Chiefs In Ruidoso Event

The FHS Chieftains' track and field team has an unusual Easter weekend meet on Friday, in--of all places--Ruidoso, New Mexico.

The Chiefs were issued an invitation to participate in the meet by former FHS coach Mike Spech, coach at the New Mexico school.

Coach Steve Williams said that the seven boys who have qualified for the regional meet, plus the four who are regional alternates, will be making the trip to Ruidoso.

Coach Williams said he expected the Chieftains to be in for some tough competition, against class AAA New Mexico schools, including the host team and such Eastern New Mexico schools as Portales and Lovington.

However, the Chieftains carry some pretty impressive credentials themselves, including a 15-foot vaulter (Rod Britting), a 6-8 high jumper (Shy Burney), a mile relay foursome bent on breaking the school record of 3:22, and a quarter-miler (Daniel Echols) who can break the 50-second mark if he manages to be 100 per cent healthy.

Seven Chieftains Qualify For Event

The Friona Chieftain track and field team, beset by a week of bad luck, still qualified seven individuals and a relay team to the regional meet as a result of the District 2-AAA meet last weekend in Tulia.

Rod Britting paced the qualifiers by clearing 15 feet (improving his own school record) in winning the pole vault. Britting already had the best vault of the season in the area, and improved that by a full foot.

His mark is just six inches below the area's all-time best of 15-6. He tried three times with the bar set at 15-7, but couldn't quite make that mark. He had cleared 15 feet on his first attempt.

The Chieftains swept the pole vault, with Sam Montoya grabbing the other regional spot with a 12-6 leap. Albert Trevino also cleared 12-6, but had to settle for third place and regional alternate with more misses than Montoya.

Friona's 1600-meter relay team breezed to a win with a time of 3:27.9. The foursome consists of Toby Gibson, Stephen Thornton, Cody Bracken and Daniel Echols.

Echols also won the 400-meter dash with a time of 51.1, after causing some anxiousness while pulling up with a muscle cramp in the 400-meter relay race earlier in the day.

Shy Burney placed second in the high jump, losing out to Dimmitt's Alexander due to missing his first attempt at 6-8. Both jumpers cleared the 6-8 mark. Burney still earned a ticket to the regional meet.

Toby Gibson also qualified for regional in the 200-meter dash with a 23.1 time.

Discus thrower Daniel Padilla hurled the platter 147-1, and had the disappointment of missing the regional meet by a mere two inches, having to settle for third place in the meet.

Cody Burney won an alternate's spot in the high jump, clearing 6-4 for third place. Shy Burney is district alternate in the long jump, with a leap of 20-5.

Lance Gatlin earned the other alternate's role in the 110-yard high hurdles, with a 15.9 time.

Jeff Chaney was fourth in both the shot put and discus throw. He had a 46-4 in the shot and a 141-9 in the discus.

Echols was fourth in the high jump, clearing 6-4. John Ed Duke placed fifth in the 3200-meter run, with a time of 11:14.

The 400-meter relay team (Lonnie Phillips, Toby Gibson, Stephen Thornton and Echols) placed fifth after Echols, the anchorman, suffered his muscle spasm.

Glenn Trimmell placed sixth in the 800-meter run at 2:11. Cody Bracken was fifth in the 200-meter dash at 23.7.

Stephen Thornton, a favorite to win district, fell down in the preliminaries of the 300-meter hurdles, and failed to make the finals. Peter Malouf had tripped on a hurdle during a practice session earlier in the week, re-injuring his knee, and this slowed him down for the meet. The team was hoping for 14-16 points in this race, and had to settle for none.

Also, sophomore distance runner Jerry Lafuente turned up sick on meet day, and did not place in his specialty, the 3200-meter run. If he could have run his previous best time of the season, it would have qualified for regional.

"We lost the team title by 20 points, and if we hadn't had the bad luck on these three events (400 relay, hurdles, 3200), we could have won," said Coach Steve Williams. "However, the ones that qualified for regional all have a chance to make it to the state meet," the Chieftain coach added.

The Chiefs scored 115 points for second place in the meet. Tulia won the title with 136 points.

Squaws Qualify For Regional Events

The Friona Squaws qualified six girls for the regional meet in four individual events and one relay,

during the District 2-3A meet last Friday and Saturday in Tulia.

