THE FOOTBALL seasons just completed by both the Friona Chieftains and Bovina Mustangs have to be described as "forgettable" at best, since both teams suffered through winless seasons.

However, when you compare their seasons to the situation at Houston's Jeff Davis High School, suddenly they didn't seem quite so bad.

The Houston school likewise suffered through a winless season. However, in their case, it was the seventh consecutive 0-10 season, and their 73rd consecutive loss last Thursday set a new national record for losses.

During the current losing streak by the Houston school, the team has been shut out 38 times. Their largest margin of defeat was 77-0 to Houston Yates in 1988, and their closest game to a win has been a 22-18 loss to Houston Milby.

The Houston team last tasted victory when it beat Houston Austin, 7-0 on October 11, 1985. The school last won district in football in 1943.

The Houston I.S.D. has a complicated system, whereby potential players have been able to avoid Jeff Davis High School through transfers out of their district, making it harder for current coach Chuck Arnold to get warm bodies for their program.

So, when the 1993 season rolls around, we'll not only be rooting for a change in fortune for our two favorite Parmer County teams, but we'll be keeping an eye out for scores of the Panthers at Jeff Davis. Can you imagine going through the better part of a decade with just one game that you "almost" won??

THE UIL HAS passed a couple of recent rulings that has us concerned about the sanity of those members who vote on such things.

One is the measure it passed that would allow girls to compete with boys in high school football.

Although some teams may need more "bodies" in their program, we don't think opening high school football up to girls is the answer.

Most people have trouble picturing girls, generally considered to be more fragile than boys, competing on the same field with 240 and 280-pound linebackers. The picture just doesn't make sense.

From this standpoint, it appears that the UIL has jumped in with their decision, saying they "feared legal problems arising from gender discrimination." If there is a great public outcry for girls to play football, we are not aware of it. It certainly has not manifested itself in the Panhandle of Texas.

The State Board of Education is to follow up on this matter sometime this month. We hope they send this matter back to the UIL with an appropriate veto, and ask the UIL, while they're at it, to "get real."

SPEAKING OF DUMB rulings, a new rule now says that a school's band cannot compete for the right to advance to area and state in the marching contests two years in a row.

Friona's band, for example, beat out several class AAA bands and advanced to the regional competition in El Paso last month.

In 1993, it won't matter if Jim Parker comes up with 100 members that look and sound as well on the field as the Texas Tech Red Raider marching band. They won't be eligible to compete in marching. And if you'll notice, Mr. Parker has a good program, year in and year out.

Is that fair?

Then why not extend the rule to athletics? Friona would like to see the likes of Tulia and Littlefield limited to one year in advancing in the playoffs. And Dimmitt in basketball. Not a bad idea. Bovina could have Nazareth, Hart or Sudan put on the shelf, by the same token.

Why pick on the band programs? It's a wonder they didn't eliminate the UIL literary meet while they were at it.

Give us a break folks. Football isn't the only thing going.

Voters Buck Trend; Rare For County

When Friona and Parmer County voters went against the national trend on Election Day by supporting President George Bush over Bill Clinton, it marked only the third time this half-century that our voters bucked the national trend in a presidential race.

Not since 1960 had the local voters voted other than the national trend on election day. In that race, Parmer County went for Richard Nixon over John F. Kennedy, 1,674-1088. The previous election, 1956, county voters favored Democrats Adlai Stevenson-Estes Kefauver with 1,372 votes, over the Eisenhower-Nixon winning ticket, 1088 votes.

County voters had backed Eisenhower and Nixon in 1952, with 1501 votes to 663 for the Stevenson ticket, but changed their minds four years later.

Only three times in this half century have Parmer County voters voted for the Democratic candidate in the presidential race. Besides the 1956 election, it happened with Lyndon B. Johnson (1556) over Barry Goldwater (1216) in 1964, and in 1976 when county voters went for the Carter-Mondale ticket (1914) over Ford-Dole (1487).

60 YRS. AGO--NOV. 11, 1932
The national election for this year is now history. As far as Friona was concerned, we had a most beautiful day for the election, and everything went off peaceably. Mrs. (Ma) Ferguson received 184 votes and Mr. Bullington received 169 votes at Friona (in the governor's race). Judge Aldridge, for county judge, received 300 votes, to 57 for Mr. Kinsley, the Republican candidate. Mr. Rushing for clerk received 313 votes to 38 for Mr. Sympton. The statement that Mr. Roosevelt carried 75 states out of the 48 seems to have gone unchallenged here.

