FHS Athletes Place At State

IS NOTHING SACRED from the Supreme Court? Recently the nation's highest court ruled that Rotary Clubs must admit women.

This was the result of nine years of litigation, in which the Supreme Court rejected the concept of Rotary as a "private men's club."

Within a week of the court's decision regarding Rotary, the area's Lions Clubs have received instructions from their International headquarters advising them to admit women if any wish to join. Apparently, the Lions would rather switch than fight.

But the court's decision may change the entire concept of some of our civic clubs. There have always been men's clubs such as Lions and Rotary, and women's clubs. Most of the men we know wouldn't want to join a woman's club, and likewise, most women would rather find a club of her own that she could attend and support.

Most Rotarians have been upset about the Supreme Court's ruling. One angrily predicted that the Boy Scouts would be the next institution to be challenged by the female invasion. "You take a bunch of fellows and you drop a woman in the middle and there is a chemical change," said Rotary International president-elect Charles Keller.

The decision came due to a small Rotary Club in California which decided to admit women, so as not to lose their club, whose membership had dwindled to eight. That set off the fight within the Rotary organization which eventually led to the Supreme Court having to serve as referee.

Will men attempt to invade the all-female service groups? If so, they may have a fight on their hands. Several all-female organizations, including Altrusa International, Pilot and Zonta, have warned the Supreme Court that they want men to stay out of their organizations, to "preserve their character, intent and identity."

As president of the Friona Evening Lions, ye editor was reading the recommendation from Lions International to our local members, in regard to admitting women if they attempted to join.

It was pointed out that our Lions Clubs have their club sweethearts, and have had for quite some time. It was suggested that perhaps the sweetheart could serve as a club's "token female," to satisfy the Supreme Court.

Mac Fields Endorsed For Spot

Members of the Friona Fire Department attended the Panhandle Firemen and Fire Marshalls' convention in Amarillo last weekend.

Friona's candidate for state mascot, Mac Fields, was endorsed by the organization. The state firemen's convention will be held in Amarillo next month.

Friona's three-man pumper team placed first in the pumper competition. Members are John Taylor, Jimmy Taylor and Randy Richards.

The ladies' three-man team placed second. They are Donice Jones, Judy Martin and Lou Fields.

The men's six-man team placed fourth. Members are Steve Jones, John Taylor, Jimmy Taylor, Randy Richards, Danny Campbell and Roger Fields.

All of the pumper teams will be competing in the state contests when the convention is held in Amarillo.

Both FHS athletes competing in the state track and field meet at Austin last weekend won places in their respective events.

Lacye Osborn placed fourth in the 800-meter run, with a time of 2:20.0 and Shy Burney placed fifth in the high jump with a leap of 6-6.

Miss Osborn turned in her best time of the season in her race. She ran a 64.0 first quarter, and the lead runner clocked a 62.0.

Between the 300 meter and 400-meter mark, Lacye attempted to pass a runner, but another competitor cut in front of her, causing her to lose a stride.

She was running in fifth place until the last 20 yards, when she managed a finishing kick to move up a notch for fourth place.

"I was real pleased with Lacye's performance. She worked real hard the two weeks before the state meet. I thought Lacye and Shy (Burney) both represented the school real well," said Coach Vicki Hatton.

The 800-meter race was conducted in the rain, which no doubt kept the times from being better than they could have been.

Lacye's 2:20 timing was her best of the season, and is the second best for the season in the Panhandle region for all classifications,

behind only Canadian's Kim McEntire.

Burney's event began on Saturday morning at 11:30. The weather was ideal--cool and cloudy.

The competition started at the 6-0 mark, and Burney passed that height and also at 6-2.

