AND YOU THOUGHT students weren't learning history and geography! The following are excerpts collected by a history teacher from student essays, which gives history a little more color than you may remember:

The inhabitants of ancient Egypt were called mummies. They lived in the Sarah Dessert and traveled by Camelot. Squaws Vs Canyon In Bi-District Playoff Friday

After an absence of five years in the playoffs, Friona High School's Squaws are back in bi-district action.

The Squaws meet District 1-AAA champion Canyon Friday (February 21) at Hereford's LaPlata Junior High Gymnasium at 7 p.m.

The Canyon girls have posted an outstanding season record of 24-8. The Squaws are 21-11.

"They are an outstanding team, with three girls over six-feet tall. They are very fundamental. They have a lot of poise, and take their time, working the ball to get their shots. They will also come at us on defense," said Friona Coach Shirlene Lilley.

While the Canyon team presents a big challenge, Coach Lilley said she and the Squaws welcomed the challenge.

"Canyon has the tradition, playoff experience, and the name. But we're trying to make a name for ourselves, and this is our chance," Lilley said.

The Squaws earned the playoffs by beating defending state champion Tulia, 46-40, in their home district opener, finishing 4-1 for the half, second behind Dimmitt.

Then, after falling to the Hornettes to begin the second round at Tulia, the Squaws battled back and downed playoff veteran Dimmitt, 43-35, in the regular-season finale, to clinch their playoff berth. Friona, Dimmitt and Tulia tied for the second half lead with 4-1 records.

The Tulia girls held the distinction of having beaten four defending state champion teams, all but Amarillo Tascosa, whom they did not play.

The Squaws are led by senior Alicia Widner in scoring, but she gets a lot of help from outside shooter Renee' Downey. Miss Downey, who made six three-point baskets against Tulia here, had five this past Tuesday night.

Also threats to score from outside are Gena Willard, Renee' Martin and Mendi Milner. Senior Kris Hamilton joins Miss Widner as an inside threat. Tena Willard and Jessica Alvarado round out the varsity's small squad.





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

ASCS Farm Program Deadlines Announced

The 1992 Farm Program signup began Monday, February 10 and runs through April 17.

Signing up to participate in the 1992 Farm Program is binding. However, your intended acreage is not binding.

There will be a 40% advance cash payment for the 1992-93 crops of wheat, feed grains and upland cotton.

The 1992 Farm Program payment limit is \$50,000. Status dates: ACP--the day you make ap-

plication; ARP--the last day of signup, April 17, 1992.

Texas is a community property state. Therefore, spouses must be on a payment limit form as combined with the producer. Also new this year, the contract to participate in the farm program will also require the spouse's signature. You may pick up a power of attorney for your spouse at the County Office.

If any required signatures are missing on March 13, 1992, the County Committee cannot approve the application.

The signup period for the 1990-91 Disaster Program began February 3 and runs through March 13.

During that time, the ASCS Office will be closed one day for a holiday and all but two or three people will be out of the office two days during the last week of signup. Therefore, in order to give the County Office time to serve your disaster application, they would like to have all applications in by March 6.

No late file applications will be accepted. Signup will end Friday, March 13, no exceptions. No signatures will be accepted after Friday, March 13. If you do not have power of attorney for your land owner, do not wait until the last minute to sign up.



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TELCOT[®] Report

A WEEKLY SUMMARY OF COTTON MARKETING NEWS

Volatile trading amid continued stagnant fundamentals in spot and futures markets last week had many in the trade wondering if the market was set for a change after months of bearishness.

Trading over TELCOT was feverish one day and sleepy the next, as volume sold over the electronic marketing system ranged from a high of 19,804 bales on February 12 to a low of 4,395 bales on February 13. On that day, producers received the lowest average price of the week, at 34.88 cents per pound. The highest average price of 36.89 cents per pound for Texas/Oklahoma growths was paid for sales on February 7. Average gross premiums over the loan redemption rate ranged from 1008 to 1062 points.

Total sales of 1991-92 cotton of TELCOT for the week ended

February 13 numbered 54,427 bales, bringing the season's total to just over 760,000 bales.

Speeches delivered at the National Cotton Council's (NCC) annual meeting in Atlanta, as well as world political developments, helped set the stage for what would be a dramatic trading week.

One speaker at the NCC gathering, William B. Dunavant, Jr., chairman and CEO of Dunavant Enterprises, told the group that at least 18 months of pressure on world cotton prices lie ahead as a result of supplies in the former Soviet Central Asian Republics.

The address came on the same day a related story was released from the International Cotton Advisory Committee (ICAC). ICAC said the breakup of the former USSR has changed the structure of world cotton markets, with some republics

now becoming key exporters. ICAC said one of these republics is Uzbekistan, which has replaced the Soviet Union as the second-largest cotton exporter in the world, behind the U.S.

