Senator Seliger speaks on education

The fourth special session of the 79th Legislature was a success in many ways. After years of varying opinions on how to fix the broken school finance system, the House and Senate passed a bill that not only brought significant property tax relief to all taxpayers, but also included important education reforms. Thanks to leadership and cooperation among both chambers, House Bill 1 provides all teachers, school nurses, counselors and librarians with a much deserved \$2000 across-the-board pay raise. The bill also restores the \$500 health insurance stipend. Additionally, one educator compensation award program was expanded and another created in order to further supplement educator salaries.

The Awards for Student Achievement Program was created by Governor Perry and applies to schools serving the most economically disadvantaged students that are also rated exemplary, recognized, or in the top 25 percent of schools most improved in reading or math. The program's funding was expanded from the initial \$10 million to \$100 million beginning in the 2007-2008 school year. Seventy-five percent of the awards must go directly to teachers who are shown to have improved student achievement.

The second program, the Educator Excellence Awards Program, is available to any district and will be funded with \$228 million starting in the 2008-2009 school year. A majority of teachers on each participating campus must vote to approve participation. Sixty percent of the funds must go to teachers shown to have improved student achievement, while the remainder may be used for stipends for mentoring, hard-to-staff subjects and campuses, and to

reward other staff who contribute to student achievement.

I am pleased to report that Texas students will also benefit from several improvements to the education system that will be implemented in the coming years.

Beginning this school year, districts will receive \$275 per student in grades nine through twelve to be spent on high school completion and success initiatives starting in sixth grade. The funds are intended to increase graduation rates and may be used to promote college readiness or to offer additional study options such as dual credit or advanced placement courses. I believe

this is a huge step towards helping our college-bound students get ahead.

Additionally, the Texas Education Agency will begin to calculate annual student achievement and report to parents and teachers whether each student meets, exceeds or falls below expectations. This is imperative for keeping our students on track for graduation and post-high school success, whether each student's plan is higher education, technical school, or succeeding in the workforce.

There are a couple of worthy goals that I hope we will address in the 80th Legislature. I would like to see

rapid progress in getting our teachers to the national average in pay. Despite the recent pay raise, Texas still lags in that figure. I also think we need to assess the effectiveness of the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) test, as well as whether the test has been counterproductive to meeting its intended objective. I believe it may be time to replace the TAKS test with end-of-course exams based upon the recommended curriculum.

I recognize the importance of preparing students not only for college, but for any path they choose in life.

I am interested in expanding technical and workforce training programs in our high schools because not every student chooses to pursue higher education. While it should always be our goal to encourage further study, we should also utilize the time we have today to help students succeed tomorrow. I look forward to working with educators in this district to accomplish more for our schools.

We must never stop supporting our schools or stop trying to improve them. Today's students are tomorrow's leaders, workers, and, yes, teachers.

Report bees to county ag office

Bees are in the news. Recent media reports have noted the possibility of Africanized bees still making their way north through the Panhandle.

Monti Vandiver, Pest Management agent with the Parmer County Extension office in Farwell, says he has received several calls the past few weeks

about swarms of bees. One incident was a swarm he found in the squirrel houses at the courthouse which he captured with the help of his father-in-law who is a beekeeper in Roswell. Another swarm was reported near the school playground in Bovina. Others have been reported out in the county.

"There is no way for the average person to distinguish between Africanized bees and native bees," Vandiver said. To determine if bees are Africanized, he said, the bees have to be sent to a lab, ground up, and the DNA tested.

Any resident that finds a swarm of bees should call the county extension office at 806-481-3619. Most important, children and pets should be kept away from a bee swarm until officials capture or kill the bees. Africanized bees are very aggressive and Vandiver said residents should not disturb any bee activity.

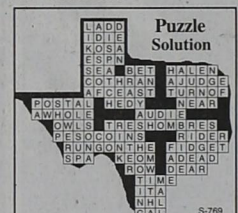

Friona 21 - Bovina 0

A standing room only full house converged on Mustang Field in Bovina last Friday for the match-up between the Mustangs and the Friona Chieftains. Whoever sponsors the Bovina concession stand should be real happy.

