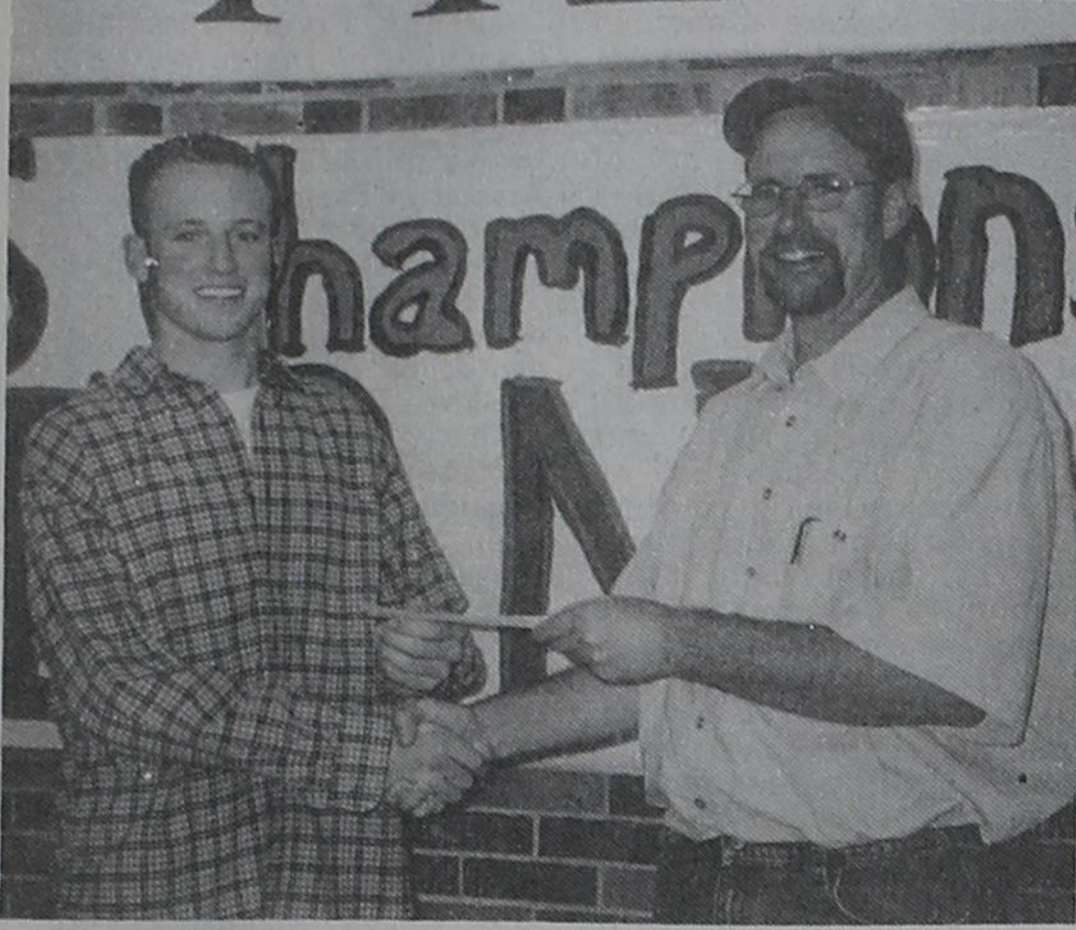

8-7, to gain the playoffs. Defense is the strength of their team. They start ten seniors on defense. They're not real big, but they play hard. We have our work cut out for us," Coach Scott warned.

"Their 5-5 record is a little deceiving, since they lost to Canyon, Childress and Caprock in non-district. Their district losses were to playoff-bound teams also," Scott said.

The Chieftain mentor said that the Wildcats are running the ball considerably more than when the teams met earlier, when most of their yardage came through the air.

The 'Cats are paced by senior QB Adam King, who Scott calls a great athlete. "He's a playmaker. He throws the ball well, and has some big targets," Scott said.

Brad Beck, a 6-3, 230-pound tight end for River Road, has been described as possibly the top lineman in their district. The 'Cats have the experience of 17 seniors to draw from.

Coming into the game, the

two teams have met on the gridiron 24 times, and the games have been split down the middle, with 12 wins for each side. This will be the third time the schools will have met in the playoffs, and Friona is still looking for its first win in that regard.

In addition to last year's season-ending shocker, the Wildcats also scored a 26-17 win over the Chieftains in a bi-district game played in Hereford in 1982.

