"SUPER TUESDAY" is upon us, and hopefully a large percentage of voters in our city, county and state will turnout to indicate their preferences in the 1988 primary races.

The Super Tuesday concept seems to have proven to be beneficial to the state, if not to the local candidates.

By moving its primary up to an earlier date, Texas seems to have drawn the presidential candidates, who have been in our state for the past couple of weeks, trying to woo the voters.

Previously, by the time Texas had its primary (in May), the delegate race was either decided in favor of one candidate or another, or was so hopelessly messed up that whatever Texas voters did wouldn't change anything.

This, plus the fact that under the old system, Texas' delegates were not decided by the voters when they cast their primary ballots, but were chosen in the cumbersome, confusing precinct conventions.

Personally, I feel that the changing of this situation for Texas voters for 1988 was one of the biggest steps forward the state has made in years. Now, the presidential candidates can be given their delegates according to public opinion. It will actually be determined by who does what on the ballot on election day.

We realize that moving the primary dates up as early as the parties did for 1988 has proven to be somewhat of a hardship on county race candidates, who had a shorter campaign time, as well as having to campaign during the dead of winter.

Yet, having our state as one of the early pace-setters in the presidential primary may prove to be worth this sacrifice on the part of local candidates.

But whether or not our state's leaders decide to stay with the early primary in future years, we definitely want to encourage them to leave the choosing of delegates to the individual voters in the primary elections.

This is one bit of modernizing whose time has come, and to go back to the old method would be more or less like going back to the horse and buggy for transportation.

The division of the party primaries again forces voters to make a choice as to which primary they will participate in. With county nominations on the line, it is a safe assumption that most county voters will vote in the Democratic primary.

However, since a lot of rhetoric has gone into the presidential primary, and since the Democratic candidates have at this point failed to generate the interest among voters as have the Republicans, with the Bush-Dole confrontation, there may be a number of voters choose to participate in the Republican primary.

In fact, the Southern Democrats, who came up with the idea of Super Tuesday so that a conservative Democratic candidate for president could receive a sendoff early in the delegate race, have seen this idea go down the tubes.

About the only Southerner in the Democratic field is Albert Gore, who doesn't have the background for the conservatives to champion.

The main thing is to do your duty on election day. Don't say "My vote won't mean anything." Because this time around, it really does.

THE DECISION this week by Texas Supreme Court Judge W.W. Justice overturning the conviction of Jimmy Paul Vanderbilt for the second time makes it imperative that voters mark the referendum on the Democratic ballot favoring electing judges, rather than having them appointed.

Voters need the right to get mad enough at such ridiculous rulings as this one that they may vote such incompetents out of office.

Voters Poised For "Super Tuesday" Primaries March 8

Polling places have been announced for Parmer County's Democratic and Republican primaries, which are a part of next week's "Super Tuesday" primaries on Tuesday, March 8.

Friona Democrats will vote at the Fire Station (Precinct 2), Calvary Baptist Church (Pct. 2-1) and Community Center (Pct. 2-2). Republicans will vote at Reeve Chevrolet. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on election day.

The precinct conventions for the Democrats will be held at the ten polling places beginning at 7:15 p.m. to elect delegates to the county convention. The county convention will be held at 2 p.m. March 19 at the Bovina Bank's Community Room to elect delegates to the state

convention, says Wendol Christian, County Democratic Chairman.

The Republicans will hold their precinct conventions beginning at 7 p.m. at the polling places.

A very good turnout of voters is expected in Parmer County, says County Clerk Bonnie Warren Howard. "I think it should be one of the biggest turnouts we have had," Mrs. Howard said. As of Tuesday morning, there had been a total of 52 absentee votes, with four days remaining in the absentee period. Mrs. Howard felt this was a good indication of a good turnout.

Fueling the turnout will be the county sheriff's race, where five men seek the Democratic nomination. They are John Armstrong, Jerry Atchley, Bob Davis, Larry Cox and Rex Williams. Also, two women are seeking the nomination for County Tax Assessor-Collector: Doris Herrington and Bernice Pennington. (See sketches on the candidates elsewhere in this issue).

Two Teen-Agers Killed In Accident

Two Friona teen-agers were killed early Tuesday morning at Grady, New Mexico when their vehicle ran a stop sign and crashed into a pile of caliche.

Those killed were Monty D. Mueller, 19, and Jessie A. Arias, 16. Mueller was a 1987 graduate of Friona High School, and Arias was a sophomore student this year.

According to New Mexico State Police spokesmen, the wreck happened at 1:20 a.m., M.S.T when the youths' vehicle failed to stop at the intersection of State Highway 18 and State Highway 39.

The two were southbound, being enroute from Tucumcari, N.M., back to Friona.

The pickup struck the mound of caliche 202 feet south of the intersection and rolled over, coming to rest on its top. Both young men were ejected from the vehicle, the spokesman said.

In an unusual twist, Arias had been involved in a wreck the previous evening near Tucumcari, and was treated by Friona native Bobby Davis, a paramedic with the Rural Metro Ambulance Service.

Davis had been assigned to work in Tucumcari for a few days. Davis said that Arias had some lacerations from the first wreck. The following day he and Mueller apparently started for home at a late hour. Mueller reportedly was enroute home to work a shift at Excel Foods beginning at 8 a.m. that day.

