Butch Preston Wins Free Throw Promo

During the recent ABC Holiday basketball tournament at Lubbock, Friona resident Norvel (Butch) Preston was the grand prize winner in a promotion sponsored by the tournament-sponsoring American Business Clubs.

Preston won an all-expense paid trip for two to watch the Dallas Mavericks' team play in Dallas. The prize includes airfare from Lubbock, hotel expenses, game tickets, plus some spending money.

The Prestons will have their choice of dates to take the trip.

Preston won the prize by being the best free-throw shooter of those selected to participate in the promotion during halftime drawings at the tournament games.

He was one of three Friona residents to advance to the free-throw finals. The others were Hal Ratcliff and Clifford McLellan. The Frionans were the three first qualifiers in the games played at Monterey High School. They had one shot in which to make a free throw, and each one made their shot.

In the finals, each contestant again took turns shooting free throws. As each one missed a shot, they were out of the competition. Preston hit free throws on four

consecutive rounds, and was the only one left. (By mistake, he was allowed three shots in his qualifying round, and made all three shots. Thus, he was seven for seven in his competition).

The final competition was held during the halftime break of the boys' championship game at the Caprock tourney. A second prize of a video recorder was also awarded by the ABC.

The Prestons have two daughters involved in basketball at Friona High School, so they attend their share of games. Sindy is a member of the Squaws' varsity, and Susie is on the freshman team.

Both of the Preston girls are involved in tournaments this weekend, the varsity at Abernathy, and the freshmen at Dimmitt. "We have six games this weekend. At Lubbock, we saw all of Friona's (five) games, plus some other games," said Preston, an indication that the tournament prize will go to some bona-fide basketball fans.

Preston was a high school basketball player at Shallowater High School. There were no warm-up shots allowed in the free-throw competition.

The grand prize trip was arranged by Aztec Travel Agency of Lubbock.

For their last non-district action, both the Chieftains and Squaws are entered this weekend in the Abernathy Invitational Tournament.

The varsity teams both won their opening games at the Abernathy tournament Thursday evening. Both of these games were played at Hale Center.

The Chieftains won over Plainview JV, 67-62, for their fourth win in a row. The Plainview team had a 13-2 season record, so was not to be taken lightly. In fact, Plainview had a 12-point lead at the half, 33-21. Then, Friona rallied to take a 12-point lead of their own in the third quarter.

The Squaws won their game over Abernathy JV, 55-23, to run their season record to 16-3. They were to meet Hale Center, which had a 7-11 record, at 4 p.m. Friday, with an eye toward the Abernathy-Tulia winner.

The Chiefs were meeting Tulia, 16-5 on the season, and will meet the winner/loser of the Littlefield/Abernathy game in Saturday's action.

Deaf Smith REC Is Free Of REA Debt

Local patrons of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative can expect an increase in their capital credit payments after the REC relieved itself of its debt to the Rural Electrification Administration December 30.

The REC, which serves a large portion of Castro, as well as Deaf Smith and Parmer Counties, took advantage of a new law that allows REA borrowers to prepay the outstanding balance on their REA notes at a discount. Deaf Smith is one of just two RECs to take advantage of the one-year offer, and received a 30.6 per cent discount on its debt of \$9.7 million plus interest.

"We determined, after a financial study, that this action was in the best interests of the members of the cooperative," said Board Chairman Eldred Brown. "Some people say we are a wheeling-dealing cooperative, but we try to take advantage of situations like this where we can cut down on the cost of electricity for our members."

"Electricity costs will not be lowered, but there will be increased capital credit payments in the near future," said James Hull, DSREC president and general manager. "We would be remiss if we did not take advantage of a chance to write off \$3 million in debt."

Hull explained the action would reduce debt payments, provide relief from REA regulations and requirements, and increase the

DSREC equity. In order to pay the \$6.6 million owed to REA, the REC used funds it had saved over the years and a loan from the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corp. (CFC).

"For future needs we have the CFC, which is owned by all of the cooperatives in the country and is free of government control," Hull said. Hull said freedom from the REA would mean the REC would not have to meet certain government requirements, and said REA would have forced DSREC to spend \$2 million in the near future to replace some existing lines which Hull said "are sufficient and should best be left alone...No changes are anticipated, and our line construction and safety standards will remain the same."

"We're not mad or unhappy with the REA," said Anthony Acker, a board member from Nazareth, "but it's an economic move designed to save dollars for the members of this cooperative." Hull said it was not known how much the capital credit payments would increase because of the action. Patrons of DSREC receive capital credit payments annually based on the profit made by the cooperative and the amount of electricity used by each patron.

