A FEW THOUGHTS regarding the inauguration that our country witnessed on Friday, January 20, in case you missed them:

The oath of office repeated by President George Bush was the very same oath administered in 1789 to George Washington.

It was a fitting inauguration for the bi-centennial of presidential inaugurations, and was billed in Washington, D.C. as the "George to George Inauguration."

Maybe it's a bit unusual that the incoming president on the 200th anniversary of the beginning of our nation's government is also named George—he also is the only other of the now 41 presidents to have the name George in his name than the Father of Our Country.

President Reagan broke a jinx involving every president elected during a year ending in zero since 1840 to have died in office. Reagan survived. Here's what happened to the others:

William Henry Harrison was elected in 1840, but died of pneumonia just a month after taking office. Harrison gave a speech that lasted more than an hour in a cold, driving rain. Then he danced into the wee hours of the morning at the inaugural balls following the inauguration, contracted pneumonia and never recovered.

Abraham Lincoln was elected in 1860, was then elected to a second term in 1864, but was assassinated in 1865 while in office.

James A. Garfield, elected in 1880, was assassinated a few months later at the age of 50.

William McKinley, who was re-elected to office in 1900, was assassinated in 1901 at the age of 58.

Warren G. Harding was elected president in 1920, but died of a heart attack in 1923 at the age of 58.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, the only president to be elected four times, was the president elected in 1940. He was re-elected in 1944, but died of a cerebral hemorrhage in 1945 at the age of 63.

John F. Kennedy, who had been the first Roman Catholic elected president, was elected to office in 1960, but was assassinated in 1963 at the age of 46.

Reagan, who was the oldest man ever to be elected president when re-elected in 1984, was first elected in 1980. He had to survive an assassination attempt early in 1981, and then underwent successful surgery for cancer of the colon in 1985.

**POLITICAL EXPERTS** point out that our nation is unique in that the presidency changes without incident, and that the old president always leaves "on time."

However, it was pointed out that the custom of the outgoing president to pick up the incoming one for a ride to the White House, which has been going on for quite some time, made for a cold, quiet ride in 1953 when the Eisenhowers and Trumans were in the automobile together.

The two had been bitter rivals during the campaign, during which Eisenhower had vowed to go to Korea, if necessary, in order to end the Korean conflict.

President and Mrs. Bush were the first "first couple" to open up the White House to the public the day after their inauguration in this century.

Historians noted that when Andrew Jackson hosted a reception for the "common people" in 1829, thousands of people mobbed the White House, smashing china, dumping food onto the floor and tracking mud in on rugs and silk sofas. Jackson himself was almost crushed against the wall before friends could escort him out through a side door.

## Chili Supper Is Next Friday

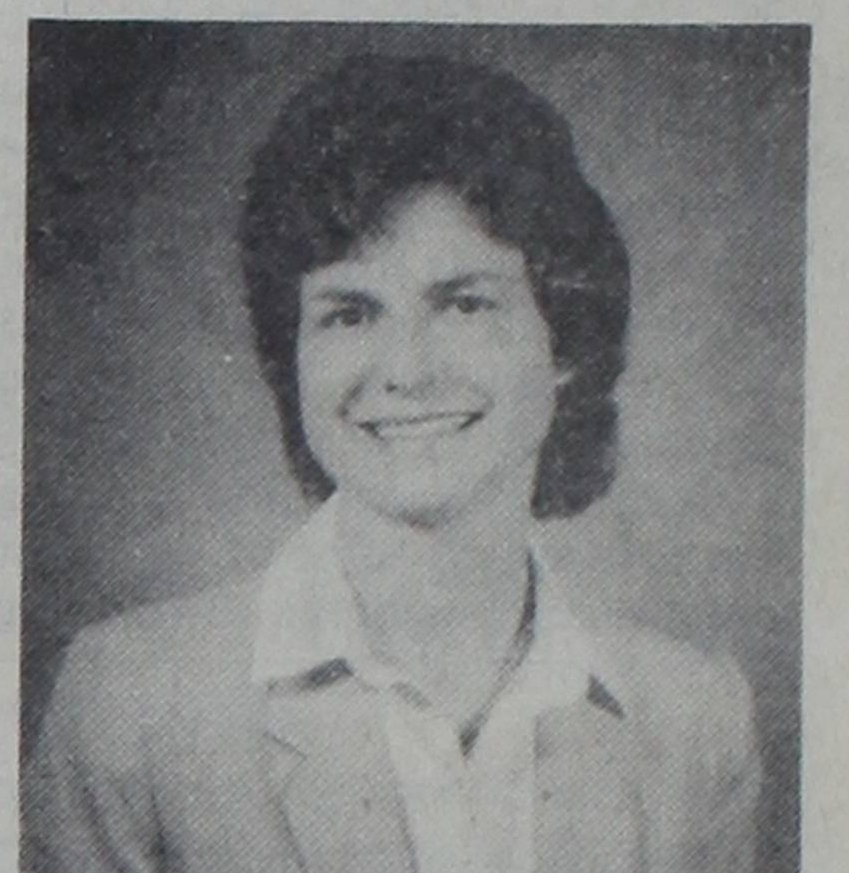
A chili and soup supper will be held on Friday, February 3 at the Friona High School Cafeteria, sponsored by the Chieftain Parents organization.

The event will be in conjunction with the Friona-Dimmitt basketball game, and will be a fund-raiser to assist the organization.



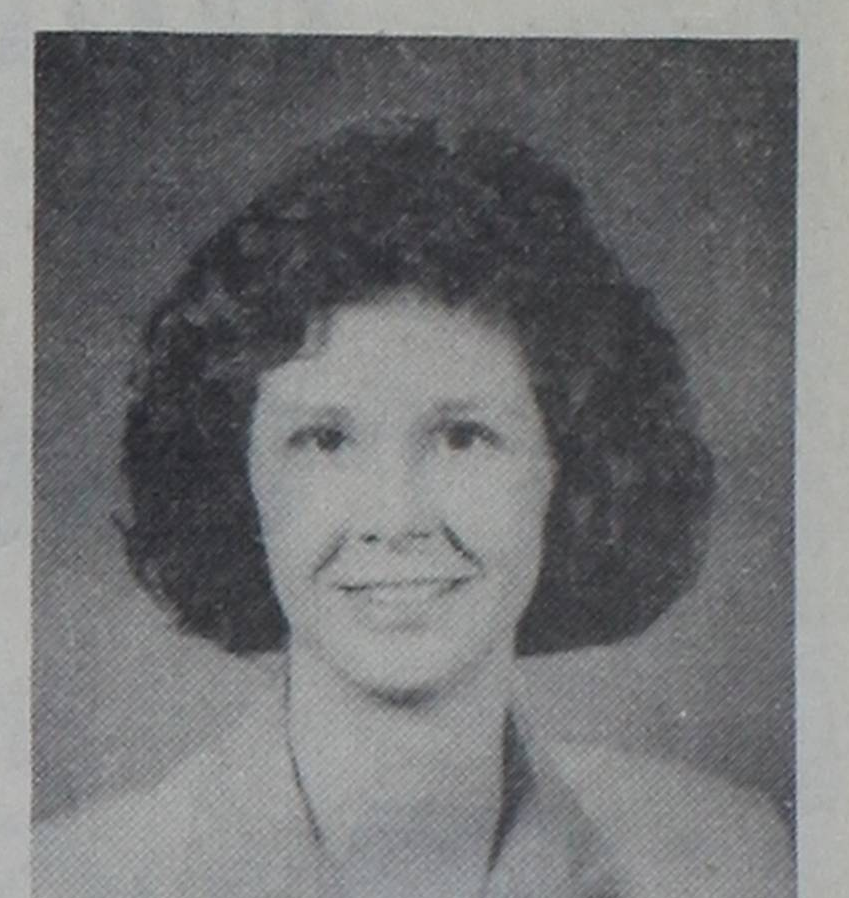

Twenty other schools competed, including Levelland, Shallowater, Muleshoe, Sanford-Fritch, Morton, Groom, Dunbar,