Funeral services for Mueller were conducted at 3 p.m. Thursday at First Baptist Church with Rev. Vergil Ichtertz, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in Friona Cemetery, under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

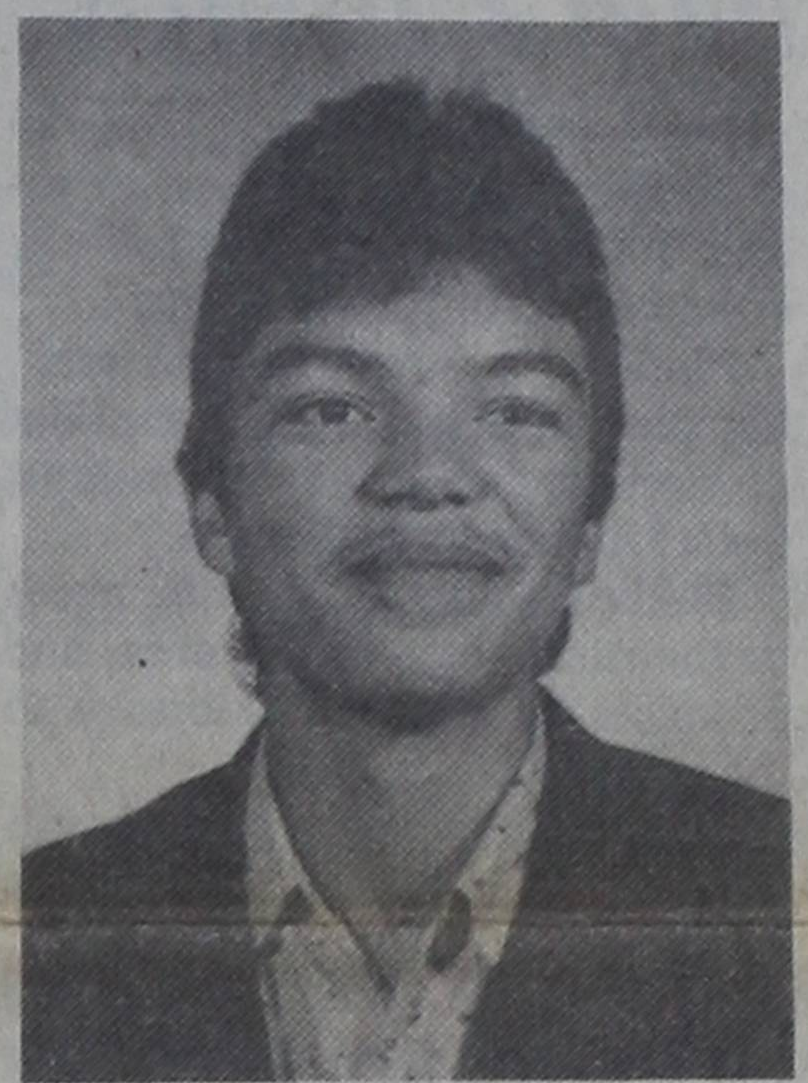
1968 in Haskell. He had been a Friona resident since 1972. He went all the way through Friona schools, being involved in band, football and the DECA program.

Excel Plant Will Close Second Week

Friona's EXCEL plant will be "dark" for a second week, it was announced this week by plant officials. Workers were notified this week that the huge beef packing plant west of the city will not operate during the week of March 6-12.

Beyond that, officials can't say how long the current work stoppage will run.

"We're hoping that we can reopen as quickly as possible, but we don't have a date as yet," said a source at the local plant.

For the past week, only management and a skeleton crew was able to work. That will likely be the case for the coming week.

Meanwhile, the EXCEL Corp. earlier announced that effective Monday, February 29 its beef slaughter and boxed beef fabrication facilities in other plants will operate either 32 or 36 hours instead of 40 hours per week.

"Extremely poor margin resulting from tight cattle supplies

and insufficient demand for boxed beef make this necessary," said Orlan Thorbeck, vice president and controller of EXCEL.

He added that the February 29 indefinite closing of the Cozad, Nebraska, and Friona plants announced February 22 are not expected to be permanent.

"As economic conditions improve, EXCEL intends to reopen these facilities, and will return to 40 hour weeks at all plants when market conditions dictate normal conditions," Thorbeck said.

EXCEL facilities shifting to a reduced hour schedule include plants at Ft. Morgan and Sterling, Colorado, Dodge City and Wichita, Kansas, Schuyler, Nebraska and Plainview, Texas, Thorbeck said.

60 YEARS AGO--MAR. 9, 1928

Star Favors Mel Phillips

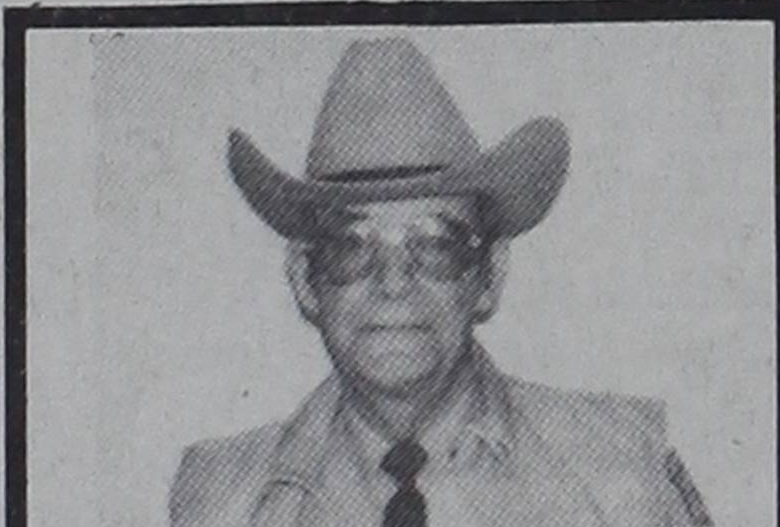
The Friona Star heartily endorses Democratic candidate Mel Phillips in his bid for the nomination for the state senate.

