KidFish event Sunday Sep 10

The City of Friona is sponsoring another KidFish Sunday September 10 at Reeve Lake. Official fishing hours are 1-4 p.m. This will be the second KidFish event this year.

Kids 16-years-old and under are eligible to fish. There are different age divisions and prizes will be awarded for longest fish, most fish, etc. Kids can bring their own gear or fishing gear and bait will be available at the registration area.

The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department will stock the lake, which is full from recent rains, with catfish prior to Sunday.

There is no entry fee but each child needs to register to be eligible for prizes and to check out fishing gear. The registration area will be at the Community Center. Bring the kids out and kick off the week of Maize Days celebration.

Maize Days 50-year celebration is longest in Parmer County

This year marks the 50th year for Friona's Maize Days celebration along with Friona's 100th birthday. Maize Days is now the longest-running city celebration in Parmer County.

Bovina's Bull Town Days was discontinued about 10-years ago. Farwell's Border Town Days has been going for the past 40-years and their 100th anniversary for the town was two years ago.

Most believe Shamrock has the longest-running city celebration in the Texas Panhandle. Their world famous St. Patrick's Day event has been in existence for the past 61 years. Shamrock also celebrated its 100th anniversary two years ago.

City receives equity return

According to city manager Terri Johnson, the city of Friona has received notification from the Texas Municipal League Intergovernmental Risk Pool (TML-IRP) that it will receive a return on equity in the amount of \$2,805.

The refund is based on the city's successful loss prevention efforts and length of membership. TML-IRP, a self-insurance fund, provides liability, property, and workers' compensation coverage to Texas local governments.

During its 36-year existence, TML-IRP has a history of returning portions of Members' equity to members when financial results are better than expected. The liability equity return is due to be delivered to the city in November.

Rain totaled 2.12 inches

It rained. And rained. Starting Friday night soon after the football game, on and off Saturday, then constant slow, soaking rain all-day Sunday into Monday morning.

Some weathercasters said it was remnants of Hurricane John that swept the Pacific coast of Mexico. From whatever source, the area received 1.18 inches Sep 2, .16 Sep 3, and .78 Sep 4, for a total of 2.12 inches so far in September, according to official weathercaster John Gurley.

Patsy Allen is Teacher of the Year in Region 16 ESC

Patsy Allen of Friona was named the 2006 Secondary Teacher of the Year for Region 16 Education Service Center (ESC). She was selected from among 10 finalists Thursday, August 31, at ceremonies in Amarillo and will represent the Panhandle Region in the Texas Teacher of the Year competition.

Mrs. Allen is the family, career, and consumer science teacher at Friona High School, what many of us knew years ago as home economics.

Her FCCLA students have consistently qualified for regional, state, and national awards. She was successful in securing \$90,000 in grant money over three years and organized a nationally acclaimed Service Learning project, involving local students in many service projects throughout the community.

Even though Patsy Allen has been a teacher for 26-years and in the Fisd since 1996 there are a lot of things you probably don't know about her.

She was born and raised in Oklahoma and received her Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Oklahoma State University in 1970-76. In 1995 she received Texas FCA certification from Texas Tech University. Her employment history includes teaching and consulting stints at Amarillo College, Texas Tech, Texas A&M, and Oklahoma State.

She and husband, Delwin, a

veterinarian, moved to El Paso in 1986, where he worked for a packing house whose slogan was "The Best Little Slaughterhouse in Texas". "They had it painted on the side of their trucks," she said. In 1990 they transferred to Friona where Delwin was going to be employed at the Excel plant "for a couple of years." It is Friona's good fortune they are still here. She is the author of Curricu-

lum Series for Teachers of Young Children. She has written three curriculum guides and done training for teachers (1988-1994) on Personal Safety, Science, and Living History, all for young children.

In 1978, Mrs. Allen presented a research paper on Older Adults as History Teachers for Children to the American Gerontology Association in Washington, D.C. and to the Na-

tional Association for the Education of Young Children in Anaheim California in 1977.

In 2005-06, she was one of the Top 100 teachers in the Disney National Teacher of the Year competition which draws more than 70,000 teacher entries. Her Friona classes were nominated by Sen. Kel Seliger for Governor's Lone Star Volunteer Award.

