Voting Precincts May Register With County Clerk.

Election Judges and Assistants Will Serve as Volunteers from Seven O'clock a. m. to Nine p. m.

Tuesday, June 5, has been designated by President Wilson as registration day. On this day all males between the ages of 21 and 31 are required to present themselves at their respective voting precincts and register under penalty of imprisonment.

The detail of registration will be under the direction of the sheriffs of the various counties of the states, and the mayors of cities having population of 30,000 or more. All work of registration will be volunteer.

(Special to the Herald.) Fort Worth, Texas, May 22.-An attempt was made this morning to assassinate the Russian War Minister Kerensky. The attempt failed. The plot is considered to have been formed by

His subject was: "Launch Out Into the Deep." The speaker said the text taught four lessons which constituted the outline of his sermon: Obedience, Co-Operation, Self-Revelation, Self-Mission. Obedience on the part of Peter caused him to launch his net out into the deep in obedience to the command of the Savior. It took co-operation on the part of all to lift the net from the water. The speaker took occasion to say that one thing more than anything else needed in Plainview was co-operation.

This fish act revealed Peter to himself and that self-revelation was taught by action. The final charge of the Master to Peter was that he should become a fisherman of men. This was the lesson of self-mission.

Among the other good advise given to the class was a warning against self-opinionation. The speaker said "I have known high school graduates who had enough brass to run a bell factory, I have seen high school boys and girls with enough brass to startle an insurance agent, or to run a street

An Ordinance Establishing and Defin- arate offense. ne the Fire Limits Within the City | Section 6. That all laws and parts rewith; Providing a Penalty for hereby repealed. the Violation Therof, and Declaring an Emergency.

he City of Plainview, Texas:

Section 1. That the following fire limits are hereby established and demed in the City of Plainview, Texas: cks 29 38, 40, and 41, and the West half of Block 28 in the Original Town of Plainview, Texas, and the East half of Block 1, Slaton Addition; the East half of Block 2, Central Park Addition; the East half of Blocks 1 and 2. Depot Addition; the West half of Block 3, Depot Addition; the West asif of Block 1, Central Park Addition. and all of the R. H. Mitchell half-block in the City of Plainview, Texas.

Section 2. That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to erect, construct, build, or place, or re-locate any wooden or iron-clad building on any of the lots within the fire limits as established and defined in this ordinance, or to add to or enlarge any house, building or improvement now located within the above defined fire limits, if said building is constructed of wood, corrusated or sheet iron, or stucco, except as herinafter provided.

Section 3. That hereafter every house, building or other structure erected, built, added to, placed, replaced, or relocated on any of the lots within the fire limits of the City of Plainview, Texas, shall be constructed and made only of fire-proof material, such as brick, stone, artificial stone or concrete, provided the sleepers, joists, casings, studdings, ceilings, floors, and other inside work may be of wood, but the roof of any such buildings shall be constructed of fire-proof material; and provided further that iron-clad and stucco buildings may be constructed on lots in Block 16, Original Town; and on lots Nos. 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 32, 23, 24, 25, and 26, in Block 17; and on lots Nos. 17, 18, 19, 20, 21 22, 23, 24, 25 and 26, in Block 19; and on lots Nos. 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22 23, 24, 25, and 26, in Block 33, and the lots in the East half of Block 38, in the Original Town of Plainview; and provided further that the City Council may, at its own discretion, on application therefor, grant a permit to any person, firm, or corporation to construct a warehouse of sheet iron, not to exceed twenty feet by twenty-five feet size, on the back end of any lot n the fire limits, except on lots fronting on the public square, where ess houses have already been ed on the front end of said lots; and provided further that nothing herein shall be construed to prohibit the erection of coal bins and closets of resonable size on the back end o lots within the fire limits.

Section 4. That any building of structure of any kind placed o erected within the fire limits as herein defined, in violation of this ordinance, is hereby declared to be a nuisance, and same shall be abated and removed

Section 5. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not less than Twenty-Five nor more than One Hundred Dollars; provided, after notice is given to abate