The Squaws' 1600-meter relay team (Sindy Preston, Ronda Ratcliff, Dara Wells and Michelle Echols) won their event with a time of 4:17.03.

Miss Ratcliff also won the high jump, equalling her school record of 5-4, and she placed second in the 400-meter dash with a time of 63.38, qualifying for regional in that event.

Lacye Osborn won the 800-meter run in a time of 2:29, to win district in this event for the third straight year.

Sophomore Sindy Preston won the 200-meter dash with a time of 28.03, for the other regional spot.

The Squaws scored 14 points in the 400-meter dash. In addition to Miss Ratcliff's silver medal, Miss Echols placed fourth and Miss Wells placed fifth.

Friona's 800-meter relay team, consisting of Cindy Ureste, Staci Mueller, Misti Cole and Julie Howard, placed sixth.

Kerri Parker placed sixth for the team in the 3200-meter run. Dana Auburg placed seventh in the 110-meter hurdles.

Miss Howard placed seventh in the discus throw and was seventh in the 100-meter dash.

As a team, the Squaws scored 71½ points, good for fourth place behind Floydada, Muleshoe and Dimmitt.

The girls will enter a regional qualifiers' meet the weekend after Easter. Their regional meet will be May 1-2 in Odessa.

Crash Kills 20-Year-Old

A 20-year-old Cannon Air Force Base woman was killed early Monday morning in a car-truck crash near the Black community, six miles northeast of Friona on U.S. Highway 60.

AIC Renee Endrea Annis was enroute from Cannon AFB to catch a plane at Amarillo International Airport at the time of the wreck. She was on leave, and was travelling home to visit her family in Hollis, Maine.

Investigating officers blamed high winds as a possible cause of the accident. Miss Annis' vehicle somehow was sideways of the highway on the wrong side of the road when it was hit by a westbound cattle truck.

At the time of the accident, the wind was blowing very strongly out of the north and a light rain was falling.

The area around Black on Highway 60 is noted for having bad wind currents. It is one of the danger spots on the busy two-lane stretch of the highway.

Miss Annis entered the Air Force in September of 1984. She had been assigned to Cannon Air Force Base's hospital since February of 1986 as a radiologist specialist in the X-ray clinic.

Her small (Nissan) car was completely demolished, and had to be brought back to Friona on a trailer.

Weather For Week Is Topsy-Turvey

Residents of the Friona area have been treated to a round of topsy-turvy weather during the past week.

In a five-day period starting with Saturday, April 11, the temperature hit the 80 degree mark, then on Monday fell into the 30s, with high winds pushing the chill factor to around zero. By Wednesday, the mercury had again climbed to the 80-degree mark.

A light rain, with reports of light snowflakes, accompanied the bone-chilling wind of Monday. The north wind blew steadily all day, making outside activities uncomfortable.

Tuesday was again a windy day, with the mercury climbing into the 60s, and then Wednesday was a beautiful day, with very little wind along with the summerlike temperatures.

Street Bids Surprise Officials

City Manager Beelee Goodwin said this week that bids had been received by the City for the five blocks of paving in the south part of town.

The bids were low enough that by using the available grant money, the city will be able to include the block of Woodland between third and fourth streets, which had been excluded due to funding earlier.

"We hope to begin construction on the project by the middle of May, with completion expected by the middle of June," Goodwin said.

55 YEARS AGO—MARCH 25, 1932

L.G. Simpson, city water superintendent, is quite busy this week setting water meters for water users who have no meters. It is the plan of the city commission to place all water patrons of the city under meter service just as rapidly as is possible.

45 YEARS AGO—MARCH 20, 1942

The Regal Theatre, which has been closed for the past three months, will be re-opened Friday night and will continue with a regular picture show program four nights each week, with matinees on Saturday and Sunday afternoons, Ray Landrum, owner of the theatre, announces.

Lee Spring, son of Mr. and Mrs. F.L. Spring of Friona, made the fall semester honor roll at Texas Tech with an average grade of A, according to a press release from the Lubbock College.

40 YEARS AGO—MARCH 21, 1947

The official staff of the Parmer County Community Hospital, which included physician and nurses, was host to the people of Friona and surrounding communities, by holding open house at the hospital from 4 until 8 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, when the public is invited to attend and be shown through the building. Dr. R.C. Stokes, whom our people are learning to know and love, is the head of the hospital's medical department.