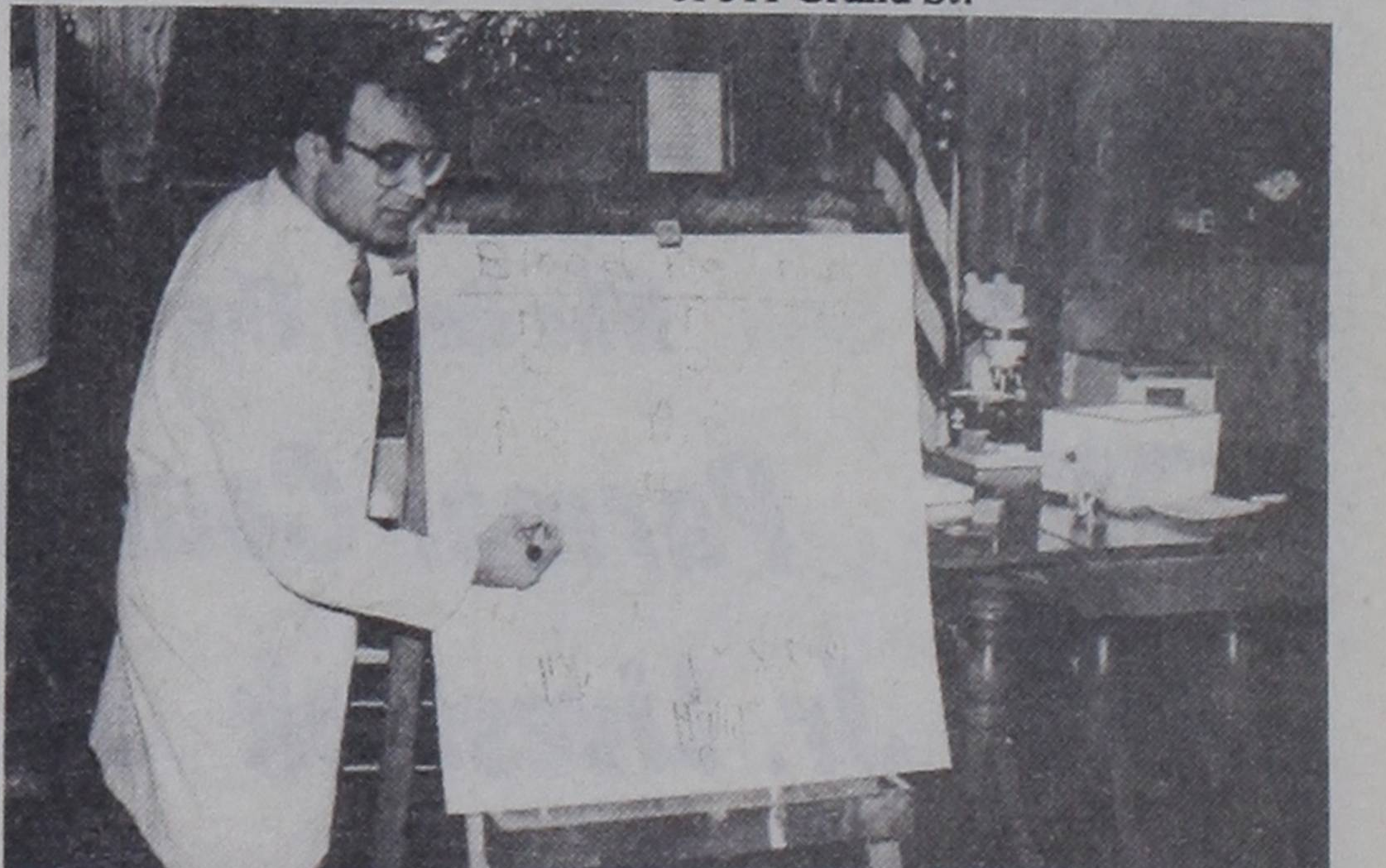

## 60 YEARS AGO—JAN. 18, 1929

The little two-year-old son of Rev. and Mrs. Porter had a narrow escape from severe injury Monday afternoon when he fell through the opening into the cellar in the Rushing grocery store.

Mr. and Mrs. Carl C. Maurer returned Monday from their visit to Wichita, Kansas whither they went last week and where Mr. Maurer hoped to secure a situation in one of the aviation fields there as an aviator.

Rev. J.L. Beattle, pastor of the local Congregational Church, returned Monday from a visit to Springlake and Earth where he preached Sunday forenoon and at night. This was his first service at Earth and he expressed himself as well pleased with the reception tendered him by the people there.

## 50 YEARS AGO—JAN. 20, 1939

Pat Butler is the new city and school tax assessor-collector, having replaced David Cooper who resigned.

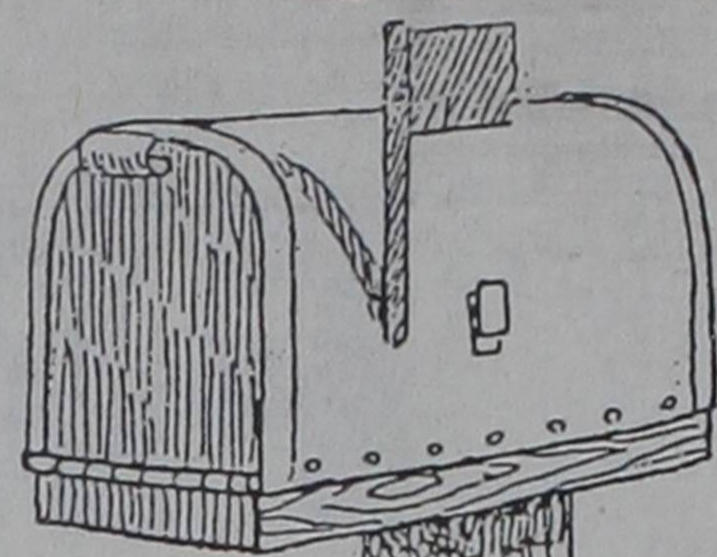

# Letter To The Editor



To The Editor:

The conflict between communism and capitalism has been, and is, fundamentally a conflict over the ownership and control of bank reserves.

Under communism, the government is the owner and beneficiary of the money supply (bank reserves). Under capitalism, the international power elite (the "Fed"), which includes Japanese, German and other foreign securities dealers as well as some of our own, print, own, and control the money supply (bank reserves). Free banking requires the decentralized, debt free, usury free ownership of bank reserves (the money supply) by we, the people, not by the internationals. Free enterprise is an impossibility as long as the ownership and control of the money supply (bank reserves) is a monopoly of either the government or an elite few so-called "private capitalists."

Very simply, the proposal to convert the IRS into a money issuing institution that would issue bank reserves per capita, by-passing both the government and the "Fed system" of bank reserve creation, is the

only possible way to re-establish genuine free enterprise.

Debt-free, usury-free bank reserves must be available to the American banking system through the debt-free and usury-free deposits of customers of the American banks. Only in this way can a free banking system obtain the bank reserves necessary for maintaining a free economy.

President Reagan, in submitting the proposal to the Office of Budget and Management to convert the IRS into a money-issuing institution, rather than a tax collecting institution, had the courage to stand tall, face to face with our own "Fed"/Congress power monopoly support of the usurious money system that is rapidly bringing America to its knees.

Every banker in America should give full support to the proposal to convert the IRS into a money-issuing institution because if monetary reform comes without a system in place to issue usury-free bank reserves to the people, you can be sure your nightmares of the possibilities of a communist America will come true.

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## Preachers Tell About Experiences

Former pastors of Friona's First Baptist Church had some interesting experiences to share with those attending the 75th anniversary celebration at the church last Sunday.

Rev. Tommie Allen, now of Burnett, who was pastor here from 1947-51, said that the building program for the present-day church auditorium was started while he was pastor. One method used to pay for the building was that farmer-members donated loads of wheat to the church.

