**RUSSIA BEGINS CAMPAIGN.**

The soldiers of new Russia have assumed the aggressive. For the first time since the revolution last March, Russian troops have begun an attack on an extensive scale. Along a front of eighteen and one-half miles in the region of Brzezany, Galicia, Russian troops have stormed the German positions. Berlin says the Russians suffered heavy losses and were compelled to retire before the German fire. The attack was made between the Upper Stripa and the Narayuvka River, a tributary of the Gnlla Lipa, in the section southeast of Lemberg, the Gallician capital, where the artillery firing has been heavy recently.

The Russians also made night attacks on both sides of Brzezany and near Zwyzynp, and Berlin reports that assaults between the Ziota Lipa and the Narayuvka have brought on new battles between the opposing forces.

**Russian Artillery Active.**

The artillery arm of the Russian forces has been active, and from the Berlin report it is learned that an intense duel has been in progress from the region of Brzezany to as far north-

ward as the Middle Stokhod in Volhynia, a distance of about 175 miles.

Berlin declares that the Russian attacks, which it says were powerful, were brought about through the pressure of the leading entente powers, the text of the official statement saying: "The Russian Government, having been constrained to yield to the pressure of the leading entente powers, part of the army has been induced to attack."

The region of the Narayuvka and Upper Stripa Rivers has been the scene of much blitier fighting since General Brussloff ended his victorious campaign last year, and Brzezany, is one of the keys to Lemberg.

**"SPUDS" TAKE A DROP.**

CHICAGO, June 29.—The drop in potato prices which some operators have been anticipating for the past several weeks has materialized. It came with vengeance, when from last Saturday until Thursday's trading was over the market has declined fully 75 cents a bushel on good stock, and more than that on inferior grades, as the market on this class of stuff was very drab and had a wide range.



crease of 1,452,000 acres, or 4 per cent. The condition of the growing crop on June 25 was 70.3 per cent of a normal condition, as compared with 69.5 per cent on May 25, 1917, 81.1 per cent on June 25, 1916, and 80.0, the average condition for the last ten years on June 25.

A condition of 70.3 on June 25 forecasts a yield per acre of about 162.5

pounds and a total production (allowing 1 per cent from planted area for abandonment) of about 11,633,000 bales. That is, the final yield will

probably be larger or smaller than this amount according as conditions hereafter are better or worse than average conditions. Last year the pro-

duction was 11,449,930 bales, two years ago 11,191,820, three years ago 16,134,930, and four years ago 14,150,496 bales.

## GOVERNMENT BELIEVES COTTON YIELD WILL BE GREATER THIS YEAR THAN LAST.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 3.—The Crop Reporting Board of the Bureau of Crop Estimates of the United States Department of Agriculture estimates, from the reports of the correspondents and agents of the bureau, that the area of cotton in cultivation this year in the United States is about 34,600,000 acres, as compared with 36,052,000 acres, the revised estimate of acreage in cultivation a year ago, being a de-

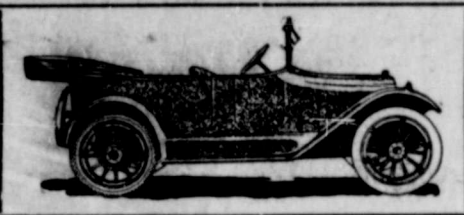

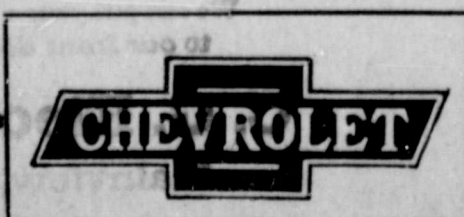

**GLORY TO FRANCE—LONG MAY SHE LIVE.**

At this hour the American people care not whether France aided our forefathers during the American Revolution because of the Frenchman's hatred for the English. The predominating thought that appears before the mind's eye of the American nation is that the France of today is fighting for the sake of humanity and civilization. She is fighting against the nation that deliberately sunk the Lusitania, drowning American women and children. She is battling autocracy—the foe of liberty. She is fighting for the safety of the peoples of this world. She is battling that the ideals which the American people cherish may not perish.

A million and a half bushels of wheat within a radius of twenty-five miles of Plainview is the estimate of authoritative persons here. It is certainly a pathetic message to send to our friend, William the Kaiser across the water, after he had hopes of making Starvation one of his allies in giving Uncle Sam a whipping.

The wheat yield is also an indication of what the Plains can produce, regardless of weather conditions. The weather man has been against the agricultural interests in this section of the country all season, but the fertile soil aided by the pure underground sea of water in Hale County, more than counterbalanced the efforts of the weather man in trying to make the crops a failure.

The dry farming land has yielded an average of twelve to fifteen bushels to the acre, and it is estimated the irrigated wheat, which is now being harvested, will run from twenty-five to forty bushels to the acre. The summer fallowed wheat has more than yielded, and indications are that more of the dry farmers will take up this method of raising wheat next year.

All in all it has been an excellent wheat season considering the conditions. The yield will pass expectations and former estimations. Hale County is proud of its agricultural record, and is thankful that the wheat yield will help the nation in its battle for Civilization. That the farmer is doing his "bit" cannot be questioned.

**YOUNG AND MATURE MEN WILL GET EQUAL CHANCE**

War Department Corrects Misunderstanding About Applications for Second Officers' Training Camps.

Word reached Plainview today from the Commanding General of the Southern Department at Fort Sam Houston to the effect that the War Department at Washington has stated that the report that mature men will be given preference for the second officers' training camp is misunderstood in many parts of the United States. According to the letter, the preference will be given to mature men only when qualifications are equal.

The letter in part says: "There is no intention to bar out applications by men under thirty-one years old. In fact examining officers have been instructed to regard the ages between twenty-five and thirty-five as the most suitable. There is also some misunderstanding about the necessity of previous military training. The Government is looking primarily for successful and forceful men, and military experience, though desirable, is not strictly necessary."

The letter further states that the applications should be sent in to the Commanding General at Fort Sam Houston as soon as possible, owing to the fact that the time in which applications will be accepted is limited to July 15. After that date all applications received will not be recognized. The second camp at Leon Springs will open the last of August.

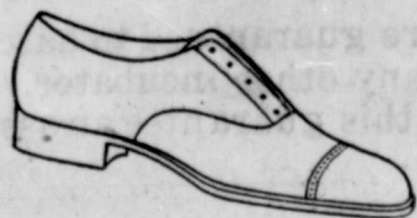

**INFERTILE EGG MOVEMENT IS MAKING PROGRESS.**

There are seventy-five communities in Texas that are producing infertile eggs and marketing them co-operatively, according to the report made by the Texas A. and M. College. These co-operative groups are called Egg Circles.

The superiority of Egg Circle eggs is so little understood by the retail grocer that it has been necessary for the Extension Service to send a representative to the larger cities to visit the grocers and explain the infertile egg movement. The results have been very gratifying. In Fort Worth three grocers were visited. They were greatly interested in this method of securing better eggs and agreed that eggs produced under the Egg Circle methods are worth more than ordinary eggs. They agreed to place Egg Circle select eggs on the market at five cents above the price of ordinary candled eggs, and to handle them on a five cents per dozen margin, remitting the balance to the shipper.