35 YEARS AGO—MARCH 20, 1952

Another cotton gin will be located in the Friona area, according to reports being circulated this week. Two Burkburnett men were in the Hub vicinity this week, and they told farmers of the area that they had purchased 20 acres one mile south of Hub, and would commence construction of a new gin within two weeks. The men were H.A. Mills and G.W. Fleming.

30 YEARS AGO—MARCH 14, 1957

Tom Atkins of Farwell joined the staff of the Parmer County sheriff's department on Monday

of this week. The announcement was made by Sheriff Chas. Lovelace, who says that Atkins will serve as deputy sheriff. He is the first full-time deputy sheriff ever hired in the county.

Billy Nichols began his duties as agriculturist at the Friona State Bank this week. He will act as a consultant for farmers and will make on-the-spot inspections. For the past several years he has been engaged in farming near Sentinel, Oklahoma.

25 YEARS AGO—MARCH 22, 1962

A giant Air Force weather balloon ended its fluttering plunge to earth in the wheat fields of Russell O'Brian, ten miles west of Hub, last Friday. The balloon is reported to have been released by Holloman AFB at Alamogordo, N.M. Lloyd Chesher, O'Brian's son-in-law, was the first to spot the balloon. He said he at first thought it was a parachute falling to earth, but could not see a man attached.

The hostess, Martha Russell, served refreshments to nine members and five guests.

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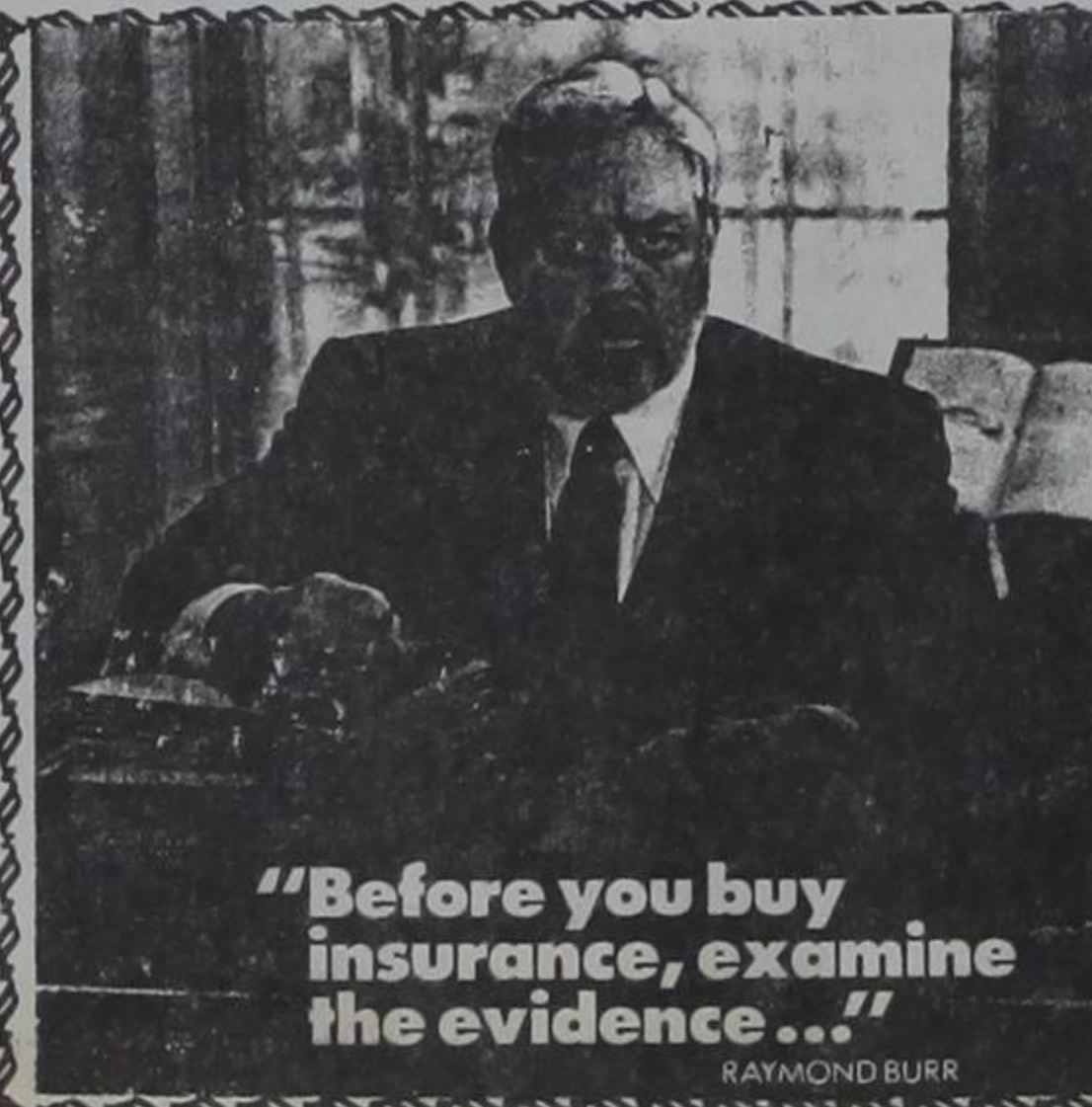

