HERE'S A RIDDLE for you: A hundred percent of us have had one, fifty percent of us are one, and once you've been one you're never not one for the rest of your life. Answer: A MOTHER.

On Sunday we celebrate the joys of motherhood, as we have since 1914 when President Woodrow Wilson declared the second Sunday of May as "Mother's Day."

You can always spot a new mother by the dark circles under her eyes from lack of sleep and the permanent spit-up stains on her left shoulder. Once she's a mother, no matter how old she gets, she'll always wonder what the kids are up to, are they okay, and are they happy. And they'll always be "the kids" even when she's a hundred and they're in their seventies.

She'll be a nutritionist, cook, chauffeur, referee, arbitrator, laundress, scrub woman, doctor, teacher, counselor, critic, psychologist, judge and jury. For the next twenty or so years she will spend about 30,000 hours cooking and feeding people, and another 51,000 hours cleaning up something or somebody.

If there is anything wrong with today's younger generation, it is probably because they weren't raised on "Mom's Maxims" like my generation was. A maxim is a small proverb that offers a lesson, a moral, a scolding, or an example to follow. Moms of my day had a maxim for every situation imaginable.

"Don't cut off your nose to spite your face." "What goes around comes around." "Pride goeth before a fall." "Pretty is as pretty does." "You can't judge a book by its cover."

"A penny saved is a penny earned." I sometimes think if it hadn't been for Ben Franklin's homilies from "Poor Richard's Almanac" mothers of pre-1950 vintage would have been at a loss for words.

"Waste not, want not." "Don't count your chickens before they hatch." "Children should be seen but not heard." "Don't bite off more than you can chew." "A stitch in time saves nine." "Don't put all your eggs in one basket."

"Never air your dirty linen in public." Nancy Reagan should have taught that one to her daughter Patty.

Advice to the lovelorn: "He's/she's not the only pebble on the beach" or "There's plenty of other fish in the sea" or "Time heals all wounds."

About running with the wrong crowd: "You are judged by the company you keep" or "Birds of a feather flock together."

City Announces Plans To Enforce Weed Rule

The City of Friona will begin to enforce its weed and rubbish ordinance, it was announced this week by acting city manager Paula Wilson.

Those in violation of this ordinance will be liable to fines of up to \$200 per day, it was pointed out.

Mrs. Wilson said that owners of property deemed to be in violation will first be cited with a "nice letter," pointing out the problem, and asking the property owners to take care of the situation.

Within a reasonable time, if nothing is done, these property owners will then receive a "not so nice" letter, and if they continue to ignore the warnings, they will be fined. The maximum fine can amount to \$200 per day that the owners are in violation.

Mrs. Wilson cited Article 3, Section 13-30 of the City Code, section C:

"Growth or accumulation of weeds and rubbish. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any lot or premises in the City to permit or allow weeds, tall grass, rubbish, junk, brush, or any other unsightly, objectionable, or unsanitary matter

of whatever nature to accumulate or remain on such lot or premises. Weeds or grass growing to the height of twelve (12) inches or more will be deemed unsightly, objectionable and unsanitary.

FHS Artist Is Honored

Mindy Johnson, a Friona High School senior, has been named a 1992 Scholastic Art Award-Winner by Scholastic, Inc., of New York.

Miss Johnson's work was an ink drawing, according to her instructor, Bobby Wied.

This year, Scholastic received more than 15,000 works in New York for the national jurving from schools across the United States and U.S. schools abroad. Over 225,000 works were juried from the regional competition.

Miss Johnson received a Hallmark Honor Prize, a \$100 award given in each of the organization's 70 sponsored regions for "Best of Show."

The Scholastic Art Awards exhibition of 1992 will be held at the University Art Gallery at the University of Pittsburgh, Pa.