While significant production and a need for hard currency make Uzbekistan a potentially large ex-

porter, the logistical factors the republic faces could be a fly in the buttermilk. One of the southernmost former Soviet republics, Uzbekistan is located about 6,000 miles southwest of Moscow. The republic must ship its cotton by rail approximately 3,000 miles west to the nearest ports located on the Black Sea. Stocks bound for Europe also must travel by rail.

Another drawback facing Uzbekistan and other former republics is continued political unrest. Last week, former Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze said possibility for a coup exists. This spawned rumors in the market of an impending coup against Boris Yeltsin, who heads the Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS). These rumors helped propel cotton futures much higher on February 12, as a coup in the former Soviet republics could result in a chaotic cotton marketing situation there.

Also released at the NCC meeting were results of the annual survey of producers' planting intentions. NCC estimated 1992 U.S. cotton plantings at 13.5 million acres, down 4.7 percent from 1991. The NCC predicted the largest decline in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas with plantings at 6.1 million acres, down 10.2 percent from last year.

USDA was the newsmaker on February 13, as it released a lower Adjusted World Price (AWP) of 40.19 cents per pound, down 157 points from the previous week. That brings the Producer Option Payment for the week to 1058 points. The new AWP came hand in hand with USDA's announce-

ment of a coarse count adjustment of seven points for the week. The coarse count represents a price adjustment for lower quality cotton.

USDA had chosen to delay, until at least April, a decision on its unpopular proposal to change the release time of the AWP, according to a department official. USDA proposed releasing the AWP at 8 p.m. Eastern time on Thursdays, making the price effective immediately. The price is now announced around 4 p.m. Eastern and is effective eight hours later. The official said the reason for the delay was an administration-imposed moratorium of 90 days on new government regulations that may hurt the U.S. economy.

Also on February 13, USDA reported sales of U.S. cotton overseas rose a net 54,200 bales. The report surpassed most trade expectations, and bodes well for the future of U.S. exports, as overseas business for U.S. cotton is on track to meet USDA's 6.8 million bale export projection. Export demand also remains promising for cheaper styles of Texas and Oklahoma cotton.



The election will be held at the cooperative's annual meeting on March 26.


Governor To Speak In Muleshoe

As adults we know that death is a natural part of life and that no one is immune to this experience. However, the death of a child seems unnatural, unfair, and an indignity to the goodness of creation.

"Dealing with the death of a child, whose life was just beginning, is perhaps the darkest, most difficult situation a parent will ever confront," said Elizabeth Valentine, associate chaplain at Methodist Hospital and facilitator of the hospital's Bereaved Parents Support Group.

According to Valentine, the death of a child is a particular grief and while others can be sympa-

thetic, no one, other than another grieving parent, can fully understand the feelings and thoughts a bereaved parent faces each day.

Research indicates that moving through the phases of grief is how we are able to more fully accept the death of a child and give form, meaning and purpose to life again. Unresolved grief is known to be detrimental to our relationships as well as to our emotional, physical, and spiritual health, Valentine said.

The Bereaved Parents Support Group meets at 7 p.m. on the second Tuesday of each month at Methodist Hospital. For more information, call the Chaplaincy Department at (806) 793-4027.

Squaws Score Win Over Rival Bobbies

Friona High School's Squaws scored an important victory over the Dimmitt Bobbies, 43-35, here last Friday.

The win propelled the team into the bi-district round of the UIL playoffs for the first time in five years. By winning, the Squaws avoided a one-game playoff with the Tulia girls for the second-seed playoff spot in district. The defending state champion Hornettes missed out on the playoffs, after finishing third in the first half, and tied with Friona and Dimmitt for the second half lead.

After a tight opening 1:31 of play, Alicia Widner sank a lay-up, was fouled, and connected on her bonus shot, for a 3-0 Friona lead.

The next trip downcourt, Renee' Downey zeroed in on a three-point basket, and the Squaws had a quick 6-0 lead with 6:07 left in the opening quarter.

Wendy Ethridge got the Bobbies on the scoreboard at the 5:17 mark, but Mendi Milner responded with a

three-point basket with 5:00 remaining in the quarter, for a 9-2 Friona lead.

Miss Ethridge sparked a Dimmitt comeback for a 9-6 deficit, but Kris Hamilton's jump shot made it 11-6, and Miss Milner nailed her second three-pointer of the quarter for a 14-6 Friona edge.

Just to top things off, Gena Willard made it five three-point plays in the quarter for a 17-6 Friona lead. Miss Downey's jump shot bounced off the rim at the buzzer.

Miss Widner started the second quarter with a jump shot, and the Squaws had their longest lead at 19-6 with 16 seconds gone in the period.

Friona then hit a scoreless spell for over four minutes of clock time, but Miss Widner hit both ends of a one and one free throw opportunity for a 21-10 Friona lead.

The Squaws broke the Dimmitt press and found Miss Hamilton open for an easy layup and a 23-12

lead with 2:23 left in the half.