In addition to the county rivalry, the Chiefs were out to atone for a 15-14 overtime loss to Bovina last year in Friona's homecoming game. In that one, the two were tied 7-7 at the end of regulation.

Friona scored first in overtime and kicked the point after for a 14-7 lead. Bovina scored on their possession but missed the extra point kick which should have given Friona a narrow 14-13 win.

But Friona was ruled offside on the kick and Bovina then gambled and converted a two-point conversion to hand Friona a 15-14 loss. Both teams went on to make the playoffs.

This year the crowd came to see the rematch and witnessed a mostly defensive contest in spite of Friona's 21-0 victory. Friona won the defensive battle, holding the Mustangs to 151 total yards. The Mustangs stayed on the ground most of the game, completing only 1 of 4 pass attempts and having 2 passes picked off

for interceptions. The Chiefs also trapped Bovina for a two-point safety.

Chieftain quarterback Sawyer Reed connected with Ryan Gerles on a long completion in the 1st quarter to put the Chiefs at Bovina's 16-yard line. From there

Reed scored on a 16-yard scamper, the kick failed, and Friona led 6-0.

In the 2nd quarter Ruben Chico scored the first of his two touchdowns on a one-yard plunge. The kick was good and later in the quarter Friona added the safety

after pinning Bovina inside the 5-on a punt. The halftime score was 15-0.

Chico again scored a one-yard TD in the 3rd quarter, Reyes' kick failed again, but Friona had the 21-0 lead. For the rest of the 3rd quarter and all of the 4th, the defenses took over.

Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative (DSEC) has filed an application, with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC), seeking approval to build a 115-kV transmission line extending approximately 18.3 miles. The new transmission line will begin at the existing Castro County Interchange in Castro County (owned by Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS)). From the Castro County Interchange the line will go north approximately 1.0 mile, paralleling the east side of an existing SPS transmission line to the south side of State Highway (SH) 86, just south of existing Substation 21. The proposed transmission line will then continue west approximately 17.2 miles along the south side of SH 86 to the east side of SH 214. The new transmission line will then parallel the east side of SH 214 continuing north to existing Substation 18 (approximately 0.1 mile). Along the route of the proposed transmission line DSEC plans to construct a new substation, Substation 22. The majority of the new transmission line as well as the proposed Substation 22 will be located in Parmer County, Texas. Approximately one-third of the line will be located in Castro County, Texas.

Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative has selected two alternative transmission line routes to be considered by the Public Utility Commission of Texas, described as follows:

Preferred Route (Route 1) consisting of line segments A, B, and D. The preferred transmission line route, will start one mile west and one mile south of the intersection of State Highway (SH) 86 and FM 1055, in Castro County at an electrical interchange facility owned by Southwestern Public Service Company, (Castro County Interchange). From the Castro County Interchange the transmission line will proceed north approximately one mile to the south side of SH 86; then the line turns west and continues along the south side of the SH 86 right of way for approximately 17.2 miles, crossing over County Road (CR) 505, FM 1524, an SPS 69kV transmission line, the Castro-Parmer county line, and continues west along the south side of SH 86 past CR 28, FM 1172, CR 25, CR 24, CR 23, CR 22, CR 21, and CR 20 to the intersection of SH 86 and SH 214; then the line turns north and continues along the east side of SH 214 right of way approximately 1/8 mile, crossing SH 86 and terminating at an existing electrical substation, (Existing Substation 18), owned by Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative.

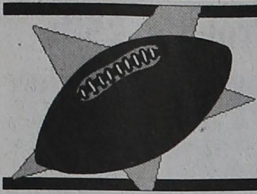
Alternate Route (Route 2) consisting of line segments A, F, and D. The alternate transmission line route, (Route 2), will start one mile west and one mile south of the intersection of State Highway (SH) 86 and FM 1055, in Castro County at an electrical interchange facility owned by Southwestern Public Service Company, (Castro County Interchange). From the Castro County interchange the transmission line will proceed north approximately one mile to the north side of the SH 86; then the line turns west and continues along the north side of the SH 86 right of way for approximately 17.2 miles, crossing over County Road (CR) 505, FM 1057, a DSEC 69kV transmission line, the Castro-Parmer county line, and continues west along the north side of SH 86 past CR 28, FM 1172, CR 23, CR 21 and CR 20 to the intersection of SH 86 and SH 214; then the line turns north and continues along the east side of SH 214 approximately 1/8 mile and terminates at an existing electrical substation, (Existing Substation 18), owned by Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative.