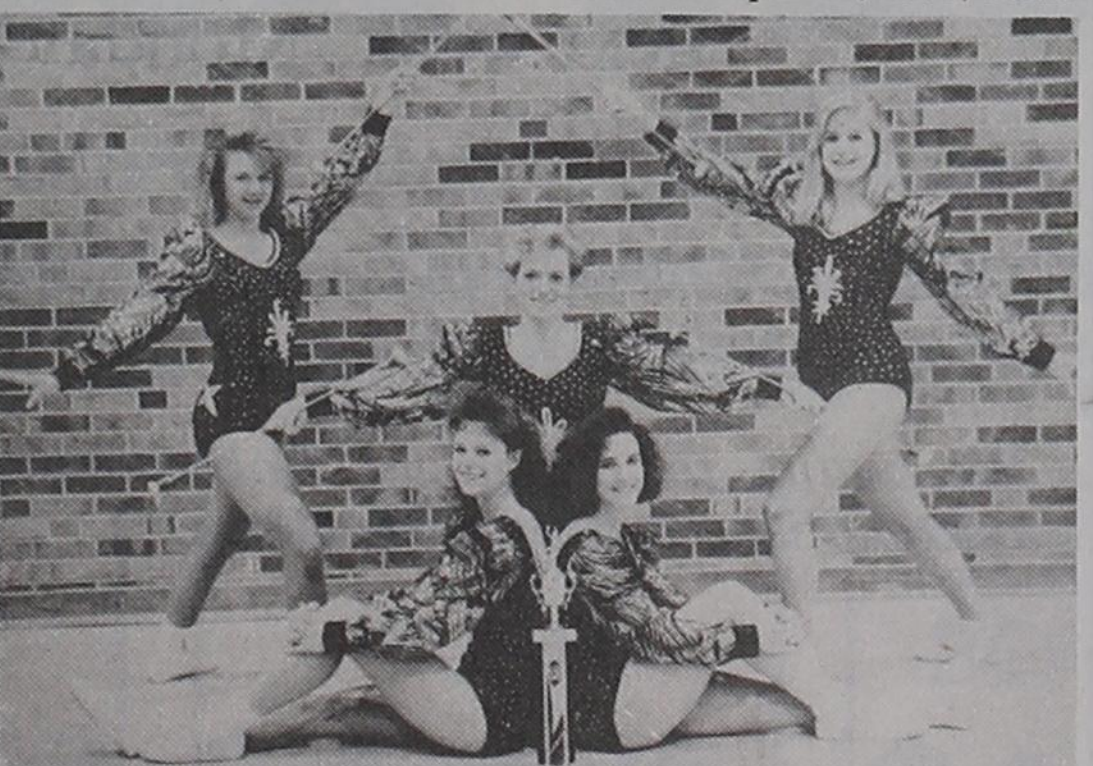
This service fulfills the true meaning of the poppy--an emblem of faith. That faith honors the deceased veterans through service to the living veterans.

Election Results

Incumbent June Rhodes was edged in the City Council election by three votes last Saturday. Elected were Tom Randolph with 158 votes and Jim Atwell with 156. Mrs. Rhodes, who has served three terms, received 153 votes. Joe Mejia with 57 votes rounded out the voting.

In the school board race, Danny Black was re-elected with 209 votes and Mike Martin gained a spot, getting 163 votes. Terry Wilcox received 103 votes, Ricky White 89 and Jason Grimsley 125.

For the Parmer County Hospital District's board, the five temporary members were elected. Results were: Danny Kendrick 424; Wendell Gresham 416; Anne Corn 507; Dennis Anthony 432; Dale Schueler 539 and John Blackwell 376.

Reactions Favor Packers

Reactions to last Thursday's broadcast on the ABC network's "Prime Time Live," in which the meat-packing industry was taken to task for what the program implied were unsafe and unhealthy practices have for the most part resulted in overwhelming support locally for the packing industry, and criticism for the way the network failed to tell "the whole story."

Everyone, from local Chamber of Commerce and other civic leaders felt as though the network was attempting to do a "hatchet job" on the meat-packing industry, siding

with the complaints of the inspectors' union, which stands to lose a few jobs due to the new inspection method being implemented.

Terry Wilkerson of Excel showed us a statement from American Meat Institute spokesman J. Patrick Boyle, in which he volunteered to help Prime Time Live in supplying background information on the industry's inspection techniques, and supplied the network with information showing the impressive safety record by the beef industry.

"When you look at foodborne illnesses traced to beef, the numbers show a dramatic decline since the early 1980s. In fact, although beef is one of Americans' favorite and most frequently consumed foods, the CDC reports that only four per cent of foodborne illness outbreaks in 1987 were traceable to beef. Any discussion of meat wholesomeness which does not reference these inescapable facts distorts the truth and wrongfully discourages consumer confidence," Boyle said in a letter to Prime Time.

"Your network should be wary of allowing itself to be used as a vehicle for promoting food safety

scare tactics that in reality mask a labor organization's fear that possible improvements in food inspection procedures could cut its membership, thereby reducing the number of people from which it can collect dues," Boyle's remarks continued.

"We understand that some ABC representatives may have posed as Federal employees in order to gain access to plants, where they used

hidden video cameras to obtain stolen footage of plant operations. As you may know, this alleged act, if true, is a Federal crime."

The Excel Corp. also released a statement to the media, which included the following remarks:

"I can assure you that Excel's own quality assurance programs meet or exceed USDA standards and that no product leaves our facilities

County Court Gives Assist To Local 911 Dispatchers

At the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioner's Court on April 17, 1992, Paula

Wilson, Friona's acting City Manager presented a request for subsidy from the County to be applied to the wages of city dispatchers due to an extra work load because of the new 911 program. The Court voted to subsidize the Friona department for this overload in the amount of \$5,000 to be paid from the General Fund.

County Treasurer Anne Norton presented the third quarter report and requested that the \$100,000 CD be allowed to mature at 6% until July 30, 1992. The Court agreed to this transaction.

In other business the Court voted that \$7,500 is to be paid from the Permanent Improvement Fund for the purpose of paving south and west of the courthouse and west of the Sheriff's Office with the contract being awarded to P. Donohue.

