In support of his claim that there are still great undeveloped potential oil pools existing in various sections of the country, Dr. Peterson says that "in west Texas, from the Rio Grande in Brewster county to the northermost county of the Panhandle great undeveloped potential oil pools exist; the same may be said of the San Juan basin in Utah, Colorado, New Mexico and Arizona.

With references to the well being drilled by the Mid-Kansas Oil and Gas company on the O2 ranch, below Alpine, geologists of the Mid-Kansas company as well as L. G. Knipe, geologist on the Wilson No. 1 Well in which oil was encountered at 1,740 feet, and also other prominent authorities agree in the opinion that oil will be encountered in that section between 1,600 and 1,700 feet, it is said.

Predicts Shallow Production. Dr. Peterson believes that the structural features represented in this district are fault blocks along which are developed arches and upfolds.

"The surface formation is Cretaceous, which is followed in descending order by a thin bed of Triassic rock, which in turn rests uncomfortably upon Pennsylvania carboniferous rocks which are possibly trun cated, in which event you may obtain shallow production." is the opinion of this eminent authority.

Wherever I am, I am a little uneasy unless I am in my own chair. I am contented only when I have my old friends about me. And yet I know full well that one should learn to be and to do otherwise, for perty to wit: sooner or later readjustments will have to be made. Old friends will have to go; new conditions will arise;
