First freeze here on Halloween

The first freeze frosted some Halloween pumpkins.

Official weather guy John Gurley reports the low temperature for October 31 was 28.5, delivering the first freeze to the area.

Gurley reported a total rainfall for October of 1.82 inches. The last rain day was October 19. On a windy October 27 the area experienced a top wind gust of 62 mph.

High temperatures for the month ranged from 91 to 49. On October 8 the low temperature was only 59.

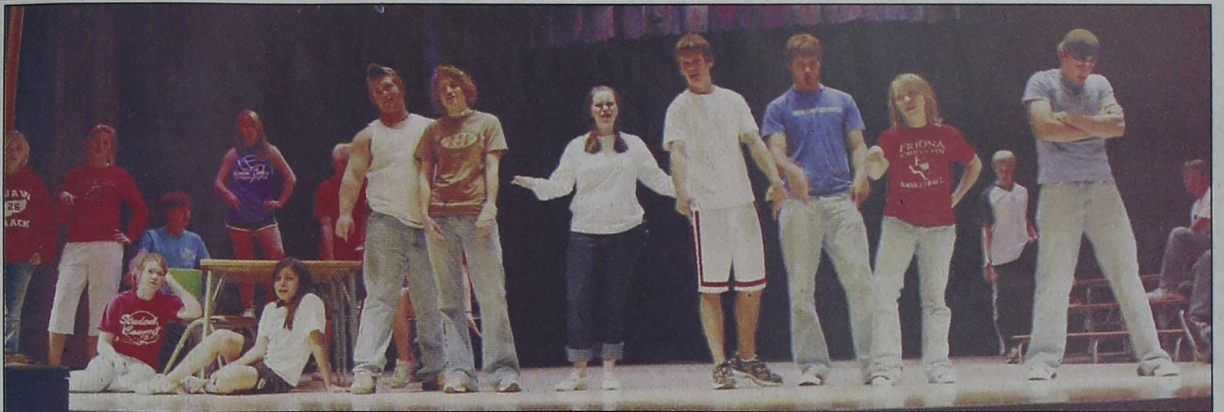

formances. Tickets are \$5 for adults and \$3 for students.

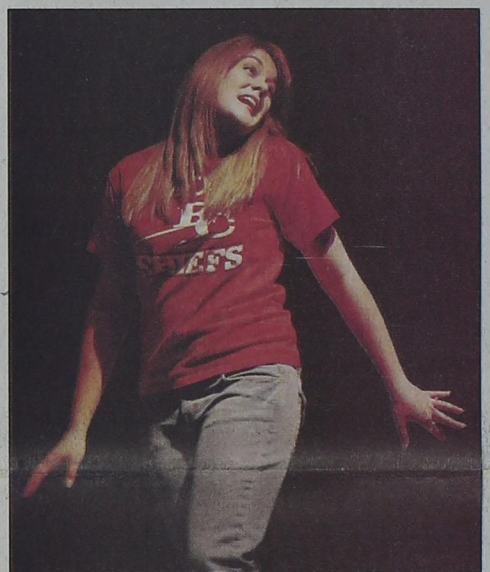

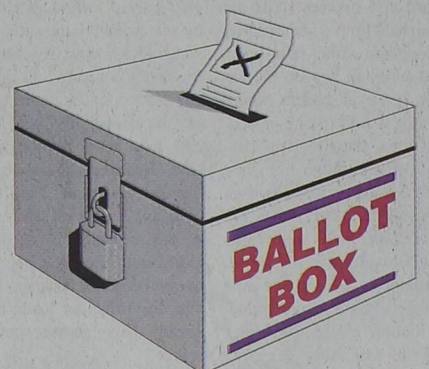

Geries said that among the many items found were an organ, a mixing board, a copy machine, washing machines, dryers and furniture.

"These items need to be taken to the local dump," said Geries. "The county will not tolerate the continued illegal dumping."

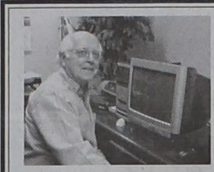
If you are caught dumping, the Sheriff's Office will prosecute to the maximum penalty of the law, a \$500 fine. The property owners will also prosecute.