50 YRS. AGO--NOV. 13, 1942

40 YRS. AGO--NOV. 13, 1952

The championship game earns the Redmen another game. They will play for bi-district honors. Friday's scoreboard read 20-0 at halftime on tallies by Robbins, Robason and Jordan. Anton's first score came after Friona had racked up 34 points.

35 YRS. AGO--NOV. 14, 1957
After a late start, the Friona Chiefs last week rolled over Springlake 35-6 and continued their

spirit as district title contenders. The Chiefs return to their home field for the last district game of the season Friday. Stacked up against the Chiefs will be the Morton Indians, also undefeated in district play this year, and the two are digging in for the district title.

30 YRS. AGO--NOV. 15, 1962
The Running Water Draw Watershed project cleared a legal hurdle in Parmer County on Tuesday, when the commissioners' court tentatively agreed to act as co-sponsor of the project. The Parmer County Soil Conservation District, original sponsor, asked the commissioners to co-sponsor the project.

Figures compiled this week by City Manager Arley L. (Jake) Outland, revealed that the city has already set a new record for building permits within a calendar year, with a month and a half remaining in 1962.

25 YRS. AGO--NOV. 16, 1967
Lillard Insurance and Real Estate has announced the opening of Welch Acres Addition housing project in northeast Friona. The project is slated to build 40 FHA homes. The addition is platted, engineered, FHA approved, and is restricted as to the type of homes which can be built in the area. The Lillard project is the largest for Friona in several years. Welch Acres is an 80-acre addition in northeast Friona which was brought into the city in 1966. Nelson Welch is the developer.

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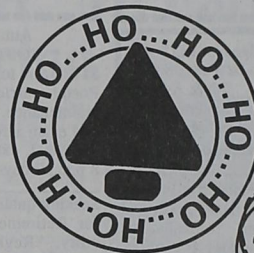
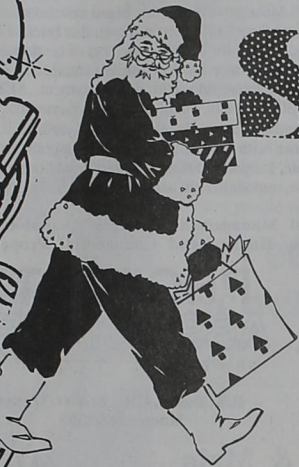

Screening Clinic Is Scheduled

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

The guidelines are: (1) Learn and perform breast self-examination; (2) Have a physical examination every year; (3) Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Age 35-40, one baseline mammogram; 40-50, a mammogram every 1-2 years; over 50, yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Friona on Wednesday, December 16, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at Parmer County Community Hospital, 1307 Cleveland. Exams are done by appointment only.