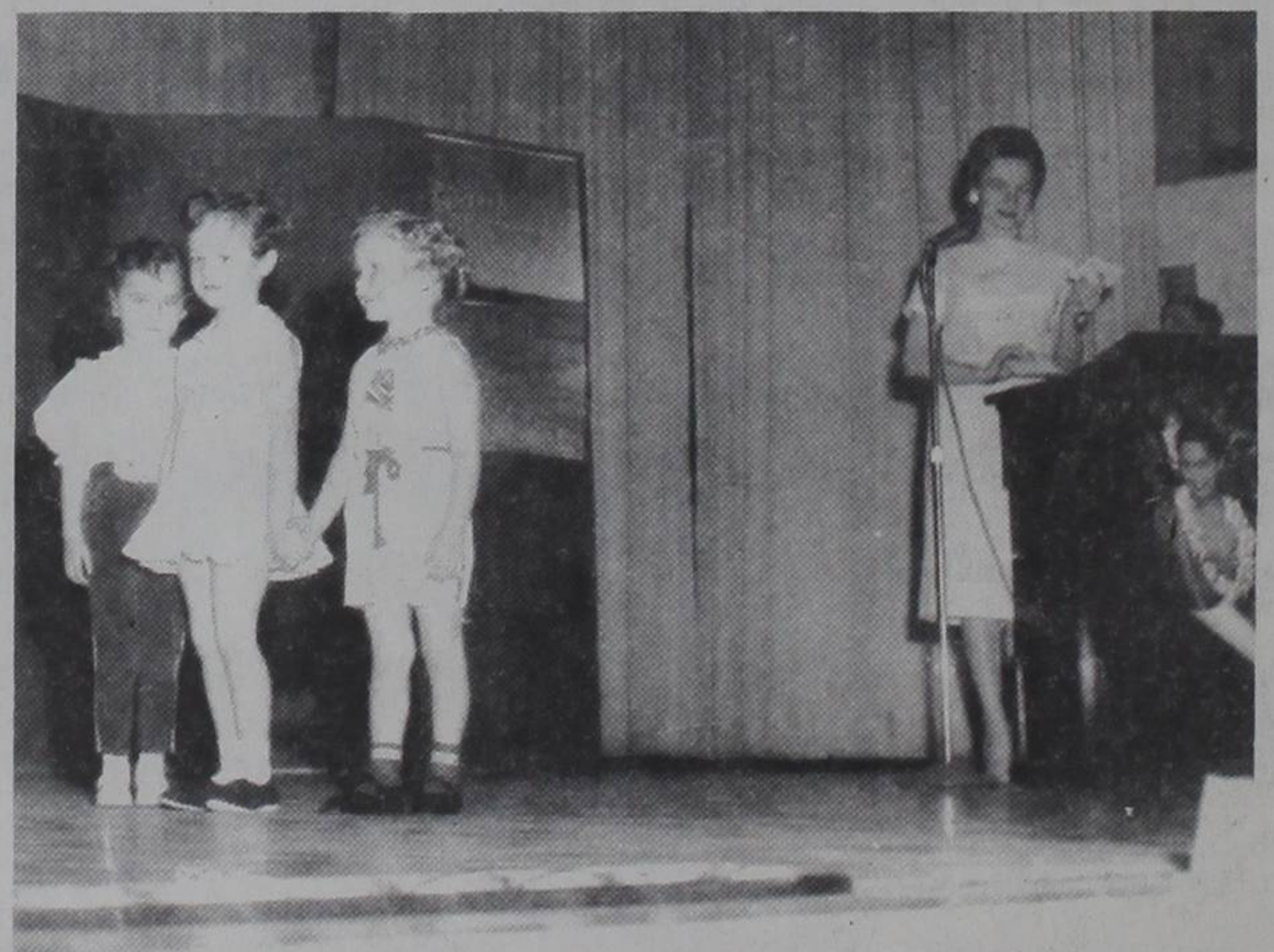