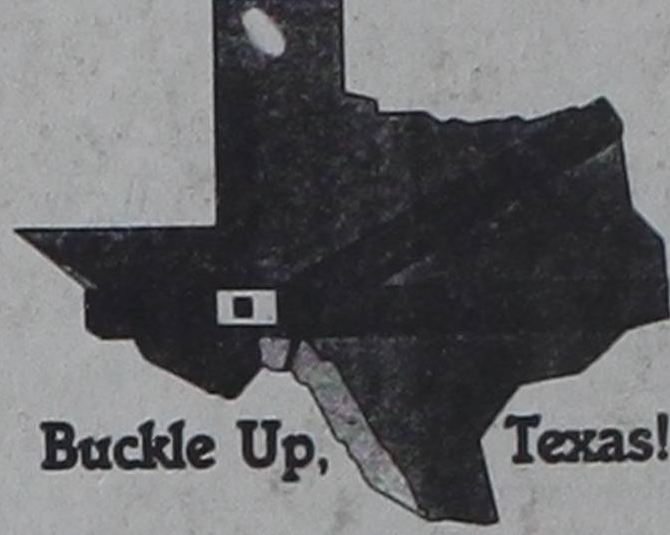
Wade Schueler's lamb placed sixth in the lightweight medium wool division, and also made the show's sale. Monty Schueler's lamb placed 12th in the same division.

County Candidates Give Qualifications

Five candidates are running in Parmer County for the Democratic nomination for the office of sheriff.

They are John Armstrong, Jerry Atchley, Larry Cox, Bob Davis, and Rex Williams.

The primary election will be March 8.

The State Line Tribune sent each candidate a questionnaire. Here are their responses:

What experience do you have toward the post you are seeking?

Atchley: I have served 19 years in law enforcement: 7 1/2 of these years have been served with the Parmer County Sheriff's office and for the past 5 years, I have served as chief deputy of this department. I have 28 college hours. I attended and completed the basic police academy in Amarillo College.

I have received the intermediate and advanced certificates. I have attended and completed many classes in law enforcement education, including criminology and criminal photography and am a certified jailer. I have had experience in administration by serving as chief of police in 3 different cities.

Armstrong: I attended the Orleans Parish Criminal Sheriff Academy in New Orleans, La., where I graduated at the top of my class, winning two of the three awards for outstanding performance in the Academy. After graduation, I worked for three years in the capacity of Deputy Sheriff.

After moving to Arkansas, I served as a City Patrolman for the city of Danville, and as a Deputy Sheriff for Yell County for about one year. I also have 10 years active duty with the military, and 17 years reserve time, most of which has been in supervisory positions.

Cox: No response to this question.

Davis: 21 years law enforcement experience; New Mexico Game Department - Conservation Officer - 1966-1972 Friona Police Department - 1972-1977, Parmer County Sheriff's Department - 1977 to date.

I began serving Parmer

County as a Deputy Sheriff working for Sheriff Charlie Lovelace. My assigned area was then, and still is, the Friona area.

Williams: I have worked for Friona Police Department since 1980. I am now Assistant Chief. I have 826 hours of law enforcement schooling, including schools on drugs, narcotics, crime prevention, interviewing and interrogation, penal code, code of criminal procedure, and criminal law updates.

I am a certified county jailer, certified breathalyzer, intorlyzer operator and a certified volunteer firefighter. I am also a certified Emergency Medical Technician.

What changes would you make in the post, if elected?

Atchley: I am sure that I would make some changes. However, I would not rush into things without first checking out all points. Then the changes would be made to

make a more efficient department, giving the public better protection as economically as possible and to serve each citizen in the same manner as the others to the best of my ability. However, there is one change that I would make as soon as possible. There would be a resident deputy living in Lazbuddie.

Armstrong: After establishing a new philosophy, setting new policy and a review of personnel, I am sure a change of personnel will be in order. One of the first things that I would do would be to ask the Commissioners to hire a jailer. That would free a deputy, who could then spend more time on patrol.

The county would be divided into three areas with a deputy assigned to each area. The deputy assigned would investigate all complaints in his area. When not on an investigation, the deputies will be on patrol in each assigned area, getting to know the people in the area and letting the people get to know them. I, as sheriff and/or my chief deputy, will personally respond to and follow up on all complaints received.

Cox: At this time I cannot make promises. I will say that a more active patrol is needed in the county at night as well as daytime. Crime prevention should be and will be a goal. Sheriff and deputies alike should and will get out to meet the public and get acquainted with the people of the county to better serve them.

As to increases in force, I think one more deputy would be sufficient at this time if the county funds allow. Also, a staggered duty shift would take care of law enforcement needs at night. If elected as your sheriff, I will strive to be the kind of sheriff you need and can be proud of to meet the law enforcement needs as they arise.