Insurance for the Public Officials and employees liability is to be renewed with Ethridge-Spring Agency in Friona as presented by Wendell Gresham. The policy expiring on May 21, 1992 will be renewed for \$7,763, plus state tax and stamping fees.

EMS Week Is Announced On Local and State Level

Governor Ann Richards has proclaimed the week of May 10 through 16, 1992 as Texas Emergency medical Services Week. This

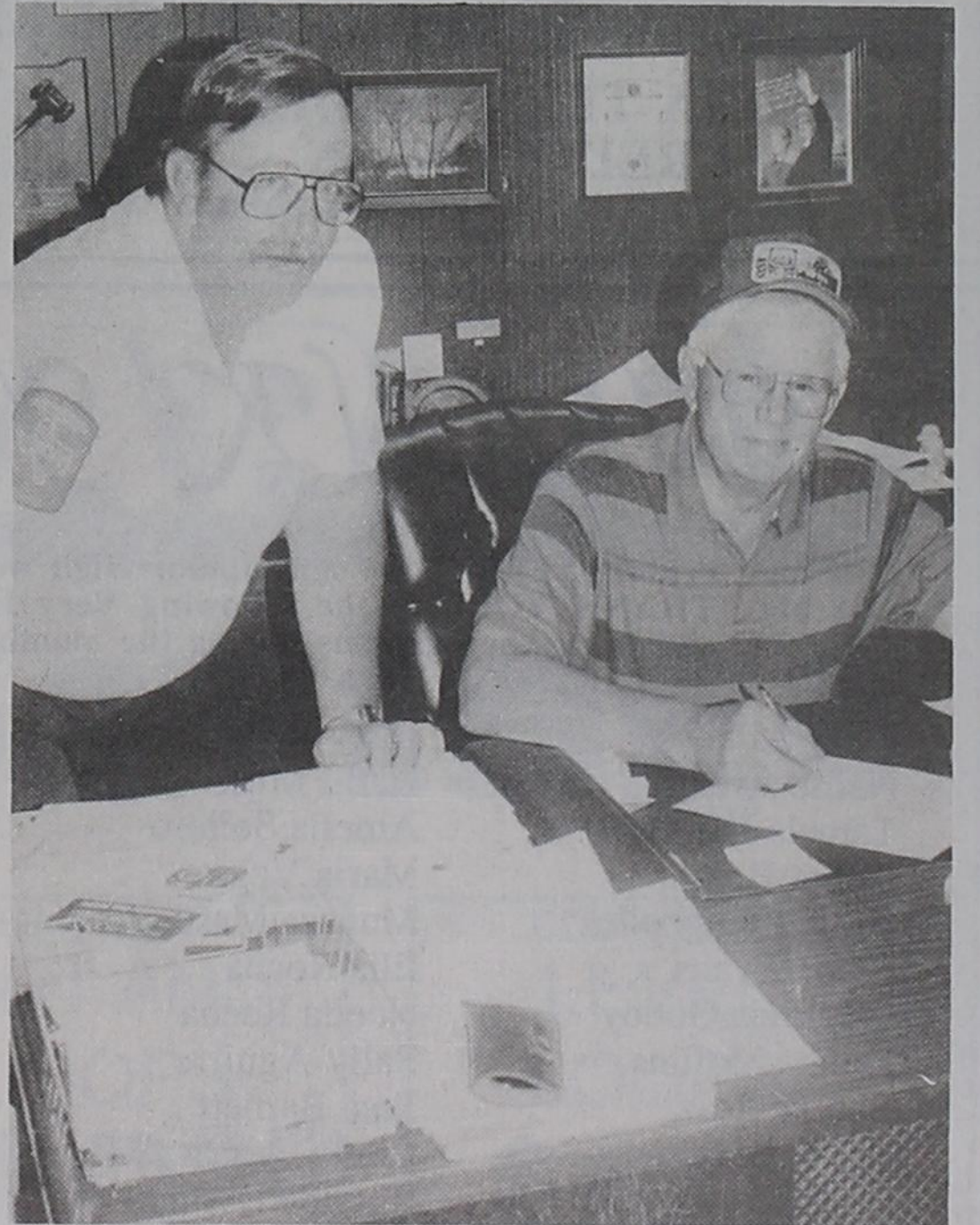
is being done in an effort to help citizens to know what to do in a medical emergency and to recognize the lifesaving efforts of emergency medical services personnel.

The Friona EMS will hold an Open House on Tuesday, May 12 at the Emergency Center from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. The public is invited to come by and meet the ambulance personnel and thank them for their efforts to help the community. There will be a presentation of awards and a local citizen will receive a merit award for heroic action.

Besides responding to calls for pre-hospital emergency medical care, the EMTs and paramedics of Friona play an important role in educating the community about preventing injuries.