Brown and Hull explained Congress enacted the law last October 21, but the bill did not go into effect until December 30, and DSREC, which had been studying

the bill for some time, decided to go ahead with the plan immediately to avoid possible tax penalties that could be imposed by the new tax laws, which went into effect January 1.

Farm Seminar Set Locally

"Farm Decisions for 1987" is the title of a seminar to be held on January 15 in the Friona Community Center. Specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will present programs ranging from Russian aphids to computers, to wheat rust and fertilizer in 1987.

All area farmers are invited to attend the meeting which will begin at 9:30 a.m. and conclude at noon. The Parmer County Extension Service is sponsoring the event.

Speakers will include Dr. Pat Morrison, Extension entomologist who will speak on insecticides for 1987 and the Russian wheat aphid; Dr. Michael Hickey, Extension soil chemist who will speak on soil testing and the TAES soils laboratory.

Martin Chandler, County ASCS director, will give an overview of the 1987 Farm Program and Jackie Smith, Extension economist will discuss computer decision-aids for the 1987 farm program. Dr. Harold Kauffman, Extension pathologist, will discuss wheat rust and other disease problems

Courtroom Dedicated

A dedication ceremony for the newly-remodeled 287th District Courtroom at the Parmer County Courthouse was held Tuesday.

District Judge Jack Young opened the ceremony and introduced the guest speaker, Judge John Thomas Boyd, Associate Justice of the Court of Appeals in Amarillo.

Boyd had served on the trial bench for 64 years in Plainview. He has served five years on the Court of Appeals. His first case that he ever tried was in Parmer County's courtroom.

Boyd commended Young for being recognized as an outstanding trial judge in the United States.

Boyd said the courtroom was important to everyone and that it stands for a rule of law, which sets man apart from the barbarians. He reminded us that the colors in the flags remind us that we live under a rule of law.

Boyd spoke about the right to have a trial by jury. He said that out of 170 countries only 9 have such trials.

After the dedication speech, Young presented a painting print of the Parmer County Court House to Boyd in appreciation for his delivering the dedication speech.

Young recognized the painting contractor, Larry Price; the carpenter, George Servantius and the contractor, Jay Sherrill of Bovina for the work they did in remodeling the courtroom.

Young also presented the members of the commissioners court a special plaque of recognition for the contributions they made to help with the remodeling.

Young recognized Dolly Aldridge as an honored guest.

Hugh Moseley gave the benediction. Refreshments were served.

The courtroom was remodeled after part of the ceiling gave way last December.

Court OKs Investment Of Money Ratcliff Is Chosen To Team

At the December 22 meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners, re-investment of certificate of deposit funds was a main item of business.

The court voted unanimously to re-invest money from a \$200,000 farm to market CD, maturing December 31, 1986, into a certificate of \$150,000 maturing March 31, 1987, and \$50,000 was transferred into the checking account.

County Clerk Bonnie Warren asked that money be put into the 1987 budget to purchase a computer for some of her records, including payroll and accounts payable. A motion was passed to purchase the machine for the clerk's office.

Friona Squaws' senior post-center Ronda Ratcliff was chosen to the all-tournament team selected at the close of Lubbock's ABC Holiday Basketball Tournament, according to Coach Vicki Hatton.

In the five tournament games, Miss Ratcliff scored 73 points, averaging 14.6 for the season. At the present time, after 18 games, Ronda is standing seventh on the top ten scorers' list in the South Plains area, with 137 points and a 7.6 scoring average.

Miss Ratcliff also ranks eighth in the area in rebounds, averaging 7.6 rebounds per game.

The Squaws won the tournament's consolation championship, winning four games after losing to Abernathy in their opening-round game.