Troopers Seize Drugs During Traffic Stop

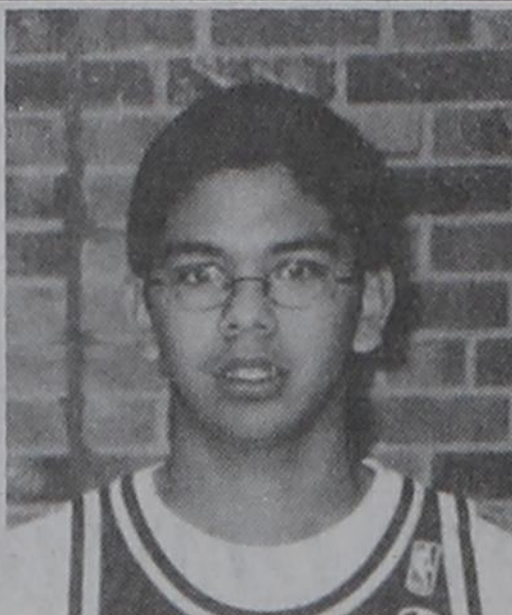

70 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 15, 1929

On Friday and Saturday of last week this vicinity was visited with one of the finest snows we have ever had, owing to the fact that it did not drift badly and contained an abundance of moisture. The temperature did not drop much below freezing.

The new laundry equipment which was purchased by Dr. McElroy for his laundry in the north part of town arrived last Saturday, and will be installed as rapidly as possible.

65 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 16, 1934

The high school auditorium was filled to capacity last Sunday night for the special Armistice Day program. Mayor F. W. Reeve was master of ceremonies, and gave the opening address.

The schools, churches, women's clubs, city and Chamber of Commerce supported the local American Legion in a patriotic observance of the day.

60 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 10, 1939

A representative of the Southwestern Associated Telephone Company, was in Friona on Monday afternoon interviewing the executive committee of the Chamber of Commerce, relative to installing the dial system of telephones in Friona. It seems an unusual fact that the new system will be installed just as soon as the necessary work can be done by the company, which is estimated to take about six months.

50 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 11, 1949

Mrs. Lindley Shields was found dead near her home four miles north of Black last Thursday, after apparently suffering a heart attack. She apparently became ill while feeding her child, and was found about 300 yards from her home, with her year-old daughter asleep in her arms.

45 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 12, 1954

Concentrated drive to secure

all needed funds to start construction of a new building for Parmer County Community Hospital will be launched this Friday night at a county workers dinner in the Friona school cafeteria.

Manager Jimmie Baxter stated today that of \$50,000 for commencement of construction, \$25,500 had been given in cash, at this time, with \$10,000 in pledges on the books.

40 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 12, 1959

Friona's annual Community Chest drive will get underway Tuesday in an effort to raise a budget calling for some \$5565, to be used by charity and other community betterment used during the coming year. Steve Bavousett and J.C. Claborn will serve as co-chairmen of the drive, which kicks off with a breakfast at the Friona Methodist Church.

35 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 12, 1964

The Friona Chieftains go to Floydada on Friday seeking a win that would give them their first district championship since 1957, and send them into the Class AA playoffs for the first time. The meeting will be the first in history between the two schools in football.

25 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 10, 1974

In what was considered a good turnout due to the lack of contested races, Friona and Parmer county voters went to the polls in ideal weather Tuesday to elect leaders for the next four years. The local voters went to the polls to give Friona's Paul Fortenberry a big sendoff by electing him as the next county judge. Fortenberry's name was marked by 730 of the 780 who voted in the Friona precinct.

Friona will have a local savings and loan office around January 1, 1975, it was announced this week. The Friona branch of Tri-County Savings & Loan Association received its

approval some months ago by the Savings & Loan Commissioner of Texas.

20 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 14, 1979

Benny Pryor, vocational agriculture instructor and FFA advisor at Friona High School, has been nominated to receive the FFA's Honorary American Farmer Degree.

15 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 11, 1984

Eclectic Ideas is a new place of business on Main Street, owned by Carmen Rape and Roxanne Hurst.

The voters in Friona and Parmer County gave President Ronald Reagan an even bigger margin than those of the rest of the state and nation, by giving him 2,524 votes, or 81.7 per cent, to only 567 votes, or 18.3 per cent for Walter Mondale.

10 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 11, 1989

Republican gubernatorial candidate Kent Hance recently named Hal Ratcliff and Peggy Gikas as the Parmer County co-chairmen of his campaign.