She was honored as Teacher

of the Year in 2005 at the annual Friona Chamber of Commerce banquet. She was also selected as 4-H Leader of the Year in 2005. Since 1997 she has been influential in securing over \$100,000 in grants for the Friona schools for her Service Learning projects.

Mrs. Allen was a columnist and consulting editor for Early Education Magazine from 1985-1990, Volunteer of the Year at El Paso's Horizon Heights Elementary in 1988-89, and Young Career Woman of the Year in Oklahoma in 1980.

During she and Delwin's busy careers they managed to raise three children, Jessie, Alice, and Emily. Jessie and Alice are Friona High School graduates and Emily is a junior at FHS this year who just won the Gold Star 4-H award last week. The Allen family has been active in Parmer County 4-H for many years.

Patsy is also an avid amateur photographer who takes hundreds of pictures of family, friends, and school projects, as well as helping 4-H students with their photo projects. She has shared many photos with us here at the Friona Star over the years which we appreciate.

Congratulations to Patsy and the Allen family on her most recent award and thanks for the contributions they have made to the community. We cast our vote for Patsy as Texas Teacher of the Year. Good luck, Patsy.

fried squash leads
to world peace

Someone said that two of the best things in life were true love and homegrown tomatoes. They forgot about fried squash.

Mother came into possession of some fresh vegetables over the weekend. Yellow squash, okra, sweet corn, and tomatoes. When mother takes a notion to cook we show up.

Back a few years, before the family grew up and everybody got married and then divorced and stopped visiting, we would all gather at mother's house for holidays. Cooking and eating were the main attractions. Mother could have three or four projects going in the kitchen at the same time and by the time she got it all to the table, the smells alone made you crazy. She didn't have to say "Ya'll come on" twice.

Mother is older now. Harry died and she moved to town and lives alone so the opportunity to cook big old meals has vanished. Still, every now and then she takes a notion to cook. It is a hard habit for her to break. She took a notion to cook Monday evening and invited me and my brother and sister-in-law over for a Labor Day dinner.

When Rick and I found out she had yellow squash we knew what we had to do. We begged her to fry it. It wasn't a pretty sight for a couple of 50-60 year-old men begging their 87-year-old mother to fry some yellow squash but who cares. If you had ever had mom's fried squash you would understand.

After all it was her fault that we liked fried squash in the first place. When we were growing up all foods except cereal and red beans were fried. Eggs, bacon, ham, or Spam, it was fried. Fried baloney, chicken fried steak, fried squash and fried okra were common menu items.

The cookstoves were gas and every kitchen had a match box holder hanging on the wall nearby with a supply of big wooden matches. Strike a match, light the burner under the cast iron skillet and melt the grease one more time.

The skillet mostly always sat on the top of the stove with the cold grease congealed in the bottom until the next fried meal. I don't think the skillets were ever washed until the grease got too old to use anymore.

The fried squash Monday night never made it to the table. As we've done since we were kids, we were eating while she was cooking. She used to shoo us away and tell us to wait until she got it on the table, but not any more. I think she is pretty glad we still take over her cooking.

The thin slices of squash, breaded in corn meal and dropped in the shallow grease, come out hot and crispy. We kept lifting the tin foil and eating the squash chips about as fast as she took them out of the old cast iron skillet.

Rick fired up mom's grill and put on the pork ribs. Mother had wrapped the ears of sweet corn in foil to put on the grill too. It must have had butter inside the foil because she warned us to "make sure the seam is up so it won't leak." The butter on the corn brought back my childhood too.

In the old days mother bought butter in a one-pound block and put it in a covered butter dish in the icebox. Later on we could buy a box of butter in quarter-pound sticks but it was still too hard to spread on a piece of bread, so you laid a

pat of butter on the bread and put it in the oven to melt into toast.

At mother's house Monday, she had four kinds of butter in the fridge (we don't call them iceboxes any more). She still had some of the old-fashioned quarter-pound sticks, plus a plastic crock of soft spreadable butter, a bottle of squeeze butter, and another bottle of spray butter. I still can't figure out who needs spray butter. Might be good on popcorn.