"Almost everyone has witnessed an emergency at some time," said Gene Weatherall, chief of Texas Department of Health, "but not everyone knows what to do." Everyone needs to know that if they witness an automobile crash, the injured victims should be left in the vehicle until EMS arrives unless the danger of fire or an explosion exists.

Local emergency personnel will be on hand at the open house to pass out literature and to answer questions.

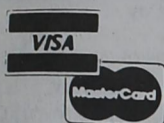

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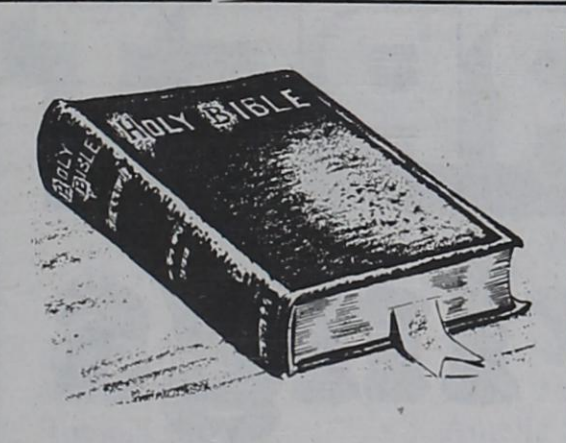

Reactions Given To ABC's Hatchet Job On Packers...

without USDA inspectors certifying them for sale. Despite allegations contained in the ABC piece, USDA inspectors have complete authority and responsibility to slow down or stop processing lines that do not meet USDA requirements and they can retain and/or condemn products that do not meet USDA standards.

"ABC's anecdotal video footage did not show viewers that federal inspectors and industry quality assurance personnel are stationed at the processing line where alleged incidents of carcass contamination occurred. Both inspectors and our own quality assurance personnel would have directed that any carcasses or meat be pulled aside

and go through the special rework and re-inspection procedures in place to accommodate the rare processing-line situations portrayed by ABC.

"The omission of this information by ABC is a disservice to meat consumers and the thousands of dedicated employees in Excel's plants and throughout the industry who have worked and are working diligently to constantly improve food safety within the meat-packing industry.

"ABC chose to ignore the studies by reputable sources and to focus on the allegations of various USDA and industry critics. Those groups have their own political agendas and are using scare tactics to attack the meat industry and fight potential scientific and technological improvements in inspection.

"At USDA's request, Excel's Texas plants became data sources in USDA's efforts to improve the nation's meat-inspection procedures. The company is not a party to the controversy between USDA and its inspectors' union and has attempted to remain neutral by declining media requests for tours and pictures."

Chiefs Top 'Winds, Go 3-0 In District

The Chieftain baseballers won both of their games in district play during the past week, to finish the first half of their district schedule unbeaten with a 3-0 record.

The Chiefs rolled to a 13-6 win at Dimmitt last Saturday, then returned to their home field on Tuesday to post a 14-4 win over Floydada. The latter game was called in the fifth inning by the 10-run rule.

In Tuesday's game, centerfielder Julian Colunga showed some of the reasons why he was chosen the previous day for the baseball award at the FHS all-sports banquet.

Colunga got three hits in four times at bat, including a pair of doubles and a single, and a pair of runs-batted-in.

But Colunga singled to start Friona's fifth, and substitute first-baseman Davy Hamilton walked. Both moved up a base on stolen bases. That's when Charlie Snead, who had the winning hit for the Chiefs in their come-from-behind win over Muleshoe, socked a single to score both runners, and that ended the game on the ten-run rule.

Field led the team with three runs-batted-in.

Tony Cuevas was the winning pitcher. He struck out six batters in four innings and allowed only three hits. Upton got a pair of strikeouts in his inning.

As you know, I lost my bid for re-election to the City Council by a very small margin in last Saturday's election. For that, I am sorry because there are some good things that might happen in Friona in the future (by the time the highway is finished) and I wanted to work on these projects.

The first thing, and it's barely started, is to get new curbing for Main Street. The ones we have are a disgrace. Since this is a state highway, the state, by law, will put in new ones plus new sidewalks but the city must put in new sewer and water lines plus tear up the old sidewalks. We do not have the money at this time, but there are grants available and with a lot of effort, I believe we can manage this. It may take a little time. In order to do this, the citizens, chamber, city and all civic groups need to become informed and cooperate fully. Believe me, it can be done.

The second thing I am interested in is called Main Street America, Main Street Texas and Main Street Friona. This is an organization that will come into our town, evaluate it and help apply for grants. We have information on Texas. They are only taking five towns in Texas this year and I don't think we are ready for that yet. That also will take full cooperation among

the city, chamber and all citizens. Post and Plainview are our nearest neighbors who belong. One town in Texas has only 700 people. The main idea is to start with what you have and go from there in order to attract visitors and tourists, thus creating more business.

Some of the things we already have and on which we could start is the depot, the old Syndicate Hotel, Jennings tractors and antique store and the old Congregational Church with a lot of work and not much money, we could start on these things.