"They would weigh it in at the elevator, and tell the elevator officials 'This one is for the church,' and then bring it to where the church building stands and dump their load. I think we had 10,000 bushels of wheat on the church lot at one time--and wheat was a good price that year, \$2.00 a bushel. That was a big help," Rev. Allen recalled.

Rev. Allen also told about a "brush arbor" revival held one summer on the building site, but was corrected by a later speaker who pointed out that there was no brush involved.

Rev. Russell Pogue was pastor of the church from 1951-53, and while he was pastor the auditorium was completed. "We're still referring to this as the 'new' auditorium, but in just two months, you will have been in this building exactly half of your entire 75 years of church history," Rev. Pogue said.

Rev. Pogue recalled that upon completion of the building, the church had a number of other expensive projects that had to be considered: purchasing new pews, floor covering, paving the street, paving parking aprons, and participating in a building at the church camp ground.

"Irrigation was becoming a vital force at that time, and the community was experiencing nice growth. The Lord allowed us to do all of this work, without any problems," he said.

Rev. Pogue, who has retired as a full-time pastor, is now living in Valley Mills, but has been serving as interim pastor at Perryton for the past six months.

Rev. C.M. Fields of Comanche, who was pastor from 1955-56, told a story about how the remarks of a little girl helped him decide to stay in the ministry when he was about to quit.

"I probably could have stayed here considerably longer, but at one of our revivals, Paul Fortenberry and myself said we would sing a special if we had a certain number in Sunday School. I don't know if he and I were using the same book--we definitely were not on the same page," said Rev. Fields.

Rev. Robert Lacewell of Borger, another of the church's "preacher boys," told of an experience he

had camping out with a group of R.A. boys in Palo Duro Canyon, when it rained, and rained and rained. "And I don't think it has rained since," Lacewell concluded.

Rev. Clayton Day of Clinton, N.Y., who was pastor from 1945-47, told of being a substitute mail carrier out north of town in the days when mail carriers delivered baby chicks, and he would have to listen to their cheeping all the way around the route.

As to the day he was called to preach, Day said his questioning came mainly from "Old Judge Wimberly," who thundered--"Boy--can you preach???"

Rev. David E. Moore was pastor from 1934-37. He said that this was his first preaching position, right out of the seminary, and the church allowed him to gain some maturity.

"The church has always had a special place in my heart, since it gave me a start in the ministry," said Rev. Moore, who is now retired.

Rev. Joe Hub Collier of Kingston, Oklahoma, who has preached locally and has preached revival services here a number of times, gave a testimony in which he told of his conversion experience when he was a young farmer here.

Collier told about fighting the invitation to attend the revival services, "But to top it all off, mother invited the preachers out to the house for dinner. They invited me to church that night, and I told them I had a lot of farm work to do and didn't know if I'd be through."

"Give us a pair of overalls, and we'll help you finish," they said, whereupon, I told them, "If you'll not come help me, I'll be there," Collier related.

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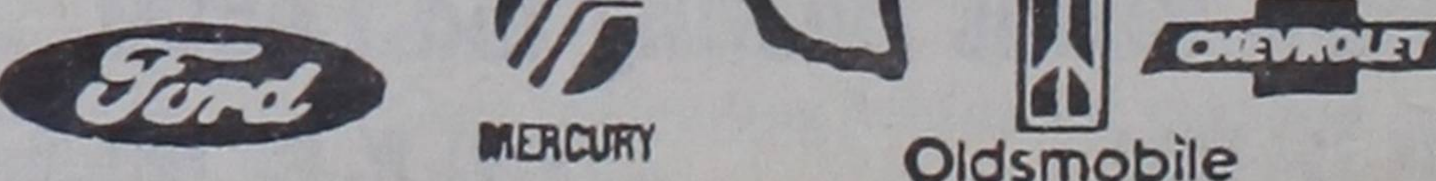

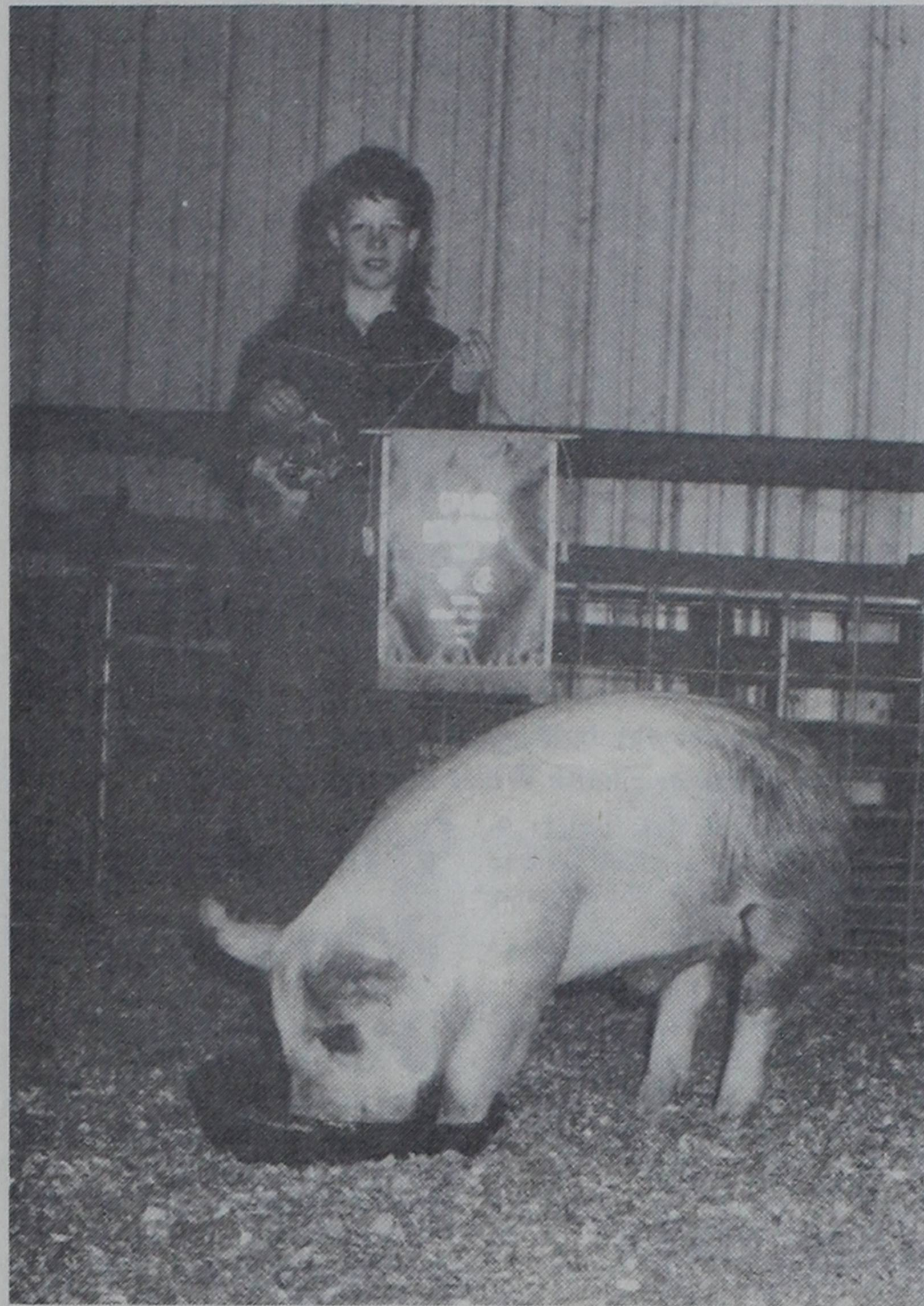

## Land-Buying Is Seminar Topic

A special seminar on "Buying More Farmland" will be held February 3 at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center, 17360 Coit Road, Dallas, Texas from 9:30 a.m.-4 p.m.