Davis: If elected the next Sheriff of Parmer County, I plan to bring a complete new look to law enforcement in Parmer County. I plan to assign each Deputy to a certain area of the county, and have that Deputy in that area at all times, to answer any and all calls. I plan to have some night patrol as well as day patrol. Each and every complaint will be investigated and every effort will be made to clear each complaint. I plan to personally be in all areas of the county to assist in investigations, as much as possible.

Williams: Changes I would make: 1. More patrol at night and evenings, and would also have patrols out during the day.

2. I would like all sheriff's units marked for better visibility.
3. I would work more on crime prevention.
4. I would work for better communication with the people of Parmer County, also with other law agencies in Parmer County and all adjoining counties.

Why do you believe persons should vote for you?

Atchley: I am knowledgeable of all aspects of the sheriff's department. I have enough years experience to do the job. I am familiar with jail operations, court procedure, crime investigation and reporting. I am dedicated and willing to serve this county. I have had 5 1/2 years of administration experience in law enforcement.

Armstrong: Having not been associated with any law enforcement agency in Parmer County, I will not be bound by any previous policies. I will be able to bring totally new concepts and ideas to the office. I have no preconceived notions of loyalty to present personnel and will be able to objectively evaluate the effectiveness of them and make changes as necessary.

I am a native of Parmer County, being the third generation to live off the farm that my grandmother purchased in 1909. Because of my roots, I have the well-being of the entire county at heart, and will serve and protect Parmer County to the utmost of my ability.

Cox: I believe I can make you a good sheriff, and as time allows I will attend school to learn the updated types of law enforcement. I am also single and will be free of obligation of family worries, and can devote more time to the office. I am an outgoing person, and meet the public well, and easy to get along with. I believe that all grades at public school should be taught or educated on drug abuse and

the dangers of alcohol, and I will personally see that it is done.

Davis: I believe that you, the people, should vote for me because of my job experience, my complete dedication to the job, and a 100% plus effort to see that the people receive the kind of Law Enforcement they need and deserve. I feel that I have taken care of my area, to the best of my ability, in the years I have served as Deputy Sheriff of Parmer County.

Williams: For better law enforcement in Parmer County.

Any other comments you might have?

Atchley: I feel that the citizens of this county need more evening and night patrol of the county. I believe in crime prevention and neighborhood watch. It is time we all work together to make our county safer and to catch the criminals and make sure they are punished.

Armstrong: I am a firm believer in the Neighborhood Watch and the Crimestopper programs and will work to get them established in all areas of the county. I think that the citizens of Parmer County want to regain the confidence of the Sheriff's Office, and I feel that I can accomplish this if I am elected.

Davis: My solemn pledge to you, the people of Parmer County, is that if I am elected the next Sheriff of Parmer County, I will be the Sheriff "OF THE PEOPLE," elected "BY THE PEOPLE," working with and "FOR THE PEOPLE," of Parmer County. I will be a compassionate, feeling, and understanding Sheriff, who will be there for you when I am needed.

There are two candidates for the post of Parmer County Tax Assessor/Collector on the Democrat Party ticket in the primary election March 8.

They are Doris Herington and Bernice Pennington. Below are their responses to a questionnaire from the State Line Tribune:

What experience do you have toward the post you are seeking?

Herington: My experience for the duties in the office of Tax Assessor/Collector includes working 4 years as deputy clerk. Prior to that I worked as an Avon representative. Since my husband is a farmer, I have had the practical experience of keeping and maintaining our family farm records.

My education includes obtaining my GED certificate from Clovis campus of Eastern New Mexico University along with 25 credit hours toward a business degree in accounting. I have served on various civic, community, and school committees. I feel that I have the experience, education, ability and desire to serve the public in a cordial and friendly manner.

Pennington: I have 20 years of office experience to my credit. I have served much of that time in a supervisory capacity. In addition to my of-

ice experience, my husband and I owned and operated a grocery store for eight years. I have worked with people in all kinds of situations. I relate to people well and this enables me to work through any problems they might have in a patient and understanding manner.

I have been a fulltime employee in the Tax Assessor/Collector's office for seven years. The last four years, I have served as chief deputy. During that time I have had the opportunity to work in all phases of the work conducted in that office.

What changes would you make in the post, if elected?

Herington: The office of Tax Assessor/Collector is governed by state and federal laws, so therefore I cannot state what, if any changes would be made in the inner workings of the office. I will state that I will continue to give the same excellent service that Mr. Moseley has always given to the people. I intend for my clerks and myself to always be knowledgeable of the new laws and to process everyone's business as if it were my own.

The implementation of new equipment, such as computers, should be made available to this office by the state within the next 2 or 3 years. The use of computers will make it possible for a lot of the work being done in our local office instead of being done in the Austin office. I feel that this program will improve the efficiency of the office.

Pennington: I can think of no immediate changes that I would make. Every effort is made to serve the residents of Parmer County in a courteous and efficient manner. Within the next three years the State Dept. of Highways & Public Transportation will install computers in the office. This will constitute some changes but will enable us to serve with more efficiency.

Why do you believe people should vote for you?

Herington: People should vote for me because I am qualified to fulfill the duties and obligations of the office of Tax Assessor/Collector in a conscientious and cheerful manner. My family's roots are in Parmer County and it is my intention to be of service to the people of Parmer County through the office of Tax Assessor/Collector. My age indicates that retirement would be in the distant future, and I am anxious to fulfill the office for as long as the voters would permit me to do so.