I intend to continue working on this. I have quite a lot of information on what other towns whose Main Streets were drying up, have done and will be glad to talk to anyone about this. Everyone in town needs to hear about this and become interested. I think the program has great possibilities.

I certainly enjoyed my six year tenure. I learned so much and tried hard to make a contribution. We have had an excellent board during these six years. There was never any table pounding or shouting at any of our meetings. Clarence Monroe is a fine mayor and Paula

Wilson certainly is proving to be a most capable city manager.

I'm proud of my attendance record. Out of seventy-two meetings plus numerous called ones, I was absent three times, the best record of any other member.

Many people have asked why I wanted to go to those old dull meetings. It so happened that I enjoyed those dull meetings because I felt I was doing something for Friona.

I've always been a great Friona booster and have told many people that when Friona decides they want something--Library, Nursing Home and Community Center--they work hard to get it. I have always tried to go the extra mile for the children of the community as well as the whole town.

Let's all get to work, support our chamber and city council, police department, fire department and ambulance crew, get our town cleaned up all shiny and pretty and be ready to have great things to offer by the time Highway 60 is cleaned and ready.

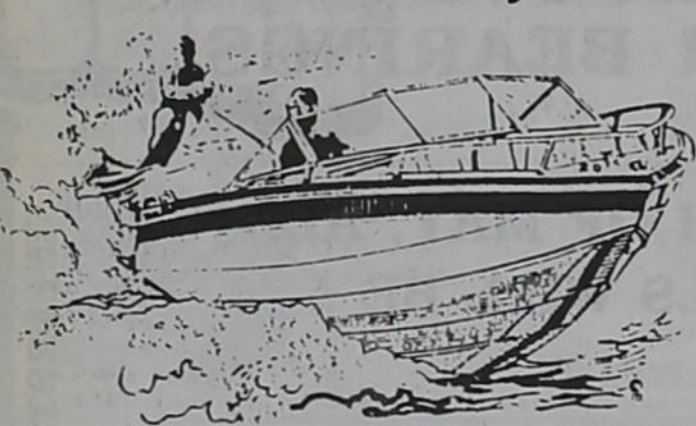

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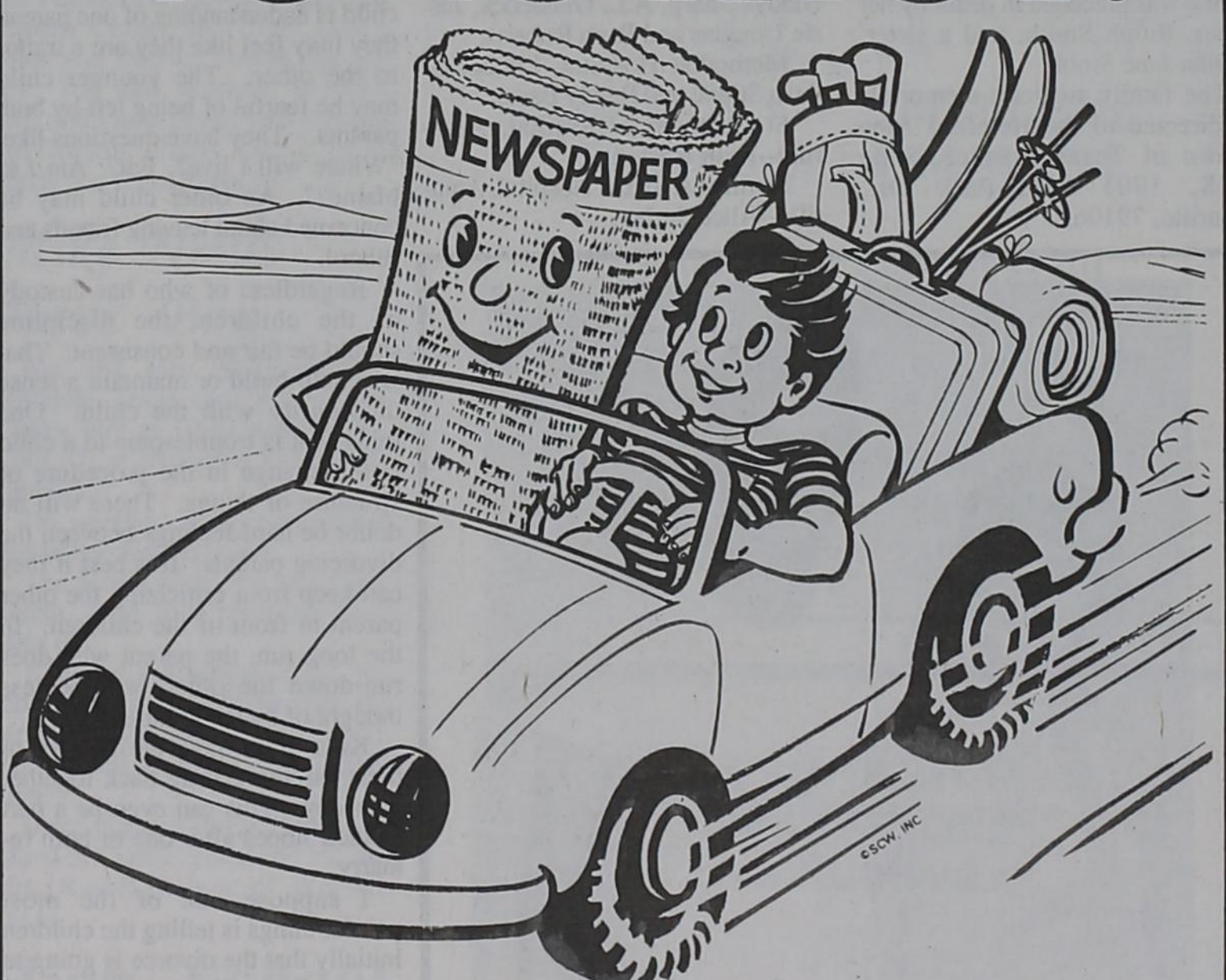

