Special Election Is Focusing On Bingo In Friona

A special election will be held in Friona on Saturday, January 18, to approve or disapprove holding bingo in the city limits for charitable purposes.

Polling place will be the Friona Fire Station. The election will be held from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Only residents of the city of Friona, who are eligible to vote in city elections, may vote in the election.

The election is being called in order to legalize bingo for charitable purposes, as authorized by the Bingo Enabling Act.

The local VFW organization, which plans to hold bingo to provide local residents with some local entertainment, and also to provide an opportunity for those who are driving out of town for such activities to spend their time and money locally.

The VFW and its local sidekick organization, the American Legion, has for years worked to benefit the Friona area. For years, the group has sponsored two and sometimes four or six teenagers to attend the annual Girls and Boys State Convention at Austin and Seguin.

The Legion and its sister organization, the Auxiliary, have for many years spotlighted the local Memorial Day celebration, with emphasis on decorating and maintaining the cemetery.

The 1992 Friona Junior Livestock Show will be held Saturday, January 28 at the Community Center, beginning at 9 a.m.

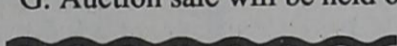
Judging of the sheep will start off the show, followed by judging of the pigs and the steers.

Ministers from all of the local churches have agreed to participate. All friends and relatives of those buried during 1991 are invited to attend.

