SURVEY OF BAN-GOS TO BE MADE

Acording to the Border Times, five members of the International Commissioner's force of engineers arrived in Presidio Wednesday to start work on making surveys for the elimination of bancos. (A banco is formed when the river changes its course so that land which was on one side is cut off and laces on the other side.) So far no actual decision has ever been made on bancos here.

Previous to 95 no provision had been made for bancos and the river always remained the boundry. In 1905 a treaty was made with the Mexican Government which designated the river as the boundry when it cuts off a banco so long as the population of the land in question is less than 200 people or the area less than 65 acres. Under this agreement the commission my survey the land and declare it a bancos. The declaration, however, does not change the private owneship of the land.

The surveyors get all the data they find necessary, and then make a report to the commissioners of both countries, L. M. Lawson, American, and Gustave Serano, Mexican, boundry commissioners at El Paso. There men hold a public meeting and make their declarations.

The men composing the American party of engineers are: C. M. Ainesworth, C. S. Kerr, E. W. Barton, J. B. Anderson, and Bud Ballew. They are making a final survey and checking up on a survey made two years ago. The work has been made necessary by a recent dispute between Mexico and the United States over a banco at El

The men do not expect to survey the two large islands lying opposite Ojinaga on this trip. These islands were claimed to have been cut in 1907.



my idea of rapid riding. But I liked rounding up, cutting cattle, and above all, roping and branding, particularly the former. There was a sort of satisfaction in getting together the nucelus for a trail herd, then adding to it until it was complete and ready for starting. I continued in this line of work until it become necessary for me to go back home and manage the ranch and farm for my parents; this I did until my younger brother was capable of handling it, at which time I turned it over to him, and with the aid I could give him he did it successfully until father and mother died, the one at the age of 85, and the other at 76.

"I became fairly expert with the rope and gloried in branding time, when I could try my skill to the utmost. That I have not in the passing years entirely lost the art was demonstrated at the Gonzales Fair last fall, when I won first prize on the second day and third money the third day of the contest.