The seminar is designed to explore the "best" way of buying more land for Texas farms and ranches," says Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist and attorney with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "Even if there is not a "best way," maybe we can keep people from making mistakes that were common in the past."

Discussions will center on economies of scale, projecting cash flows, financing alternatives and tax planning.

Farm purchase agreements include many clauses, notes Hayenga, and many of these will be discussed at the seminar. Benefits and restrictions to both sellers and buyers will be addressed.

One major consideration is projecting income from both the existing operation and the additional land. Dr. Ken Stokes, Extension economist from Dallas will discuss this topic.

Financing alternatives will be covered. Price and interest trade-offs will be calculated with a look at the tax situation of both the buyer and seller.

Ways to take title to the new farm to save both income and estate taxes will be the highlight of the afternoon program.

This is the second time Extension is hosting this program. As many of Texas farmers and ranchers are thinking about selling land because of the current financial situation, others will want to buy the land. We hope to help buyers buy the land "right."

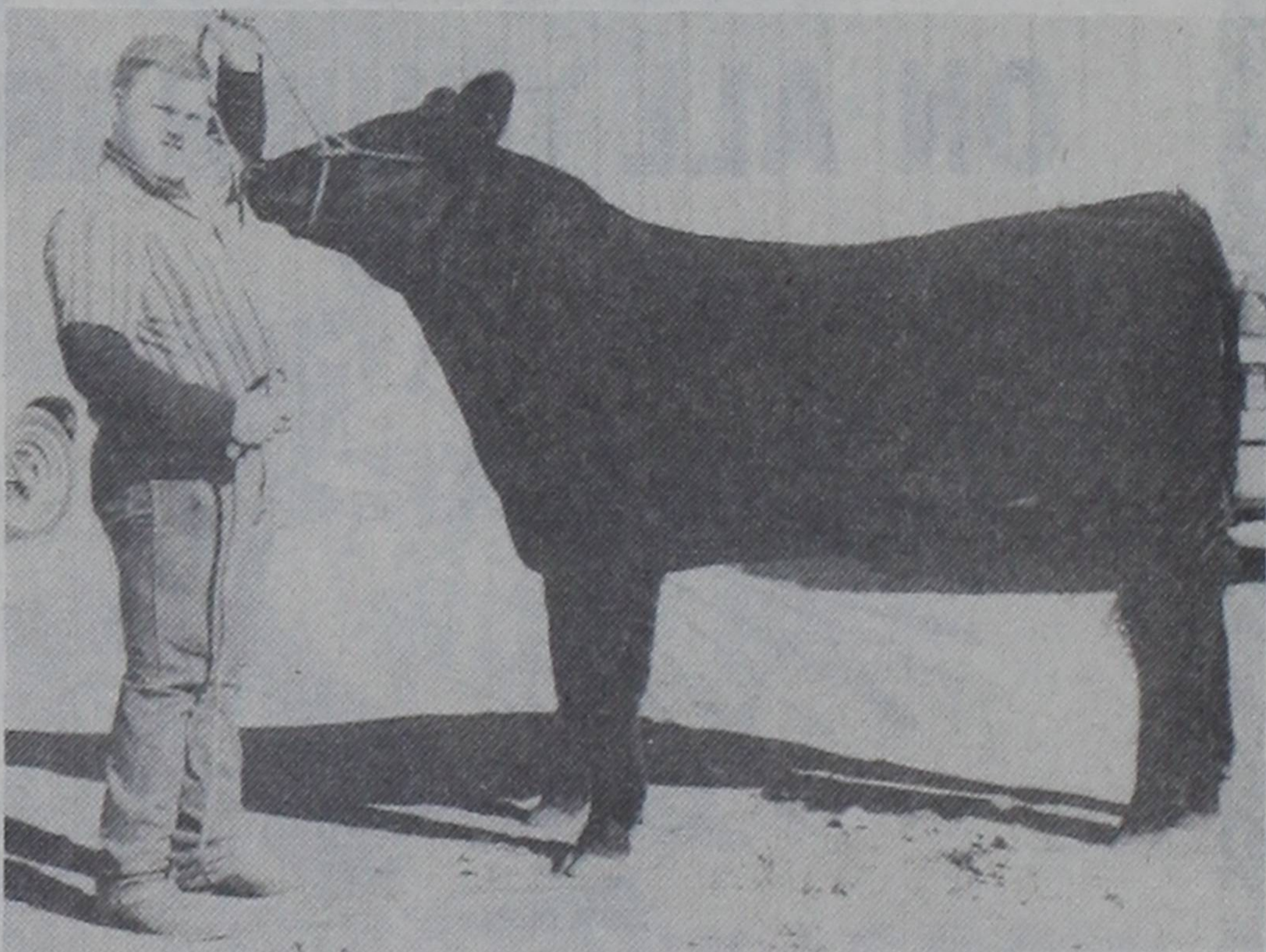

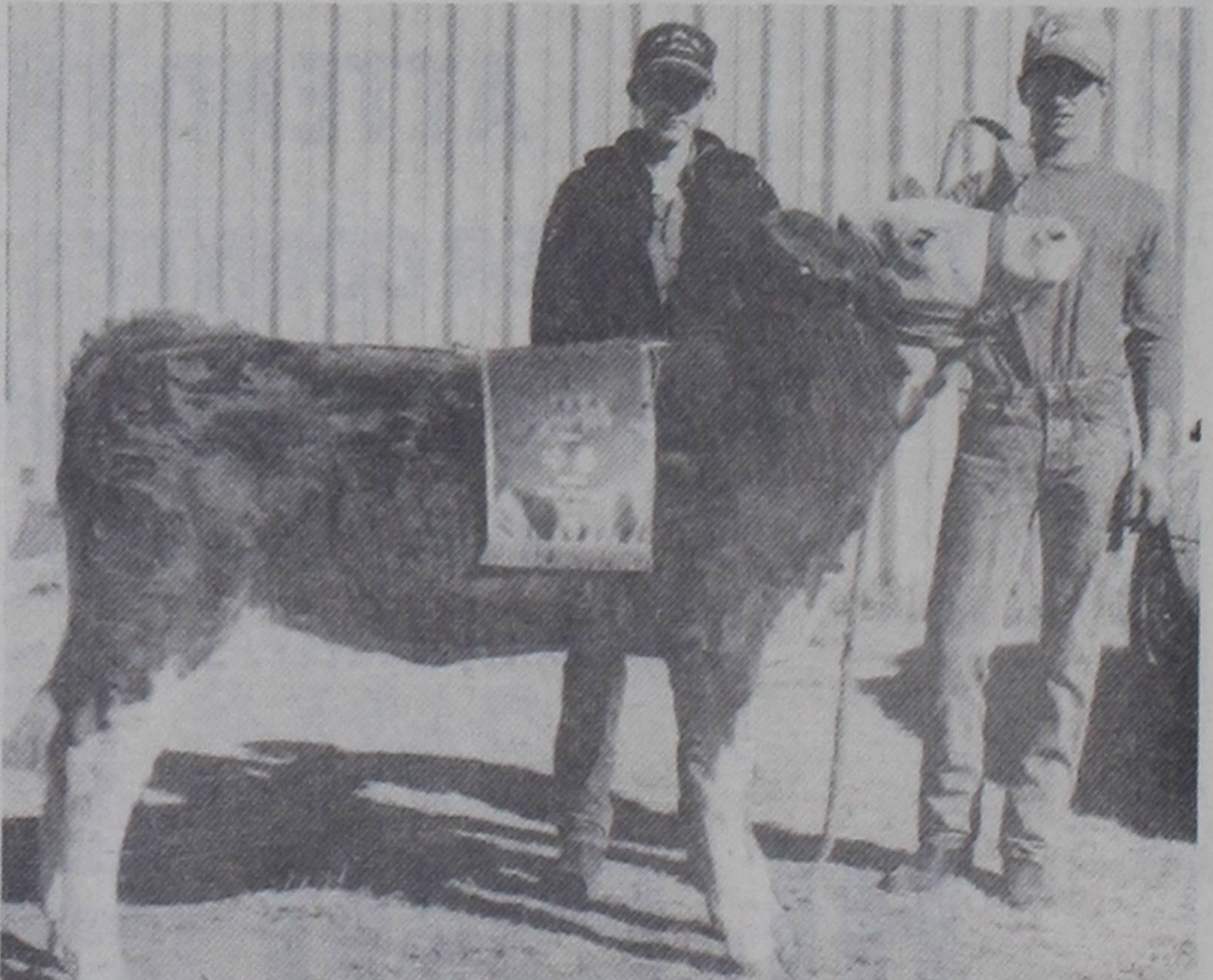
**CHAMPION LAMB....Charlie Snead was the proud owner of the Grand Champion Lamb at the Friona Junior Livestock Show held last weekend.**