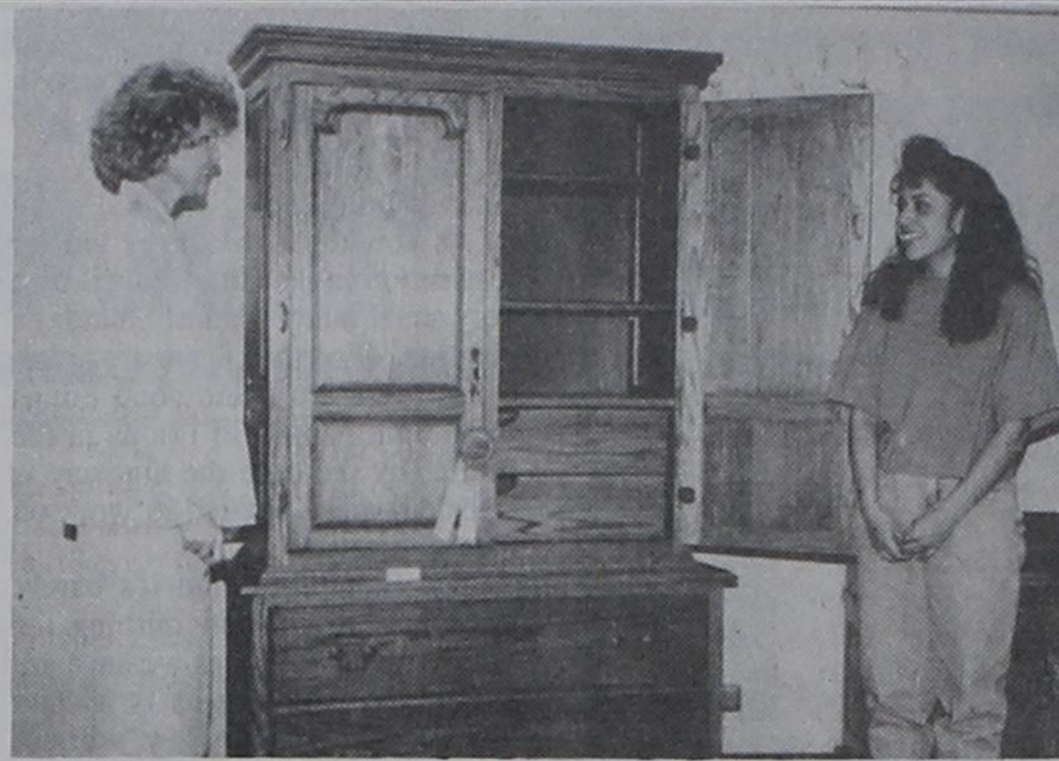

Divorce & Kids

It is common to hear, "The kids are young, they'll get over the divorce." Time does have a way of helping any person heal or adjust to change--but children who experience their parents' divorce do not make it through the experience without some marks or scars.

There are a multitude of feelings and thoughts that can be experienced. The following are but a few possibilities.

Divided loyalties between the parents can be a big problem. If a child is understanding of one parent, they may feel like they are a traitor to the other. The younger child may be fearful of being left by both parents. They have questions like, "Where will I live? Eat? Am I to blame?" An older child may be concerned about leaving friends and school.

Regardless of who has custody of the children, the discipline should be fair and consistent. That will help build or maintain a sense of security with the child. One thing that is troublesome to a child is the change in the procedure or structure of things. There will no doubt be hard feelings between the divorcing parents. It is best if they can keep from criticizing the other parent in front of the children. In the long run, the parent who does run-down the other, will be less thought of by the children.

Kids often have the fantasy of their parents getting back together someday. This can even be a part of their hopes after one or both remarry.