Deaf Smith Electric Co-op is not running out of electricity

The rumor out in the county is that Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative is running out of electricity. The truth, your cooperative is not running out of electricity.

Webster defines a rumor as "an unconfirmed report, story, or statement in general circulation." I have always heard that a rumor starts out as a half-truth and later develops into a total false hood. You have all played the rumor game at parties where a story is told to one person, and then passed on to several others down the line until the last person tells what they heard. What starts out as a short story soon turns into a long drawn out novel. A rumor is like a peace pipe "it gets passed from mouth to mouth". Soon you can't tell the real story from the rumor.

This rumor is simply not true. Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative is not running out of electricity. Your cooperative has always strived to provide power for its members and will continue to do so. With that in mind the board of directors at Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative has decided that we will no longer take wells with 150 horsepower or greater. Temporarily we will no longer take irrigation con-

versions, and the reason for this decision has more to do with capacity than anything else. Our system is being pushed to the limit, and we have to temporarily curtail indiscriminate load growth in order to maintain system reliability.

Capacity is a problem not only on our system, but also on our suppliers transmission system. Right now Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative is in a process to project future load for the cooperative, and decide how to best meet that load. The area's transmission lines are also taxed. Until this problem is solved, and adequate capacity is secured Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative will continue declining service for irrigation loads that already have another power source.

The cooperative is in the midst of a lengthy regulatory process to build a new substation near the Castro Parmer county line. They are also making plans for a new substation somewhere north of Hereford. These projects should give adequate capacity for your growth requirements, and we expect them to be ready to serve you in late 2007 or early 2008.

It is also rumored that Deaf

Smith Electric Cooperative can't or won't supply power to new services. If you build a new house, drill a new well (less than 150 HP), or wish to build a dairy, Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative is ready to serve you. We will be glad to discuss your construction needs and time table. We are also setting up a waiting list for those of you that wish to be considered for conversions

from natural gas. When new capacity is secured just come by the cooperative and give us the information about your service, and we will put you on the list.

At Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative we are always striving to make the cooperative a better place for you the member, after all it is your cooperative, and that's no rumor.

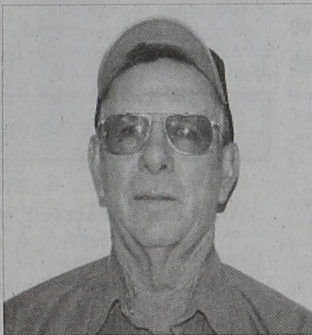

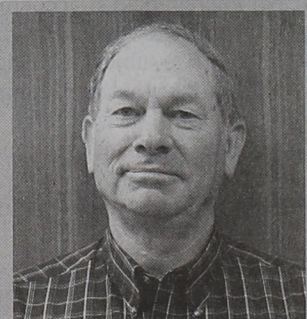

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Lazbuddie Robotics team competes in Lubbock

The Lazbuddie Robotics Team competed at the local West Texas BEST (Boosting Engineering Science and Technology) Competition held at Estacado High School in Lubbock, Texas on October 21, 2006. The team members designed a robot and competed in the BEST competition which consists of four categories:

1. A project summary notebook
2. An oral presentation that

includes a power point presentation.

An explanation of the engineering process, community outreach, School promotion, and school spirit involvement

3. A table display and interview

4. Spirit and Sportsmanship

The competition this year was titled Laundry Quandary. The mission for the robot was to be able to hang "wet laundry" onto a clothes line

and to retrieve "dry laundry" from the clothes line and put it in a laundry basket. The team named their robot SUDMASTER 3000. SUDMASTER is an acronym which stands for Super, Utility, Detergent, Machine, Apparatus, Soapy, Towel, Extraordinary, Robot.

There were 25 teams at the local competition.



Lazbuddie placed 2nd in the robot game competition. They also placed 2nd in the Most Robust Robot category and 2nd in the Founder's Award for Engineering Design category. The drivers for the Lazbuddie Team are Jason Davis, Bryce Haney, Brianna Sanchez, Brittney Schacher, Jacob Schacher and Chase Timms.