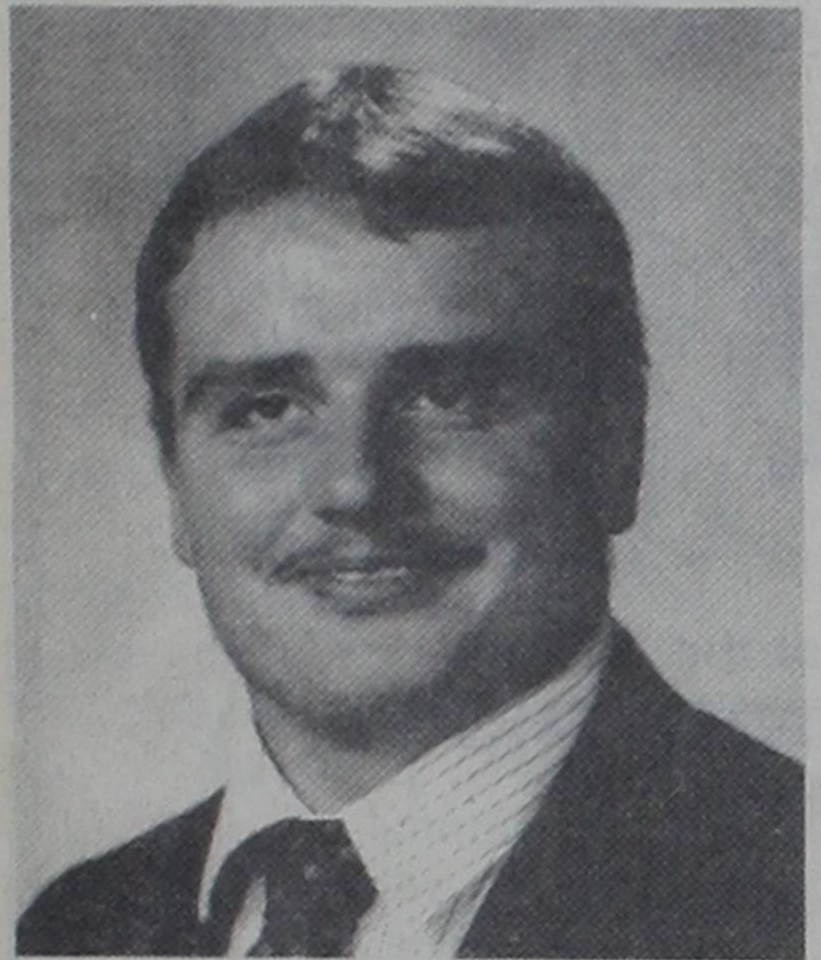
**RESERVE LAMB....Jennifer Smith's lamb was named Reserve Champion Lamb at the Friona Livestock Show.**

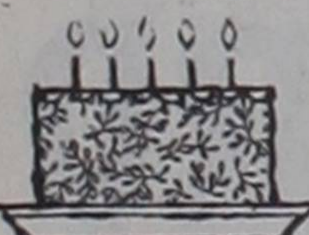

However, Miss Ureste and Elaine White scored before halftime to give the Squaws a 31-21