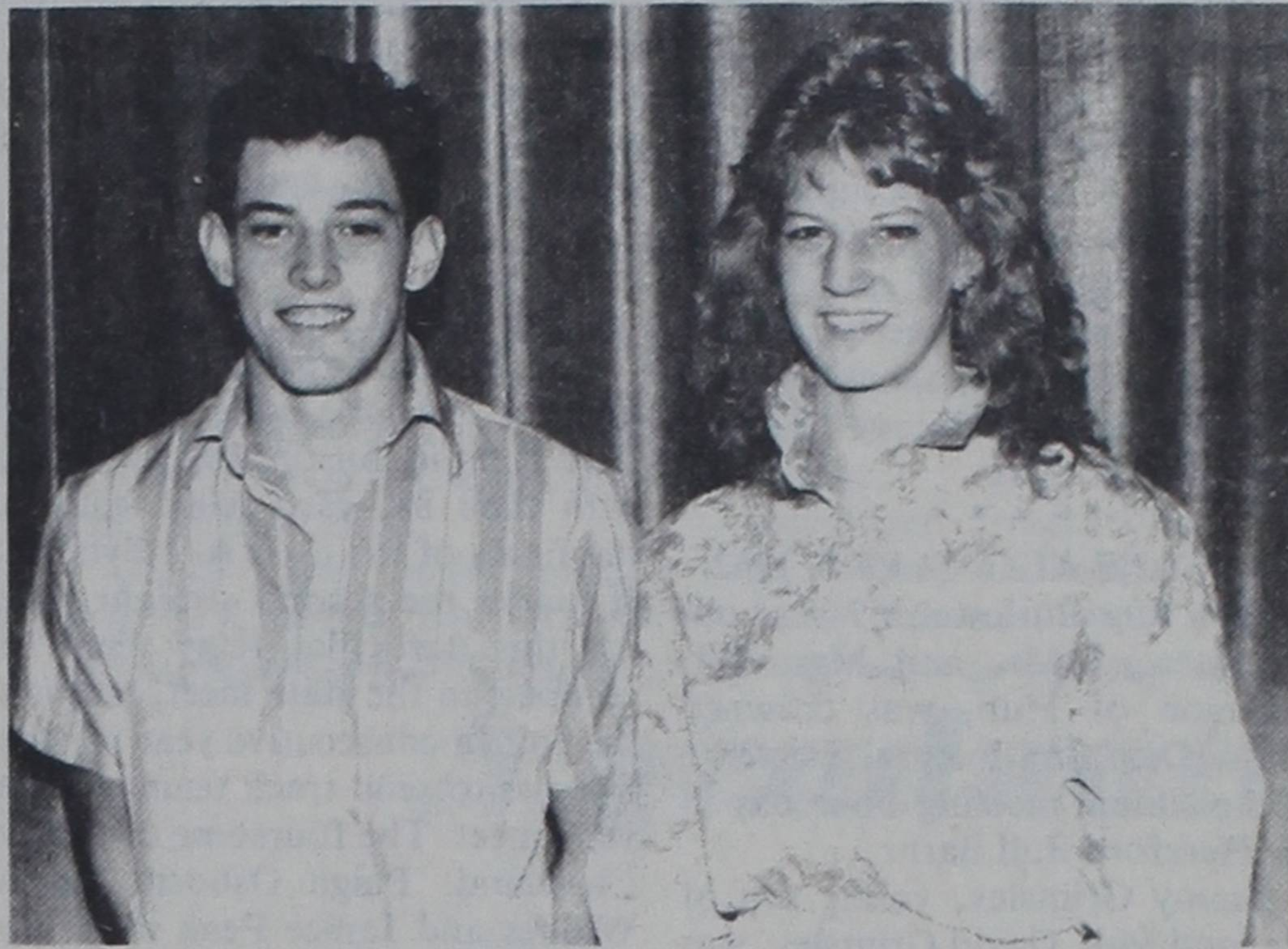
He made his first attempt at the 6-4 mark, and cleared that on his first jump. He did the same at 6-6. By now, three of the jumpers had been eliminated.

With the bar at 6-8, it appeared on each of his three tries that the Chieftain jumper would clear, but each time the bar fell.

