"MY TURN"

AN INTERESTING PACKAGE crossed Bill's desk one day last week. It turned out to be a complimentary copy of the "Texas Country Reporter Cookbook" with a note from the publisher in Fredericksburg, indicating that the editor of the "Friona Star" might like to do a feature story about this book. The note said that a local lady had her recipe chosen from the thousands which had been sent to Bob Phillips of the "Texas Country Reporter" TV show. The recipe was for Texas Grape Cobbler on page 190 and the local lady was Carol Ellis.

Well, we got a big kick out of that, first of all because the book came out about a year ago and we've known for a long time that my recipe was in the book, which, by the way, is currently available in most bookstores. Second, it was amazing because I'm certainly not known for being a four-star cook. In fact, a fourth of a star might be stretching the point a bit.

I usually don't get onto the subject of cooking or recipes in this column, leaving such discussions as that to the real on-staff expert, June Floyd. But since they wanted us to talk about the cookbook, I'll tell you how this Texas Grape Cobbler recipe came into existence.

My mother was a terrible cook. She served a lot of overcooked and burned things, which I simply wouldn't touch. She had just lived through the big depression of the late twenties/early thirties when there often wasn't enough food to go around. So she'd put all that awful food back into the "ice box" (translation: refrigerator), then warm it up and put it back on the table over and over and over again.

I, being the skinny picky-eater type of kid, would spend a lot of time and energy trying to sneak around to scrape the stuff off into the garbage pail. I would invariably get caught in the act and have to listen to the "waste not, want not" lecture about how there were starving children in China who needed the food that I was throwing away. I would have been very happy to box up the stringy roast and the dehydrated peas and send them to those starving children in China, but I doubt they would have eaten them either.

Anyway, the "waste not, want not" lectures must have gotten stuck in my subconscious. Many years later, when I was straining the juice off some grapes while making grape jelly, I found that I simply could not throw out all that nice-smelling grape pulp. So, the pulp went through a sieve to get rid of the seeds and it turned out about two cups of purple mush. Well, your standard cake cobbler recipe usually calls for two cups of any type of fruit... usually peaches or cherries. I tried it with the strained grape pulp and it turned out just wonderful. It doesn't sound very good, but you really ought to give it a try.

Since Texas has been pushing the state's new grape/wine industry for the past few years, I thought people might like to know of something else they could do with the pulp besides throw it out. The only trouble is, you can only make this cobbler a few times each year while the grapes are ripe, unless you prepare enough of the pulp to put some into the freezer and make your cobbler later.

Anyway, this cookbook is full of really wonderful old recipes. There's even one for "Texas Rattlesnake Chili" from a fellow in Amarillo, which tells how to dress-out the dead snake. In addition to Amarillo and Friona, the Panhandle area is represented in the book by recipes from Hereford, Pampa, Claude and Canyon.

If the economy around here gets worse instead of better, we may have to try the recipe from a lady in Kerrville for coffee made from baked bran and commel like they did back in the depression. Remember, waste not, want not!

Registration Events Given For Students

Superintendent of Schools Hal Ratcliff this week announced a number of events dealing with the beginning of the 1992-93 school term.

Students who will be in kindergarten or first grade will have an important orientation night on Thursday, August 20 at 7 p.m. in the Elementary Cafeteria. Room assignments will be made at this time.

For those K-1 students new to the district, or who have not pre-enrolled, registration should be done at the Primary School office any time during the day from August 17-21. All immunizations and records need to be completed by this time.

Elementary students (second through fifth grades) who are new to Friona may register from August 17-21 at the Elementary School office.

All students in grades six, seven and eight who are new to the community may enroll for school from August 17 through August 21. Students who pre-enrolled last spring will only need to show up for school on August 24.

All high school students who are new to Friona need to enroll August 17-21. Any student who needs a schedule change should report August 17 or 18.

All students are encouraged to bring their Social Security numbers when they register. The first day of classes for the fall semester is August 24. All kindergarten students will be dismissed at noon the first week of school.

Lite-A-Bike Set To Kick Off Here

On Saturday, August 22 at 9 a.m. the Parmer County Memorial VFW Auxiliary #1413 will be at the American Legion Building, Sixth and Euclid, to place reflecting tape on local children's bicycles.

The program is called "Lite-A-Bike," and is meant to help keep children safe while riding their bicycles by allowing motorists to see them better.