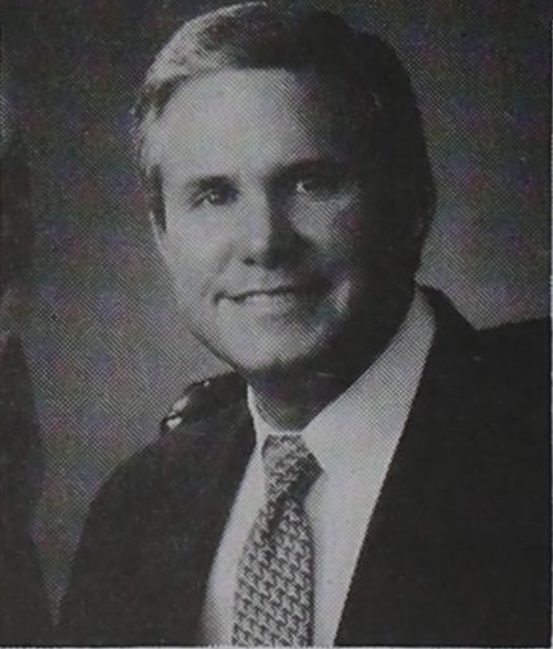
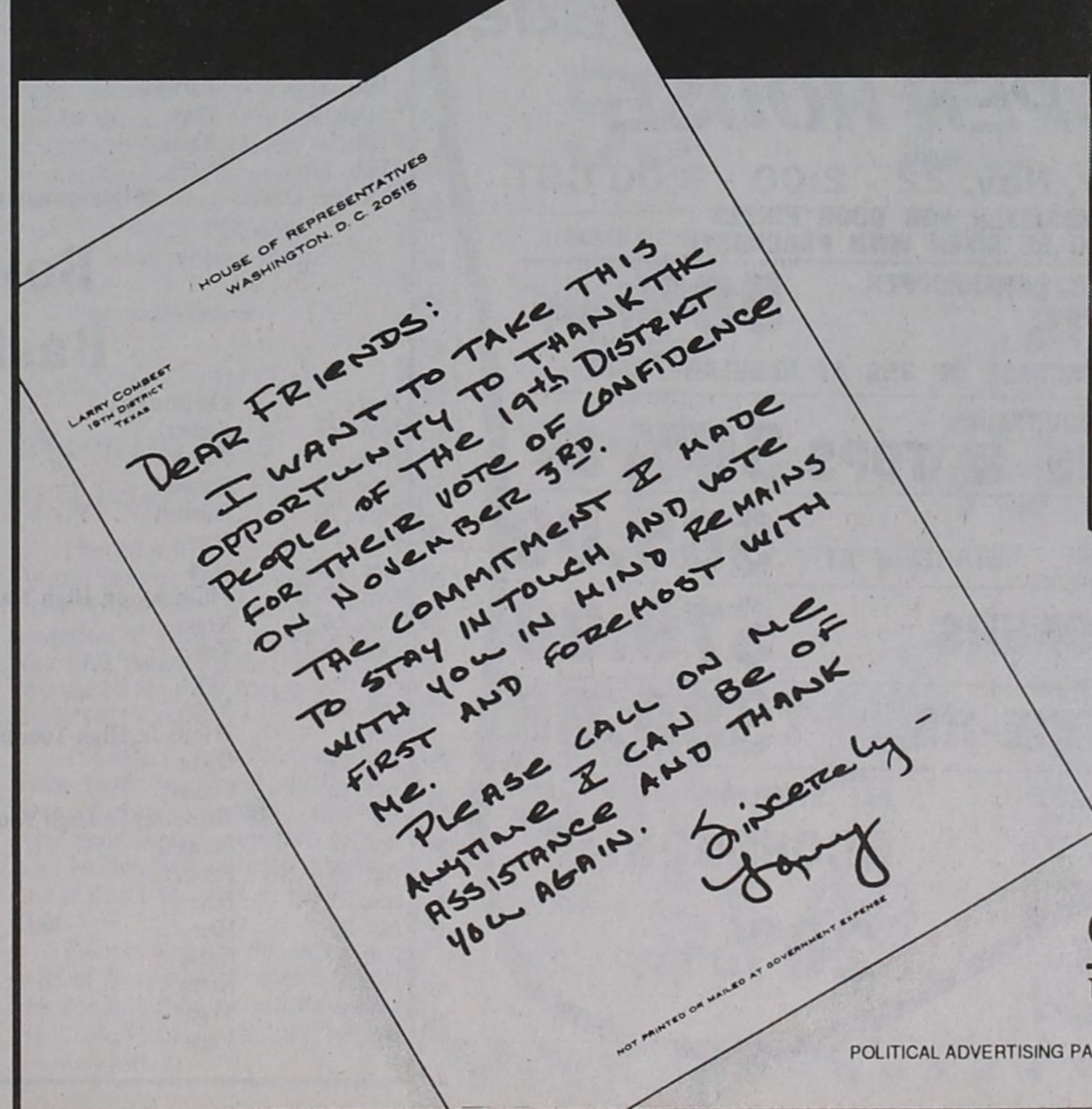

Ex-Friona Resident Writes Computer Program For Perot

From the Hugo (Okla.) Daily News
When Ross Perot announced he was back in the presidential race his supporters were ecstatic. They were high on hopes and had a contagious case of campaign-fever. They were ready to man the phones, paint banners and wave posters. What they were not ready for was an unfriendly computer program..... especially when time was limited and volunteers didn't even have time to change a typewriter ribbon, much less take a crash course in software.

