



Great-grandparents are Luis Rocha, Rosalio and Rosalinda Torres, Agripina Hernandez and Juana Moctezuma.







WILDCATS TOPPLED, 34-27 **Talk About Your Last-Minute Rallies: Chiefs Had A Dandy!**

History was made at Wildcat Stadium last Friday, when the Chieftains scored in the last ten seconds of play to upend Littlefield, 34-27.

After 14 failed tries, Friona finally beat district rival Littlefield on their home turf. Wildcat teams had beaten Chieftain teams 17 consecutive times from 1977-93, and 19 of 20 times from 1977-96.

But this year was to be different. For the second year in a row, quarterback Nathan King engineered a fourthquarter scoring drive to snatch victory away from the Wildcats.

Friona never led in last Friday's game until the last 9.8 seconds. The win gave Friona the district title with a perfect 5-0 record. It was Friona's third title in four years, and fourth in six years.

But early in the game the prospects of an undisputed title began to slip away, when Littlefield grabbed a 13-0 lead after only 5:52 of clock time in the first quarter.

On Friona's first play from scrimmage, Wildcat Kevin Reed intercepted King's pass, and ran it to the Chieftain 11-yard line. Two plays later Jeremy DeLosSantos ran in from three yards out and Littlefield had a 7-0 lead with just 1:59 elapsed in the

opening quarter. The Chieftains put the ball in play at their 22-yard line, on the second play, and turned the ball over after King completed a shovel pass over the middle to Bandy, but Joseph was hit a lick by the Wildcat receiver, causing him to fumble. Littlefield 's Josh Brandes carried twice, going around end untouched for 27 yards and a touchdown on his second try. Friona blocked the PAT, but Littlefield was celebrating with a 13-0 lead, and the opening quarter was not half over yet. Friona failed for the third time to pick up a first down, but at least was able to punt the ball for a change, as Trent Cook booted the team out of trouble on fourth down. The Chieftain defense sacked Wildcat Taylor Allen for a loss, and the 'Cats were hit with a penalty, and finally, Littlefield had to punt. DeLosSantos got a bad snap from center, and had to go back and try to retrieve the ball at the Littlefield six. King gained five yards to the one, and after Noel Grajeda was caught for a short loss, King went around left end on the run-pass option, and sailed into the end zone untouched. Cook's point try was just a shade wide, but the score became 13-6 with 2:28 left in the opening quarter. The Wildcats put the ball in play, and Allen's pitchout went astray and Landon Martin recoverred for the Chieftains on Littlefield's 11. Friona was flagged for holding on first down, but on second and 20 King sailed a high, arching pass toward the end zone. Somehow, Joseph Bandy and Grajeda were both

This was the first of four touchdowns for the Chieftain senior, who had seen a doctor for flu-like symptoms earlier that day. The Wildcats may be thankful that they didn't have to face the Friona scoring and rushing leader when he was 100%.

Coach Scott's Comments:

"That was real satisfying. Everything went like we wanted it to (at the last of the game). If we hadn't scored the touchdown, we were going to let Kai (Pawlowski) kick the field goal," said Chieftain Coach Mike Scott.

"It was our plan to let the clock run down and not leave

Littlefield any time if we could help it," he continued. Concerning Noel Grajeda's health, Scott confirmed that he had been ill with a stomach virus for a day or two, and the coaches weren't at all sure that he would be able to play.

"We were getting ready to move Joseph (Bandy) to Grajeda's spot if we had to. He is quite a competitor. He did a great job, under the circumstances," Scott said. "We didn't play our very best the entire game, but we managed to hang in and give ourselves a chance to win." Besides Grajeda, Coach Scott complimented Landon Martin, who recovered two fumbles and played his usual outstanding game on defense. He also pointed out that Cason White had 19 tackles; Joseph Bandy had some good plays, and King executed well. "The offensive line stepped up and executed well in the second half," he concluded.



Fresh from an inspiring Fresh from an inspiring performance in spite of an ailment in the Littlefield game, FHS senior running back Noel Grajeda has given himself an opportunity to challenge for the school's alltime scoring record, as well as moving himself into the top five rushers at Friona High School.

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Grajeda's four touchdowns last Friday night gave him 114 points for the year. This was second only to Matthew Kendrick's 226 points he scored as a junior in the 1997 season.