Lazbuddie placed 1st overall in the BEST competition. They also placed 1st in the Table Display category, Oral Presentation category, and the Spirit and Sportsmanship category. They placed 2nd in the Notebook category and 3rd in the Autocad and Graphics category. The Oral Presentation team included Jason Davis, Jesse Gomez, Colten Ingram, Kayle Jesko, Brianna Sanchez, Brittney Schacher, Jacob Schacher and Chase Timms. 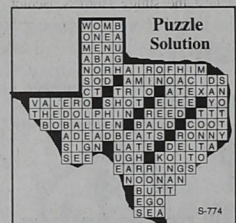

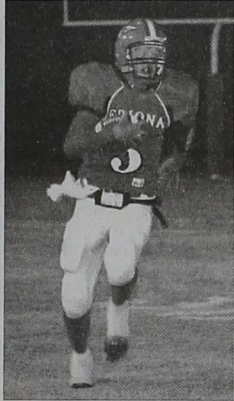

Chiefs SWAT the Tulia Hornets 21-0

The Friona Chieftains took one step closer to the final week showdown with Muleshoe by shutting out the Tulia Hornets 21-0 Friday night at Chieftain Field. The Chieftains improved their overall record to 7-1, 4-0 in district.

Through four district wins the Chieftain defense has allowed only 7 points. They prepare this week to visit the den of the Dimmitt Bobcats. Game time is 7:30 p.m. in Dimmitt.

The Tulia Hornets proved to be a tougher test for the Chieftains. The Chiefs received the opening kickoff and promptly went "3 and out" and a Hector Sanchez punt. That hadn't happened recently as the Chiefs had a habit of scoring on opening drives.

On Tulia's possession, Ritchie Casas intercepted a Hornet pass at the 50-yard-line but the Chiefs still had trouble mounting a drive against the stingy Hornets. Senior Chieftains Ruben Chico (knee) and Fernando Moreno (cut finger) sat out this game but are expected to return maybe as soon as the Dimmitt game.

After the Casas interception the Chiefs had to punt again. This time Tulia mounted a drive that saw them threatening with a 1st and goal as the 1st quarter ticked away. The Hornets were flagged for holding and penalized back to the 18. Great play on a blitz by Octavio Moreno and Bobby Silva had the Hornets facing a 4th and goal from the 21-yard-line to open the 2nd quarter.

Ritchie Casas batted away the 4th down pass at the goal line. The Chiefs took over for their third possession of the game but still could not move the chains. The teams exchanged punts, Tulia intercepted a Sawyer Reed pass at the 10-yard-line with 58-seconds left in the first half.

The Chiefs used all three of their timeouts during the final minute, taking the punt at the 40, a great leaping catch by Hector Sanchez inside the 10, a quick spike and the Chiefs had a shot at a field goal but it was no good and the score remained just like it started, 0-0 at half time.

It appeared that the first team to score might win as the Chiefs kicked off to open the 2nd half. A nice sack by Chance Lewellen left the Hornets with a 3rd and 17. Ritchie Casas intercepted his second pass of the night on the 3rd down try, Casas had a nice run back nullified by a block in the back penalty.

The Chiefs were again unable to move the ball and Sanchez launched his fourth punt of the game to Tulia's 10-yard-line. The Chief defense held again and Tulia managed to punt only out to the 32-yard-line giving Friona a short field. Eddie Ortiz, who had over 100 yards

rushing, promptly burst through the line for a 32-yard touchdown, but it was called back due to a holding penalty. Facing 2nd and 20, Reed completed a nice pass to Juan Reyes, followed by an Ortiz speed run to the 12. From there, Octavio Moreno bruised a couple of Hornet defenders as he turned it up to the 2-yard-line, then over for the TD on the next carry.

The Chiefs were first on the board with 4:59 left in the 3rd quarter and led 7-0. Tulia had to punt but another block in the back penalty gave the Chiefs the ball back at their own 20. On the first play, quarterback Sawyer Reed faked to Eddie Ortiz on a sweep to the left side. But Reed kept and was 20-yards down field before anybody in the stadium realized he still had the ball. He ran 80-yards untouched down the right side line to put Friona up 14-0 with 2:19 still in the 3rd quarter.

On the next possession the Chiefs used a pass to Casas, and a great option by Reed to Dillon Welch to set up another Octavio Moreno touchdown from 4-yards out to take a 21-0 lead with 9:41 left in the game.