What they needed was a program that was as easy to use as sitting down, pressing the power button, and following a couple of one-finger steps to get into the desired mode. In essence, the Oklahoma headquarters for Perot for President needed a program in the form of a clone of Ross Perot himself. Simple, no-nonsense and ready for business. John Atkisson, treasurer of the Oklahoma State Campaign, found what he needed in MGW Software of Fort Towson, Oklahoma.

Joe Menefee and Rodney Wren, custom software experts and owners of MGW, wrote a program that not only is easy to use, but above expectations in efficiency.

"Rodney had called and said he was interested in Perot," said Atkisson. "We got to talking. At that time I didn't know he was into computers. We were trying to find a user-friendly database and I mentioned that we were having a problem," he continued.

"They had an expensive program and found it was not user-

friendly," said Menefee of the Perot campaign team.

"Other people write software that has all the particulars, but we write software that is extremely easy to operate," added Wren.

"When we got together to tell them what we wanted, we had no idea they could actually write us a custom program. We just hoped they could help us out with what we had," said Atkisson, delighted with his discovery.

Because a stream of different volunteers use the computer system each day, Perot headquarters needed something that was uncomplicated and took a minimum of time to enter information. At times a volunteer might be working with little or no supervision. In effect, nobody would come to the rescue when they yell "HELP."

"The other program was real complicated," explained Atkisson, suddenly retracting. "No, that's not the right word. Complicated isn't it." He thought for a moment before hitting on the word he wanted to use. "Too intellectual! We have people who come in here who are not illiterate, I don't mean to imply that. They're smart people. They just are not familiar with a computer."

"We developed a computer program written to their particular specifications," Wren proudly explained of the Perot program. "It lists all of the Zip Codes in the United States. Or, they can go by cities or congressional districts if desired."

"We think it's great!" exclaimed Atkisson. "They gave us

exactly what we asked for. They did an outstanding job!"

It took over 200 hours for Menefee and Wren to write the campaign program. They consider it to be the highlight of their career in programming thus far. They also consider it their contribution as volunteers to the Ross Perot Presidential Campaign.

Two years ago the pair developed a program called Church Business Manager Plus, which they debuted at the Oklahoma State Evangelism Conference in January 1992. They sold 15 of the software programs the first year, and 20 churches in the Oklahoma area are using this program now, Menefee said.

"It was designed for small to medium churches that can't afford to spend \$800 to \$1,000 like larger churches can," he said.

A church in Oklahoma City with a membership of 5,000 had purchased a program for \$10,000 from a large, well-known software company. The operators found it difficult, time consuming and impossible to use independently and on a daily basis. They complained.

The program was custom written for a local minister to store individual member data. It wound up being an invaluable asset to the church office with storage capabilities such as information on choir members, deacons, church positions and talents a member may possess.

"It offers a mini-word processor and spreadsheet like screen that shows a yearly breakdown of each member's contributions," said Wren. "And some areas are password protected for privacy," he emphasized, "meaning only those assigned a password can enter to retrieve confidential information."

MGW has written custom programs for small individually-owned businesses as well as larger corporations such as Weyerhaeuser.

"They have to keep a record of seedlings, classification of trees and their generations," Menefee explained with a glint in his eye.

"We have several expansion ideas and new projects in the works," announced Wren. "We are at the design stage for an MSDS (Material Safety Data Sheet) for a personal computer-Employees Have a Right to Know."

And their friends in Oklahoma and Texas have a right to know that two down-home boys like Menefee and Wren have found their niche in the personal computer software world with their product and personal contact.

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Pecan Recipes

Every time my husband, Tony, and I visit my grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. C.W. Vick of Breckenridge, we come home with a bag full of goodies. Granny packs up everything from antique handkerchiefs with edges embroidered by my great-grandmother to cartons of just-laid eggs.

Last week, in addition to the eggs and hot peppers, they gave us a grocery bag full of pecans that Grandpa had gathered from the big

tree in their yard. The pecans will come in handy when I do my holiday baking.

Pecans stay fresher in the freezer, and, the best news for people with many pecans is that the nuts can be frozen in the shell and shelled when needed.