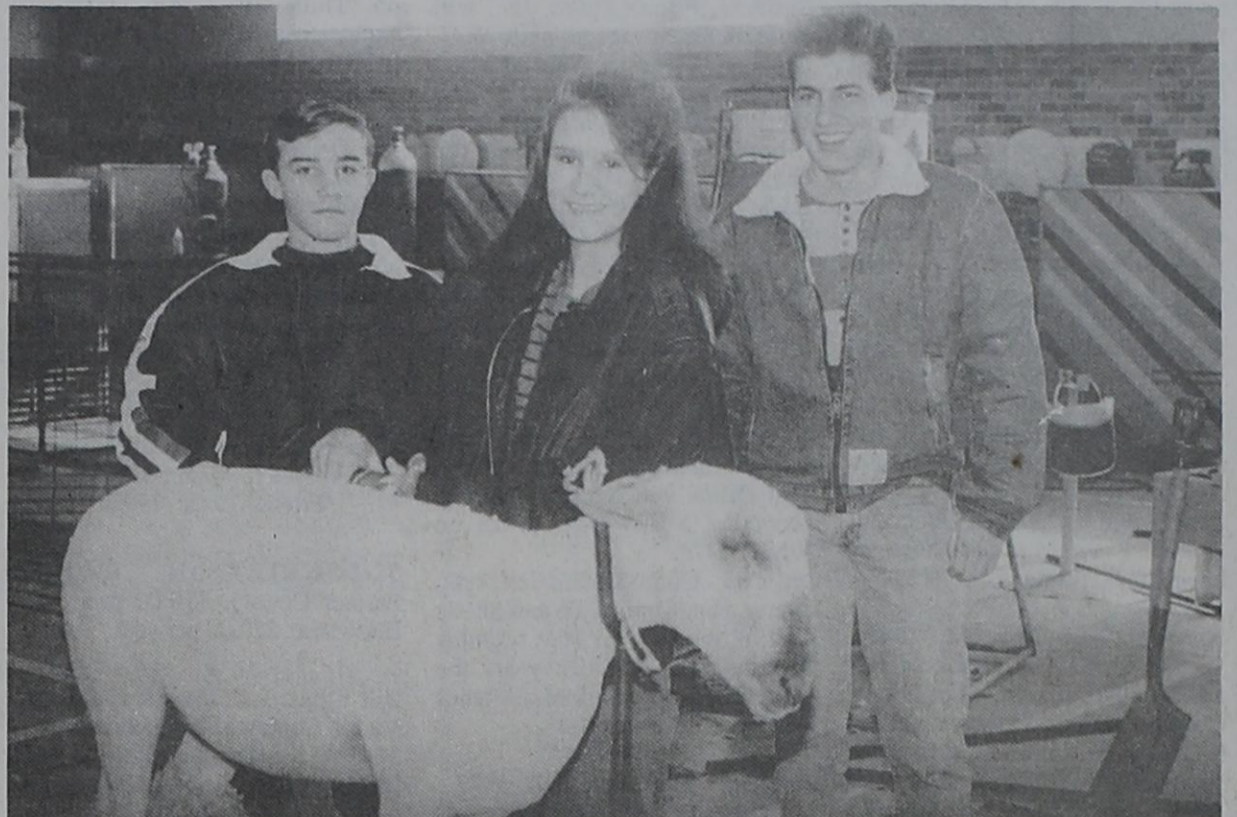


RHONDA MURPHREE's four and five-year-old class is shown making potato porcupines, during craft time at Mother's Day Out this week.

School Enrollment Tops Previous Year

During the regularly scheduled monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Friona Independent School District on January 13, 1992, Superintendent Hal Ratcliff reported that school enrollment as of December 20th stood at 1261, as compared to 1237 one year ago.

In other business, the Board adopted a policy regarding the use of the Elementary/Jr. High Cafeteria.

The Board accepted bids for a 15-station computer lab at Friona High School and awarded the contract to Jerry's Computer Warehouse of Lubbock.

Hal Ratcliff also reported that

the window project at Friona Primary School has been completed and that Jan Parker has been hired as resource room teacher at Friona High School, replacing Angela Hollowell, who has moved to Kansas.

The Board received the tax collection report as of January 1, 1992 which showed that 35% of Parmer CED taxes and 31% of Friona ISD taxes have been collected as of this time. This compares favorably with last year at this time, when 31% of taxes had been collected.

The Board received a report on school funds and conducted the annual review of the Superintendent's contract.

65 Yrs. Ago--Jan. 21, 1927

The Star office is in receipt of a copy of a petition sent in by Judge J.C. Temple, of Farwell, praying the Commissioners' Court of the county to take immediate steps toward securing a farm advisor for Parmer County. Whether this comes as a response to the plea put forth by the Star a few weeks ago, we do not know, but we do know that the Star is still sold on the idea, as was stated in that article.

60 Yrs. Ago--Jan. 22, 1932

Sanitary engineer S.A. Gunn was a visitor in Friona last Thursday, and while in town spent some time checking over the city's water system. The system received the approval of the engineer. He said it was equal to that of towns elsewhere in the state. Gunn also checked the city's sanitary toilet system, and encouraged all citizens to follow the city ordinance by having them installed.

50 Yrs. Ago--Jan. 23, 1942

Price Brookfield, son of Mr. and Mrs. F.P. Brookfield of Friona, is riding to fame on the strength of his part in the winning record of the mighty Buffalo basketball team of West Texas State. An Amarillo news story of this week states that "Brookie" is the spark plug of the team, which is standing 16-1 for the season and has been swept into the national spotlight, billed as the "world's tallest team."

Symposium To Discuss FY Manure

Ever since the 1950s and 60s, cattle feeding has been part of the region's ag economy and feedyards have been a major local market for grain grown by area farmers. Now, area feedyards produce 25% of nation's fed beef and contribute \$14 billion to the economy.

But feedyards produce something else--manure--a renewable resource that can help farmers return some of the harvested nutrients back to the soil.

To help area farmers learn more about using this renewable resource, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service (TAES) and the Texas Cattle Feeders Association (TCFA) will sponsor "Feedyard Manure -- A Farmland Fertilizer," a dinner and educational seminar at 6:30 p.m. Monday, Jan. 20 at the Hereford Community Building in Hereford.

The program begins with dinner provided by TCFA. Then, area growers will hear TAES experts address various aspects of feedyard manure, including a look at its nutrient composition, the economics of manure, composting and the effects of manure on the soil profile.