Pennington: As chief deputy, I am fully aware of the responsibilities of serving as Tax Assessor/Collector to the people of Parmer County. I take my responsibilities very seriously. This office requires a person who is qualified and experienced. I believe that I am the person most qualified for the position.

Any other comments you might have?

Pennington: Many people are under the impression that the tax Assessor/Collector's office is now just a motor vehicle department. Although this is a major part of the work, this is not the only thing we do.

Although you pay your taxes directly to the Parmer County Appraisal District, this money is sent to our office where each month I make a report and the money is allocated to the various entities. These reports are maintained in the tax office and are audited annually.

In addition, we handle voter registration which is almost a full time job. We also handle boat titles and registration.

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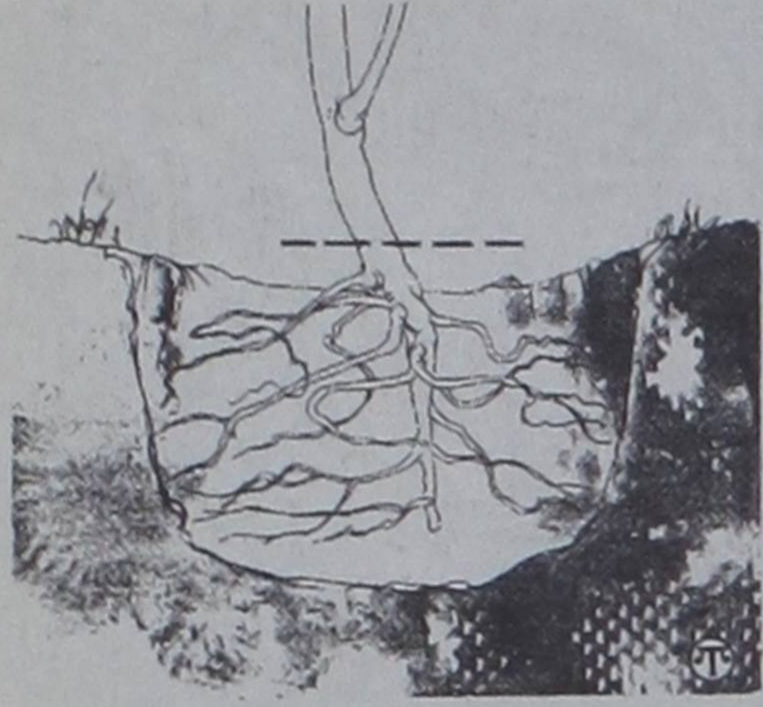

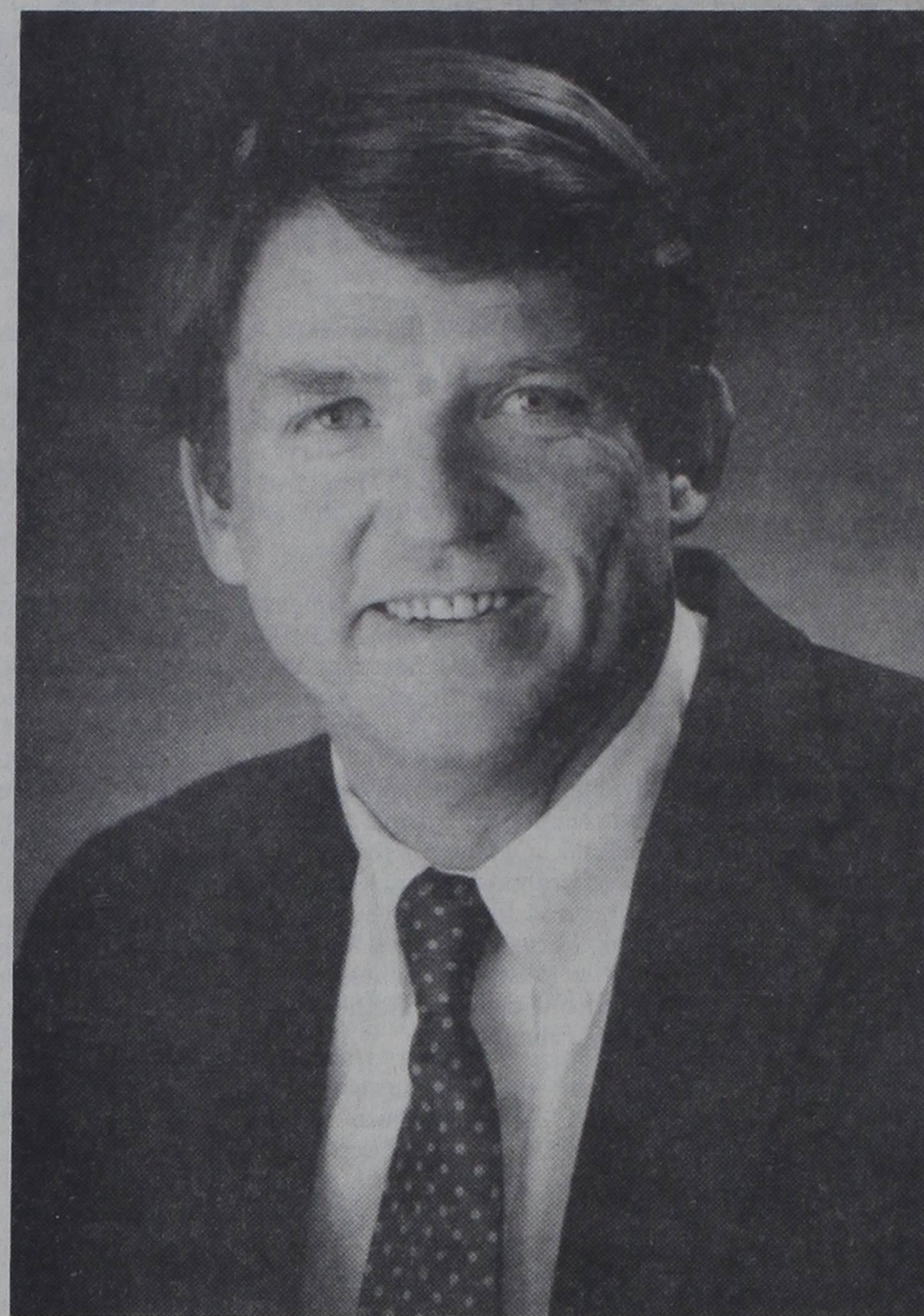
Rosa Lee McDonald moved to our home last week from Clovis. She is the aunt of Joe Tongate of Friona and we welcome her to Prairie Acres.