The Friona Cemetery Association placed a large metal sign at the intersection of the road going north from Friona and the road leading east to the cemetery. The sign was built by Taylor & Sons Blacksmith Shop and city employees, Larry Martin and Jose Sammaron.

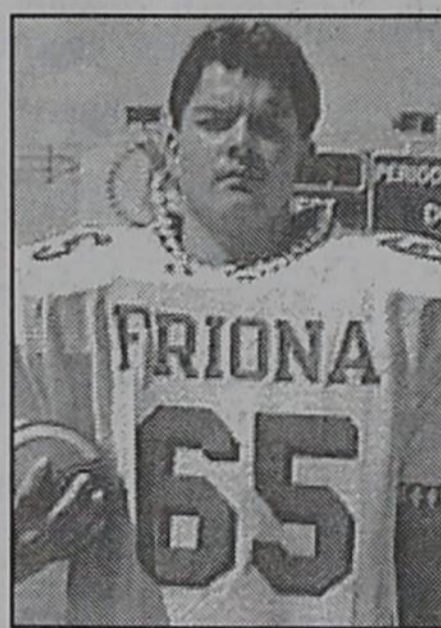
5 Yrs. Ago--Nov.12, 1994

Friends and family joined together in a surprise gathering honoring Charles Broadhurst, pastor of First Baptist Church in Friona, on Sunday, October 30.

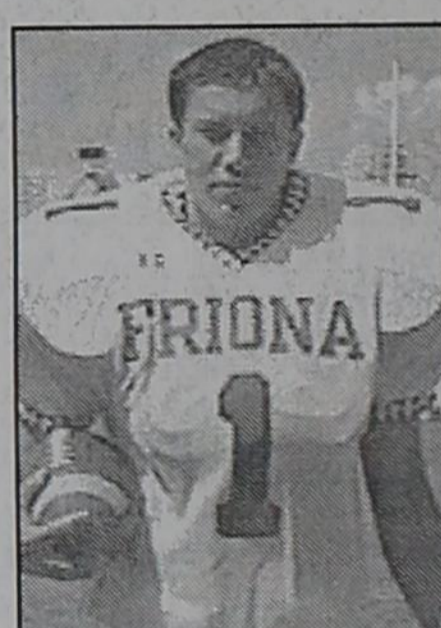

Ray Stanley of Lazbuddie, won the weekly contest for the second time, and is tied for 18th place in the overall standings.

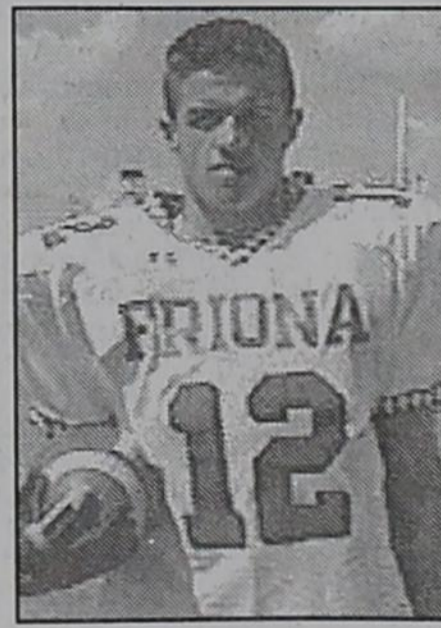

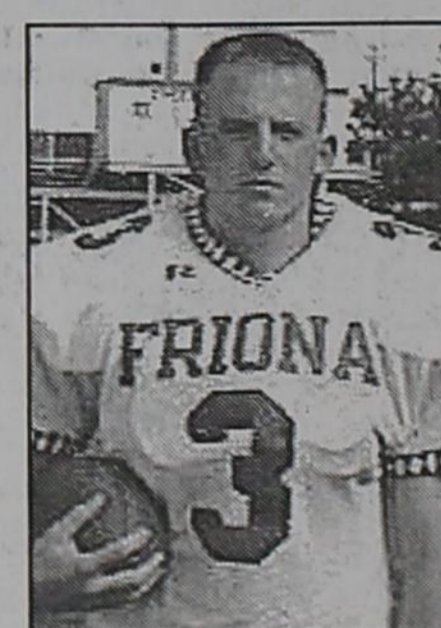

1999 Chieftains Fourth On Total Offense Chart

The 1999 Chieftains rank fourth overall for total offense for a ten-game season, according to research by statistician Bill Ellis this week.