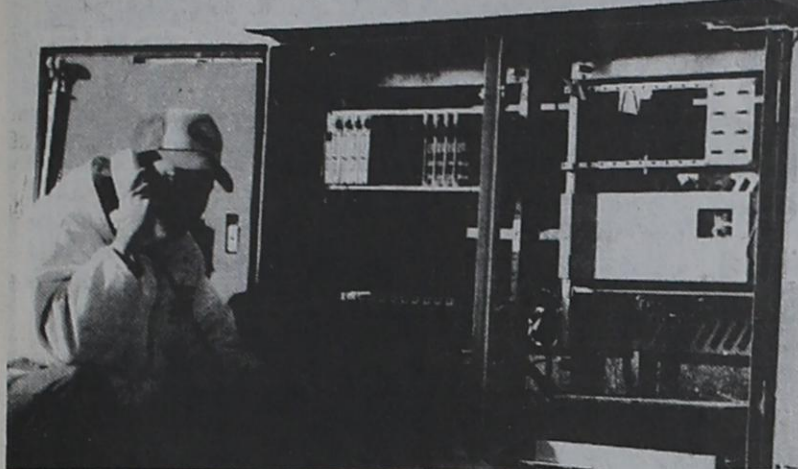

WTRT service technicians are completing the installation of a digital subscriber carrier, or concentrator box, on the Hub exchange.

It is the second to be placed in service by the cooperative. The first was installed on the Frio exchange several years ago.

Mike Harris, WTRT installation foreman, says adding the equipment is just the latest effort to ensure top-quality service to the cooperative's rural exchanges.

WTRT has been a leader in bringing the latest in communications technology to its rural customers.

While much ado was made over a recent cutover to digital switching for telephone customers in Hereford, patrons of WTRT had already been enjoying the advantages of digital switching for years.

Adding a concentrator box will bring cooperative members on the Hub exchange improved equipment, and will bring benefits of efficient operation to the whole cooperative.

The upgraded equipment at Hub will allow 96 subscribers to receive telephone service from only eight pairs of cable. Prior to installing the concentrator boxes, 96 pairs of cables were required to accommodate the same number of subscribers.

"Putting in the concentrator box at Hub means that WTRT is able to save on the expense of burying nine miles of new cable that would otherwise be necessary to serve the growing customer base. That saves a lot of equipment and man hours, and that's cost-effective. While the boxes aren't cheap, they are very efficient. They give us the ability to carry present customers, with room for expansion in the future," says Harris.

Concentrator boxes became necessary at both Frio and Hub due to growing demand for telephone service to rural residences and businesses. If growth continues in other exchanges, additional concentrator sites might be needed in the future.

Dean will discuss the status of fishing in Texas lakes, what's hot and what's not.

Hope's presentation will cover aspects of the trophy tracking program including habits of big bass and recent findings of the current project at Amistad Reservoir.

Joiner will describe advanced crank bait techniques. He will cover what lures to use, when to use them and offer tips on how to work the bait for the best results.

State Taxes Hit Record High

Despite the fact that tax increases are not popular with the American public, state legislatures handed out plenty of them recently, making fiscal year 1991 the biggest year in history for revenue raising by the states, according to a recent study by the Tax Foundation. "And with no robust recovery in sight," the study stated, "it is a trend which will cause an increasing amount of pain to state taxpayers." Thirty states have enacted tax increases designed to raise a total of \$17 billion in new revenue during fiscal year, 1992, reported the Washington, D.C.-based research organization. Gasoline and tobacco were the most

popular targets, with 23 states raising the amount paid at gas pumps, and 14 states increasing cigarette excise taxes. The bulk of the new revenue, however, will be raised from higher sales taxes in six states and higher income taxes in eight states. According to the Tax Foundation study, these tax increases are the latest in a trend of higher taxes and higher spending at the state level that began during the 1980s. State taxes grew an average of 8.6 percent throughout the last decade, outpacing inflation by three percentage points.