A new electrical substation, (Proposed Substation 22), is proposed to be located adjoining SH 86 along the route of the transmission line approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

The estimated cost of these transmission facilities is approximately \$5,820,000, of which \$3,815,000 is for transmission facilities and \$2,005,000 is for substation facilities.

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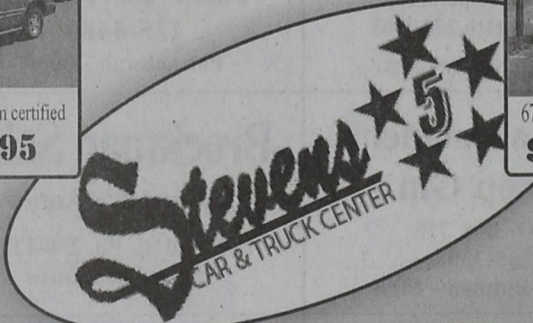

The girls' course was 2 miles and 25 yards. The Friona varsity girls placed 8th out of 11 teams in the Division I race with 175 points, right behind Levelland's 172 points.

Emmie Crutchfield placed 5th in a time of 13:54. Jordan Monroe was the second Friona finisher in 26th place. Monica Saenz was 46th, Erica Davila 47th, Heather Sandoval 54th, and Corinne Hinton 68th. There were 81 runners in the varsity girls Division I race.

Two Friona boys competed. Justin Bridges finished 41st in 20:30 and Josh Duenes was 64th in 22:08. There were 79 runners in the varsity boys Division I race.

In the junior high competition Caleb Monroe, a 7th grader, placed well in 5th place out of 56 runners with a 13:36. Ernesto Monreal also medaled placing 8th. Lupita Aguilar ran for the junior high girls and placed 97th with an 18:15.

Coach Kirton said, "I want to say a special thanks to all the volunteers that continue to make this meet a success. We could not do it without you. Thanks a million. And also thanks to all parents of our runners and your support."

FRIONA CENTENNIAL MOMENTS

(This is one of a series of weekly articles pertaining to Friona's 100th anniversary, which will be observed throughout 2006)

Bracero

It was 1942 in the middle of World War II when much of America's manpower was overseas fighting the war. Many of our country's jobs were capably being taken care of by America's women, but there was still an urgent need for a larger labor supply. Farmers, fearing the urgent need for more labor and feeling the anxiety over having to pay higher wages, were desperate for workers. At the same time, ever since the 1910 Mexican Revolution when 2 million peasants died, the Mexican workers were not being provided the resources or the jobs by their government to survive. Enter an agreement between the two countries called Bracero, the Spanish word for day laborer or the offering of an arm based on the word brazo meaning arm.

This was neither the first nor the last such program. Before the Civil War most of the work on small farms was done by family and friends of the farmer, and most of their production was just for themselves. Many Mexican workers came to work on the railroads in the 1880s and 1890s. The Chi-

nese workers also came to work on the railroads. Later, in the 1920s more workers came to the cotton fields and gins to fill the need for a greater labor force. Not only the cotton crops, but also the fruits and vegetable crops called for hands on maintenance and picking—seasonal work. From 1942 to 1964 during the twenty-two years the Bracero Program was in effect, 4.5 million Mexican National workers came to America to work. The workers came mostly to Texas, California, and Arizona (80,000 per year in El Paso alone).

The program was only offered to able males who were required by some Mexican states to work for a period of time in Mexico before being eligible to come to America. The program required a physical examination and a signed contract that stated they would return to Mexico at the end of their contract. At first, the laborers worked for the governments but later in the program, they were hired directly by the farmers themselves. States were given no less than \$9 million and not

less than \$13.5 million to accomplish administering this program to fill America's need for an emergency labor force. The money was for managing, training, recruitment, transportation, living expenses, building temporary housing and sanitary facilities, medical services, occupational insurance and even a 10% savings account to be held for the worker upon his return to Mexico. The workers were to be paid the same wages as domestic workers, but in any event no less than 30 cents per hour; this was later increased to 57 cents per hour depending upon the type of work. No more than 2% of the funds were to be spent on administration of the workers themselves.