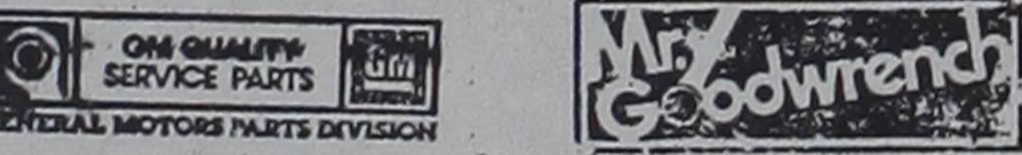



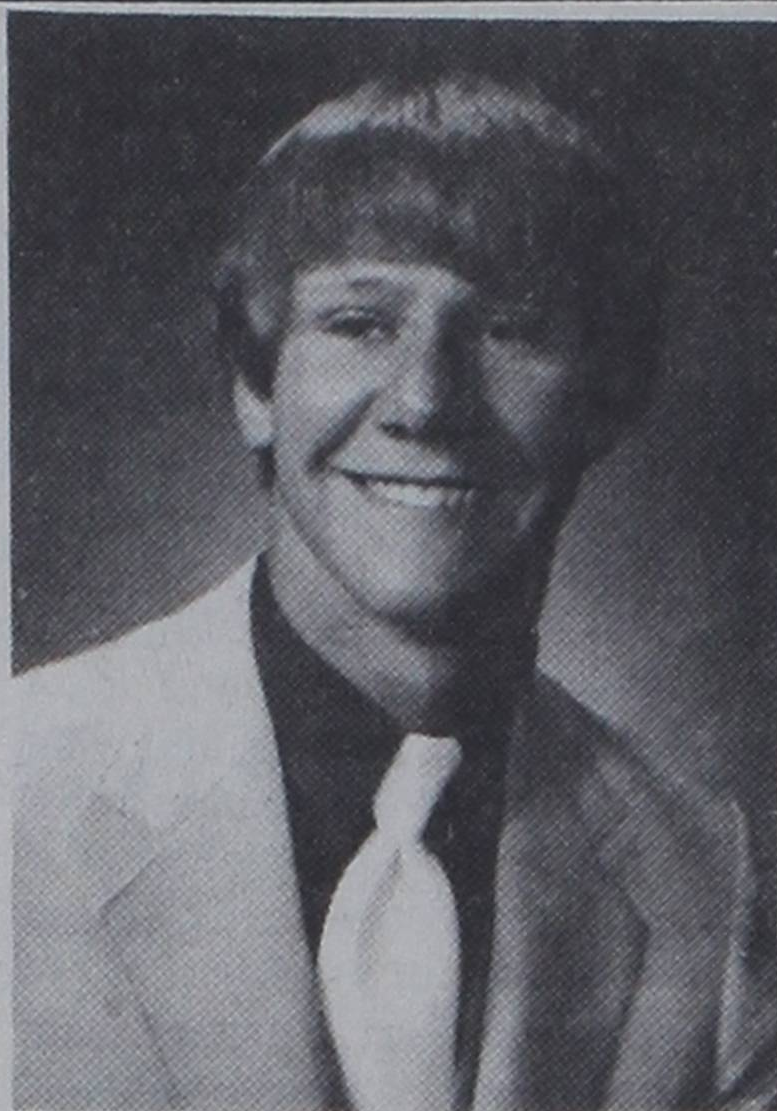

Ushers were Kerry Pratt of Floydada and Anthony Garza of Lubbock.