While the ribs and cornbread were cooking, we each got a small bowl full of the fried squash and sat around the living room talking and eating with our fingers. By the time the ribs were done and the corn was grilled and the cornbread crispy, the fried squash bowl was empty and in the sink. There aren't too many things I can think of that are better than fried squash. It could even lead to world peace.

I believe if we invited the Islam terror guys over to the house and shared some of mom's fried squash with them they would forget all about those 72 virgins waiting up in heaven.

A dream vacation turns into a nightmare

Some acquaintances of mine saved up for a weeklong family reunion and vacation on South Padre island. They rented a house with a pool and were having a ball. After being there for a few days, someone suggested they go to Matamoros for lunch. It was just across the border from Brownsville, only thirty minutes away.

They loaded up three vehicles with family members and headed for the border. During their time on the island, they had talked with other tourists who visited Mexico. They said it was no hassle, that all you needed to go across the bridge was a driver's license.

The group had planned to just walk across or take a taxi, but found themselves in a one-way lane leading into Mexico. It was noon when the first of their three vehicles got to a Border Patrolman on the Texas side. The owner told the officer that he had some gun shells in the pickup and asked if that would pose a problem. They had no weapons, only bullets. The Patrolman said, "No, just declare them to the Mexican authorities on the other side of the bridge." On the

Mexican side, they were told they would have to go to another crossing to turn over the ammunition, and waved the other two vehicles on through. Those folks quickly returned to Brownsville to wait for word about their family.



The three passengers in the pickup were detained. I'll call them Dad (pickup owner), Mom and Son (21 years old). Son was driving the pickup. Dad was placed in an official car and driven across town to another border crossing station. A customs agent drove Mom and Son to the station in their pickup. The three were confused and

worried. They thought since they told them about the bullets, they would let them go. No such luck.

They were questioned for hours, all in Spanish, which only Dad spoke. The officers wanted their birth certificates, social security numbers, driver's license, title and registration to the pickup. A few hours later, an agent who spoke English came

Ron,

I read with interest the letter in the Star from Bill Ellis. I was more interested in the pilot knowing the location of Bovina than the sighting of the UFO.

Back in the 1970's there was a V-O-R (VHF Omnidirectional Radio) southeast of Bovina. I used it many times when flying to the northwest. (More later on what is a V-O-R?) I would estimate it to be on or near one of Houston Bartlett farms. You can see it if you know for what you are looking as you come down the hill before entering Bovina. Look to the left about a mile away and you will see a shiny white tower that looks like a large white sombrero lying on the ground. For you flyers, it looks to be about 34 degrees and 30 minutes north and 102 degrees and 52 minutes west. (I'm looking at my old June 1971 Albuquerque sectional).

Without getting too specific, may I explain the V-O-R? A V-O-R is a radio navigational aid for pilots to find their way across the country. The pilots fly from V-O-R to V-O-R like we get directions to drive from town to town by using our road map.

This explains, to me why the pilot knew his position. He was using his radio frequency to fly the Bovina V-O-R.

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in and said he was charging Son with firearms possession, that in Mexico possession of bullets was the same as having weapons. A representative from the American consulate stopped by and told them she couldn't do anything except loan them her cell phone to call family members to get the title and other items. A family member brought them down by plane, along with a big bundle of cash. Mom says all during the questioning and waiting, the Mexican officers were rude and gave the Texans glaring looks, refusing their requests for water. They hadn't had anything to eat all day. "We could feel their hatred and resentment," says Mom, "just because we were Americans." Around midnight, they took Dad and Son to a jail cell.

After conferring with attorneys on both sides of the border, Dad and Son were released the next day after paying the judge and attorneys \$9,000. Dad's pickup (he still owes \$10,000 on it) is still in Mexican custody. He really doesn't care if he gets it back. He is glad to be home. He brought his wife and son home in a rent car.