Chieftains Zap Steers; Fall To Whirlwinds

The F.H.S. Chieftain basketball team scored a 69-52 win over the Farwell Steers in their final tune-up game here last Friday, but dropped a 73-68 decision at Floydada on Tuesday in their District 2-3A opener for the season.

Charlie Snead sank a pair of three-point baskets and two of two from the free throw line as the Chieftains grabbed a 19-10 lead over the visiting Steers last Friday night.

But the team could score only a pair of field goals in the second quarter, and went to intermission nursing just a 26-24 lead.

But Friona saved their best quarter 'till the last. Warren Duke came in to score seven points, a pair of baskets and three of four from the line. Kyle Potts matched that, with three baskets, one from three-point range.

But the Whirlwinds answered with a 24-point quarter and held Friona to 12, as Floydada held a 37-35 halftime lead.

The Chieftains finished with a flurry, as Snead sank a pair of three-pointers and Outland added one, as Friona outscored their hosts, 20-13. But the team came up five points short.

Dear Editor:

If the death penalty is a failure as a deterrent to would-be murderers, it is nonetheless effective at deterring the condemned from murdering again. Why, then, is Johnny Frank Garrett still alive?

I do not intend to placate the "hypersensitive." Therefore, I shall endeavor to be as blunt and sincere as possible. For all the callousness of my previous paragraph, it strikes at the very heart of a moral dilemma that consumes our land today--that is, granting the wicked every benefit, at the expense of the innocent and of justice.

Whether or not capital punishment is an effective deterrent, I do not care. It is justice. That's what is important.

Sister Tadea Benz was denied justice--first by Garrett, who took her life; second, by a judicial system that, even after convicting Garrett of her murder and sentencing him to die for it, has kept him alive for a decade. Whether the sister would have called for Garrett's life is not at issue. Justice calls for his life! Justice is the issue here.

Now Sister Benz is denied justice by Ann Richards, governor of the state of Texas.

So I have to ask myself: How does someone like Ann Richards become our governor; someone who on one hand supports the killing of unborn children and on the other has just granted a stay of execution to a murderer?

I suppose "pro-life" is a matter of perspective.

I ponder such issues--they typify the absurdity that America has become--and I sincerely wonder if perhaps the time has come for vigilante justice. But for all the frustration and anger, I feel I must decline that approach just now. I am not yet ready to advocate an insurrection or to "preach" civil war. I still believe there is a chance, however slight, that our state and our nation can be saved--at the ballot box.

So when it comes time to vote, for justice's sake, go vote. And the next time we elect a governor, remember Ann Richards. Johnny Frank will.

A person is eligible to vote in
 the board election if he or she is, or
 for at least one production period
 during the three years preceding the

 a producer of, or caused to be pro-

 farms and their tenants or share-

 defined above may place his or her
 name in nomination to serve as a
 director on the TCPB. Nomination
 applications must be submitted to
 the TCPB signed by the applicant
 and ten other eligible voters. Nom-

ination forms will be available in
 all 147 county agent offices for
 counties where elections are to be
 held this year, including the specific
 counties within this voting region,
 as listed above. Nomination forms
 can also be obtained by writing the
 TCPB, 218 E. Bedford, Dimmitt,
 Texas 79027. Please state your
 county of residence if you request
 nomination forms in writing from
 the TCPB office. All nominations
 must be filed with the TCPB not
 later than 30 days before the date set
 for the elections, and the date for
 the deadline for receipt of valid
 nomination forms by TCPB is
 therefore a postmark date of March
 2, 1992. Nomination forms will
 be available after February 2, 1992.