Board Says Pupils Can Wear Shorts To School This Year

In an August 10th meeting of the Friona School Board, the student dress code for Junior High and High School students was

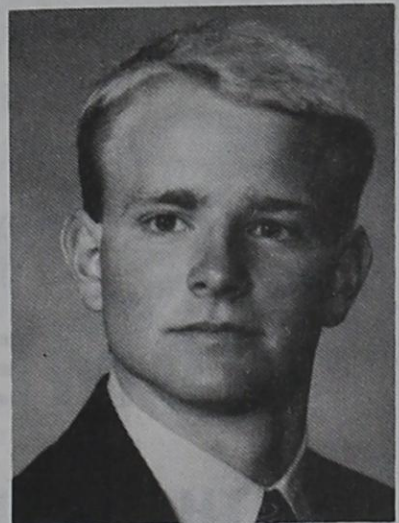
revised on a temporary basis.

From the beginning of school until October 12th, students will be allowed to wear shorts to school on a trial basis. After that time, an evaluation will be made to determine if the policy should be allowed to continue in the future.

Students' guidelines for wearing shorts to school will be as follows: Walking shorts of reasonable length and split skirts of reasonable length will be acceptable. Not permissible at school are gym shorts, cutoff sweats or pants, jama, biker shorts or spandex shorts. Any shorts worn to school must be hemmed.

In other business, the Board set the cafeteria prices for the 1992-93 school year to remain the same as last year. A Site-Based Decision Making Plan for the school year was adopted.

Kendrick Petroleum Company was awarded the gasoline bid for the school year. The Board also conducted a work session on the 1992-93 school budget.

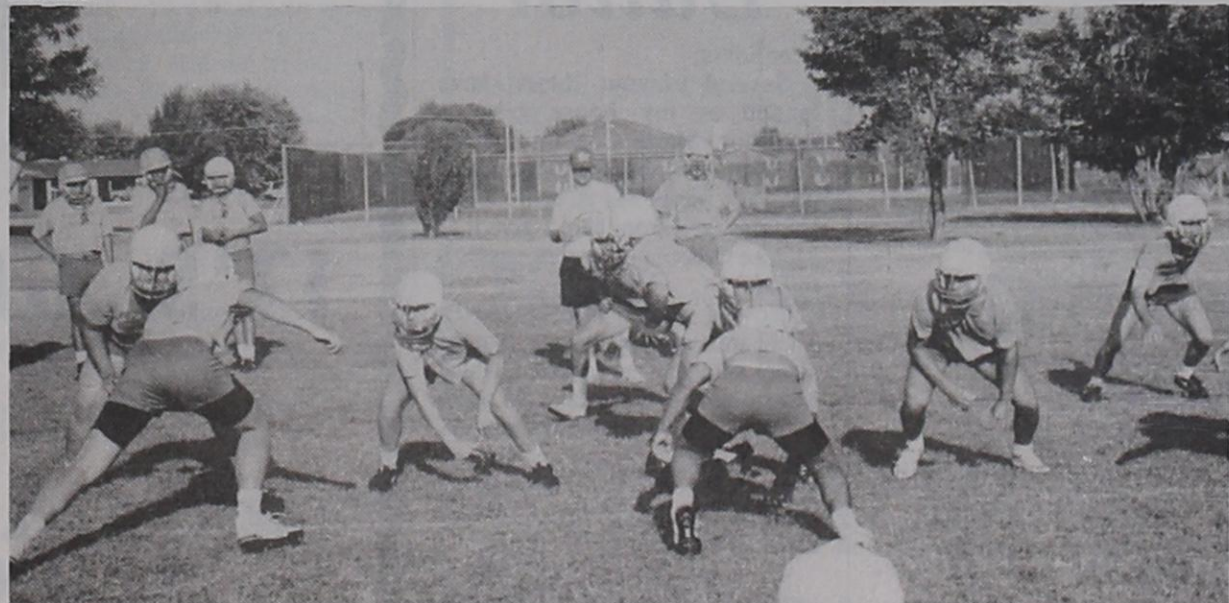


KOBY ROGERS Yearbook Distribution Is Underway

Following an afternoon of visiting, everyone began to go their separate ways.