Wind energy meeting in Bovina Tuesday

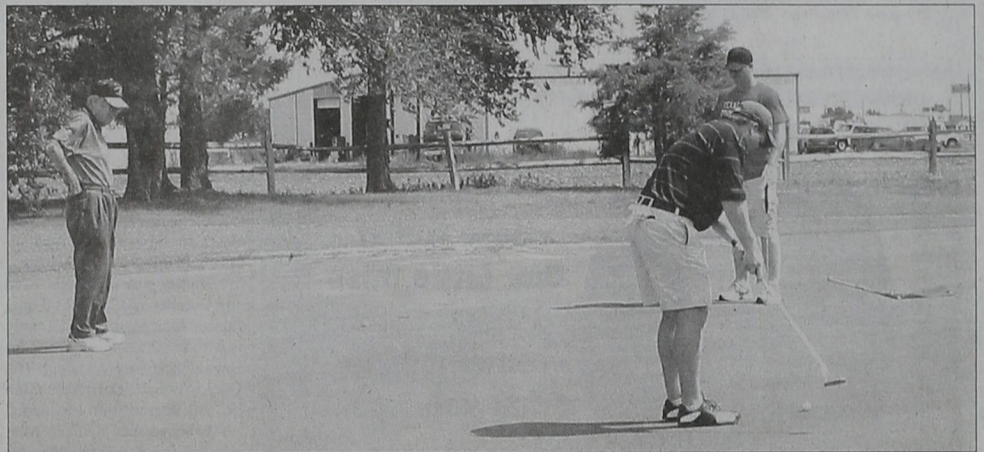
The public is invited to a wind energy meeting at 7 p.m. Tuesday, September 12, in the Bovina high school auditorium.

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

Cool temps put cotton at risk

From the September 1 Northwest Plains Pest Management newsletter by Monti Vandiver, extension agent:
 Cooler temperatures were a welcome relief but on the down side it did slow crop development. A prolonged cool spell could prevent some crops from reaching full maturity.
 Crops at most risk are those which were already "late", possibly due to a late planting date and environmental damage. For the most part irrigated crops look very good. Preliminary corn

silage yields appear to be good but it is still early.
 Cotton bollworms continue to be found in low numbers for the most part. Most higher bollworm populations have been observed in later maturing cotton fields. Populations in much of the more mature cotton have not developed to levels which justify treatment.

Chiefs win battle of first game jitters

After weeks of two-a-days and a couple of scrimmages, players and coaches look forward to a real game that counts. The first game of the year is usually a test when coaches hope the combination they've put on the field is the right one.

For the offense and defense it usually means opening night jitters, adjusting to snap counts, and keeping the adrenaline under control.

That was the case Friday night as the Chiefs squared off against the Abernathy Antelopes and their highly-touted running back Tate Horsford plus a couple of 6'6" defensive linemen. It turned out that was about all Abernathy brought as the Chiefs defense harassed Horsford and rattled Antelopes all over the field with jarring tackles, batted passes, and quarterback pressures.

In between, fans were entertained with bad calls by officials, two interceptions by Chieftain Juan Reyes that were ruled not interceptions, a fake punt by Friona, a blocked punt by Tolby Wilcox, a few false start penalties, and some shaky play clock management by the Chiefs. All of which can be explained by those first game jitters.

The first touchdown and the first first down of the season goes to senior Chieftain Octavio Moreno. Early in the 1st quarter, quarterback Sean Lookingbill threw an interception to give Abernathy the ball at the 20-yard-line. On the first play from scrimmage, Horsford carried up

Friona head coach Bob Ferguson remembers the last Chiefs vs. Littlefield game very well. Ferguson, who was an assistant coach to Mike Scott at the time, said, "We went to Littlefield to determine the district champion."

Both teams were in 3A at the time, both were 4-0, both had qualified for the playoffs, so the final game of 1999 was for the outright district championship. The final score of the game was 34-27. Friona scored the winning touchdown with 10-seconds to play. It was the only time Friona led in the game.

Quarterback Nathan King scored the first Friona touchdown then running back Noel Grajeda scored the next four TDs, one on a pass from King, and three on running plays of 1-, 1-, and 37- yards. Earlier in the day, Grajeda had been treated for flu symptoms. Grajeda's final touchdown was with only 10-seconds showing on the clock.

Fans will remember German exchange student Kai Pawlowski. He kicked four extra points in the game after Trent Cook missed the first try. Littlefield's desperation "Hail Mary" pass on the last play of the game was intercepted by Joe Bandy.