Many things have affected migrant labor including the mechanization of picking the cotton crop, moving of population from rural to urban areas, loss of domestic labor due to wartimes, resulting in changing needs. Some of the needs were met with POWs from camps in our country; these included mostly Germans and some Italians and supplied between

41,000 and 122,000 workers from 1943 to 1945.

The original program was modified in 1943 and extended in 1946-1947 & again in 1949.

Our local labor camp may have been built during the 1946 extension period. Local counties could apply for funds to build a labor camp. An administrator was then hired to manage the program and the workers. The labor camp in Friona was just south of the railroad tracks at the end of main. The camp was built by local contractors in close proximity to the cotton gin because most of the workers did not have any means of transportation other than their employer's. The workers came by railroad to Juarez, which became a Bracero Center and were then bussed or brought by railroad to areas of need in America. Once the system was in place, area farmers could go to the camps and hire workers by the day and they also paid the wages. The facilities were dormitory type dwellings with a separate building for toilet and shower purposes. Some of the first workers to come, before facilities were constructed, were housed what is now the city barn. The area was partitioned off with burlap or canvas curtains to allow some privacy. Later, a different building was constructed to house families who worked at the vegetable shed on the north side of the railroad just east of the city barn.

On December 31, 1964 the last day of the Bracero program, 527 Mexican Nationals crossed the Sante Fe Bridge in Juarez to American making a total of 12, 127 for its final year of operation. It was not the intent of the program to drain or destroy the domestic work force of either country; but, as with any such program, there was fraud and abuse, which brought about discontent, distrust, and disagreements. Strictly forbidden was the use of migrant labor as strikebreakers—allowing

migrants to work when American workers went on strike. Unfortunately, this and many other abuses were realities. By the time the program ended, our own secretary of labor called it 'legalized slavery'. It also brought about the phenomenon of 'circulatory migration'. Migrant workers, by agreement, were to return to their countries of origin at the end of their contract. Many collected their 10% savings accounts and returned to the U.S. Thus, these legalized non-resident, or alien workers, became 'illegal aliens'. The fact that working conditions and wages had not improved in Mexico also contributed to this re-migration.

Migrant labor has come to the rescue when an emergency labor force was urgently needed to provide for wartime and peacetime economic needs. It has also helped keep food prices down in America while allowing us to feed many, many of the world's people in addition to our own land. As our rich farmland and farmers help feed the world, we acknowledge the important roles the migrant labor force has played. As we celebrate our bountiful harvests each year at Maize Days, we honor all who played a part in our success. During this month of honoring Hispanic History, if all can appreciate the roles we each have played, then perhaps, the hopefully, noble intent and

purpose of a program provided by these two governments was realized.

In a very recent PBS documentary, they investigated the effects upon the families left behind in Mexico by migrant male laborers. Many do not ever return and their families, women and children, are left to fend for themselves doing much of the same type work as their husbands, fathers, and brothers are doing in America. Loneliness is a big factor in even today's programs, which often do not allow families to come legally. Many times workers are robbed and murdered when they return to see their families in Mexico.

Note: I do not have any pictures this week because I have been unable to find any. I have been considering this story since last September. I remember what the camps looked like and had the occasion to see inside the actual buildings but it was long after they had been abandoned, although I do not remember exactly when they began here. If any of you have any information and/or photos, please share them. Many counties have well documented programs, but I have not found very much information on Friona or Parmer County. We plan to include it in the new Parmer County History Book to be published for the County Centennial in 2007. DB