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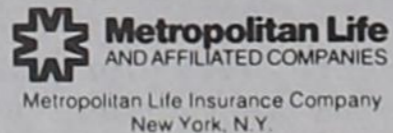
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Friona Flashbacks

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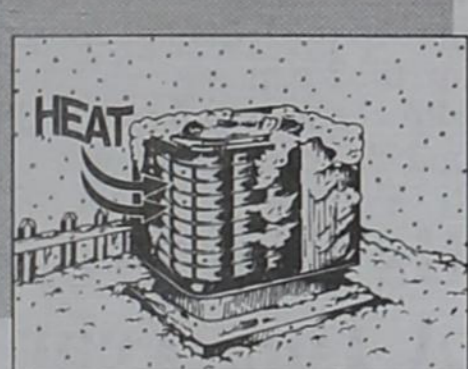

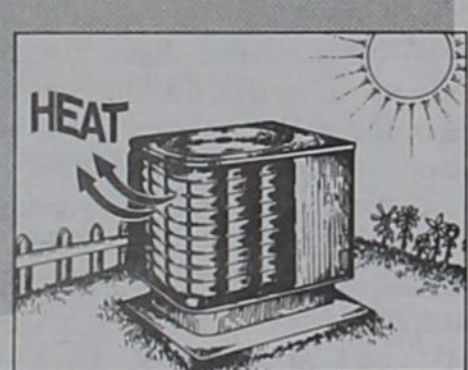
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Santa Fe RR Recognizes Employees

Santa Fe Railway will operate an "Employee Recognition Train" on a round trip between Los Angeles and Chicago, August 30-September 16, pulled by a restored Santa Fe steam locomotive, #3751, made available to the railroad through an agreement with the San Bernardino Railroad Historical Society. This locomotive was originally built in 1927 for Santa Fe and was rebuilt in 1991. As part of the overall trip, #3751 will be on display at "Railroad Days" in Topeka, Kansas, September 5-7.

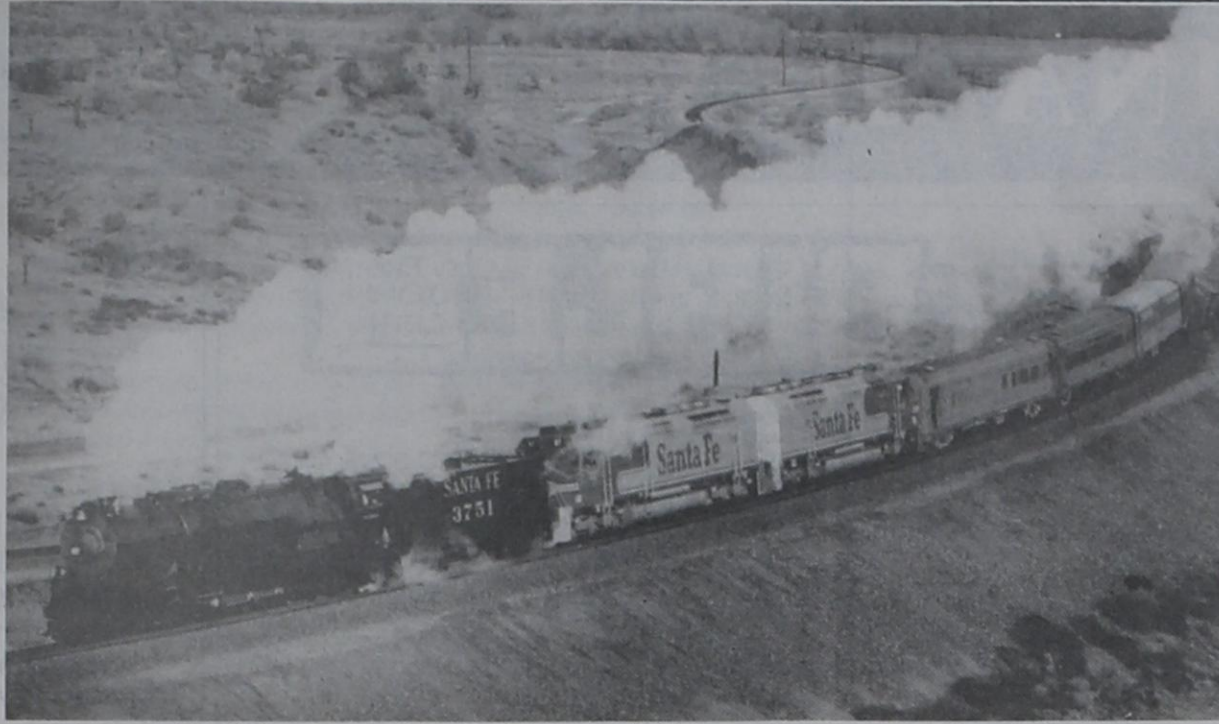
"This trip is in celebration of Santa Fe's rich heritage and in appreciation for the job our employees have done in recent years to help us attain our vision of being a leader in the transportation industry," said Rob Krebs, chairman, president and chief executive officer. "A Santa Fe steam locomotive of this type has not operated between Chicago and Los Angeles since the early 1950s."

