The board also discussed bilingual classroom services at the Primary and Elementary school, especially the need for staff and facilities at grade two. Texas Education Agency teacher-student ratio guidelines allow for no more than a 1:22 student ratio in any K-4 classroom. The district projects it will not be in compliance in 2006-07.

Two years ago the district faced similar problems and expanded kindergarten and first grade bilingual services by adding staff and additional classrooms to meet the guidelines. It was projected at that time the district would require second grade bilingual staff and space in the near future. The board authorized Superintendent Parker to proceed with plans to address the problem.

ornyn co-sponsors Fair Tax Act

Many Texans understandably vait until the last week to file their federal tax returns. The experience is so unpleasant—and I'm not just talking about paying taxes due-that we tend to put it off as long as possible.

With the mid-April filing deadline now behind us, let's take a moment to look at the monster we have created in the federal income tax. What started in 1913 as a small levy that affected only two percent of citizens has grown in complexity and seeming inequality. It increasingly frustrates almost everyone.

There are currently 325 sepa-

rate forms that taxpayers might be required to complete. The code has become so complex that a majority of Americans now require professional help to file their taxes-and even those pros often make mistakes. We spend a total of \$250 billion annually just to comply with tax laws, and

more than six billion hours preparing our returns.

Here's another way to look at it. In 1955, there were 744,000 words in the IRS code. By 2000, this number had grown to 6.9 million. And since 1986, there have been more than 15,000 changes made to the tax code, many of them special provisions to benefit a small number of tax-

The process seems designed to confuse even those who don't have to pay. Consider this deceptively simple directive on the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) web site: "Even if you do not have to file a return, you should file one to get a refund of any Federal Income Tax withheld.'

If someone is eligible refund, why would the IRS obscure the matter by even suggesting that filing a return was unnecessary?
It reminds me of some advice

an accountant friend in Austin once said: "When it comes to the IRS, the answer is maybe, and that's final."

I've now come to the conclusion that our current tax system is in danger of collapsing under its own weight. It ought to be replaced by a much fairer and simpler process. That's why I'm a co-sponsor of the Fair Tax Act (S.25). If passed and signed by the President, the bill would significantly change the way we collect taxes in America.

The bill would eliminate most current major federal taxes-in cluding the income tax, capital gains, all payroll taxes, estate, gift, corporate and self-employment taxes-and replace them with a national retail sales tax. Collection could be done through state systems, and the IRS would be significantly downsized and

Think about it-no Byzantine forms and laws to comprehend quarterly or annually. In their

place: a simple sales tax on the

cost of new goods and services.

To ensure a fair tax didn't penalize low-income Americans, everyone would receive a monthly "prebate" of the tax on essential goods and services.

This system would greatly simplify the collection process. It would eliminate the demand for expensive tax advisers who specialize in finding loopholes and exceptions in our complicated tax code. It would also negate measures such as the Alternative Minimum Tax that are sweeping up increasing numbers of middle class taxpayers.

The Fair Tax idea has been talked about for decades. But there is increasing support for making a radical change, in the

name of fairness and efficiency.
I've always believed the key economic prosperity in our country is keeping taxes low for Americans and their businesses. That's the way to reward initiative, and to promote job creation and economic growth.

Reclaiming the reins of our runaway federal income tax system will help promote a strong economy. A national retail sales tax is a simple and viable alternative to our current federal in come system.

Albert Einstein, a genius at analyzing complex scientific principles, once said: "The hardest thing in the world to understand is the income tax."

Einstein died more than 50 years ago. What would he say about the system today?

I never took a TAKS test. I understand that kids fear them. But I can promise that kids today do not know real test fear like the anticipation of taking one of Miss Ben Tarpley's tests. We had to take tests without the help of computers, calculators, text messages, cell phones, and global satellite positioning. The test paper, you, and a pencil, with Miss Ben watching every move you covers and our notebooks didn't zip.

Academic competition did not go beyond our high school. We didn't have UIL editorial writing, and poetry, and calculator, and debate. English, math, history, civics, and algebra were the core curriculum and Future Homemakers and Future Farmers learned to cook, sew, and farm.

Mrs. Dorothy Warden taught speech and typing. We sat down at big old manual typewriters and tried to keep our fingers on the home keys. There were timed tests in typing. We strived for a lot of words per minute. I wasn't very good as I recall. There was big pressure (and noise)

during the tests. It was pretty intimidating to sit bea girl flying at 100 words per minute, leaving you behind in a trail of typewriter dust.

I do remember we skipped a few afternoons at the end of our senior year and went to Whitney to shoot pool. One time on the way back my 1949 Plymouth ran out of water, overheated and blew a head gasket so I had to fess up and call daddy to come rescue us.

We all managed to graduate and move on, some successful, some not so successful. One classmate died homeless under a bridge in Ft. Worth. Another became a prosperous doctor. Many have passed away. After all it has been 50-years ago. I liked my high school years.