In-shell pecans will stay fresh for four months in the pantry, for nine to 18 months in the refrigerator and for two years or more in the freezer, according to information provided by the Texas

Department of Agriculture. Shelled pecans have a slightly shorter shelf life: three months in the pantry, six months in the refrigerator and two years in the freezer.

For freezing, pack pecans in a sealable freezer bag or in glass jars with tight-fitting lids. Pecans tend to absorb odors, so store away from onions, apples, oranges or other strong smelling items. Frozen pecans do not need to be thawed before they are used in a recipe.

Pecans are a good source of protein and fiber. A one-ounce serving of pecans includes 195 calories, 2.6 grams of protein, 20.2 grams of fat, 4.1 grams of carbohydrate, 21 milligrams of calcium, 82 milligrams of phosphorus, 171 milligrams of potassium and a trace of sodium.

When baking keep in mind that a pound of in-shell pecans yields about 2 1/4 cups of pecan nutmeats and about four ounces of shelled pecans equal one cup.

Try the following pecan recipes this fall.

DIANA'S PECAN PIE

- 3/4 cup sugar
- 3/4 cup corn syrup
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 3 tablespoons margarine, melted
- 3 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 cup broken pecans or enough pecan halves to cover the bottom of the pastry shell

1 9-inch pastry shell, unbaked
Line the pastry shell with the pecans. Add sugar, corn syrup, margarine and vanilla to the slightly beaten eggs. Mix well. Pour mixture into the pecan-lined pastry shell. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes or until brown. Cool and serve as is or with ice cream or whipped cream.

PECAN CHEESE CRISPS

- 1/2 cup butter
- 8 ounces grated cheddar cheese
- 1 tablespoon worcestershire sauce

1 1/4 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon red pepper (cayenne)
1/8 teaspoon hot pepper sauce
1 cup finely chopped pecans
Cream butter and cheese. Add remaining ingredients to cheese mixture and mix well. Chill the dough until firm enough to form into rolls 1-inch thick. Place rolls in the freezer until well frozen. (Note: these may be frozen for several weeks.) Defrost the frozen rolls and slice into thin rounds. Place the rounds on an ungreased cookie sheet and bake for 10 minutes at 350 degrees. Makes 4 to 5 dozen crisps.

PECAN PRALINES

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon margarine
- 2 cups chopped pecans
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Combine the sugars, buttermilk, baking soda, salt and margarine in a 2-quart glass mixing bowl. Microwave the mixture, uncovered, on high for 7 minutes, stirring twice. Stir in the pecans. Microwave the mixture again on high for 11 to 12 minutes or until the candy reaches the soft-ball stage, stirring every 4 minutes. Stir in the vanilla. Stir until the mixture begins to thicken. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto waxed paper. Cool until set.

SPICY PECANS

- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 2 cups pecan halves

Chiefs Drop Season Finale To Muleshoe

An early touchdown that was called back, plus a strange series of plays late in the game cost the Chieftains a chance to break their losing streak at Muleshoe last Friday, as the Mules claimed a 28-17 win.

The Chieftains had dominated the game most of the way, until the Mules gained momentum midway through the third quarter, and broke Friona's personal eight-game winning streak over Muleshoe. The Chiefs had also won nine of the last ten games between the two schools prior to Friday.

Juan Gamboa raced 70 yards on the first play from scrimmage, and after Blair Burney added the PAT, Friona had grabbed a 7-0 lead just 18 seconds into the first quarter.

The Mules mounted a drive to the Friona 30, but Chris Hanna intercepted a pass to end that threat.

Four plays later, Hanna raced 62 yards up the middle for what would have been a 14-0 Friona lead, but an official had called holding on the play.

Muleshoe took over and drove 50 yards in 12 plays to tie the score with 1:23 left in the opening quarter.

Hanna returned the kickoff to the 37, and Gamboa had a ten-yard gain that was called back for another holding penalty.

On fourth down, punter Brian Herring had the ball centered ten yards over his head, but alertly went back near the goal-line, and punted the ball on the run to the Muleshoe 45. Four plays later Friona recovered a fumble.

Gamboa gave the team a first down at their 45 with an 11-yard gain, and Hanna raced 23 yards around right end to the Muleshoe 37.

Friona tried a "shotgun" formation that lost 16 yards on a bad snap, and went into punt formation.