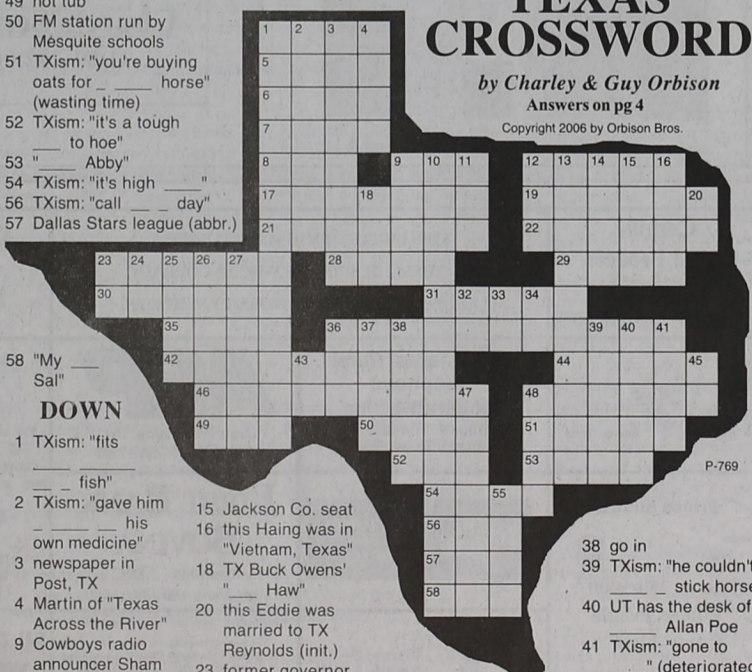

Investing in children: a return not found on the Dow Jones

A magazine recently ran a

cover story about the cost of raising children to age twenty-one, currently \$1,455,581 each—of which half goes to a prom dress. The average cost of

clothing to age eighteen is a bit over \$22,000. You can knock \$21,000 off this total if you refuse to buy basketball shoes. This figure changes for parents of babies, depending on the quality of the diapers.

Things to consider in a good retaining wall—enforced diaper are load-bearing capacity, cartoon logo, degree of industrial-strength odor retention, and how many squishy noises it makes when the child runs through the dining room with a full load while you have guest for dinner. The diapers we used for our children ranged from Ninja Turtles and Care Bears disposable diapers to super-polymer lawn-and-leaf bags. For today's baby, modern technology has brought us the super, surround-sound sumo diaper, built to withstand the breakup of the Hoover Dam.

Healthcare per child averaged just over \$20,000, which shrinks to \$5.38 if you use castor oil, and it varies with each incoming child. Anytime our firstborn sneezed, we researched medical books and took her to the doctor. By the time "Boy" arrived we read the *Farmer's Almanac* and raised leeches. (This study did not consider the diagnosis of opinion-infested grandparents.) Food was \$54,000—higher at our house because our kids skipped the pea years (when

children discover the fun connection between peas, nostrils, ears, catapults, and paternal reactions) and zoomed straight from baby food to pizza. In fact, my son's first word was not "Daddy," but he came close. He said, "Paparoni."

A much more practical and cost-efficient solution is to ease children into a diet of Spam and Cheez Whiz. It also helps them develop the delicate intricacies of gastronomically impaired college students. You cannot put a price tag on events like changing a baby's first diaper or his first bath—events extremely susceptible to video. Is nothing sacred? Other priceless events include a child's first step, waiting through a twelve-hour dance recital to see your daughter's two-minute dance performance, clapping for your son's first hit at the Little League game, or sharing the tears after his first strikeout.

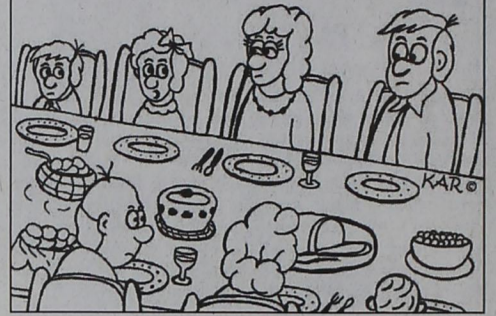

ATV safety campaign launched

The president of the 4-H Council, Don Floyd, and NASCAR racing legend Richard Petty have joined with the Neighborhood Safety Network (NSN) in launching a major campaign to educate riders young and old on the safe use of all-terrain vehicles.