"We didn't know what he was hitting the bar with. It looked like he had enough height, but he was brushing the bar with his body on the way over," said Chieftain coach Steve Williams.

"Shy was disappointed that he didn't go higher, but when he realized he was the fifth best jumper in the state, that made him feel better," Williams said.

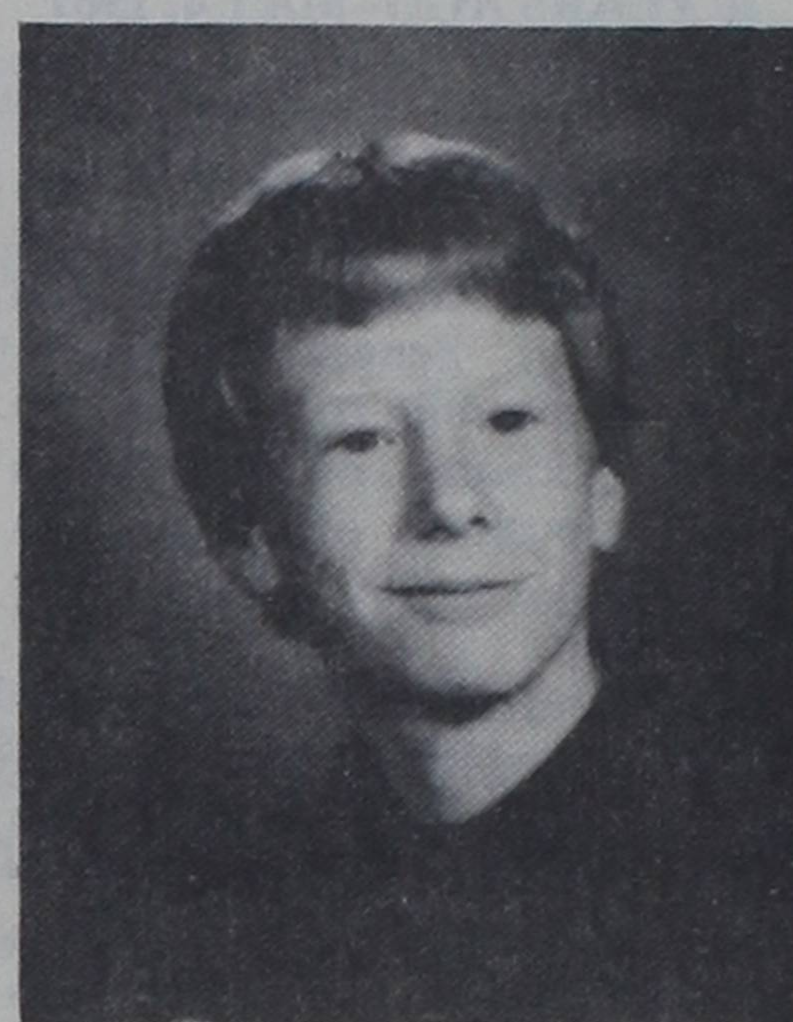
Burney concluded his track career as the school record holder in the high jump, having cleared 6-8.

FHS Boy Has Art Selected

Area Receives Nice Moisture During Week

After a prolonged dry spell, the Friona area has finally received some good moisture during the past week or 10 days.

On Thursday, May 14, the city received .57 inch of rain, and on Saturday, May 16, another .40 inch was received.

Then on Tuesday, May 19, an afternoon shower deposited an even half-inch in town. Another rain was possible, as it was raining lightly early Friday morning.

The rain in the outlying area has varied according to the way you go from town.