The current team rolled up 3,486 yards (348.6 yards per game) to rank just behind the 1998 team, which tallied 3,642 yards. This year's Chieftains averaged 286 yards per game rushing and 62.4 yards passing. The 1997 team is the all-time leader, at 3,969 yards, and the 1996 team is runnerup at 3,642 yards.

The '99 Chieftains gained more than 400 yards in each of their first two games, and had 396 against Lubbock Roosevelt, and 383 against Shallowater.

The 1999 team displaced

the 1968 team for fourth place overall. The '68 team was led by Tony Perea, who held the school's all-time individual rushing title until he was replaced last season by Matthew Kendrick. That team averaged 327 yards per game.

The 1995 team, which barely missed the playoffs with its 7-2-1 record, now ranks sixth with 325.8 yards per game.

The 1986 Chieftain team, which, led by quarterback Daniel Echols posted Friona's first-ever playoff win, now ranks 10th on the offensive ranking, averaging 296.3 yards per game.

The 1994 team, which advanced to bi-district under Coach James Morton, is 11th overall with its average of 295.5 yards.

Defensively, the 1999 Chieftains also had the fourth-best season ever at Friona High School. The Chieftains were bested only by Muleshoe in that department.

Friona gave up only 748 yards rushing for the season and 978 yards passing, for a total of 1726 yards.

The team thusly displaced the 1963 Chieftains for fourth on the all-time list.

Only last year's Chieftain defense, which allowed only 141.5 yards per game, along with the 1972, '85 and '74 teams had better marks on defense than this year's team.

Grajeda Eyes Chance At FHS Records

Fresh from an inspiring performance in spite of an ailment in the Littlefield game, FHS senior running back Noel Grajeda has given himself an opportunity to challenge for the school's all-time scoring record, as well as moving himself into the top five rushers at Friona High School.

Grajeda's four touchdowns last Friday night gave him 114 points for the year. This was second only to Matthew Kendrick's 226 points he scored as a junior in the 1997 season.

Since Grajeda won the team scoring title last year as a junior with 100 points, he goes into the bi-district game with 214 points, just two points behind Kendrick and 11 behind Angel Vega, currently the top two scorers in Friona's all-time records.

Grajeda's performance after having flu-like symptoms on game day moved him ahead of Andy Kendrick, the leading scorer for Friona's state semi-finalist team in 1996, who scored 196 points in two seasons, and ahead of Tony Perea, who scored 188 points in 1966-67-68.

In the individual rushing department, Grajeda gained 988 yards during the regular season to pace the Chieftains in that department. He logged 1059 yards in 1998, giving him 2,047 for his career, and ranking him presently number five on the FHS all-time list.

Grajeda moved ahead of Daniel Echols, who had 1,881, and Ben Osborn, who gained 2,002 yards. He is just 42 yards behind Charlie Morgan, who gained 2,089 in 1982-83.

Morgan is the fourth leading rusher, behind Matthew Kendrick with 2,899, Tony Perea, 2,823, and Andy Kendrick, 2,294.

Burial was in Westlawn Memorial Park under the direction of Foskey-Lilley-McGill Funeral Home.