Miss Milner stole the ball and drove for a layup and was fouled. She made both of her free throws for a 26-14 lead.

However, the Bobbies got a pair of free throws from Bossett, and a jump shot by Ethridge to trim Friona's lead to 26-18. A charging foul called on the Bobbies just prior to halftime nullified another goal that would have cut Friona's lead to 26-20 at the half.

Dimmitt did make it a 26-20 game to begin the third quarter, but Miss Milner sank a jump shot with 5:30 left in the quarter--Friona's first score of the second half--for a 28-22 lead.

Miss Widner then made a layup, and came back to be fouled on a fast break, making both free throws for a 32-22 lead.

The Squaws then went into a six-minute scoreless spell that proved near-fatal. The team was scoreless for the last 4:18 of the third quarter, and that allowed Dimmitt to cut their lead. Dimmitt's Terri Matthews saw the clock winding down and sank a jump shot to cut the Friona lead to 32-28 at the end of the quarter.

Miss Ethridge sank a free throw to open the final quarter, for a 32-29 score. Miss Downey broke Friona's scoreless streak with a three-pointer at the 6:03 mark, for a 35-29 Friona lead.

Miss Ethridge scored again, and Miss Schumacher sank a pair of free throws, to bring the Bobbies back to within two points, 35-33, the closest the score had been since the opening buzzer, with 5:30 left to play.

Friona answered the challenge. Gena Willard made a layup shot for a 37-33 lead, and Miss Downey hit her second three-pointer of the quarter for a 40-33 Friona edge with 5:00 left to play.

The Squaws then began a delay game, working the ball around for good shots, and Dimmitt was obliged to commit fouls.

Renee' Martin made three out of four from the line, two with 1:30 to play, and the last one with just 20 seconds left, as Friona clinched things with a 43-33 lead. Miss Ethridge's shot at the buzzer trimmed the Squaws' final margin.

The Squaws played some stellar defense in the final quarter, controlling the backboard, and preventing the Bobbies from shooting. This was evident in the fact that Dimmitt scored only seven points, with two of them coming on the final-second shot.

Although the Bobbies made 25 field goals to Friona's 13, the fact that six of Friona's were from three-point range, and also the Squaws making 11 of 16 from the line (11 of 14 until the last two missed shots), made the difference in the game.

Miss Widner led the way with 11 points, and Miss Milner added 10. Miss Downey had nine points on three shots.


There will be an open meeting held March 4 at 8:30 p.m. to elect new officers and for nominations for new board members.


JV Squaws Top Dimmitt



Transaction Costs Are Part Of Investing
Everyone enjoys a bargain, and investors are no exception. After all, why pay when you can get something for free? Unfortunately, there's no free lunch. The fact is that transaction costs are a real part of investing.

One cost is the commission charged to buy or sell a listed stock. While this fee may vary among brokers, it is generally based on whether your broker is a full-service investment representative or a discount broker. If you just want to have your security order executed and do not need additional service,

assistance or recommendations, a discount broker may be your answer. On the other hand, if you prefer personal attention and ongoing service, then expect to pay a larger fee to compensate your broker and the full-service firm he or she represents. The key is service.

The cost of buying bonds or over-the-counter securities is more confusing. Your broker usually buys these securities from a dealer who inventories them. Much like a supermarket buys products at wholesale and resells them to customers at retail, securities dealers buy at a wholesale price, called the "bid," and resell at retail, or "offering" price. The difference between these two prices is called a "markup" and represents the dealer profit for the risk and cost of maintaining a market of inventory in that security. In addition, the broker who handles your transaction will generally add a commission for his or her services. In many cases, the broker and the dealer are the same and can offer securities at retail without adding the additional commission.

When it comes to mutual funds, don't mistake "no-load" for "no cost." All mutual funds charge for their services. The "load" on a mutual fund is the commission paid to the investment representative and his or her firm to explain the fund, sell the appropriate fund to meet your objectives and service you as long as you own the fund.

This charge, which is specifically stated in the prospectus, can range from a maximum 8.5 per cent of your deposit to 1 per cent or less, depending on the amount invested.

All these costs and fees should be investigated and understood before you invest.

School Board Meets Here

The Board of Trustees of the Friona ISD met in regular session on February 10, 1992. Highlights of the meeting included:

1. The Board voted unanimously to adopt a Resolution & Ordinance to tax automobiles pursuant to Section 11.25(c) of the Texas Property Tax Code.
2. The Board passed a Resolution calling a school trustee election to be held jointly with the City of Friona on May 2, 1992 to elect two school trustees for three year terms.
3. The Board received the tax collection report for the month of January 1992. Taxes for the Friona ISD are 81% collected and for the Parmer CED are 80% collected.
4. The Board received enrollment and Average Daily Attendance reports from the Superintendent. Enrollment is 1264 currently, up 32 students from the same period in 1991.
5. The Board conducted annual reviews of contracts for administrative and guidance personnel.

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
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