My only regret is that if we had UIL competition back then, I might have been the state typewriter champion.

Dear Ron,

This is a letter to the citizens of the Parmer County Hospi-

I came to Friona in the spring of 1965 to attend the open house of the new wing of the hospital, and to sign a contract to join the Friona Medical-Surgical Clinic. The wind was blowing pretty much like it has this spring - hard. Had there not been a hospital here, opening up a practice would have been out of the question. That same fact of having a hospital here still holds. Recruiting another physician to take over when I retire won't be possible without an inpatient facility Retaining the remaining physicians will be unlikely.

Medicare wasn't yet enacted into practice in 1965. Along with the coverage for senior citizens came the strings that inevitably accompany federal money. Now, we must dance at the end of those strings in order to provide a medical facility for Parmer County.

We would have closed our doors if the hospital district hadn't been formed, providing tax funds for upgrading the equipment and raising the pay scale enough to hold qualified personnel. Now, we have to decide whether the citizens of Friona are going to have a facility to continue providing medical care for them. The federal guidelines are such that we must remodel or rebuild. Either way, the costs are very high, necessitating a rise in taxes and the ability to float bonds. So, this election is really about whether we continue to have a thriving local hospital or have to go out of town for everything medical.

Consider the alternative. Do you think a pharmacy would

be able to survive without practitioners here? Every ambulance ride a minimum of 22 miles, [providing that enough people would volunteer to join up, knowing that no less than an hour would be volunteered every time they were called away from work or home.] No lab. No X-ray. No physical therapy. No post op rehab. No place where simple, but necessary, inpatient admissions would place you in town with No emergency room, [where for the past 50 or 60 years, or possibly more, there has been a doctor available here 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year, with an ER backing us up.] Nursing home? No meals on wheels. Where you gonna go when you or your family has a life-threatening emergency that must be stabilized right now!

Get out and vote May 13th, or early vote May 1st through 9th. Please show your support with a yes vote.

Passengers are wonderful to help. usually carrying a small drink the mother

When they get to a table, the mother puts down the food, disengages herself from the bags on her shoulders, tends to the baby in the carriage and prepares the food for the walking child. Then she eats.

It can't possibly be an enjoyable experience because she's constantly checking on the baby and the 3 year old. But we seldom see any signs of agitation. Although the moms must be considerable pressure, they seem composed, appearing tranguil and unruffled.

Standing in line, I see the paraphernalia and wonder how in the world is all that going to get on the plane. Sometimes the mom checks the carriage and a piece of luggage. Sometimes

Passengers are wonderful to help. They see the young mom struggling with all the stuff in a small, crowded space and offer

Usually the moms let them put a bag in the overhead space and hold other items while she gets seated

On crowded planes, when the mother arrives late, passengers cooperate to make sure the mom and her toddler are able to sit together. Babes in arms travel free if they're under 2 years old. That means the mother has to hold the baby during

I usually see all this on short flights of an hour or so. The baby doesn't cry, the toddler reads a book or drinks from a sippy cup. When the flight ends, passengers again are willing to help load up the mom with all her belongings. They appreciate her ability to not only cope, but also do so without complaining.





State sales tax collections increase in March

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn announced that the state received \$1.36 billion in sales tax revenue in March, a 13.2 percent increase compared to March 2005.

Local sales tax revenues also continue to grow. Strayhorn sent \$368.2 million in April sales tax allocations to cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts, and 18.2 percent increase compared to April 2005. So far the calendar year, sales tax allocations to local governments are up

17 percent.

Comptroller Strayhorn sent April sales tax allocations of \$249.3 million to Texas cities, up 17.8 percent compared to April 2005. Calendar year-to-date, city sales tax allocations are running 15.5 percent higher than last year. Texas counties received sales tax payments of \$22.3 million, up 19.2 percent compared to one year ago. Calendar year-to-date, county sales tax allocations are 18.1 percent higher than last year.

State sales tax revenue for March, and April payments made to local governments today, represents sales that occurred in

The Comptroller's next sales tax allocation will be made on Friday, May 12.

Parmer County's April 2006 payment totaled \$31,024 broken down as Bovina \$4,663; Farwell \$8,418; and Friona \$17,942. In April 2005 the tax payment total was \$49,463

Comparing April 2005 to April 2006 tax receipts were down 37.27% broken down as Bovina is up 15.68%; Farwell is down -68.01%; and Friona is down -6.14%.

For the year 2006, Parmer County cities have received a total of \$154,111 as compared to \$162,180 for the same period last year. For the year, Bovina tax revenue is up 6.98%; Farwell is down -21.64%: and Friona is up 1.71% for an overall decrease of -4.97% for the county.







I miss playing softball. I miss the spill of the game. I miss standing at home plate, listening to the umpire tell me those immortal words: "You're holding the wrong end of the bat!" I miss running through the outfield at the speed of snail birth, tripping on an especially tall blade of grass, and falling flat on

I miss the camaraderie of my church team when I would come back to the dugout after a bad call,