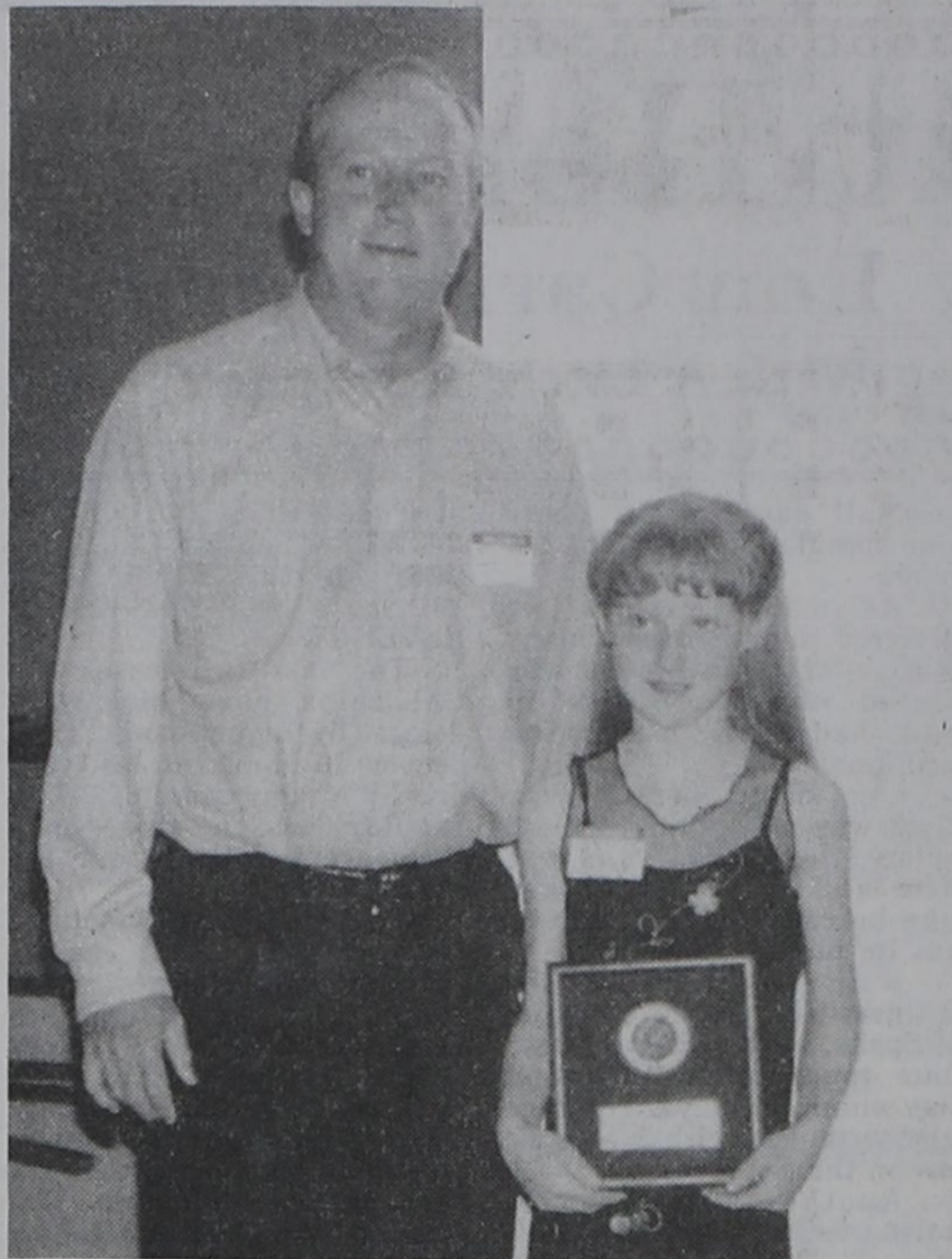
He died Tuesday, November 8, 1999, at Canterbury Villa Nursing Home.

Parmer County SWCD Offers Windbreak Trees

Seedling for Conservation Windbreaks are now available for order through the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD). Landowners in Parmer County are encouraged to purchase the one-year-old seedlings before preferred stock is sold out.

Windbreaks are trees and shrubs systematically adjacent to fields, homesteads or feedlots as a barrier to reduce or re-direct the wind. They create permanent natural protection and habitat for wildlife, reduce erosion and increase land value and aesthetics.

Wildlife packets for habitat establishment are available. Each of the four wildlife packets contain 100 bare-root trees and shrubs which cater specifically to the habitat needs of their labeled species.

*Quail/Pheasant: Sand-cherry/Honeysuckle/Plum, Russian Olive, Aromatic Sumac and Fourwing Saltbush/Nanking Cherry.

*Deer: one Shumard Oak, Flameleaf Sumac, Hackberry and Fourwing Saltbush.

*Turkey: Hackberry, Shumard Oak, Mulberry and Aromatic Sumac.

*Squirrel: Little Walnut, Shumard Oak, Osage Orange and Cottonwood.

Recommended planting of wildlife packets is in blocks on grassland at right angles on

dry corners, in "Motts" along playas or parallel to irrigated crop land.

For example, on a dry corner five wildlife packets can be used to produce a four row, right angle wildlife planting. The outside angle, the farthest from the circular cropland, would contain 1,250 feet (625 feet on each "leg") of Plum trees; the second angle, Russian Olive; the third inside angle, Aromatic Sumac; and the fourth angle, that's closest to the circular crop ground, Nanking Cherry.

For best results 10-25 foot spacing between each deciduous tree within a tree row; 6 foot spacing between each shrub row; and 20 feet spacing between each row of trees.

Seedlings ordered this fall will be shipped or delivered to the Parmer County SWCD in the Spring of 2000.

For best selection order your wildlife packets, evergreens and deciduous trees and shrubs for windbreak tree plantings today. For more information, contact the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District office at (806) 250-2220 or come by 1306 West Ninth Street in Friona.