Employees and family members in California, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, Iowa and Illinois will have an opportunity to reserve space on segments of the trip. They will ride in passenger cars owned by Santa Fe that are used for customer trips and special occasions. The train will include six sleeping cars, a lounge and dining car originally used on the Santa Fe's Super Chief passenger train, and a full-length dome car formerly used on Santa Fe's San Francisco and Texas Chief trains. A track inspection car with theater style seating and a large rear window for viewing the railroad will be on the end of the train.

Santa Fe employees have organized this trip and will be responsible for all of the logistics associated with the train's operation.

(Editor's note: The special train is scheduled to leave Clovis at 6:45 p.m. C.D.T. Tuesday, September 1. It should come through Bovina between 7 and 7:15 p.m., and through Friona between 7:15 and 7:30 p.m.)

Steps To More Confidence

Lack of confidence is common and has many side effects. This is the first of two articles that will give general steps you can take to having more confidence.

1. Recognize your strengths and weaknesses--set your goals according to your strengths. For example, if you don't like people very much, a salesman job may not be the best for you.

2. Look at where you have come from (your roots) and try to deal with past hurts and work toward forgiving others involved in those hurts. Also, forgive yourself for mistakes, sins, failures, and past embarrassments.

3. Don't indulge in guilt/shame. They limit your personal value. Doing bad things does not make you a bad person.

4. Build a realistic view of "reality." "Reality" is nothing more than a shared agreement among people to call something the same way. There are always other views. Another's views may be different from yours but that does not mean you are being rejected or put down.

5. Don't say bad things about

yourself, like "stupid, ugly, failure," etc.

6. Don't allow others to criticize you as a person. They can evaluate your actions or performance, but not you as a person.

7. Remember, that failures and disappointments can be blessings in disguise. You may be avoiding a bigger letdown later.

It takes more than reading things to build your confidence. It takes application and practice. (More next week.)

Teach Children How To Use Their Resources

by Debbie Pollard

Guiding the development of your child's personal resources builds the greatest resource they will ever have--themselves. As you build your child's confidence in his or her resourcefulness, it is also important to help youth understand that resources have limits. That means that we all have choices to make about how we use our resources.

Making choices begins by helping youth understand the differ-

ence between needs and wants. Let your children look up "needs" and "wants" in a dictionary and tell you how the words are different. Then, involve them in deciding what their needs are and their wants. Reinforce the idea that needs and wants are different whenever your child asks for something. Ask if what they asked for is a need or a want and why, and what choices the two of you have for meeting the need or want.

For example, if your son has been learning about building personal energy resources, he may need more exercise, but want to watch TV more. Guide his thinking with questions about the choices he has about playing that could also give him more exercise, such as play that involved running, swimming, or dancing.

By helping children learn the difference between needs and wants and seeing how they make choices in the use of their resources to meet their needs and wants, they begin to see and live with the limits of their resources.

Teaching them principles of resourceful living gives them a foundation for thinking about using limited resources to meet unlimited needs and wants as they become more aware of the limits of our natural resources. They become resourceful in applying the same principles to living with all resource limitations with greater understanding and less stress.

Frank Dillingham Passed Away

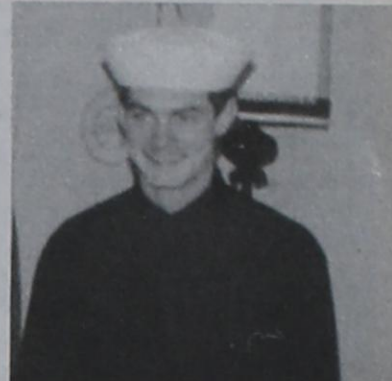
In Albany, Texas

She returned home Monday afternoon.

