 11 different

agencies of state government. Proposition 10 would amend the constitution to allow the governor to appoint and replace the Health and Human Services Commissioner at the governor's pleasure."





44 Unanswered Points Quell Cooper, 51-7

Early in the second quarter of Friona's game against Lubbock Cooper last Friday, the Chieftains found themselves with a game on their hands.

After the Chieftains marched 64 yards in just seven plays to take a 7-0 lead, the Pirates responded with an 84-yard drive of their own, moving the ball virtually the length of the field in just

three big pass plays.

Cooper QB Stan Finch
drove the Pirates quickly
downfield, with a 29-yard
strike to Russell Madison, and then on the third play of the second quarter, hit a wide-open tight end, Dustin Welch, for a 40-yard pass and run play that scored a TD.

The kick tied the score at 7-all, and folks on both sides of the field thought they might be in for a close game. Last year south of Lubbock, the Pirates jumped out to a 14-7 halftime lead, and it began to look like deja-vue "all over again!"

But this time the Chieftains had a good answer for Cooper's challenge. Friona scored 21 points in their next two possessions--not a bad trick if you can do it--to grab the momentum, and the Chieftain defense shut the Pirates down completely. Cooper registered minus 18 yards and no points the rest

Fullback Noel Grajeda. who also scored the Chieftains' first TD, sparked the next drive after Adam Bandy returned the kickoff out to the 30 yard line. After QB Nathan King gained 18 yards on a keeper play, Grajeda caught a ten-yard pass, and ran 13 yards, sandwiched around an 11yard gain by Joseph Bandy.

Bandy gained ten yards in two plays to Cooper's four, and Grajeda crashed over from there. Cook's second kick gave Friona a 14-7 lead it wouldn't surrender, with 4:32 gone in the second quarter.

Cooper got a good kickoff return--one of their expected strengths--out to their 40. But that good opportunity soon faded.

Joseph Bandy ran in front of Finch's pass at his own 35, and weaved his way around the Pirates, taking advantage of several blocks, reversing his field twice, in one of the most spectacular runs seen at Chieftain Field in a long time.

Bandy's official return was 65 yards, but he must have run about twice that far. In fact, he hyperventilated after it was over, and had to spend some time on the sidelines. The INT return and Cook's

PAT made Friona's lead 21-7

at the 6:10 mark. Finch misfired on three passes, after a holding penalty wiped out a would-be gain. Friona put the ball in play at the Pirate's 43 after Bandy returned the punt into Cooper territory.

Bandy gained eight, Grajeda nine, and QB King reeled off a 21-yard scamper on an option play, as the Chieftains quickly moved the ball inside the Pirate 10. Workhorse Grajeda was called on again, and bulled across

from four yards out.
After Cook's PAT, Friona had scored 21 unanswered points in less than five minutes of clock time.

Holding Cooper again in three plays, the Chiefs almost lit up the scoreboard again, driving 73 yards before the halftime horn sounded. Still Friona had taken command, 28-7.

Cooper's Marcus Kimmel misplayed the second half kickoff and Chieftain Matthew Mata nailed him at his own six-yard line. That got Cooper off to a

bad start, and it was three plays and punt once again. Friona's punt rush caused a short kick, and the Chiefs were back in business on the Pirate 39 yard line.

This drive took only one play. Grajeda took the handoff, crashed through the line, found himself in the open, and outran the Cooper secondary to the goal-line for his fourth TD of the game. Cook was again perfect, and the Chieftains had hiked their lead to 35-7, just 2:07 into the third quarter.

A rash of Friona penalties--40 yards in three straight plays--were the next defensive challenge, setting the Pirates up at the Chieftain 20.

But on fourth down, King intercepted a Finch pass in the end zone, and ran it out to the 20. At this point the Friona offense went a bit flat. and the score was still 35-7 after three quarters.

The defense again scored some points, when defensive back Dustin Boyd blocked a punt, which went out of the end zone for a safety, to make Friona's margin 37-7.

After the free kick, Coach Mike Scott began inserting reserves. Jesse Allen ripped through for a 12-yard gain, and King rolled out for a 14yard gain. Mata then took the pitchout, got around right end, and outraced his defenders to the right corner

Cook was six for six, as Friona's lead became 44-7.

The defense again put the pressure on Cooper's passing game, causing big losses, and Friona got the ball back one last time.

Reserve QB Cason White carried the ball five times in six plays on the roll-out keeper play, and posted gains of eight, nine, nine and 25 yards. The last gain, around the left end, was stopped only by the end zone. Cook's seventh straight kick made the final score 51-7.

The score was Friona's highest of the season, and Cook's seven straight PATs may be a new school record for one game.



Elementary School Is Honored


Friona's Elementary campus, Jerry Shelton, principal, has been recognized by the Texas Education Agency (TEA) for successfully educating its migrant students.





There is no substitute for human blood. Despite periodic reports to the contrary, it can't be duplicated, manufactured or extracted from any other source but volunteer donors.





Senate approval of the FY2000 Agricultural Appropriations Bill and attached Emergency Relief Package was good news for U.S. cotton producers.