Don't forget about our weed barrier and drip irrigation supplies. Deadline for ordering will be March 1, 2000 so hurry in and get yours ordered today.

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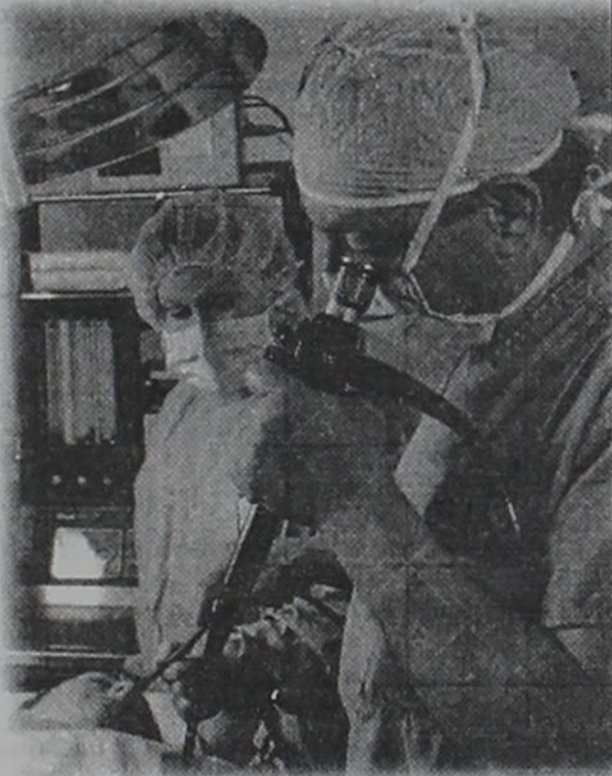

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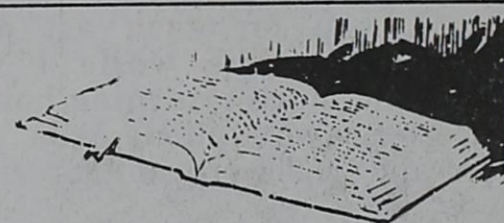


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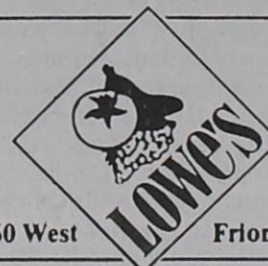

Parmer County SWCD To Sponsor Annual Contests

Further analysis of the effects of the recently implemented Emergency/Disaster Assistance Program shows agriculture getting a much needed short-term boost.

The relief package, delivered mainly in the form of a supplemental 1999 Ag Market Transition Payment (AMTA), will significantly improve the economic situation of most farmers. Many producers were projected to have difficulty making their operations cash flow in 1999 as a result of the ongoing slump in commodity prices.

The research, done by economists with the Texas A&M University Agricultural and Food Policy Center (AFPC), shows that the relief package will indeed help producers get through the 1999 crop year but does

nothing to alleviate the long-term pressure on agriculture's weakened economic situation.

The AFPC analysis also shows that, despite short-term economic benefits for producers, farmers and ranchers will still be hard-pressed to cash flow their operations through 2002 unless the commodity price situation drastically improves.

The AFPC analysis concludes that unless a significant reversal in commodity prices ensures additional aid will be needed for agriculture.

Boll weevil treatments in the three active high Plains eradication zones continue wherever cotton fields still have hostable material.

Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation (TBWEF) Program Director Osama El-Lissy reported to

TBWEF Board of Directors in Abilene Thursday that spraying is continuing in triggered High Plains fields as the area awaits a cotton-killing freeze. So far this fall only the northern half of the Northwest Plains (NWP) Zone has seen a killing freeze.

"We are seeing substantial reduction in boll weevil numbers in these three zones as a result of this year's treatments," said El-Lissy. "The program is working."

The first year diapause phase of eradication in the NWP Zone, Western High Plains Zone and Permian Basin Zone will be followed up with three years of full season treatments to eliminate the pest from the 1.87 million acres in the three zones.

Assessment collections for boll weevil eradication programs in the three High Plains zones—Northwest Plains (NWP), Western Plains zones (WHP) and Permian Basin (PB)—are reflecting strong support from cotton growers across the area.

Eighty-three percent of assessments have already been paid in the PB zone with the NWP showing 75.2 percent paid and the WHP 73.2 percent.

Growers who have not, as yet, paid up their account will be reminded of their outstanding debt if they are unable to present a compliance certificate when they sell their cotton. Under state law, any first buyer of cotton is required to honor a lien in favor of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation (TBWEF) placed on this year's production from farms subject to the boll weevil assessment.