Among the players on the roster that year were Landon Martin, Joe Bandy, freshmen Nathan Haile and Adam Bandy, Jesse Allen, Dustin Campbell, Daniel Wiseman, Cason White, Josh Burleson, Garland Buske, Kyle Wiseman, Eric Rubio,

After an exchange of punts, Friona launched a 78-yard drive, helped along by 40-yards worth of Abernathy penalties, includ-

Before the half, Abernathy managed to block a Friona punt and had the ball inside the 20, but penalties and incomplete passes plagued the Lopes. They ended with the ball at Friona's 3-yard-line, lined up for a field goal, thought better of it, and went for the TD on 4th down but the Chieftain defense stopped their quarterback option for a 2-yard loss.

The Chiefs then went 3 and out and punted from their own end zone to the 40 but Abernathy could not punch it in. The halftime score was Abernathy 12, Friona 7.

The second half began with more of the same. The teams traded possessions mostly in the middle of the field. With 8:45 to go in the 4th quarter, Chieftain Tolby Wilcox blocked an Antelope punt giving Friona the ball at the 28-yard-line. A good second effort by running back Eddie Ortiz moved the Chiefs to a first down at the 15 but a goal line interception by Abernathy turned the ball over.

The Chiefs defense held and forced a punt. Abernathy had a high snap which the punter grabbed then tried to throw a

pass which was incomplete and gave Friona the ball 1st down at the 23-yard line. Lookingbill tossed two incomplete passes to Hector Sanchez in the end zone. With about 3:39 left and facing a 4th and 12, Lookingbill threw a beauty and hit Sanchez in full stride in the end zone for the go ahead touchdown. The Chiefs tried a two-point conversion which failed and gave them a slim 13-12 lead. On the night the Chiefs held the lead for about 4-minutes in the game but it still goes in the win column.

The Chiefs tried a squib kick and almost recovered but Abernathy had the ball at the 48-yard line with plenty of time. But Octavio Moreno batted an attempted pass up into air and the Antelope quarterback caught it again for a big loss and a 2nd down and 24. The next play was a deep pattern intercepted by Juan Reyes but ruled out of bounds.

A 4th down desperation play was stopped by the Chief defense and Friona ran out the clock at mid-field, avenging the 17-14 playoff loss last year to

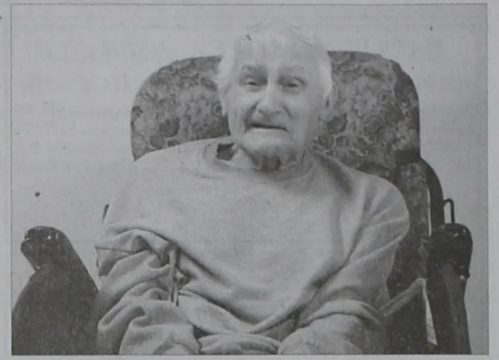

My Life Story

Every month, a resident of *Prairie Acres Nursing Home or Friona Heritage Estates*, writes a story about his/her life's history for the home's newsletter, "The *Prairie Times*", for printing in this issue. This month we feature *Charlie Huey Wise*.



Charlie Huey Wise

I was born August 14, 1909 in Cleburne, Texas, to William and Josephine Wise. There were 10 children in my family. Seven boys: Alvie, Sam, Bill, Ira, Charlie, Perry and Bud. The three girls were Edna, Pearl, and Bootsie. Bootsie and I are the only ones still living.

Dad was a farmer and the boys were taught to work outside and the girls were taught to work inside the house.

We didn't have much schooling. For fun we played marbles and baseball, back then you had to use your imagination for playing, we didn't have many toys.

When I was a small child we went to Oklahoma and was in the Oklahoma Land Rush. We settled around McAlester, Oklahoma.

After two months we moved to a two-room house at the back of Jack's Barbershop. Some time later we moved to Pearl Kinsley's house on the corner of 7th and Woodland. Then in 1953, we bought a house at 603 Ashland and still own it today.

I worked for a while at Friona Consumers, then for Adam's Drilling, ran a filling station on the corner of 7th and Main Street. I started working for Friona Wheat Growers in September of 1952 and worked there until 1985. I retired after 32 years of working at the age of 72.

We bought a Winnebago and did some traveling.