The area north of town generally has not received as much rain as has been measured in the city, while the farther south and east you go, the measurements have by and large been more than the city

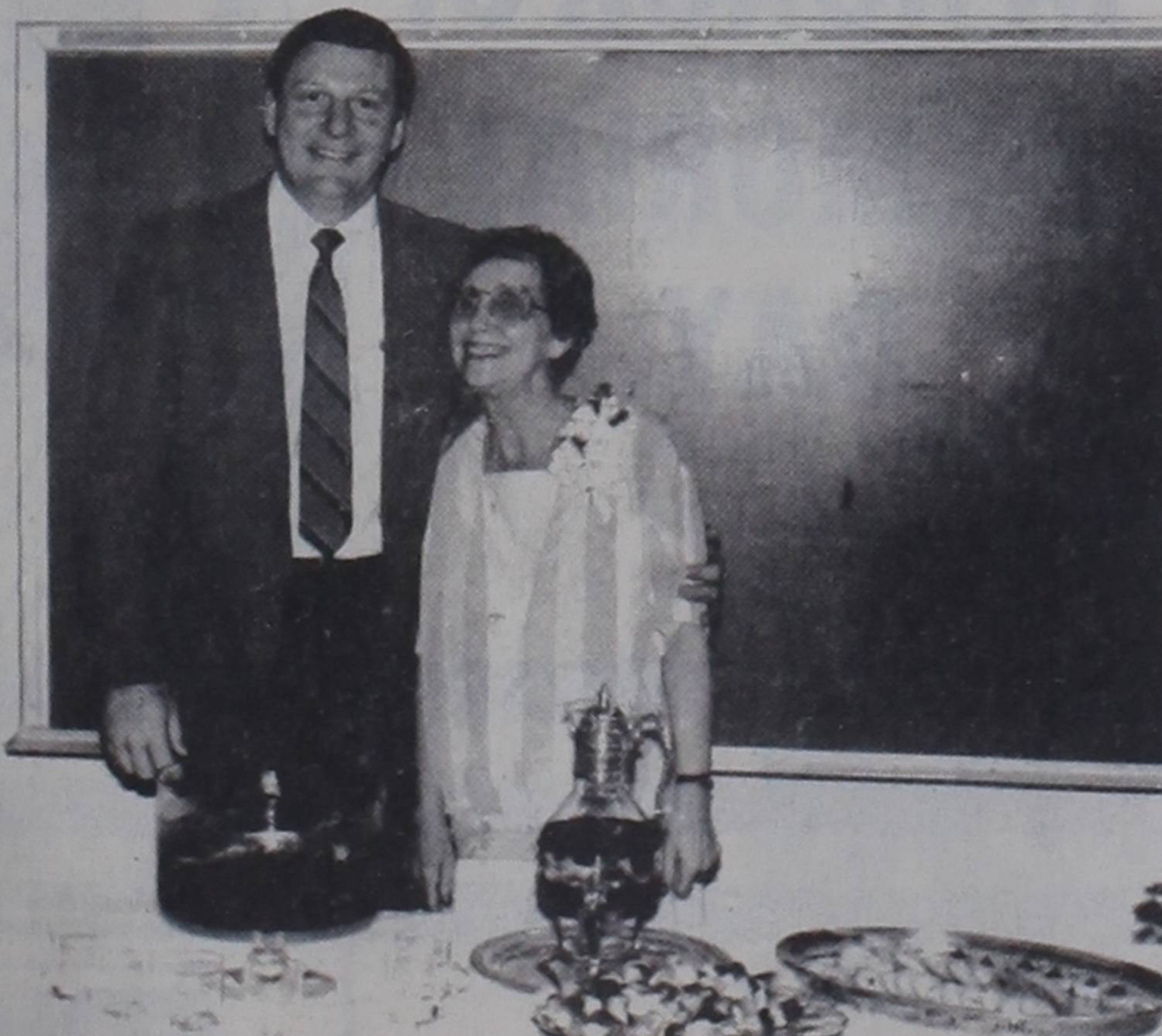
gauges received.

Clarence Monroe said following the Tuesday showers that he had received at least two inches of rain on all of his farmland.

South of the Running Water Draw toward the Lazbuddie community, the rains have been considerably heavier. Lazbuddie was said to have received two inches of rain as of last Saturday, prior to the Tuesday system.

The rains should prove to be a God-send for farmers who have planted or will plant row crops, allowing in most instances enough moisture to get the crops up and off to a good start.