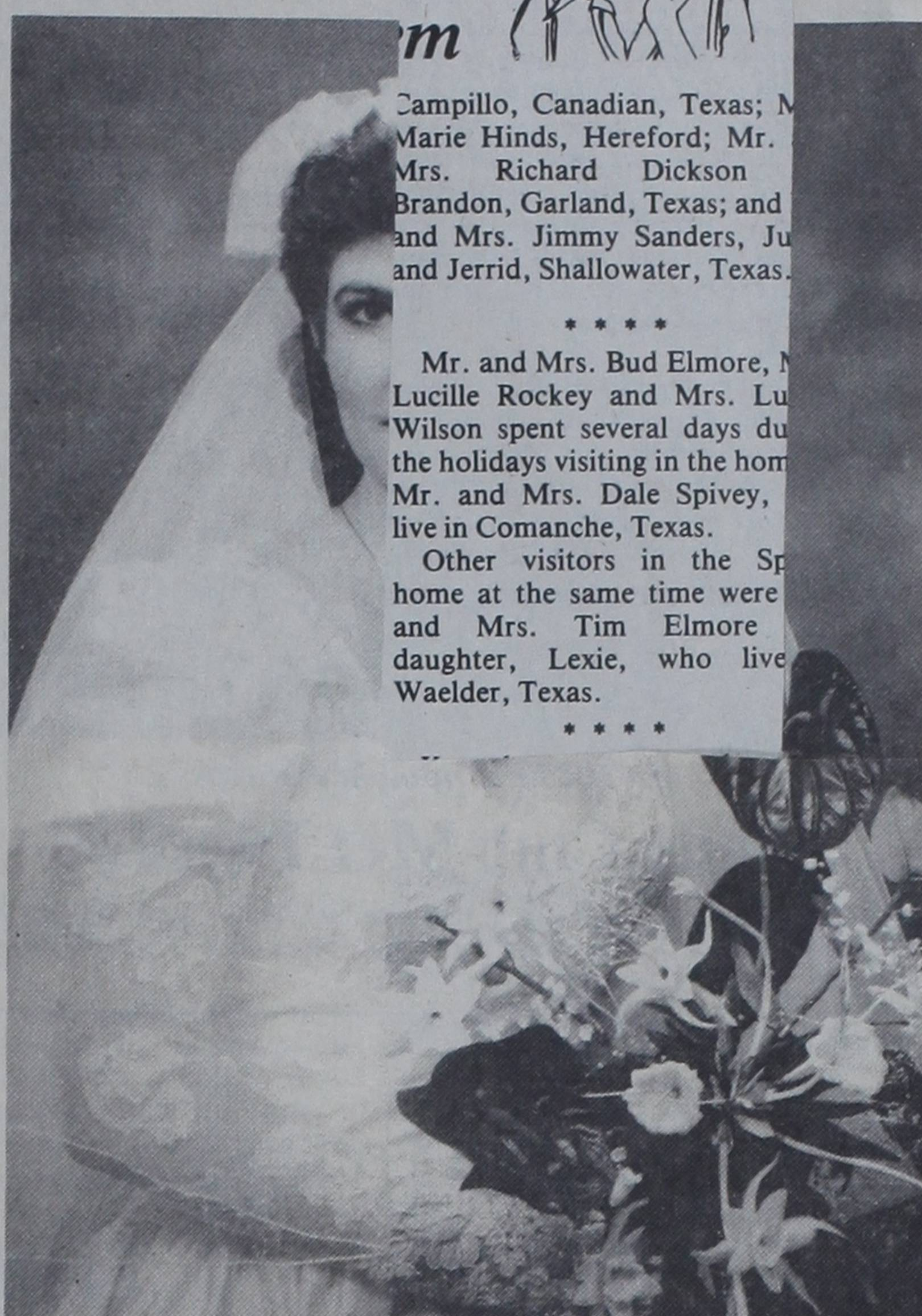

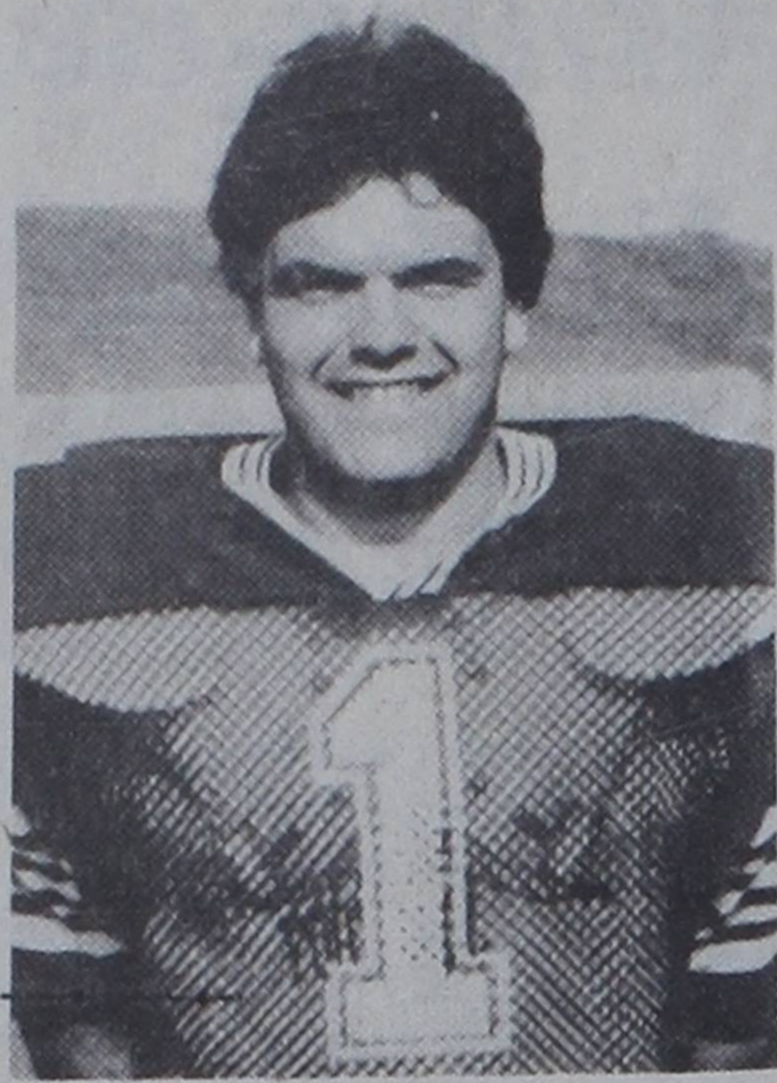
Montoya Is Honored