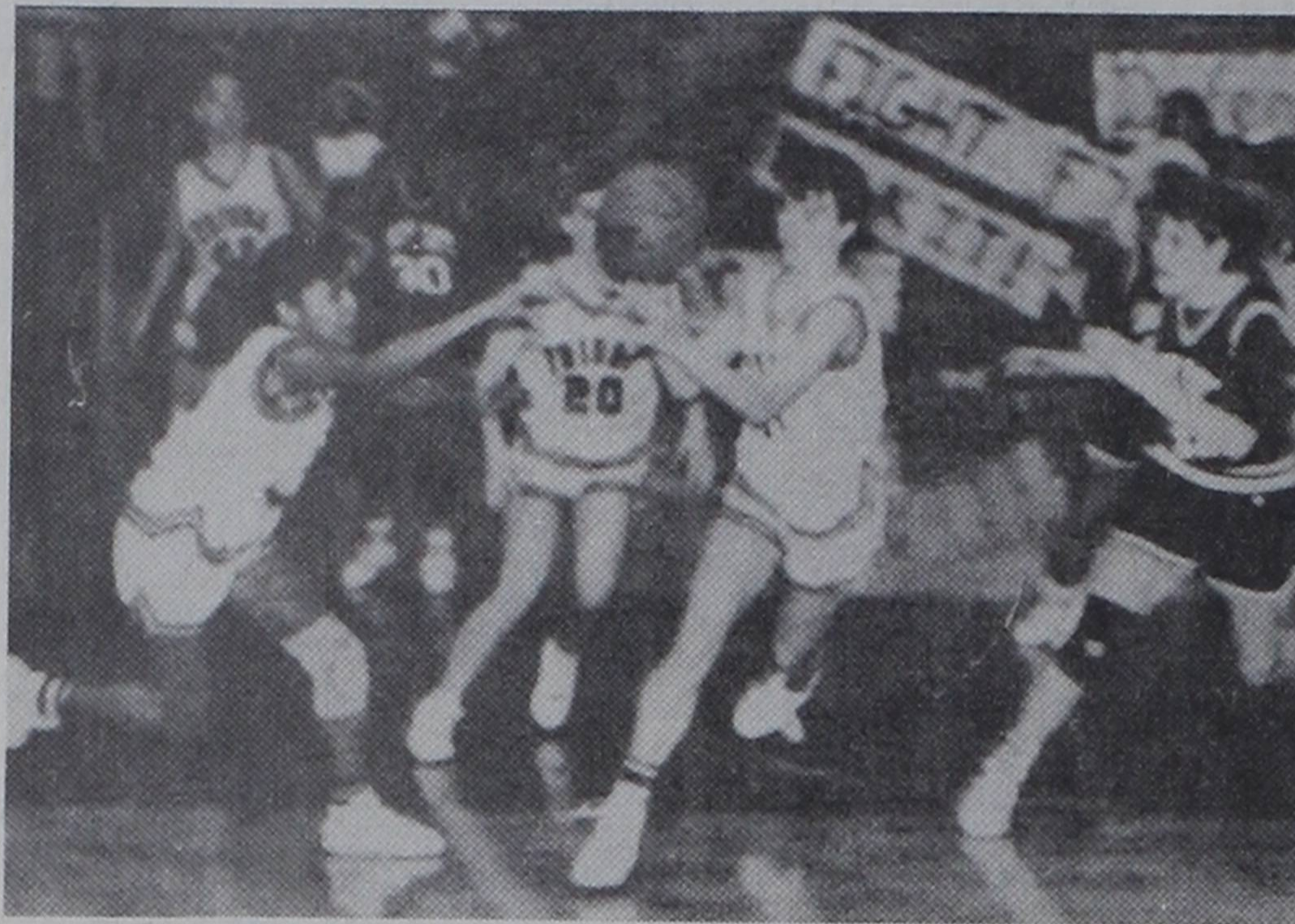



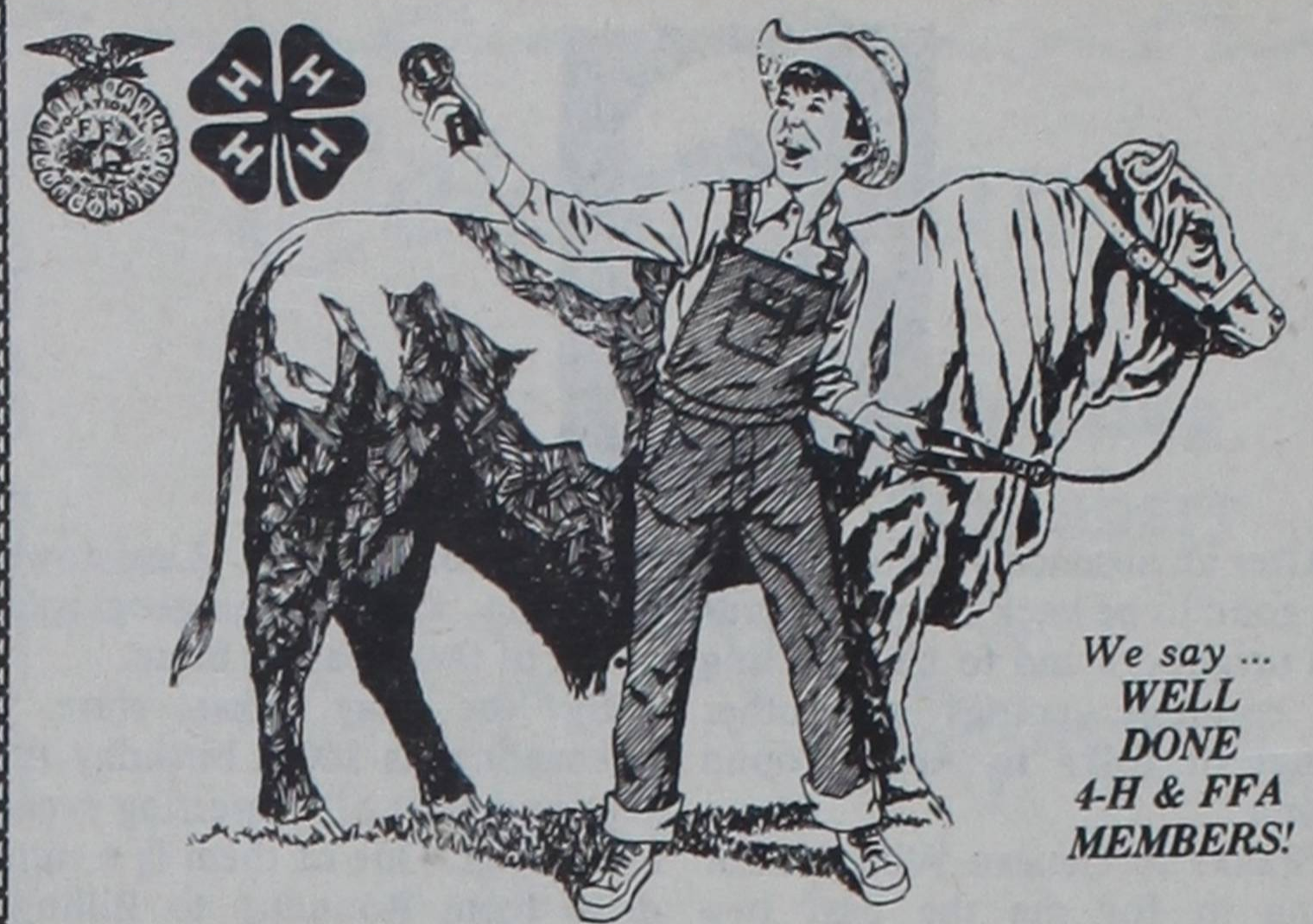

### The Facts on How Social Security Income Is Taxed

Many elderly couples receiving Social Security benefits are confused by current laws that could tax a portion of that income. Adding to that confusion, tax-exempt interest, which municipal bonds pay, is included in calculating the amount of income received. This may require you to pay federal income tax on a portion of your Social Security benefits.

There is, however, good news because it's estimated that fewer than 10% of Social Security recipients must report any benefits to the IRS. Most retirees' total income is too low to qualify.

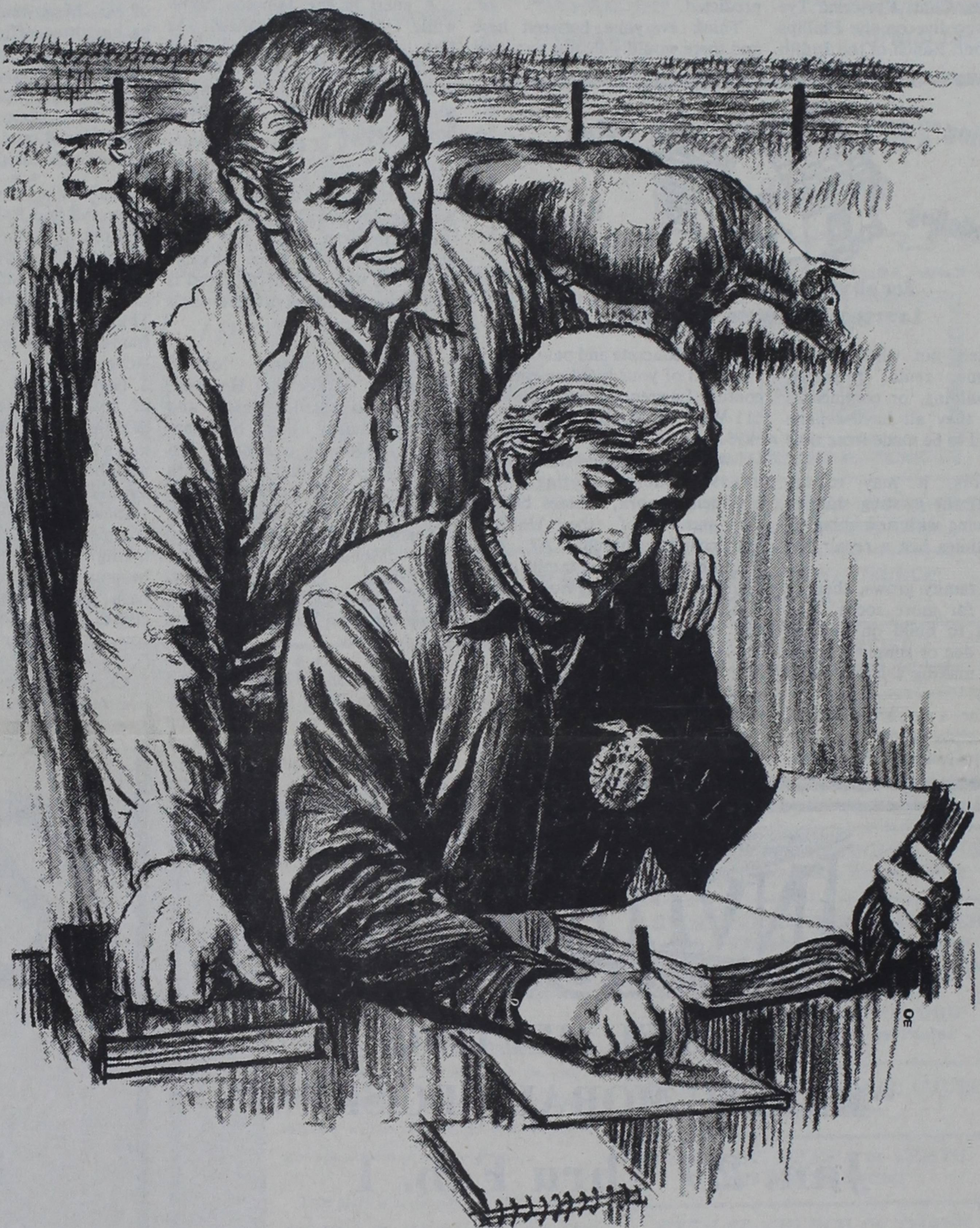
Here's how the law works. If you receive benefits, the Social Security Administration mails you Form 1099-SSA, similar to the W-2, which shows all your Social Security income for the year. It's up to you to compute the total of your adjusted gross income, tax-exempt income and one-half of your Social Security income for the year. If you're filing a joint return and this total exceeds \$32,000 (\$25,000 for an individual return), half your Social Security is taxable. If it doesn't meet these limits, your Social Security benefits are not taxed.