Without a compliance certificate, a buyer must obtain confirmation from TBWEF as to whether or not an assessment is outstanding. This is being provided through a secured Internet file that is updated daily.

Comptroller Delivers Tax Rebates

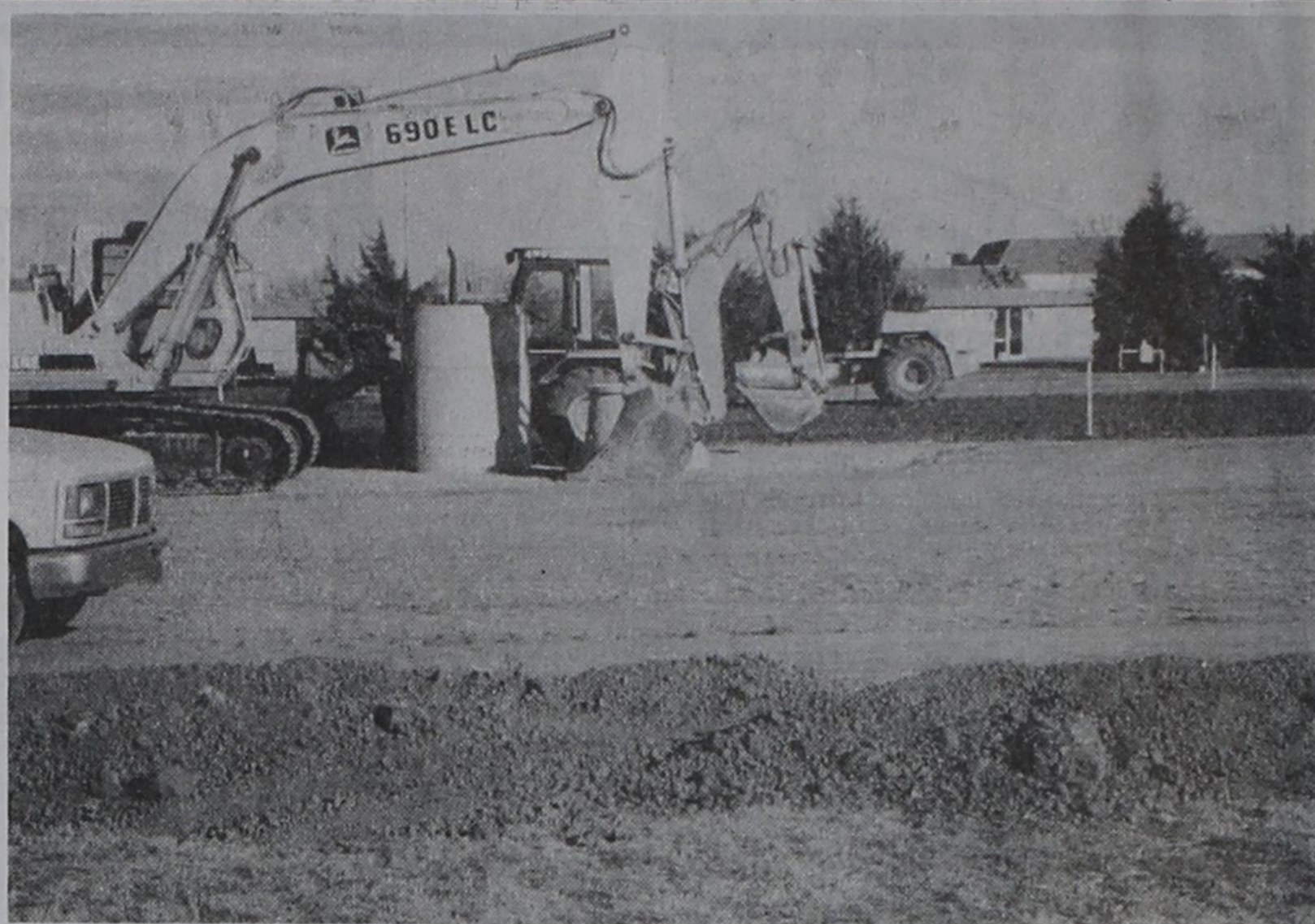
Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander has delivered \$244.7 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,098 Texas cities and 118 counties. She says that year-to-date, payments to cities and counties are running 5.1 percent ahead of last year.

The November payment includes local sales taxes collected by monthly tax filers in September and by quarterly filers on July, August and September sales and reported to the Comptroller in October.