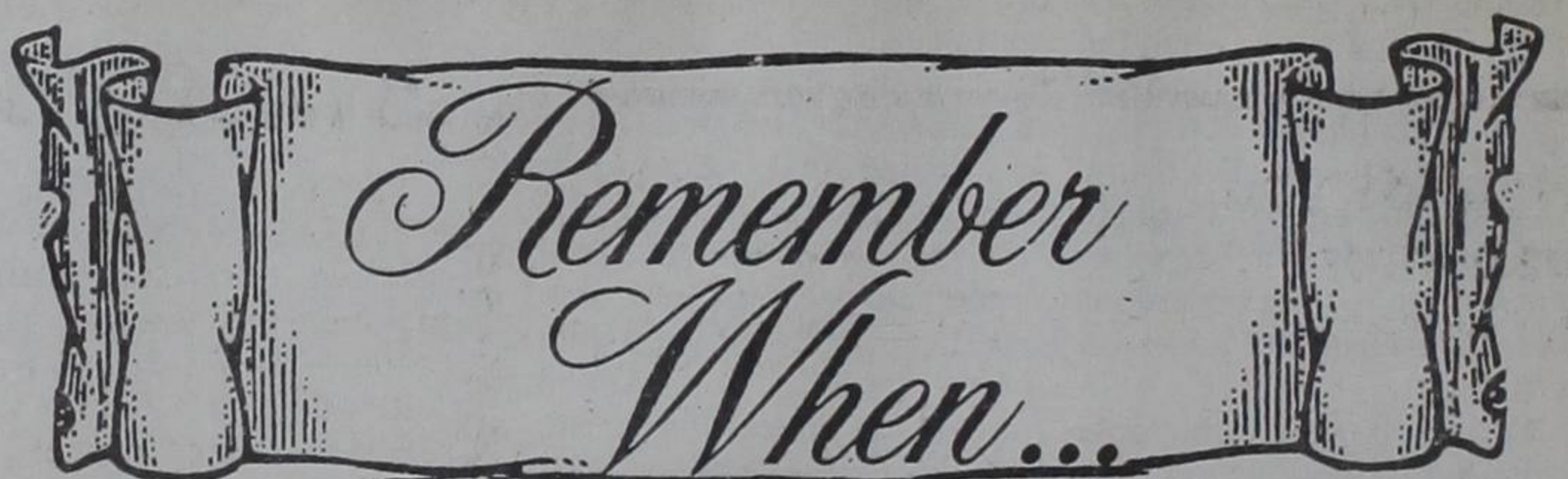