An investor recently

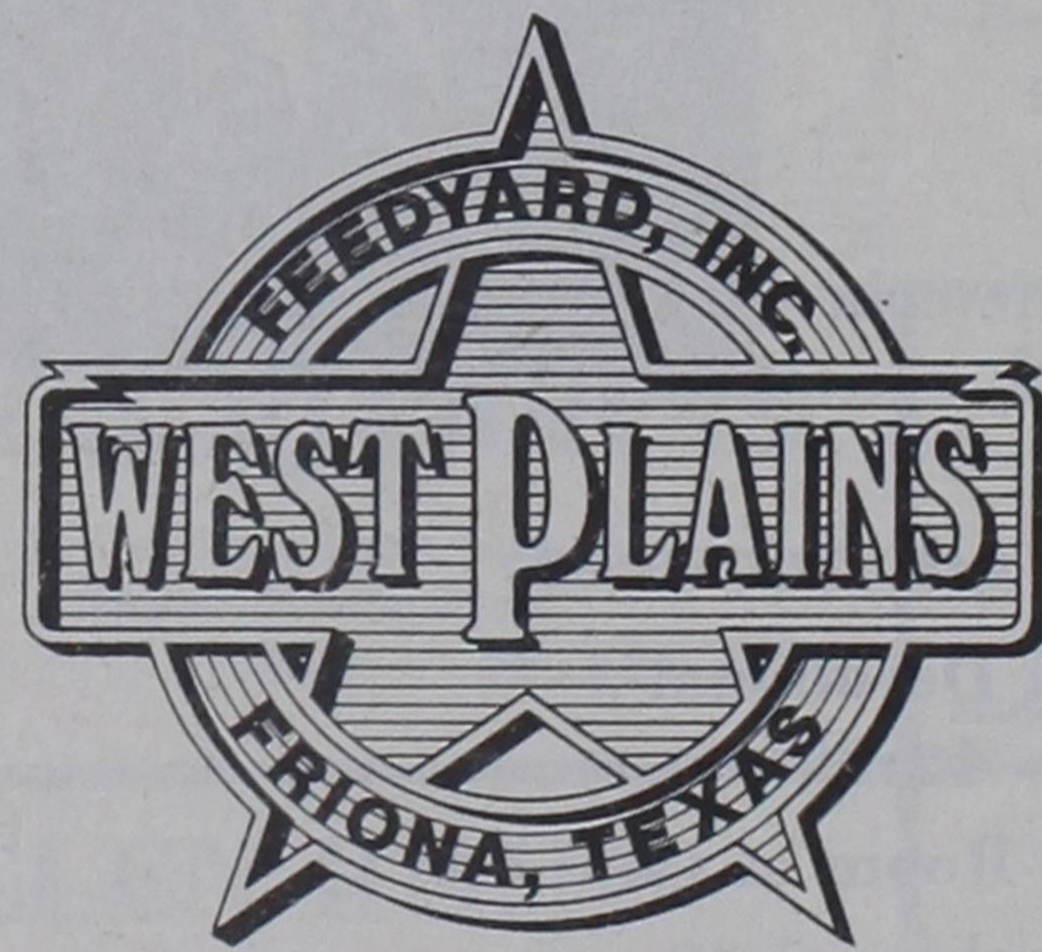
complained, "I bought municipal bonds for tax-free income. Now I must pay taxes on that income." That's incorrect. The tax-exempt income is used only to determine if you're required to pay taxes on Social Security. The tax-free income remains free of all federal taxes. The tax on Social Security benefits was not intended, nor does it, remove the benefits of tax-free income.

On the surface, this could appear as an additional tax on income regardless of the source. Actually, it's not. The additional tax, if you qualify to pay it, is on Social Security income only. Income from other taxable sources, such as corporate bonds, certificates of deposit, rental income and the like are subject to the same federal income taxes as before. The interest on tax-free bonds continues to remain free of tax liability. Under no circumstances will retirees pay more taxes on Social Security benefits simply because they earn money from tax-exempt securities rather than taxable investments.

If you're receiving Social Security benefits and still enjoy a relatively high income, don't be deceived into believing tax-free income can no longer benefit you. Consult a professional and learn the facts. Don't be misled by the myths.

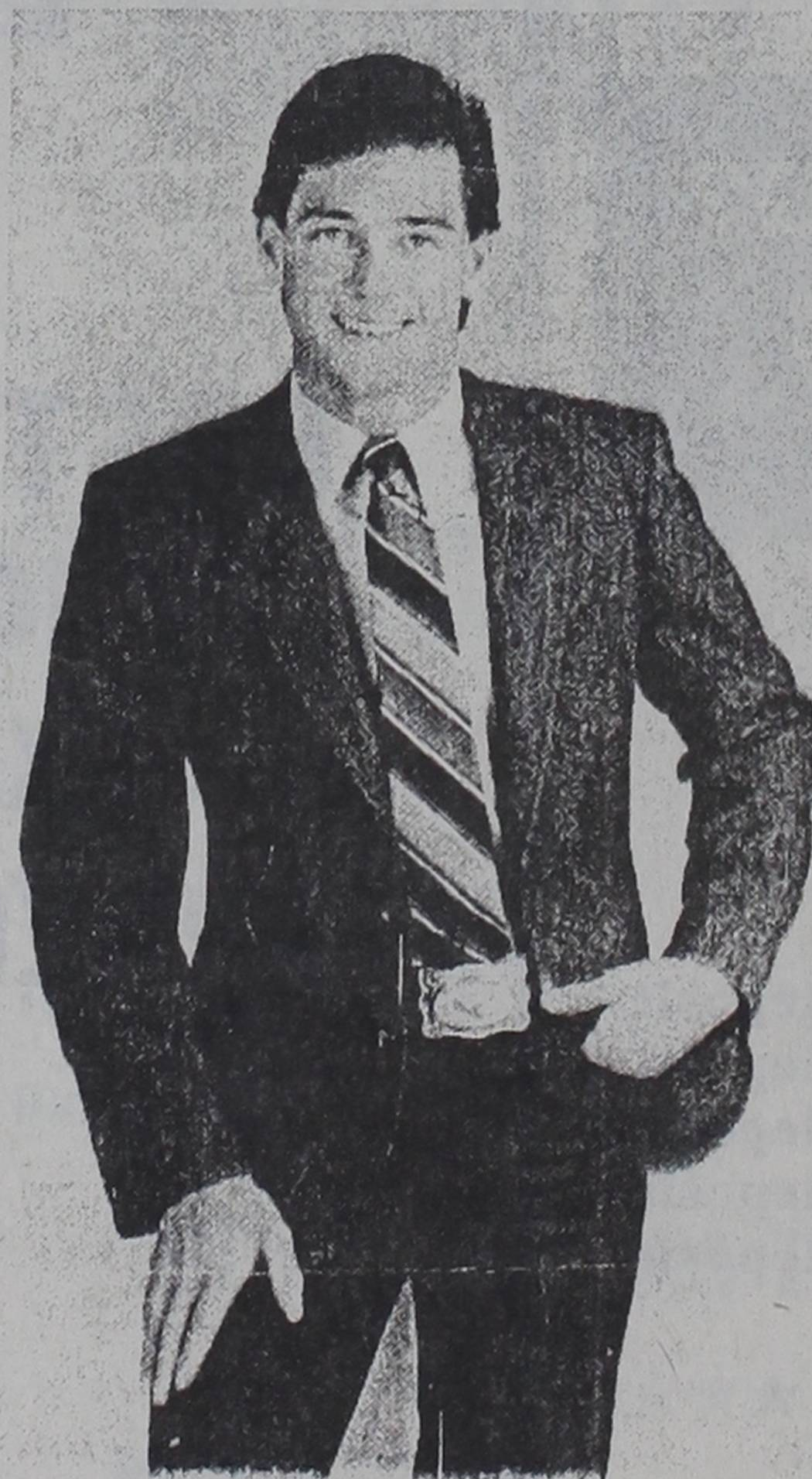

Two students from Friona are among 354 students named to the Dean's Honor List for the fall 1988 semester at South Plains College.