The Hornets managed to keep the ball for about three minutes. Trent Hudson had a sack then a

controversial pass completion call moved the Hornets inside the 20. A sack by Toby Wilcox left the Hornets facing another 4th and 16 at about the 25-yard line. Tulia went for the score and a wide open Hornet receiver dropped the 4th down pass in the end zone, giving the Chiefs the ball with 6:13 left in the game.

Ortiz, Reed, and Moreno went to work, knocking off chunks of yardage to keep a drive alive and burn time off the clock. Ortiz ripped through for another 1st down with 1:23 left and the Chiefs at the 50-yard line. From there Friona took a couple of knees and ran out the time, notching their fourth shutout in the last five games.

The District 2-2A standings, with two weeks left, have Friona and Muleshoe tied for the district lead with 4-0 records. Tulia and River Road share third with 2-2 marks. This week Friona travels to Dimmitt, Muleshoe hosts Bushland, and Tulia and River Road face off to determine third place in district.

In District 1-2A, the playoff opponent district, Stratford, Canadian, and Panhandle are currently the top three. Stratford is 3-0, Canadian and Panhandle are both 2-1. This week Panhandle plays Canadian, and Stratford hosts WT High (0-3).

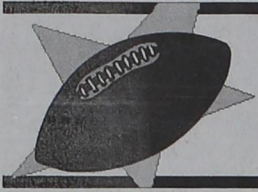

FRIONA CENTENNIAL MOMENTS

Bob Sang Bass

This picture is taken at the old Bob Chiles' Place—the house on Cemetery Road. It is a gathering on October 13, 1929 of three families after church one Sunday. In fact the windmill in the background was used for baptisms, as the early church did not have a baptistery. Mrs. Chiles was taking the picture of the James and Lessie Watson family, the James and Alta Wylly family, and the Bob Chiles family. James Wylly was killed in a wreck one week later on October 20, 1929. Duane Wylly was born after his father's death.

Bob was the fourth child of seven in the family. He was one of five boys. His name wasn't really Bob, but ever since babyhood when his grandfather had noticed a likeness to an older uncle, he had been 'Bob'. He was actually named for his father James. He was born on the same place in Floyd County Texas, as his mother had been some 26 years earlier.

He moved with his family from Floyd County where they had also farmed just 2 years earlier in 1927. This area was experiencing a 'boom' of sorts then just before the 'dirty thirties' were to begin. Many folks were moving into the area with high hopes for the new land. It was Bob's early lot in life to help with the chores and to shoulder some of the many responsibilities of an early farm family. This came in mighty handy when their dear Papa was tragically killed in a truck accident when Bob was just 8 years old. Mighty young to be losing a father, don't you know? 7 kids and a farm—Bob's mother had always said when she was asked why she never remarried that: "Only a crazy man would marry a woman with 7 kids and that she sure didn't want to marry a crazy man!"

The family was always very faithful and dedicated to serving the Lord. Attending church

regularly was always a top priority, so when it came to building a house of worship, their family was ready to help. Bob helped with the building of 3 churches in 1929 again in 1948 and finally in 1964. Each one was a little bit larger than the one before to hold more people. Isn't that wonderful, a church needing more room for more people?

But the thing young Bob loved most of all maybe besides rabbit hunting was singing. He always loved to sing. In fact, it was on such a rabbit hunt that he'd asked his best girl out once. Now that's an exciting date! I figure he got some rabbits on that hunt, but I know he got the girl because he married her in 1946. He bought some land and soon had a farm of his own and a family to enjoy it. The family enjoyed many happy times on the farm and all of them worked hard, but they also played hard.

Unfortunately, tragedy was to befall Bob's family again. His wife was killed in a tragic accident in 1969 leaving him with 5 kids and a farm. His faith and conviction remained strong however, and his mother was there to help him as he had been for

her. He was very fortunate to know and love many good people in his lifetime including his wife Lydia whom he married in 1978. After their marriage Lydia's daughter Beth was killed in an accident in 1985. The family still persevered.