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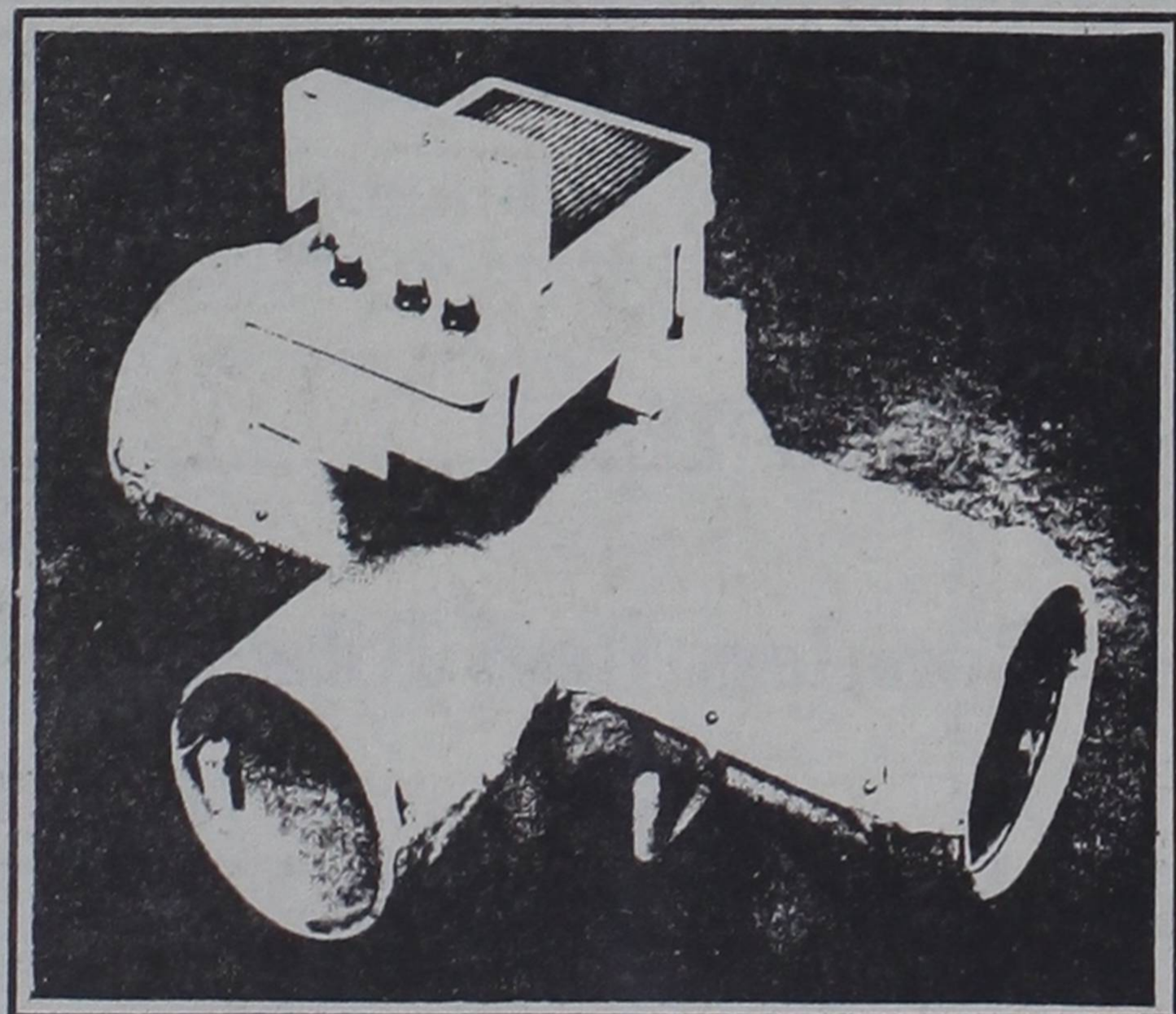

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Friona Veterinary Clinic Newsletter

SPRINGTIME brings with it the threat of several seasonal diseases: viral encephalitis, heartworm disease, bovine digestive disturbances associated with new green pastures, and parvo virus in dogs, just to mention a few.