I suppose one of the most painful things is telling the children initially that the divorce is going to occur. Generally, it is best to inform in a honest, straight manner--no lies, false promises or excuses. To be able to answer their questions best, separate personal problems from family issues. One tough area would be if they question about an "affair" (if there really is one involved). Again, in the long-run, an honest answer without blame is best. It is usually best for both parents to tell the children together. They need to know they will be loved by BOTH parents and that they are free to love BOTH parents. Research has shown that young boys take longer than young girls to regain emotional balance. Divorce is one of the most stressful experiences faced by an individual--it is not foolish to get professional help.

Cinco De Mayo

To understand cinco de Mayo is to understand culture and history. In March 24 of 1829, a boy with the name of Ignacio Zaragoza Seguin was born in Bahia del Espiritu Santo, in the Mexican state of Texas. His father, Miguel Zaragoza, was the captain who took care of the Empresarios and the immigrants coming from East in search of better lands and opportunities. Without detailing Texas or Mexican history, years later Texas became a separate republic.

Since infancy, Zaragoza moved to Matamoros where he attended primary school and later followed his education in Monterrey. Due to Mexico's political situation, Ignacio Zaragoza registered in the militia. Having the ability to organize and direct, he was named Captain by the dictator, Santa Anna. His mother, Maria de Jesus, convinced him not to fight in favor of the traitor. Zaragoza was released from that commitment and returned to Monterrey where he proved his leadership defending it against the federal troops and later in Saltillo where the "federales" were totally defeated.

When Benito Juarez was elected president of Mexico, Ignacio Zaragoza was named Secretary of War. This is the time when the naval troops from Great Britain, France, and Spain again arrived in Veracruz to take care of some problems with intentions especially from France to take over the states of Sonora and Baja, California.

Spain and Great Britain went back to their respective countries leaving France alone with 6,000 soldiers and a plan to invade Mexico's land and the opportunity to get ahead without the intervention of other nations.

The night of 4 de Mayo, the Mexican Army was about to face one of the best armed forces at that time. However, the human element sometimes outweighs everything else. Mexico has been very defensive, caused by the roots of being conquered, enslaved, robbed, etc. by strangers. That night Zaragoza stirred the souls of the Mexican soldiers with a sense of patriotism. Some parts of the speech are: "The world will not say that 6,000 sol-

diers dominated a nation of 8 million people, defending becomes a necessity."

Early in the morning on 5 de Mayo, Zaragoza spoke: "Soldiers, you have behaved like heroes fighting for reformation! Your efforts have been crowned with success not one time but on several occasions you have made the enemy bend their necks. Today you are going to fight for a sacred object--you are going to fight for your country. And I promise myself that in the present journey you will conquer a name with everlasting memory. Our enemies are the first soldiers in the world; but we are the first sons of Mexico and they come to take over your country. Soldiers, I read in your front the victory...let's have faith...Viva la Independencia Nacional! Viva Mexico!

Brittney Danielle Scaff is an unusual new little baby girl.