Bob sang at our little church at 10th and Euclid for almost 80 years and although his voice is now stilled as far as we can hear, perhaps now he sings with the heavenly choir. People spoke of his great love of family and his influence on others. We will miss him—his voice and his dedication. So many singers (the church was full) joined together in singing many beautiful songs, a loving tribute, at his services last Tuesday. Living in a community for many years means that we have to say many tough goodbyes when we lose loved ones, friends and neighbors—good people we have known for many years. It is a hard thing, but our memories will last forever.

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

Cargill promotes GED/ESL classes

Over 100 local residents are currently attending self-improvement classes in Friona.

Cargill Meat Solutions, Region 16 Education Center, Amarillo College, and the City of Friona have all collaborated to provide the means for residents to earn their high school equivalency GED or study English as a Second Language (ESL).

According to instructor Raymond Morazan, many people do both.

The building at 13th and Virginia

served as the Redeemer Lutheran Church until the congregation was disbanded several years ago. The church gave the building and property to the City of Friona who gave it the official name of Redeemer Center. The city lets the Region 16 programs meet at the Redeemer Center at no charge. The city picks up the utilities also.

Morazan, a teacher and native of Borger, is paid by Amarillo College and Region 16. Cargill Meat Solutions provides assistance through donation of computer

equipment and school supplies and other assistance. Rick White, Cargill training manager, said that Cargill has set up similar programs at all of their plant site cities. Many of the students are Cargill employees. "We will get more involved in sponsoring the program as time goes on," White said. "It is a win/win program for the community."

Classes are free of charge to the students. The examinations for GED are given in Hereford and the test fee is picked up by Amarillo College. Morazan said the classes meet in the mornings from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and in the evenings from 5:30-8 p.m. GED classes meet Monday and Wednesday, ESL classes Tuesday and Thursday. Currently there are 33 enrolled in GED and 76 in ESL. GED students may qualify to be paid \$50 per week as long as they are in the classes.

GED applicants are pre-tested to determine their grade level then started accordingly. The GED program takes about 18 weeks, Morazan said. He picks the subjects, including reading, math, and science, and conducts lecture hours in addition to the student work on computers.

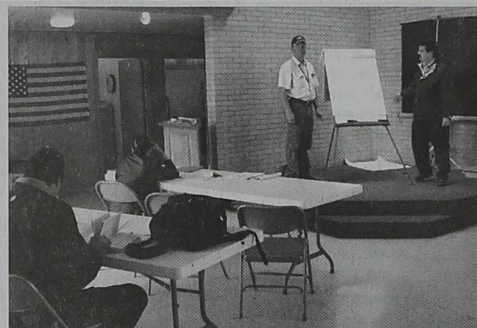
The center has nine computers with ten more on the side, White said. There is no telephone number at this time but will be soon. In the meantime Morazan said that anyone interested in the GED and ESL programs should come by the Redeemer Center during class hours and talk with him.

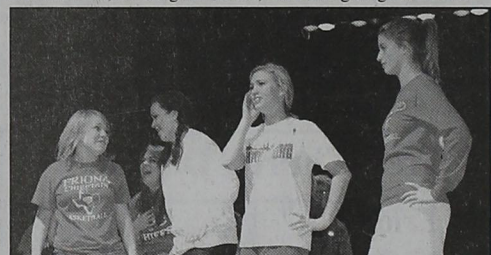
Simona Arizmendez

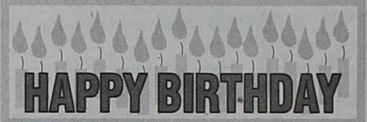

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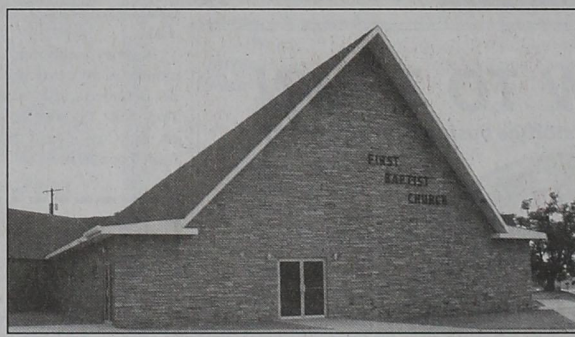