Also, springtime brings us newborn animals, puppies, kittens, foals and calves. In the care of all of these newborns, just good old tender loving care and cleanliness are paramount.

As these animals get older, their needs are ever-changing. Most of them depend totally upon their owners for food and almost everything else necessary to sustain life.

Dentistry is one thing that we have become extremely interested in. Oldtimers will tell you that a horse is only as good as his teeth. Well, this is very true, and applies to small animals as well. The diets we feed these animals predisposes them to dental tarter buildup and gum disease.

The "bad breath" that accompanies this condition is only the tip of the iceberg. The grave

underlying conditions that accompany periodontal disease range from infection of the gums and jawbones to infection of the heart and other vital organs.

We recommend oral examination, scaling and polishing problem teeth once a year. In the horse we routinely examine teeth at worming time and file or float sharp points off uneven teeth. This is a routine procedure, simple to do, inexpensive and pays great dividends in the future health and well-being of the animal.

In the introduction I mentioned several diseases. Equine viral encephalitis is a mosquito-borne disease that is prevented by vaccination before the disease becomes a problem. Canine heartworm disease is prevented by a monthly tablet during the mosquito season. Canine parvo virus infection is prevented by vaccination before exposure. Bovine bloat problems are best managed by poloxaline, Rumensin and spray adjuvant before bloat is a problem.

Bovina Ex-POW Awarded Bronze Star From W.W. II

Luis Serna of Bovina was recently presented the Bronze Star for service rendered to his country during World War II.

Serna served as a prisoner of war for a time during the war, and this week shared some of his experiences with us.

Serna was twenty-two years old when he enlisted in the U.S. Army. He was living in Snyder, Texas at the time he entered the service in May of 1943.

Serna had a wife and a small son at the time of his enlistment. He was in "boot camp" in Abilene, and was then sent to Fort Bliss in El Paso, and later to Camp Aterberry, Indiana. He said his family was with him for part of this early period of service.

Then he shipped out to Germany, on the huge Queen Mary, which carried so many thousands of young Americans across the Atlantic. On December 10, 1944, he saw combat in the Schnee-Eiffel area.

On December 16, 1944, Serna's regiment was hit by the German Ardennes counter-offensive, and was quickly cut off from its main group.

On the night of December 17, the regiment was in battle, and all were killed or captured except for nine officers and 70 men. Serna could not remember the number that had started in his group.

After they were captured, most of the men were marched for over a week, covering 500 miles. They were scattered in POW camps throughout Germany.

Sometimes the men rode in boxcars on the railway, and were at times kept in the boxcars for

days at a time. He said at one time they were in a boxcar when it was being heavily bombed by the Americans.

Serna said the men felt that the Germans meant for the men to be killed by their own armed forces. He said they spent a lot of time praying during those three days.

The prisoners were kept in a big building with straw mats to sleep on. They were fed two potatoes per day, and Serna felt that they would not have survived except for the Red Cross, which came with supplies about every three weeks.

The Red Cross gave the men coffee, cigarettes and canned goods. The men always shared equally with one another.

Some of the prisoners were forced to work on the railroad, but Luis said he was never put to work during the five months he was held prisoner.

They were not physically abused, he said.

In order to pass their time, the men would walk around and around their compound. They only had the clothes they were wearing, and only had cold water. He said the men would save their fuel in order to boil coffee at night.

Serna said he lost weight during his time as a prisoner, at one time getting down to just 92 pounds.

Serna said there were several nationalities represented in his group, and he was the only Texan. His family had been told that he was "missing in action," and did not hear from him for four months.