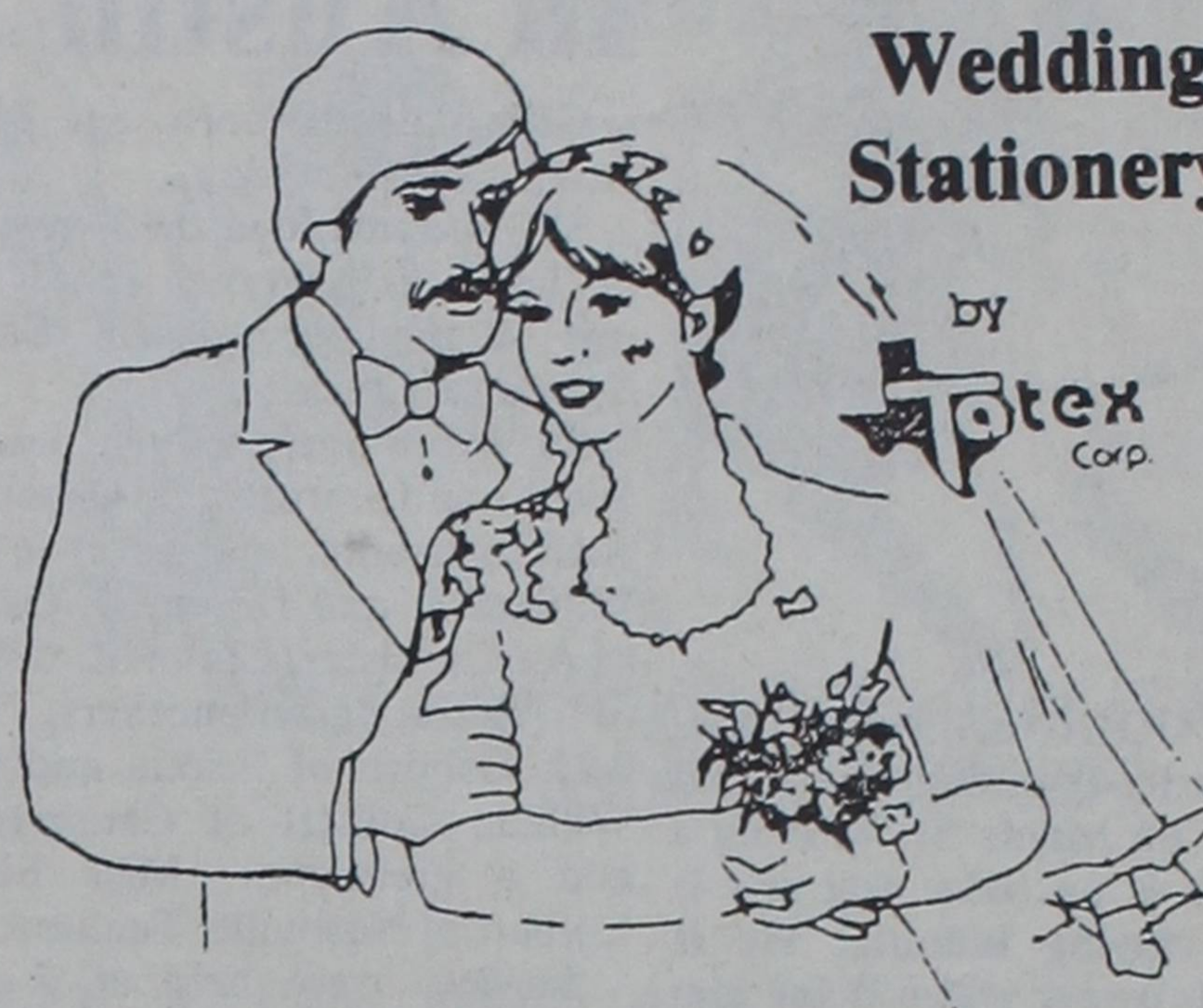

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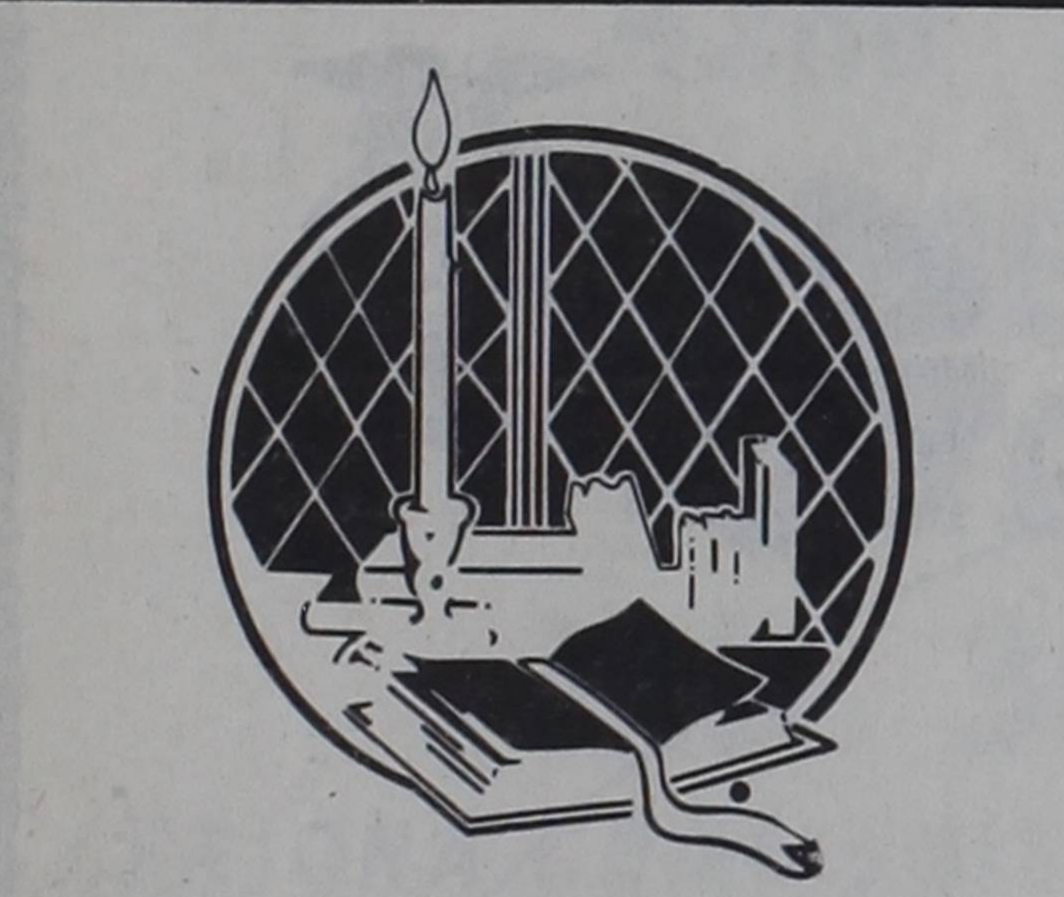
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**Lost in the Crowd?**