The election in each of the four
 voting regions where elections are
 called for will be held by mail bal-
 lot. Ballots containing the nomina-
 tions of all persons who have
 validly filed petitions under Section
 41.025 of the above stated code will
 be available after March 11, 1992,
 at either elevators or other points of
 check-off collection in each of the
 appropriate voting regions, at
 county agent offices in each of the
 147 counties where elections are to
 occur, or by writing the TCPB at
 the address stated above. For a bal-
 lot to be counted, such ballot must
 be postmarked no later than April
 10, 1992. There are four voting re-
 gions conducting elections in 1992.
 A voter must reside within a county
 contained within the voting region
 that the voter is casting his or her
 vote, and a voter must meet the de-
 finition set forth above as to a quali-
 fied voter. Voters may also vote

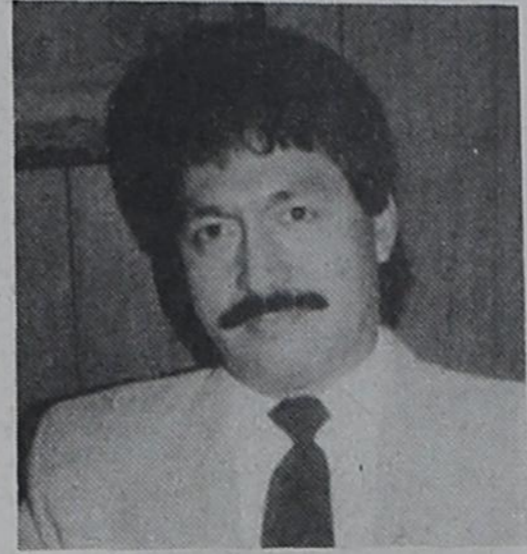

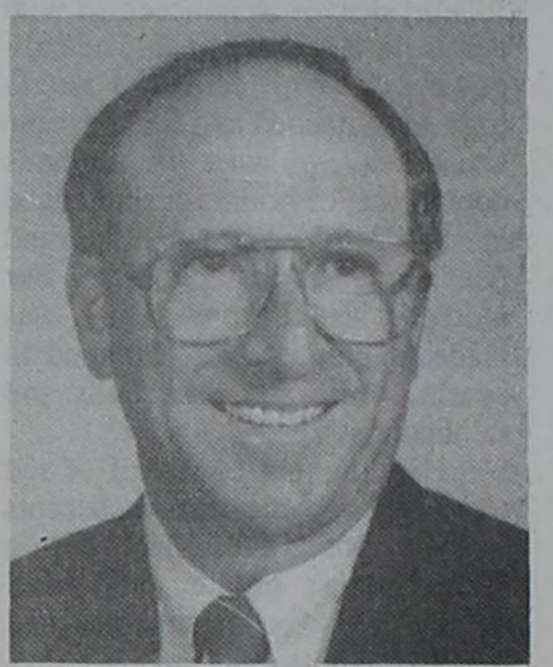

Doctor Warns About Flu

Flu season came early in much of North America, and a second surge may be on the way, according to a release by the Baylor College of Medicine.

"People who caught influenza earlier in the season could get it again, especially if a different strain hits," said Dr. W. Paul Glezen of the Influenza Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "But people who have been vaccinated are likely to be protected. The two influenza A viruses circulating are similar to those included in the current vaccine."

Flu season generally peaks in late January or early February, but an unusually early round peaked in November.

Those most at risk for potentially fatal flu complications are the elderly and people with heart disease, lung disease, asthma, chronic bronchitis, diabetes, chronic kidney disease, chronic anemia, sickle cell anemia and immune-system disorders.

"It is still not too late for people in the high-risk groups to get flu shots," Glezen said. "Such patients can be protected by taking the prescripting drug amantadine during

the 14 days it takes for the vaccine to provide full protection."

Most of the influenza this season has been type A, and the symptoms and duration of an influenza A attack can be minimized by amantadine.

Influenza usually strikes suddenly and brings fever, generalized muscle pain, weakness and a dry, hacking cough.

Adults may take aspirin or an aspirin substitute to reduce fever and pain, but people younger than 21 should use only aspirin-free products.

Aspirin has been associated with Reye's syndrome, a flu and chicken pox complication that can cause vomiting, convulsions, brain damage and even death in children, said Glezen, an epidemiologist and pediatrician.

As bad as this current season has been, it pales by comparison with the 1918 worldwide flu epidemic that afflicted 500 million people and killed 20 million. More than half a million died in the U.S.