Farmer County received \$22,649 for the current period, a decrease of -22.09% over last year.

In revenue, Bovina received \$2,823; Farwell \$2,937; and Friona \$16,888.

Year-to-date receipts (with 1998 receipts in parenthesis) are: Bovina, \$25,292 (\$27,851); Farwell, \$43,350 (\$46,930); Friona, \$206,594 (\$241,746).

YOUR EYES

Diabetic Eye Disease

If you suffer from diabetes, you should be aware of certain diabetic eye diseases that can lead to severe vision loss or even blindness. A leading cause of blindness in American adults is diabetic retinopathy. Diabetes damages the blood vessels in the retina.



Diabetics also have a higher incidence of cataracts, which is a clouding of the eye's lens. 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When Picking Mutual Funds, Get Some Help

While a new mutual fund may not be introduced every day, it sometimes seems that way. Today, there are about 11,000 funds available to the public. How can you pick the ones that are right for you?

Of course, you could purchase "today's hottest funds," which are often touted on the covers of financial publications. It can be confusing—but it doesn't have to be. Before you get down to the business of actually picking out mutual funds, ask yourself some questions: What is your investment objective? Do you need current income, capital appreciation or a combination of both? How much risk are you willing to accept in exchange for potentially high returns? And finally, how many years do you plan to invest?

Once you've answered these questions, your next step may be to seek the help of an investment professional—someone with the information and experience necessary to help you select the mutual funds best suited to your needs.

Even after you invest, your investment consultant should continue to work with you, helping to monitor your mutual fund portfolio. Just as many factors go into the decision to buy a mutual fund, there are also several issues to consider before you sell a fund. Have your investment objectives changed? Has a mutual fund manager changed his or her investment philosophy? Has a particular market sector undergone some radical changes? These are the types of questions that a qualified professional can help you answer as you make any needed changes to your mutual fund holdings.

Mutual funds can be excellent investments. They offer diversification, professional management and the ability to meet a wide range of goals. With a clear understanding of your own needs, and with the help of a competent professional, you should be able to choose those funds that can help you meet your objectives for years to come.

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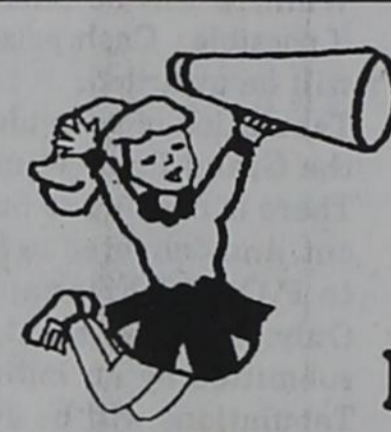
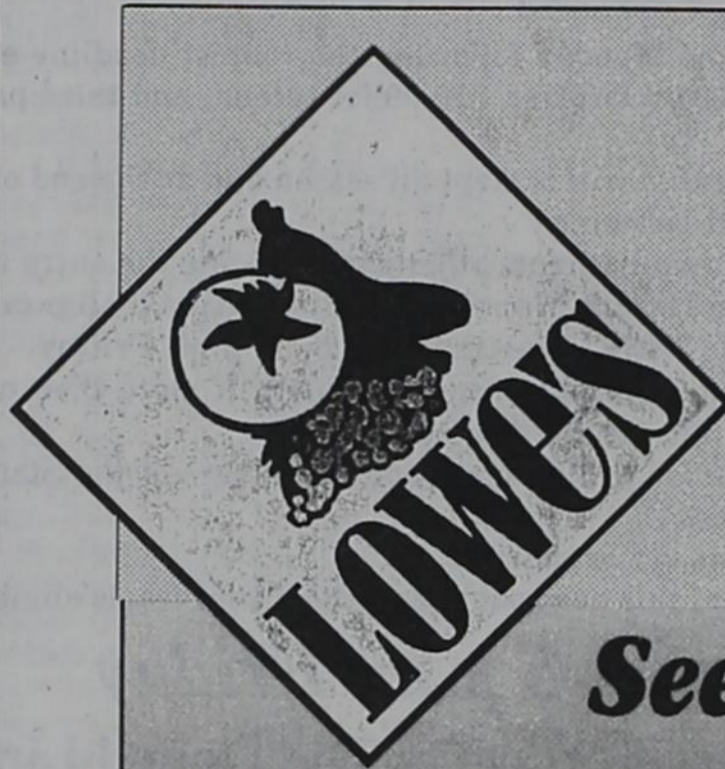