From 1982 through 2004 there were nearly 6,500 deaths involving ATVs. In 2004 alone an estimated 136,000 people were treated in hospital emergency rooms for ATV related injuries, many life-altering. In 2003 an estimated 740 people died na-

tionwide in ATV incidents. About 30-percent of all deaths and injuries involve children younger than 16.

ATVs are not toys, especially adult ATVs, which can travel at 6- mph and weigh up to 800 pounds. Children should only ride youth model ATVs. There have been too many children killed while driving or riding as a passenger on adult ATVs.

The NSN says if all riders followed the golden rule of ATV safety there would be a decline in deaths and injuries. Those rules are: 1) never allow a child

to operate or ride an adult size ATV, 2) always wear a helmet or protective gear, 3) never ride tandem on a one-person ATV, 4) never ride on paved roads, and 5) never ride under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

Veazey certified in safety control

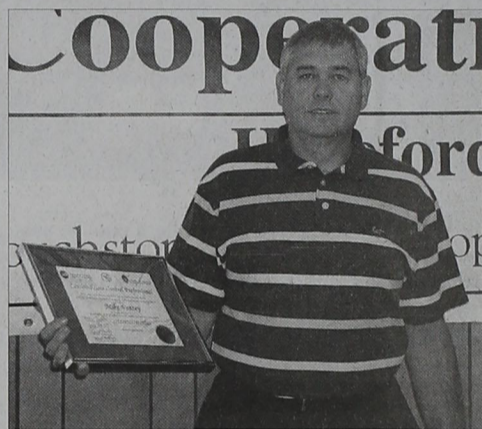
Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative staff assistant and safety coordinator Mike Veazey has completed an intensive program in electric utility safety and loss control.

The Loss Control Internship is a series of workshops offered by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association in conjunction with the National Utility Training and Safety Education Association. The program is designed to instruct participants in many areas related to electric utility industry safety.

One of the goals of a Certified Loss Control Professional is to help ensure a safe work environment for utility workers and the public in general. Avoiding workplace accidents avoids down time and can ultimately lead to lower utility rates.

Veazey is one of only a few electric utility professionals that will receive this certification. The program requires participants to complete a rigorous series of seminars and tests, a detailed course project and a 30-hour OSHA course. Loss Control participants go through four 6-day sessions designed to challenge and educate them in new, innovative safety techniques. Veazey must maintain his certificate by attending courses each year.

YOUR EYES

KEEP YOUR CONTACTS SQUEAKY CLEAN

Eye-care specialists recommend various products for cleansing contact lenses and keeping the eyes moist. These include:

Daily cleaners act as cleansing agents for debris and film when added to other products for rinsing and disinfecting, omitting the daily cleaning step, even occasionally, can cause cloudy lenses as well as allow deposits to build up and cause irritation and discomfort.

Saline solutions are used for rinsing and storage of all types of soft contact lenses. Enzymatic cleaners are used daily, weekly or monthly in order to eliminate protein deposits.

Rewetting solutions/eye drops lubricate and reduce dry eyes. You may have to add a tablet to those products not having a built-in neutralizer that prevents eyes from stinging.

Disinfecting lenses after daily cleaning is necessary to destroy harmful microorganisms that can cause irritation and infection. Eye-care specialists recommend that lenses be soaked in a disinfecting or multi-purpose solution for a minimum of four hours. Remember, normal cleansing solutions will not disinfect your lenses.

Always wash, rinse and dry your hands thoroughly before handling your lenses. Rinse your storage case daily, leave it open to dry, and replace it monthly. A dirty case can cause serious infection. Clean the container using a toothbrush and contact lens cleaner.

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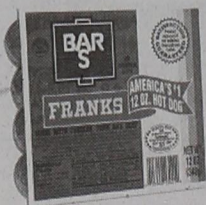

We remembered all our teachers' names and Mr. Jarboe, Mr. Cook, Coaches Duggins and Light, and we remembered our classmates who have passed from this life into the next: Madalyn Binger, Johnny Claborn, Duane Reed, Gary Shackelford, Eugene Weatherly, and Dwight Whitaker.

Although it has been over 40 years since this journey began, it is this beginning that always brings us back together again.