The recent rains also should be a boost to the area's wheat crop, allowing it to add considerably more weight prior to harvest.

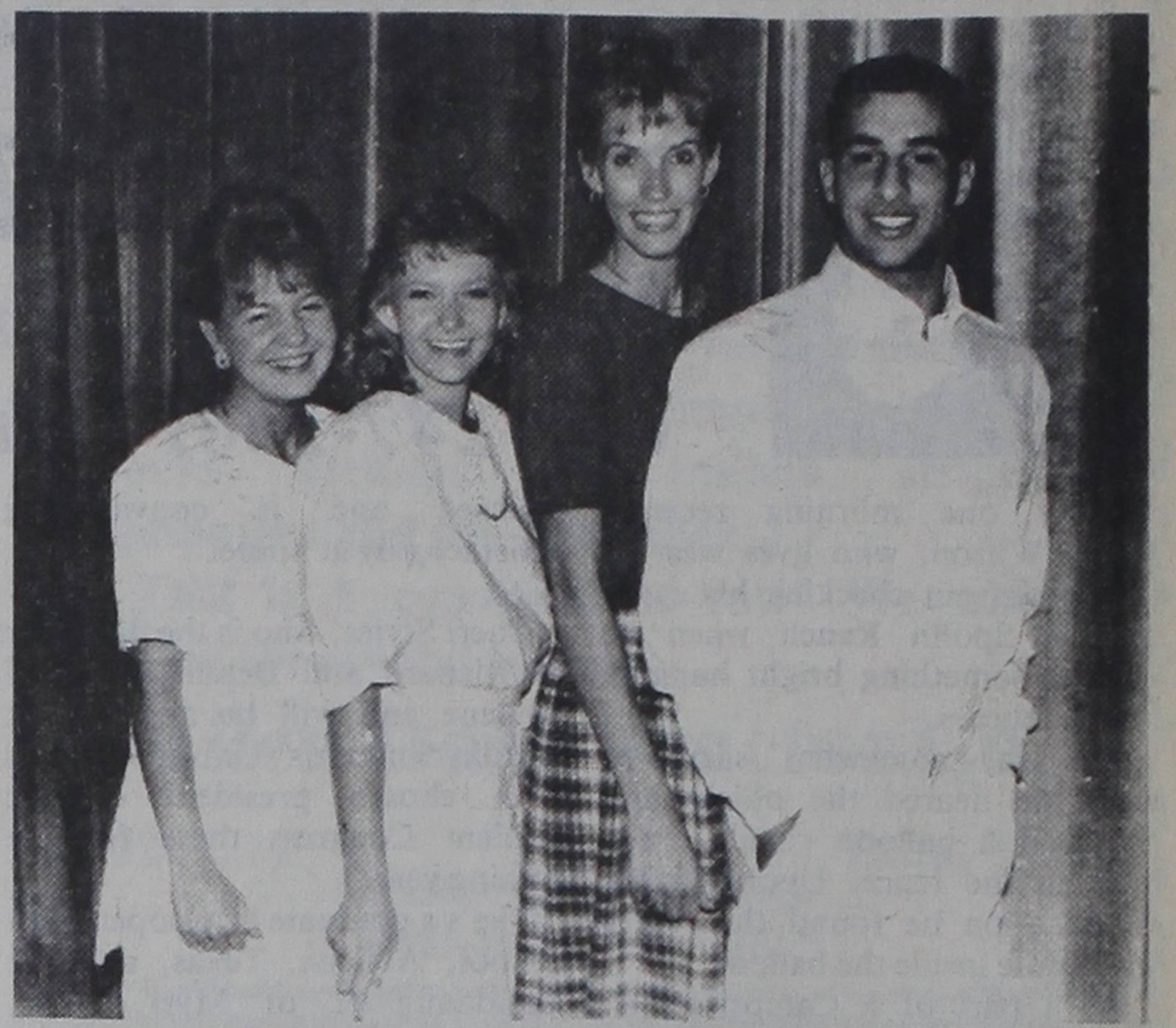

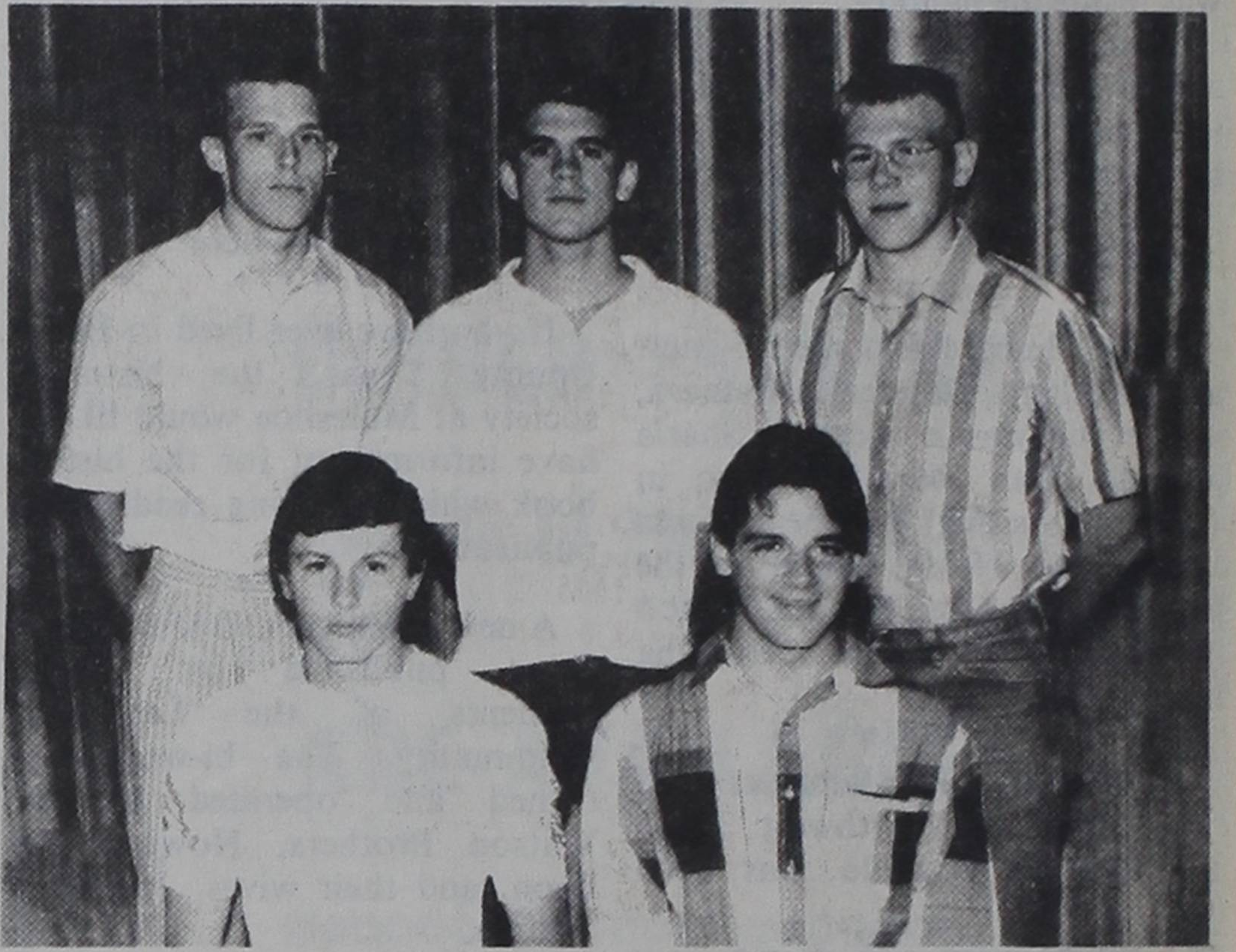