I have always had a garden. I love to plant flowers and vegetables. I enjoy playing checkers, 42 and listening to music of all kinds. I also love cookies, chocolate and any kind of sweets. I also like dogs and usually have had one. I drove up until I was 96 1/2.

Wilma and I are members of the Oddfellows and Rebeccah's.

In fact I am a Charter Member. We are also members of the Congregational Church.

I served in World War II from November 18, 1943 until November 6, 1945. I was a Litter Bearer and Medic in Rome-Arno, North Apennines and Po Valley in Italy. I saw a lot of sad things and do not talk about it. One of my favorite quotes is, "It will rain when the wind stops blowing and the wind will stop blowing when it rains."

I came to live at Prairie Acres on June 1, 2006.

FRIONA CENTENNIAL MOMENTS

(This is one of a series of weekly articles pertaining to Friona's 100th anniversary, which will be observed throughout 2006)

Crackerbox, Big Square, Buckeye...

If these names mean anything to you, then you are either a great local historian or you and Parmer County go way back (and perhaps for some it is both). These are just some of the names of the small community country schools in Parmer County. Names were chosen for property owners, location, type of structure, etc. At one time there were 17 common school districts in the county all under one county superintendent. Overcoming distance has been a problem for the Panhandle since the beginning and education was no exception.

These early schools were quite simply, but adequately constructed with usually a small wooden frame structure in the neighborhood of 20 by 24 to 28 feet. Generally they had one entrance, a few windows and sometimes a bell if the community were wealthy enough; but mainly hand bells were used to call the school to order. The act of ringing that bell was quite a privilege as Sam Mears remembers. Heated by coal stoves in the winter and cooled by the windows in the spring, these beloved schools were immensely important to the communities they served where they doubled as social centers. Education was second only to building one's own shelter and providing religious worship for the community. Some were even built on skids so that they could be moved to where the children were. At the onset, the county's school districts were 6 miles square so that hopefully, no child would have to walk more than 3 miles to attend school. Thus, the 'portable' school was an excellent solution when different families needed the school.

Teachers for these early schools were not in plentiful supply and many times were chosen from the oldest students who had just finished school or were imported from their former communities in Iowa, Indiana, and Ohio which the new settlers had left to come to Texas. Many of their names are recognizable to us even today: Roxie Witherspoon, Malinda Reeve, Lucy and Esther Goodwine, Edith Maurer, Lara Edward, Floy Bridges, Mary Lou Roberson and Annie Lee Riley.

As in the other one-room school houses of their day, all ages and all grade levels were taught in the same small space by the same teacher; and you know—they seem to have made it just fine. As the social centers of the small communities, many

different events were held at the school houses including fundraisers for the school. Box socials, pie suppers, a 'literary society' to express the talent in the community, sing-songs, singing schools and a community Christmas tree party are just some of the events remembered. Materials were scarce and therefore, quite precious and greatly appreciated. Fundraisers helped purchase school supplies for the children. One such event was an auction of various homemade items. One item was a friendship quilt made by the students and auctioned. It brought \$5.00 and was purchased by their teacher, Wana Vestal in the 1930s.

Later, these communities sponsored special events for their citizens such as a skating rink for 10 cents and silent movies for 25 cents. Elaborate Christmas events were very popular also and in the Oklahoma Lane Community a certain peach tree was decorated in lieu of an evergreen tree—trees were mightily scarce then also. Later, they continued the great tradition with evergreens from the Breaks. Nothing was quite like the gift bags from Santa Claus each year to bring joy to young and old alike.

Most of these early schools were not able to have secondary or high school education and when the time came for that, it was either add it or consolidate with a larger school. As you can imagine, these country schools fought tooth and nail to save their schools. Black Public Schools, Parmer County Common School District # 1 which opened in 1907 even had a soccer team, the Black Bears, which played against the Summerfield Coyotes and won 9-2 in 1927.

"Why we need a rural high school" by Clifford Mann, Black Public School

"First: because no community can progress where the inhabitants are not EDUCATED.

Second: A good school draws people to the community.

Third: It is very inconvenient for children to go to town to school. Country children should be educated in the country.

Fourth: A good school is attractive in appearance.

Fifth: The auditorium could be used as a community hall and for religious services.

Lastly, no person can obtain a college education without finishing high school."