The 1918 epidemic killed more people in less time than any other disease in modern history.

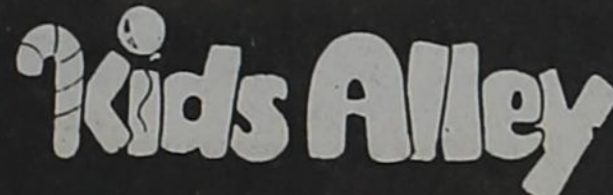

Beware of Financial Fraud
If you believe in a free lunch, you may want to talk to Myron Heyman, president of the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) in Casa Grande, Arizona. In a recent publication of the "AARP Bulletin" Heyman tells of an investment scam involving bonds secured by non-profit retirement and nursing homes. The bonds were promoted as "safe" because they became a first mortgage on the property. But the rest of the story, which was not told, is that the mortgage was on the land only, not on the buildings. According to AARP, that didn't come out until later, "after some of them went bankrupt."

Another scam involved bonds on an industrial development project backed by the county. "The county, it turned out, didn't actually back the project," says AARP. "It merely lent its tax-exempt status to an entity set up to own and run the plant." How can investors protect themselves against such deceit? The best ways are to know who you are dealing with and to investigate the investment. In addition, you should stay alert for some of the common warning signs of investment fraud.

AARP estimates that 75 percent of all investment fraud occurs over the telephone. This may involve you receiving an unsolicited call or you calling a number in response to a piece of direct mail or a newspaper ad.

Small investors lost an estimated \$1.1 billion by telephone scams in 1988 and 1989 alone.

Older Americans, who typically can afford it least, are prime targets of investment fraud. Many though not considered wealthy, come into large sums from a deceased spouse's life insurance or from the sale of a home. The temptation of a promise to change a modest nest egg into a golden egg is often too much for an unskilled money manager to resist.

If you know who you're working with and investigate your investments, you should be well protected from investment fraud. Remember, it's up to you to protect your own interests.

CONTACT LENSES AND GLASSES, TOO

Most contact lens wearers used to wear glasses. Most are glad they made the switch to contacts. Yet the truth is that contact lens wearers sometimes need glasses, too. Sunglasses are a must for eye protection and greater comfort outdoors and when driving. They reduce glare and brightness. Reading glasses may be advised for contact lens wearers. Some who wear contacts adjust well to bifocal lenses or wearing one lens for distance vision and one for close work, but others prefer supplemental reading glasses. Safety glasses should be worn by anyone who works with machinery that creates dust or throws off debris. They are also indicated for sports like racquetball, basketball and underwater swimming. Safety glasses can be ground to prescription or worn over lenses. Also needed: A pair of glasses with a current prescription to wear when eyes are tired or when contacts are lost or torn.

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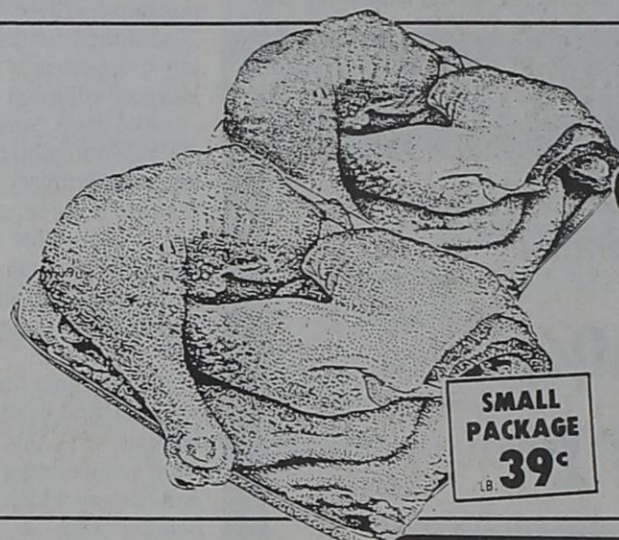