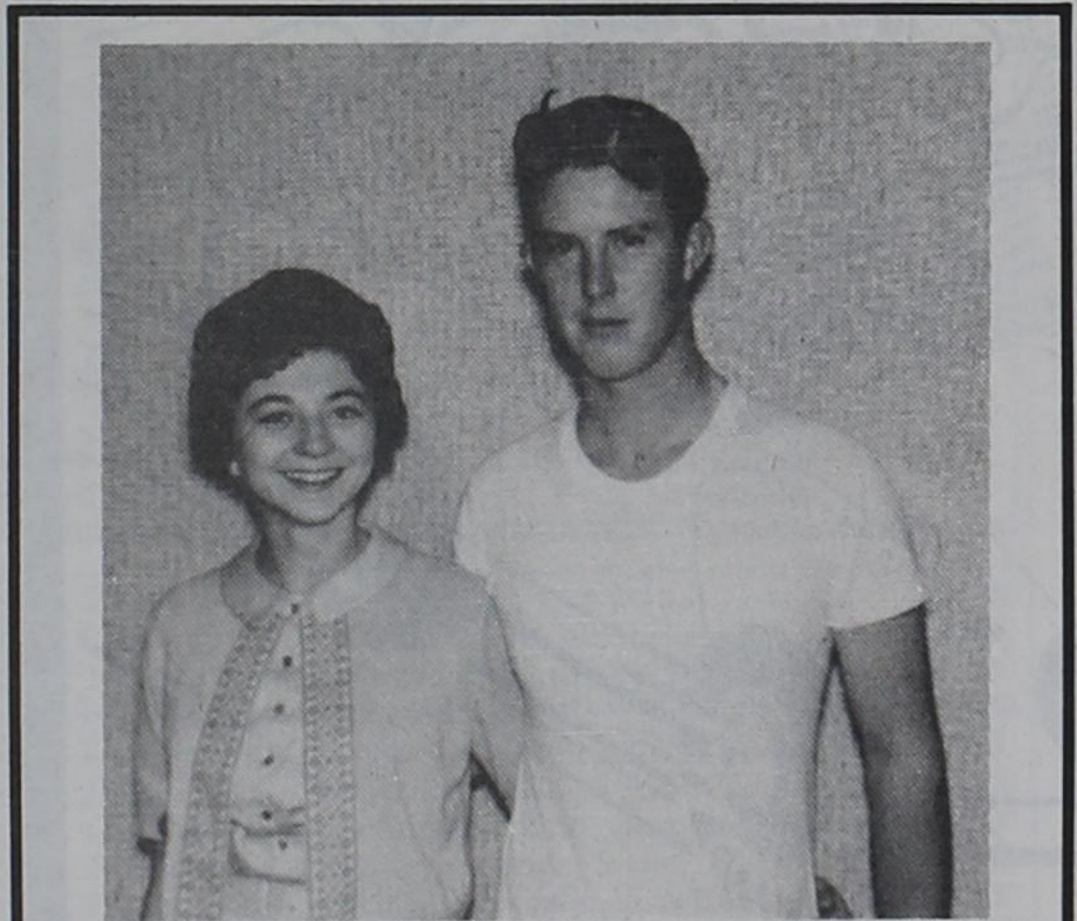

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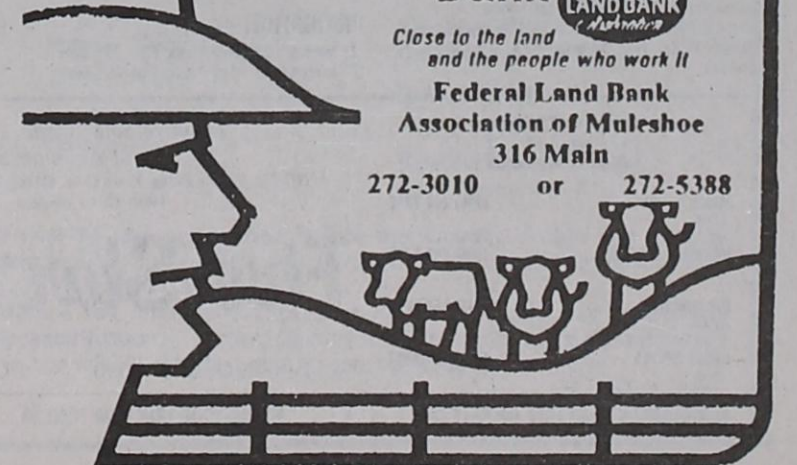

Select The Proper Fund
Type For A Withdrawal Plan

A popular service among mutual-fund investors is automatic withdrawal, which allows shareholders to receive fixed payments from their mutual fund on a regular basis, usually monthly or quarterly.

Each period that the shareholder is paid, the fund liquidates sufficient shares at current market value to make the distribution. For example, if the fund's shares currently have a value of \$10 and the shareholder wants to receive \$1,000, the fund sells 100 shares. If the share value were to drop to \$5, it would be necessary to liquidate 200 shares to produce the same \$1,000.

A well-planned withdrawal program can be a good way to provide regular income, but there are some pitfalls. Because automatic withdrawals are taken first from dividends, and then from capital gains, it is necessary to monitor your fund to ensure you are not withdrawing more than the fund earns. It is not uncommon for a withdrawal plan to dip into principal during a declining market period; furthermore, there must be evidence of strong recovery as the market improves for a withdrawal plan to work.

A withdrawal plan begun in a declining market can show several years of principal erosion. Compound that by selecting an aggressive growth fund that earns small dividends and depends on growth for its total return, and you have limited your chance of success to almost nil.

To illustrate, we selected two reputable mutual funds with nearly identical growth over a turbulent, 18-year period (1973-1990). The growth fund, with all dividends and

capital gains reinvested, grew at an annual rate of 11.94 per cent. The growth-and-income fund, with reinvested dividends and gains, grew at 12.55 per cent, about 0.6 per cent difference. We hypothetically invested \$100,000 in each fund on January 1, 1973, and began monthly withdrawals of \$750 (9 per cent annually) beginning January 15, 1973, and continuing through December 31, 1990. During this period, \$162,000 was withdrawn from each fund. At the end of the period, the growth fund's original \$100,000 had dwindled to \$6,250. The growth-and-income fund, on the other hand, had increased in value to \$172,646 (see chart).

Why such a remarkable difference? In 1973, when the withdrawals began, the Dow Jones Industrial Average peaked at the 1000 level. By the following year, however, it was back in the 600 range. In 1976, the Dow saw 1000 again, but two years later, it dropped to about 750. It was not until 1982 that the Dow finally penetrated 1000 and began the longest bull market in history until the severe one-day decline on October 19, 1987. This period is significant because it illustrates how an unfriendly market can destroy a withdrawal plan in a highly volatile fund, such as a growth, while a more predictable fund with fewer fluctuations, such as a growth-and-income fund, can survive and even prosper.

If you begin a mutual-fund withdrawal plan, carefully select the fund. It's a good idea to ask for a historical illustration of how several funds have performed under various market conditions. You may be surprised at some dramatic differences.