Friona was Parmer County Common School District #2 and was established in 1908, Rhea was #3 established in 1908; Lazbuddie was # 8 in 1925 from part of Black and Bovina #5 est. 1905. By 1949 all of Black, Lakeview, Messenger and part of Rhea had consolidated into Friona Independent School District. Consolidation did not solve all the problems. Although Friona Schools led the state with the first school buses, transportation during a time of gas rationing would have been difficult. Integration became more of an issue. Bovina had a Mexican School established in 1902 which operated until 1928. Farwell, the only independent school district in the county for many years, bused Negro students to Clovis in the 1950s. Hot lunches were a huge, but welcome undertaking for all the area schools.

As the small schools consolidated, the old school buildings continued to serve their spiritedly independent communities for many years, example—Black Community School was

torn down just last year. Many were relocated to serve the consolidated schools and still exist today i.e. Lakeview to Friona and Oklahoma Lane which now serves as the Bovina Community Network. Lazbuddie and Walcott continue to operate today. Many students from Hereford now transfer and are bused to Walcott for the "small school experience". Interesting...

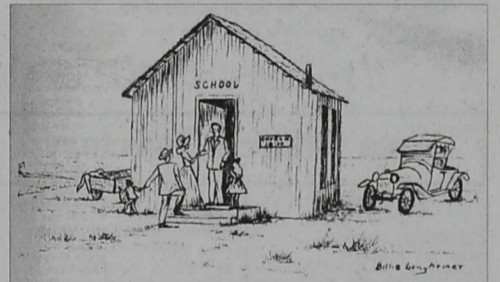



I was seventeen, in the spring semester of my first senior year of high school, when I had my first car date. Until that time I had only been allowed to date

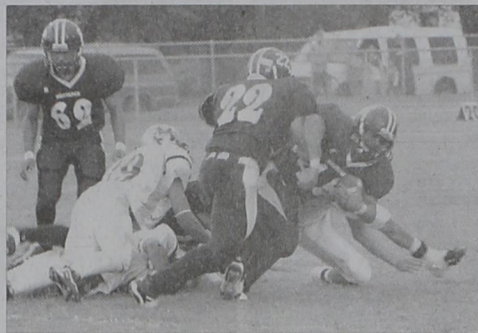

total of 235 yards on offense. The Mustangs fumbled twice and lost both and were penalized 10 times for 65 yards. Morton had six fumbles

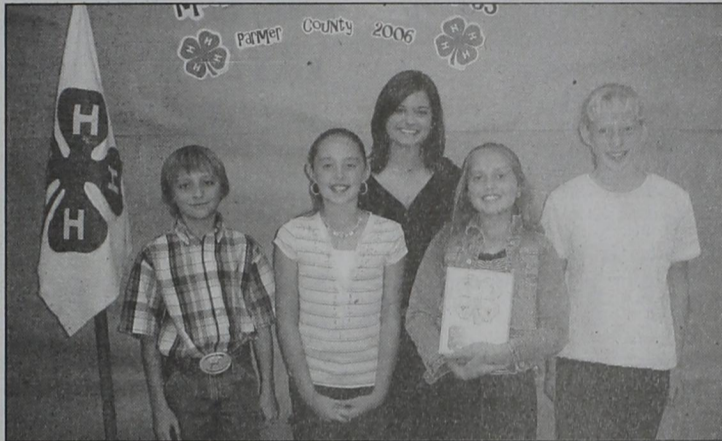
and lost two. Bovina will travel to Clarendon this week to meet the Clarendon Broncos. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

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Texas Cooperative Extension encourages us to be prepared

Texas Cooperative Extension officials will spend September trying to help people statewide focus on being prepared for disaster, whether by natural forces or terrorism.

The fifth anniversary of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, the anniversary of hurricanes Katrina and Rita, and recent wildfires all make this year's National Preparedness Month more meaningful for many Texans, said Janie Harris, Extension housing and environment specialist.

Extension will host numerous events around the state and offer a variety of instructional materials as part of the preparedness campaign, which is sponsored by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security and the American Red Cross.

The Extension Disaster Edu-

cation Network Web site at <http://texashelp.tamu.edu/> has information on topics from avian bird flu to wildfires, much of it in English and Spanish.

