RUSSIA BEGINS CAMPAIGN.

The soldiers of new Russia have asumed the aggressive. For the first time since the revolution last March. Russian troops have begun an atack on an extensive scale. Along a front of eighteen and one-half miles in the region of Brzezany, Galicia, Russian troops have stormed the German positions. Berlin says the Russians suffered heavy losses and were compelled to retire before the German fire. The attack was made between the Upper Stripa and the Narayuvka River, a tion southeast of Lemberg, the Galiclan capital, where the artillery firing has been heavy recently.

The Russians also made night at tacks on both sides of Brzezany and near Zwyzynp, and Berlin reports that the Narayuvka have brought on new battles between the opposing forces.





YOUNG AND MATURE MEN

War Department Corrects Misunderstanding About Applications for Second Officers' Training Camps.

Word reached Plainview today from the Commanding General of the Southern Department at Fort Sam Houston to the effect that the War Department at Washington has stated that the report that mature men will be given reference for the second Officers' Training Camp is misunderstood in many parts of the United States. According to the letter, the preference will be given to mature men only when qualifications are equal.

The letter in part says: "There is so intention to bar out applications by men under thirty-one years old. In fact examining officers have been instruced to regard the ages between twenty-five and thirty-five as the most suitable. There is also some misunerstanding about the necessity of previous military training. The Government is looking primarily for successful and forceful men, and military experience, though desirable, is not strictly necessary."

The letter further states that the applications should be sent in to the Commanding General at Fort Sam Houston as soon as possible, owing to the fact that the time in which applications will be accepted is limited to July 15. After that date all applications received will not be recognized. The second camp at Leon Springs will open the last of August.

INFERTILE EGG MOVEMENT IS MAKING PROGRESS.

There are seventy-five communities in Texas that are producing infertile eggs and marketing them co-operatively, according to the report made by the Texas A. and M. College. These cooperative groups are called Egg Cir-

The superiority of Egg Circle eggs is so little understood by the retail grocer that it has been necessary for the Extension Service to send a representative to the larger cities to visit the grocers and explain the infertile egg movement. The results have been very gratifying. In Fort Worth three grocers were visited. They were greatly interested in this method of securing better eggs and agreed that eggs produced under the Egg Circle methods are worth more than ordinary eggs. They agreed to place Egg Circle select eggs on the market at five cents aboe the price of ordinary candled eggs, and to handle them on a five cents per dozen margin, remitting the balance to the shipper.