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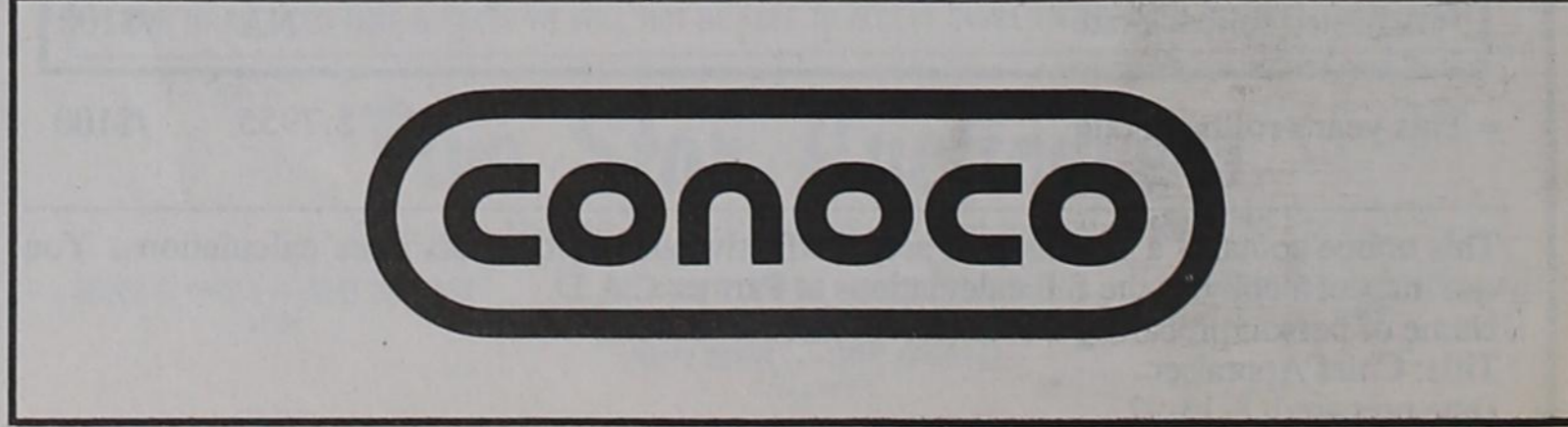
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Leigh Neelley, Charles Boatman Are United In Church Ceremony

Understand CMOs Before You Invest

There's a new kid on the block that goes by the nickname CMO, which stands for collateralized mortgage obligation. A CMO is a mortgage security that collects the income and principal from thousands of mortgage loans and distributes it to the investors.

Mortgage investing is nothing new, but until recently it was somewhat limited to large institutional investors because of the \$25,000 minimums and the sometimes confusing method of principal repayment. This can still be the case with alternative mortgage securities like Government National Mortgage Association (Ginnie Mae), Federal National Mortgage Association (Fannie Mae) and the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation (Freddie Mac). These conventional mortgage securities dribble principal back to investors as the mortgages in the package are paid off rather than paying principal in a lump sum. This can be unpredictable and confusing to investors who don't fully understand what is happening.

Most mortgages in these pools are conventional 30-year mortgages. Today, however, few people remain in the same home that long. They move, sell their home or even refinance, and the mortgage is paid off early. The average life of today's mortgage is about 12 to 13 years.

The CMO offers investors a way to eliminate much of this prepayment risk by dividing their pools of mortgages into various classes that receive principal repayment in sequential order. For example, the holders of the first class of CMO bonds receive all principal repaid and interest due until that entire class of bonds is retired. Principal then is returned to the next class and the next until finally all the CMOs are repaid. This allows investors who want a shorter maturity

(often two to three years) to select that particular class. On the other hand, those wanting to lock in long-term interest select the longest class.

Your safety of principal and interest on a CMO has two backings. The mortgages in the pool are the first collateral. That means that the land and property on which the mortgages are taken back up the loan. Additionally, CMOs are generally backed by either Ginnie Mae, Fannie Mae or Freddie Mac, which give them the unconditional guarantee of the U.S. Government (Ginnie Maes) or private companies originally chartered by Congress. CMOs with this backing are rated AAA by Standard & Poor's (Aaa by Moody's) or trade at yields that indicate this rating of safety. Private issues backed by unsecured mortgages generally carry a lesser, or no, rating and should be avoided unless you understand them and are willing to take the additional risk.

CMOs can be attractive investments for people seeking safety of principal and yields offering more than a Treasury note or bonds of similar maturity. Before you invest, however, understand what you are buying. (1) Ask your broker to explain the backing of the mortgages within the CMO package. Unless they are backed by Fannie Mae or Freddie Mac, guaranteed by Ginnie Mae, or a combination of these packaged by your broker's firm, either avoid the CMO or satisfy yourself as to the risk involved. (2) Understand the weighted average life of the class of CMO you are buying. (3) Discuss how the value of your CMO will be established if you sell it before maturity.

Finally, if you are uncomfortable with any CMO feature or do not fully understand what to expect regarding the return of principal or payment of interest, look for another investment.

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