"Being disaster prepared is more than just knowing what to do in case of a tornado or a fire it's about preparing to be self-sufficient for at least 72 hours after a disaster," Harris said.

Extension materials can help families put together a 72-hour disaster supply kit for the home, office and car, she said, and provide information on developing and practicing a family emergency plan.

The site also teaches about community warning systems and evacuation routes, and provides information on getting involved and supporting community emergency preparedness, Harris said.

Preparation and plans need to be made in homes, businesses, schools, and on farms and ranches, said Kyle Smith, Extension associate director of county programs in Texas.

"In order for a family and a community to be prepared for a disaster, everyone needs to take the necessary steps to become disaster-ready," Smith said. "Get informed. Get prepared. Get involved."

Extension agents in each county will conduct programs throughout National Preparedness Week, Sept. 10-16, in conjunction with other emergency management officials, county judges and commissioners, and various volunteer organizations, Smith said.

In addition, Extension agriculture agents are working with

county officials to establish a County Animal Issue Committee, Smith said.

Patriotism through Preparedness is an Extension youth curriculum for fourth-grade-level students and their families, Harris said. This curriculum is available in both English and Spanish on the Texas EDEN Web site.

The agency also offers free programs that teach life skills, basic money management and health and nutrition, all skills that may be needed on the road to recovery, she said.

Extension is in a unique position to respond quickly, because it has employees and volunteer programs in every county, Smith said. Whether providing food for victims of the hurricanes or helping producers after wildfires this spring, Extension has been a part of many recovery efforts, he said.

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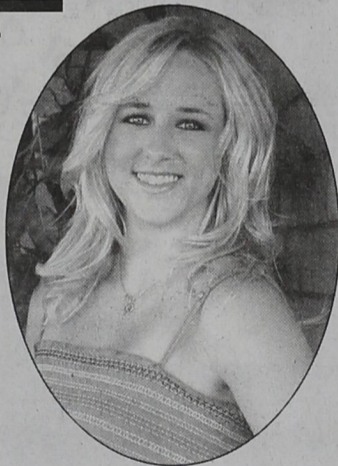

Show sorghum some respect

Sorghum is like the Rodney Dangerfield of the crop world—the younger tag-along sibling of corn that gets no respect.

But, sorghum has a vital role in the future of American agriculture. Its drought-tolerance is legendary and an increasingly important factor in many crop rotations on farms dealing with long dry spells. It's fast becoming the top crop for ethanol production, which could help our nation reduce our dependence on foreign oil supplies. And, overwhelmingly, it's deserving of our respect.

The National Sorghum Producers' announcement last month of a proposed national sorghum checkoff may be a way for sorghum to get the respect it deserves. By supporting the proposed national sorghum checkoff, producers and end users can ensure its profitable future.

The potential for a revolution in sorghum is here and now, but only if the research studies are conducted. Sources within the sorghum research sector say that already they've had to pass up on valuable research opportunities because the funding through the few current state checkoff's just wasn't enough to support them.

Studies that would improve the ethanol potential of sorghum, or develop an over-the-top weed control application in the field are lacking the necessary funding. These are two examples of research projects that would increase sorghum farmers' bottom lines, and yet they gather dust on shelves for lack of financial support.

The bottom line is regrettable, but understandable. Private industry won't sink the dollars into expensive research unless there's a guaranteed monetary

return—like that they can get from cotton, corn and soybean seed sales. Other industry segments, such as the ethanol and silage sorghum industry, are doing what little research they can, but again it all comes down to what is profitable. And, as for the public universities, well they're already stretched thin enough just funding the research for their primary crops, such as cotton, corn, and soybeans.

A national checkoff would put those with a vested interest in boosting the profitability of sorghum in control of the crop's destiny. More adequately funded research can increase the profits

in the elevator bin, the feed bunk, the ethanol plant and on the table.

Now is the time for those in the sorghum industry who see the value potential in this crop to voice their support for a national checkoff. Call your state sorghum representatives and add your input on the issues of board representation, assessment rates, administration and other critical issues.

It's only when all sorghum stakeholders band together and fully fund its research, educational and promotional efforts will this crop get the chance to shine, and the respect it deserves.
