Instances can be cited where progressive citizens have been ridden to the wall and have lain down. In every case the town has keenly felt the loss of the power and of such men. Public opinion are circulated to benefit citizens and no one may be imposed upon.

If the citizens of Sweetwater refuse to come to the aid of Mr. Crane in this case, action is apt to prove a blow to the progress of the town—Snyder Signal.