The Friona American Legion Post 206 and Auxiliary has experienced a "first" in the Boys' State and Girls' State programs for 1987.

Delegates from all four schools in Parmer County—Friona, Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie—are represented at both Boys' State and Girls' State for 1987. "This is really an accomplishment," says Ralph Taylor, Boys' State chairman, and Geneva Williams, Girls' State chairman. "We have had girls from all schools once, but not both boys and girls."

Delegates from Friona will be Kellianne Coffey and Reese Hand; Bovina, Ruby Renteria and Steve Gauntt; Farwell, Dee Anne Ray and Damon George and Lazbuddie, Amy Denise Daniel and Steve Bradshaw.

The purpose of Boys' State and Girls' State is to educate our young people on rights and responsibilities of American citizenship. Its purpose is to awaken within the youth of our nation a sincere conviction that a well-informed, intelligent, participating citizenry is most vitally needed to protect and preserve our American institutions and our American democracy.

It is a mythical 51st state where, for a period, the citizens of Boys' State and Girls' State organize their own city, county and state governments. They choose their own officials in accordance with regular election procedure.

They learn the duties of the various city, county and state offices. They introduce and debate their own bills in a legislature. Justice is administered by their own law enforcement agencies and courts. These delegates "learn by doing."

The boys attend the University of Texas campus for a seven-day period and the girls attend Texas Lutheran College, Seguin, for ten

days. These delegates will experience a lot of "firsts" in their lives—some have never flown in an airplane; some have never been away from home for very long and these programs truly teach these young people "learning by doing."

The people who direct Boys' State and Girls' State are strictly volunteer people who enjoy working with young people. To attend these programs only junior or third year students in a high school are eligible to attend and this is a one-time affair. They can never go back as a delegate—but may be invited back as a junior counselor.

One former Boys' State citizen, Shane Woodard, has worked with Boys' State for the last several years as a counselor. Another opportunity open for these delegates is Boys' and Girls' Nation. Two citizens will be elected from each—Boys' State and Girls' State—to attend Boys' and Girls' Nation. They will assemble in Washington, D.C. and establish a Mythical National government. These citizens are chosen by the staff of Boys' and Girls' State.

The American Legion and Auxiliary has participated in this program since 1951 and each time it is very rewarding to see our young people realize their responsibilities because of this program, says Geneva Williams, Girls' State chairman.

These young people are available to any club or organization who might like to have them appear at their meetings to give their experience and ideas of Boys' State and Girls' State.

Lewis Gore is the local Post commander and Ralph Taylor is the adjutant. Marlene Drake is president of the local Auxiliary and Mildred Mingus is secretary-treasurer. Geneva Williams is Girls' State chairman.

records. Now in its seventh year, the Carr Academic Scholarship Program has provided over \$7 million in academic scholarships since the 1981-82 academic year. Awards are based on the students' outstanding academic records and personal achievements.

Several National Merit Scholars, a large number of National Merit finalists, semi-finalists and commended students, and several hundred valedictorians and salutatorians are among the distinguished students who will be attending ASU on Carr Academic Scholarships during 1987-88.

The distinctive scholarship program, created by the late Mr. Carr in 1978, will provide approximately \$1.5 million in academic scholarships during the 1987-88 school year to assist worthy and deserving students to pursue their education at Angelo State University.

Mr. Carr bequeathed to the Board of Regents, Texas State University System, for the use of Angelo State, all his interest in oil, gas and other minerals with the provision that these properties be held in trust for the establishment of the Carr Academic Scholarship Program.