TBWEF Board of Directors in Abilene Thursday that spraying is continuing in triggered High Plains fields as the area awaits a cottonkilling freeze. So far this Fall only the northern half of the Northwest Plains (NWP) Zone has seen a killing freeze. "We are seeing substantial reduction in boll weevil

numbers in these three zones as a result of this year's treatments," said El-Lissy. "The program is working."

The first year diapause phase of eradication in the NWP Zone, Western High Plains Zone and Permian Basin Zone will be followed up with three years of full season treatments to eliminate the pest from the 1.87 million acres in the three

Assessment collections for boll weevil eradication programs in the three High Plains zones--Northwest Plains (NWP), Western Plains zones (WHP) and Permian Basin (PB)--are reflecting strong support from cotton growers across the area.

Eighty-three percent of assessments have already been paid in the PB zone with the NWP showing 75.2 percent paid and the WHP 73.2 percent.

Growers who have not, as yet, paid up their account will be reminded of their outstanding debt if they are unable to present a compliance certificate when they sell their cotton. Under state law, any first buyer of cotton is required to honor a lien in favor of the Texas Boll Eradication Weevil Foundation (TBWEF) placed on this year's production from farms subject to the boll weevil assessment. Without a compliance certificate, a buyer must obtain confirmation from TBWEF as to whether or not an assessment is outstanding. This is being provided through a secured Internet file that is updated daily. Any questions on assessments or compliance certificates can be resolved by contacting the Foundation at 1-800-687-1212.







YOUR EYES

Diabetic Eye Disease

If you suffer from diabetes, you should be aware of certain diabetic eye diseases that can lead to severe vision loss or even blindness. A leading cause of blindness in



American adults is diabetic retinopathy. Diabetes damages the blood vessels in the retina.

Diabetics also have a higher incidence of cataracts, which is a clouding of the eye's lens. In addition, diabetics are more susceptible to glaucoma, the increase in fluid pressure inside the eye that leads to optic nerve damage and loss of vision. Often there are no symptoms in the early stages of diabetic eye disease. Diabetics should have their eyes examined at least once a year. Your eye care professional uses eye drops to enlarge the pupils and to better see any signs of disease.

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When Picking Mutual Funds, Get Some Help

While a new mutual fund may not be introduced every day, it sometimes seems that way. Today, there are about 11,000 funds available to the public. How can you pick the ones that are right for you?

Of course, you could purchase "today's hottest funds," which are often touted on the covers of financial publications. The trouble with these stories is that they are actually about yesterday's hottest funds, because magazines typically base their "hot picks" on last year's performance. By the time you read about a fund, it may well be on a decline.

At any rate, it's usually not a good idea to "chase the performance" of a mutual fund--or any other investment. So, how do you choose the "right" fund, or combination of funds? It's not as easy as just picking a "growth" fund, or an "income" fund. Consider this: in 1992, the Investment Company Institute (the trade group for the mutual fund industry) identified 21 major categories of investment objectives. Today, those categories can number in the hundreds, depending on where you look. You can choose from sector funds, index funds, socially responsible funds, micro cap funds and dozens of other categories, many with exotic-sounding names. It can be confusing--but it doesn't have to be. Before you get down to the business of actually picking out mutual funds, ask yourself some questions: What is your investment objective? Do you need current income, capital appreciation or a combination of both? How much risk are you willing to accept in exchange for potentially high returns? And finally, how many years do you plan to invest? Once you've answered these questions, your next step may be to seek the help of an investment professional--someone with the information and experience necessary to help you select the mutual funds best suited to your needs. Even after you invest, your investment consultant should continue to work with you, helping to monitor your mutual fund portfolio. Just as many factors go into the decision to buy a mutual fund, there are also several issues to consider before you sell a fund. Have your investment objectives changed? Has a mutual fund manager changed his or her investment philosophy? Has a particular market sector undergone some radical changes? These are the types of questions that a qualified professional can help you answer as you make any needed changes to your mutual fund holdings. Mutual funds can be excellent investments. They offer diversification, professional management and the ability to meet a wide range of goals. With a clear understanding of your own needs, and with the help of a competent professional, you should be able to choose those funds that can help you meet your objectives for years to come.

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