However, Burney took the snap and fired a pass to Herring, streaking up the west sidelines. Herring caught the pass for a 45-yard scoring play, and Burney's kick gave Friona a 14-7 lead with 8:41 left in the half.

The Chieftain defense held after three plays and should have had the ball back, but Friona touched the low line-drive punt by Muleshoe,

and the Mules got the ball back at their own 35.

That fired the Mules up, and they went 65 yards to tie the score, and the halftime score was 14-14.

Friona drove from their own 38 to the Muleshoe 24 late in the second quarter, but lost the ball on a close measurement.

In the third quarter, the Chiefs jumped on a Muleshoe fumble at the Mules' 40.

Burney hit Hanna for 16 yards on a naked screen, then Jay Belcher and Hanna picked up another first down. Friona had a first and goal at the Muleshoe three.

But the Chieftain running game, which had ripped off several good gains, managed to move the ball only to the two in three plays and on fourth down Burney split the uprights with a field goal. The kick gave Friona the lead back at 17-14.

At this point, the Chiefs did something that came back to haunt them, when they decided to try an onside kick.

Muleshoe took over at their 45-yard-line and three plays later Jimmy Gauna of the Mules got behind the Friona defense for a touchdown pass. The Mules had regained the lead and the momentum, 21-17 with 6:26 left in the third.

Friona could get no sustained drive going for over 12 minutes of clock time, but with 4:33 to play, a bad pitchout by Muleshoe gave the Chiefs the ball at the Mules' 30.

But the Chieftains elected to throw long four plays in a row, and Muleshoe reclaimed the ball after an aborted 31-second possession by Friona.

The Mules even took advantage of Friona's let down to score on a 55-yard pass play with 2:35 to play, putting the game out of reach at 28-17.

With time running out, Burney completed desperation passes to Kelly Jack and Herring, and on the last play of the game, hit Hanna on a 34-yard gain which almost scored. The Chieftain back was tackled at the Muleshoe two-yard line as time expired.

Friona led in total yardage, 337-322. Gamboa gained 135 yards on ten carries--Friona's only 100-yard performance of the season. Statistics

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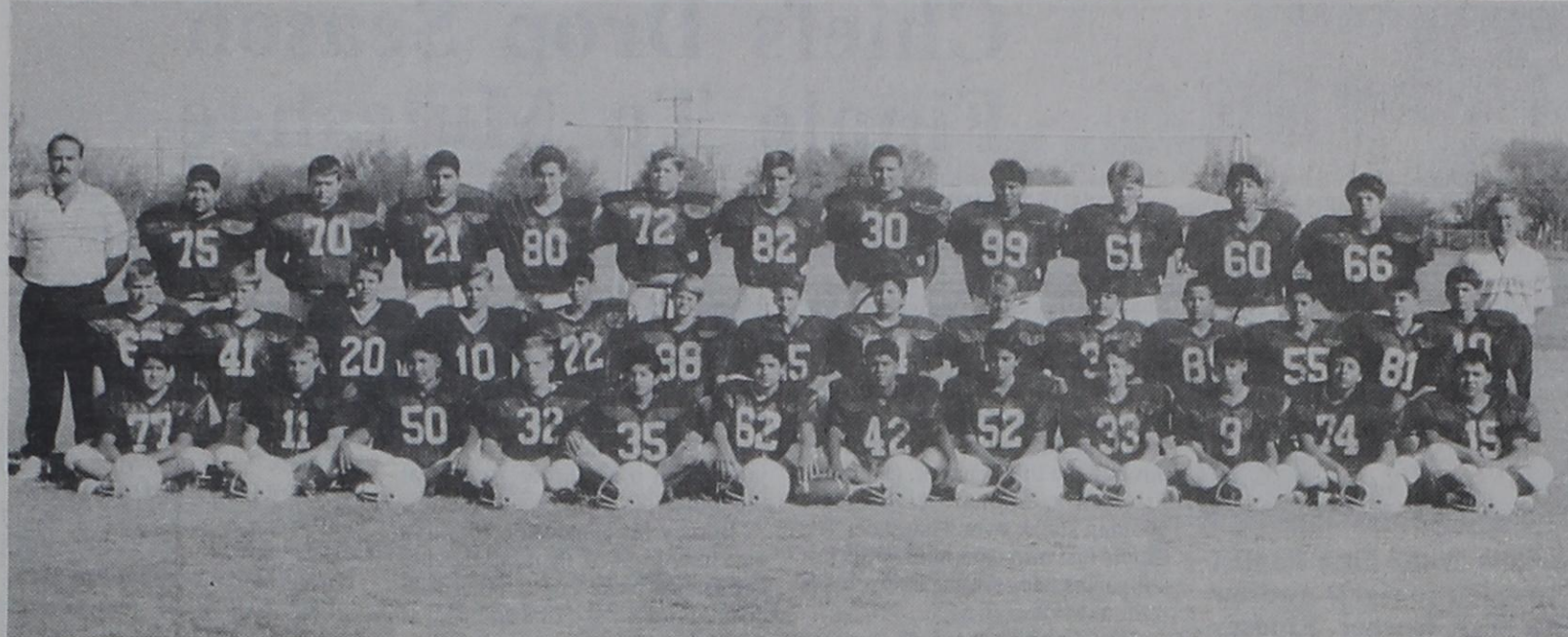