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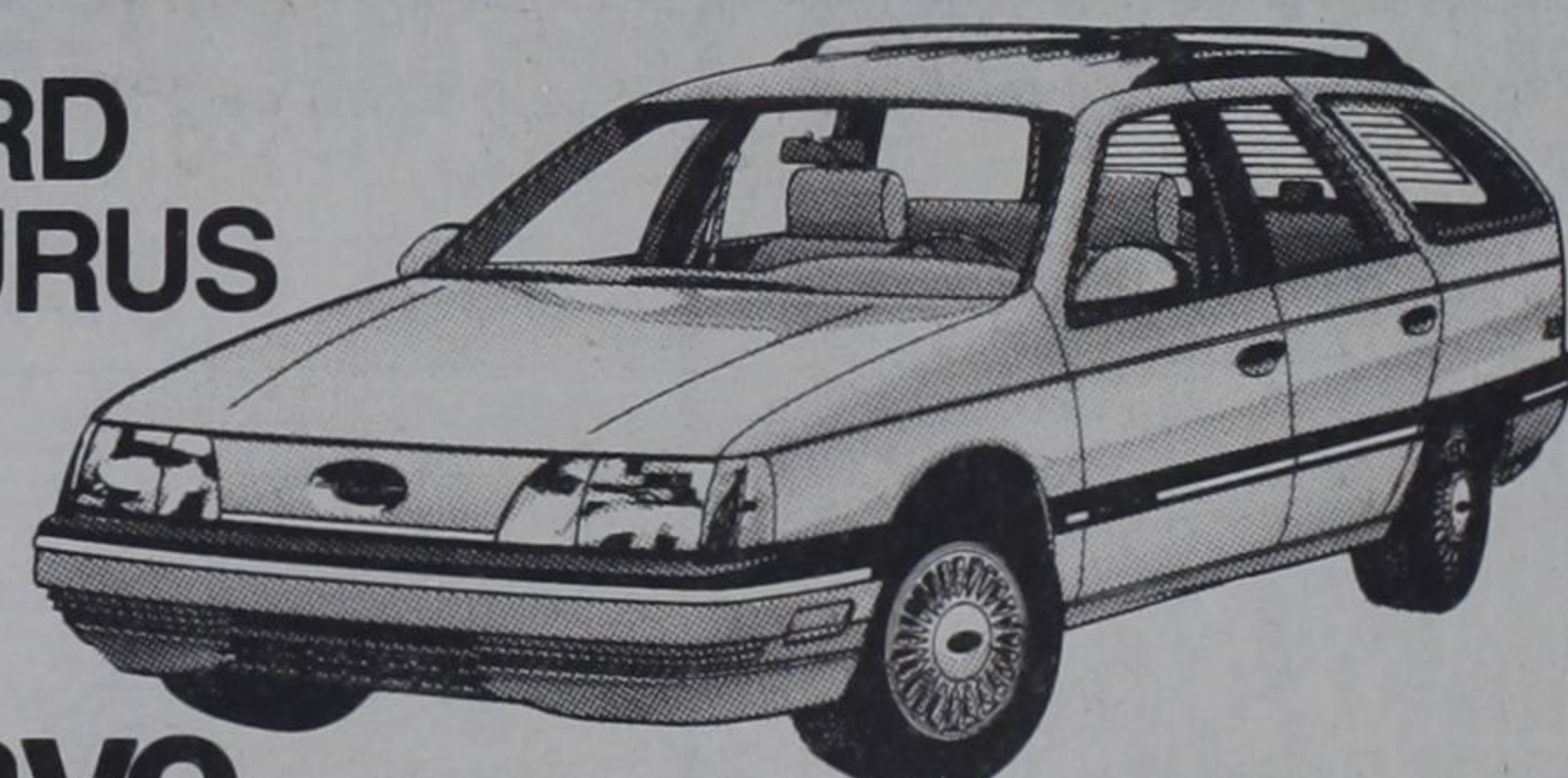


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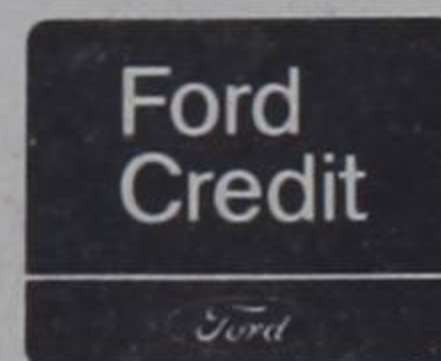
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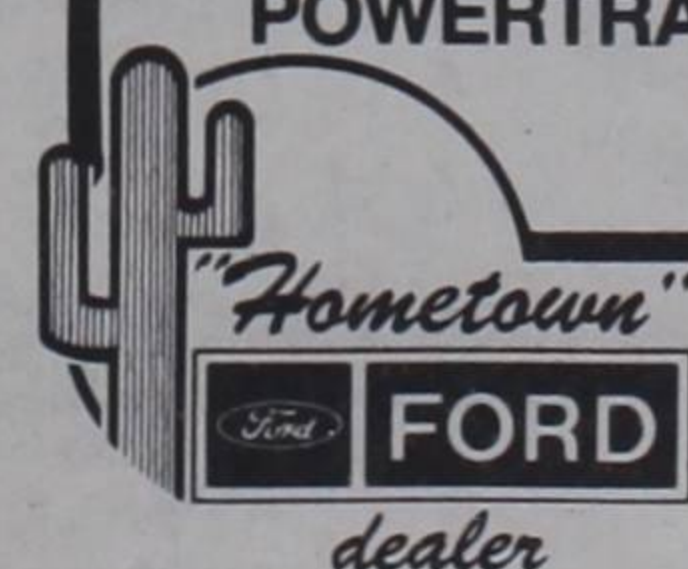
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Church Ceremony Unites Kayle Britting, Randy Dean