Across the Cotton Belt producers trying to piece together a survival strategy in the face of weak demand and prices for a constantly declining 1999 cotton crop have been looking for help from some quarter and it now appears that is on the way.

The Senate's 74-26 vote to approve the Conference Report cleared the second of three hurdles that have to be crossed. All that remains is the President's signature to make the relief package a reality and start the process

Key components of the package include \$1.2 billion disaster assistance to be delivered in a method similar to the 1998 Single-year disaster assistance program; \$5.54 billion for issuance of a supplemental Ag Market Transition Act (AMTA) payment equal to 100 percent of the 1999 AMTA payment rate; \$400 million for crop year 2000 crop insurance premium subsidies; funding for reinstatement of the cotton Step competitiveness provisions with technical adjustments; \$75 million for direct payments to soybean and minor oilseeds producers; \$325 million in assistance to dairy and livestock producers; permanent authority for availability of advance AMTA payments and permanent authority of issuance of generic commodity certificates.

Producers will probably see the first phase of the Emergency Assistance package within a few days of President Clinton's signing of the Bill. There has been no indication that Administration intends to veto the legislation even though they may not fully agree with the mechanisms provided for delivery.

As of this writing the President had not signed the Bill. Any further delay in the signing of this legislation will only serve to delay receipt of emergency assistance to producers and could also cost producers export

marketing opportunities. Agriculture depended heavily on a handful of key supporters during development of the Emergency Relief Package and producers are encouraged to relay their thanks and kudos to Congressmen Larry Combest, Charles Stenholm and Henry Bonilla as well as Senators Trent Lott and Thad Cochran and their staff members.

House Ag Committee of delivering a much needed Chairman Larry Combest boost to U.S. agriculture. Gained House approval of his gained House approval of his earlier promise to deliver a crop insurance reform package in 1999. The Combest Bill proposes many important changes to the current system including the addition of some \$6 billion and additional funds allocated for crop insurance in the last budget agreement.

The Combest plan would allocate the bulk of the additional funds to making permanent the 30 percent additional premium subsidy introduced as part of the 1998 Crop Loss Assistance Programs.

The remainder of the funds would be used to to the program including APH adjustments; re-rating and eliminating the disparity between cotton rates and the rates paid by other commodities; elimination of the "Black Dirt" policy for prevented planting claims and providing producers the flexibility to eliminate unwanted policy options in order to further reduce insurance costs; implementation of discounts for technology improvements and good experience; reduction in the fees paid to companies and agents for delivery and underwriting of CAT program; provisions to protect

producers against price and income loss as well as beefed up compliance processes and inclusion of Farm Service Agency in monitoring pro-

gram implementation. Senate Agriculture Committee Chairman Richard Lugar (R-IN) is currently proposing a very different reform package and much work will be required to bring the two viewpoints together.

There is hope however, that the Senate will go ahead and at least pass some type of bill so that the issues can be taken up by a conference committee and the additional money earmarked for crop insurance can be utilized and made a part of the baseline funding for the program.

What Should You Do With Your Qualified Plan Distributions? Oct. 27 - Nov. 2, 1999

Do you have a retirement plan where you work? If so, consider yourself fortunate--especially if you have a 401(k) or other type of "tax-qualified" plan. Your plan receives special tax advantages from the government, which means you pay no taxes on your earnings until you start making withdrawals. This is a very good deal for you: because your earnings grow on a tax-deferred basis, they will accumulate much faster than they would if you paid taxes on them each

But, sooner or later, you will retire or leave your job. When that happens, what should you do with your qualified plan distributions?

Basically, you have four choices:

Leave the money in your plan, if the plan allows it. Some employersponsored plans allow former employees to leave their retirement funds in the plan, even after they leave their job. If you have been satisfied with the performance of your retirement plan, you might want to consider this option. Your earnings will continue to grow tax-deferred, and you won't have to look around for a new place to put your money. If you choose this option, however, you generally won't be allowed to contribute any new funds, and your distribution options may be limited.

Roll the money over into an IRA. If you pick this option, you can retain the benefit of tax deferral. And you can invest your IRA dollars in virtually any type of investment, such as stocks, bonds or mutual funds. Once the money is in the IRA, you may even be able to roll the money over into a Roth IRA, in which case your earnings grow totally tax-free, provided you meet certain

Roll the money over into your new employer's plan. Your new employer's qualified retirement plan may accept a rollover from your old plan. If you like the investment choices available in the new plan, this type of rollover could be a good move.

Take the money as a lump sum distribution. If you are leaving your job to start your own business, you might need to take your retirement funds to help pay for your start-up costs. However, you should be aware that this move has some serious tax consequences. You will have to pay income taxes on your distribution, and you may also have to pay a 10 per cent early withdrawal penalty. Still, if you have an opportunity that you want to take advantage of, and you don't have access to other financial resources, you might want to


consider taking your retirement money as a lump sum. Which retirement distribution option is best for you? It depends on your individual circumstances--your employment situation, tax picture, investment portfolio and personal preferences. Before you make a decision, you will probably want to consult with your tax adviser. Remember, your distribution may well represent the largest sum of money you'll ever receive at one time--so