The 1990s Could Be The Decade Investors Take Charge Of Their Destinies

When the dust settles, 1991 and 1992 could be remembered as the years people living on fixed incomes realigned their investments. For the past 25 years, Certificates of Deposit (CDs) have offered a reliable source of income for investors willing to earn less income in exchange for more safety. There was even a period during the early 1980s when CDs were the best income game in town. Then, as inflation began to decline, so did CD interest rates. In 1984, six-month CDs yielded an average of 10.68 per cent. The next year, that rate fell to 8.25 per cent, and by 1991 it was about 4 per cent, less than half the previous year and one-third what it had been just ten years earlier.

The ebb of inflation was an economic plus for the rest of the nation, but for retirees whose investment income depended primarily on CDs, it was a disaster. People who made ends meet in the 1980s on \$10,000-a-year CD incomes tightened their belts when their income dropped to \$8,000. They found it impossible to accept half that much in 1991.

Most began looking for other investments that offered higher income. With more income, however, came a different kind of risk. Before, the main concern had always been to preserve principal. Few considered that if principal remained the same over time, its buying power would be eroded annually by inflation. On average, a dollar's buying power one year would be worth 96 cents or less the following year. This was often of little concern as long as interest was being paid on the full amount invested. But now, buying power

and interest declined simultaneously.

What to do? One alternative is bonds. The interest rate on a bond is stable, but the market value of the principal fluctuates. Bond investing is for longer time periods, and if the bond is sold before maturity, the market value is not guaranteed. This concept is a bit different from the conventional CD.

Another investment that is attractive to CD buyers is mutual funds that invest in U.S. government securities. Here, principal and interest fluctuate. For someone willing to commit money for a longer time period and to receive regular monthly income comparable to and generally more than CDs pay, government securities funds offer the opportunity. The important thing to understand, however, is that even though these funds have the protection of U.S. government-backed securities, the principal and interest can fluctuate.

These new concepts are a challenge to long-term CD investors who are re-evaluating and re-designing their investment philosophy. In order to maintain a reasonable income from investments, some limited risk is expected. Once understood, however, these risks are relatively insignificant when weighed against the income benefits they can offer.

The history of Certificates of Deposit has shown that with any investment there is a risk. Guarantees of principal offer no protection against inflation, and interest promised for limited periods can drop to unacceptable levels. Investors learned this in 1991 and 1992. That is why the decade of the '90s could be a time when investors take charge of their money and weigh all their investment opportunities.

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YOUR EYES



Amblyopia

If you see a young child wearing an eye patch, it may be that there has been an injury and the eye is covered to help it heal. But more likely, these days, an eye doctor has diagnosed amblyopia, or "lazy eye," and the patch is a common treatment.

Amblyopia is a fairly common functional disorder found in young children: one eye sees sharply and the other doesn't. If the condition is not treated, the brain learns to depend on vision in the better eye and ignores the "message" of the poorer one. In time, the child loses effective vision in that eye.

Professional treatment, started early enough, can successfully restore binocular vision. Eyeglasses may be required as part of the procedure. Often, the child wears a patch on the "good" eye to force the use of the one with poorer vision.

It's advised that a child's vision be tested by the age of three. Your optometrist can perform the necessary examination.

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