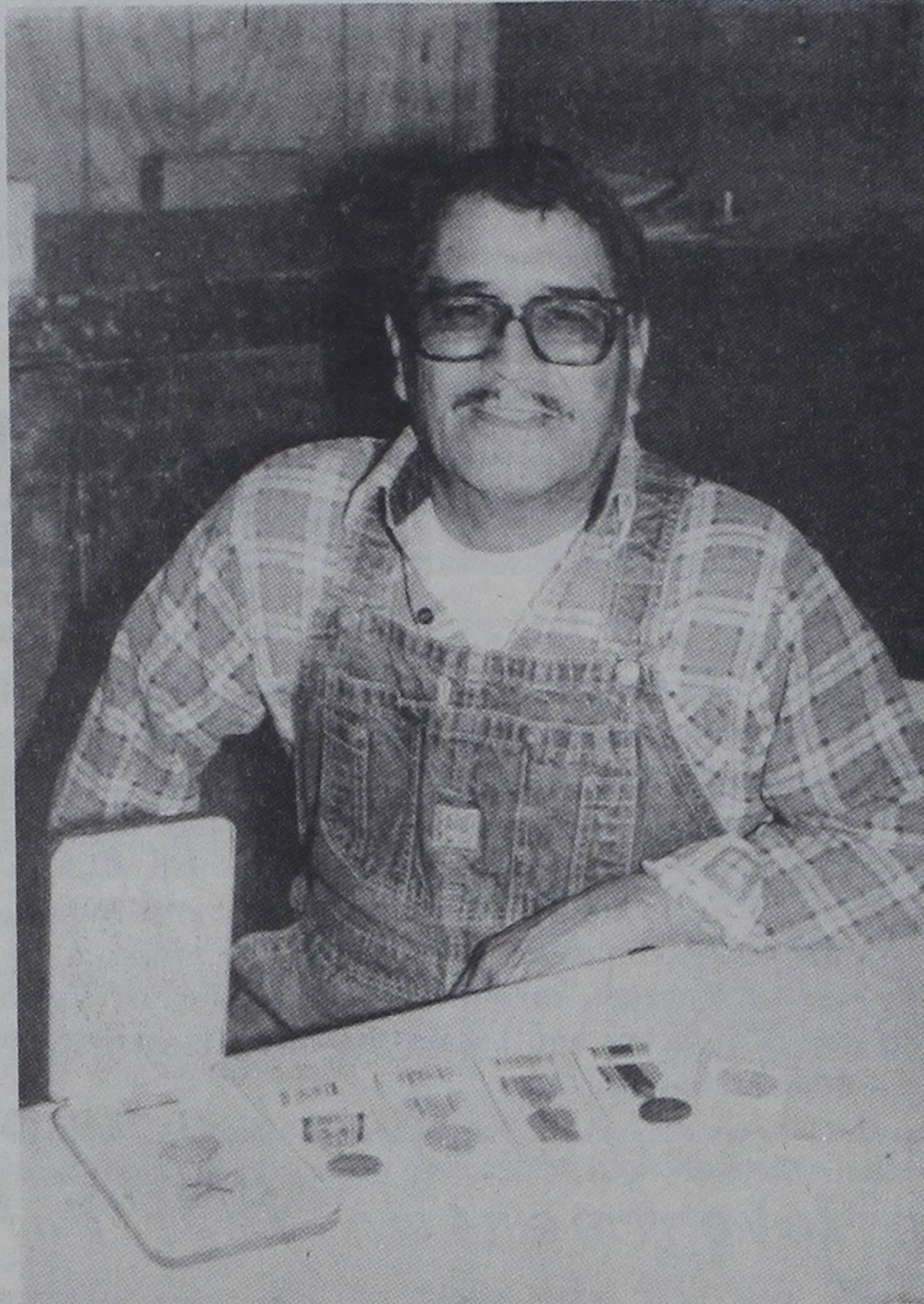
In May of 1945, he was freed by the Russians, and was required to walk behind the Russian soldiers until they got to their own lines. His group was then flown to France, where he said they were "fed real good for about a week."

Luis was never injured seriously in the way, but suffered frostbite on his feet.

When asked if he had been bothered by sleepless nights because of his experience, he said, "Yes, maybe at times. But that's war."

Luis and his wife Fela moved to Bovina in 1960. He has always been a farmer. Their children have attended school in Bovina Schools.

The couple has 12 children and 14 grandchildren. Their children are Andy, Luis, Audlia, Elodia, Yolanda Ramon, Irma Hernandez, Tony, Ruben, Tommy, Anita, Juanita and Olga.

Calvary Baptist Church is hosting its spring revival March 7-13. The services will begin at 7:30 p.m. nightly.

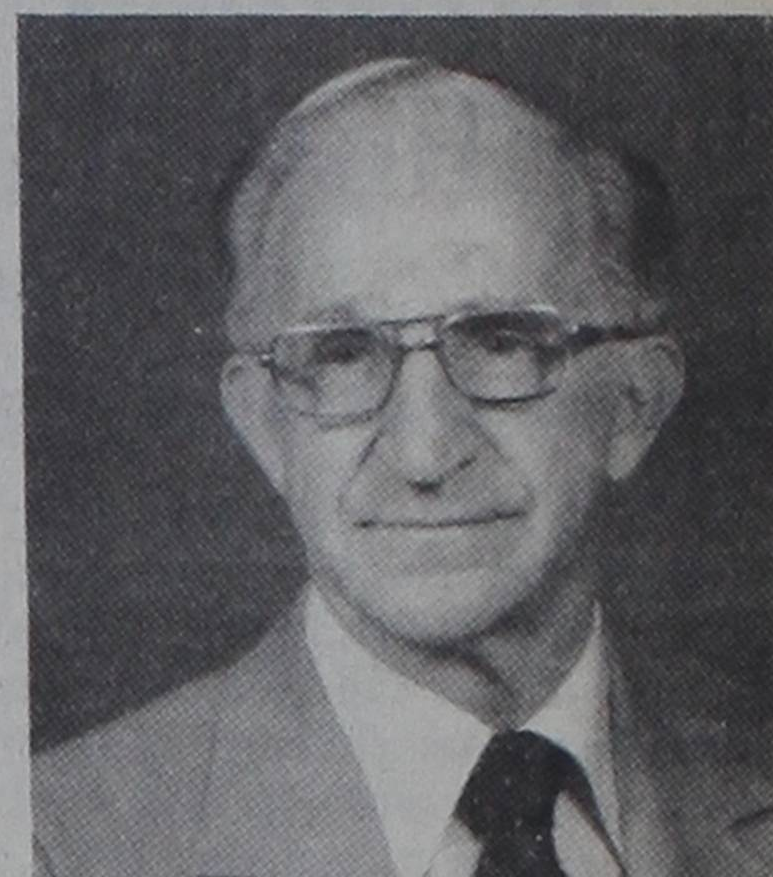
Evangelist for the series will be Dr. A.L. Palmer, currently pastor of the Opelousas, Louisiana First Baptist Church.

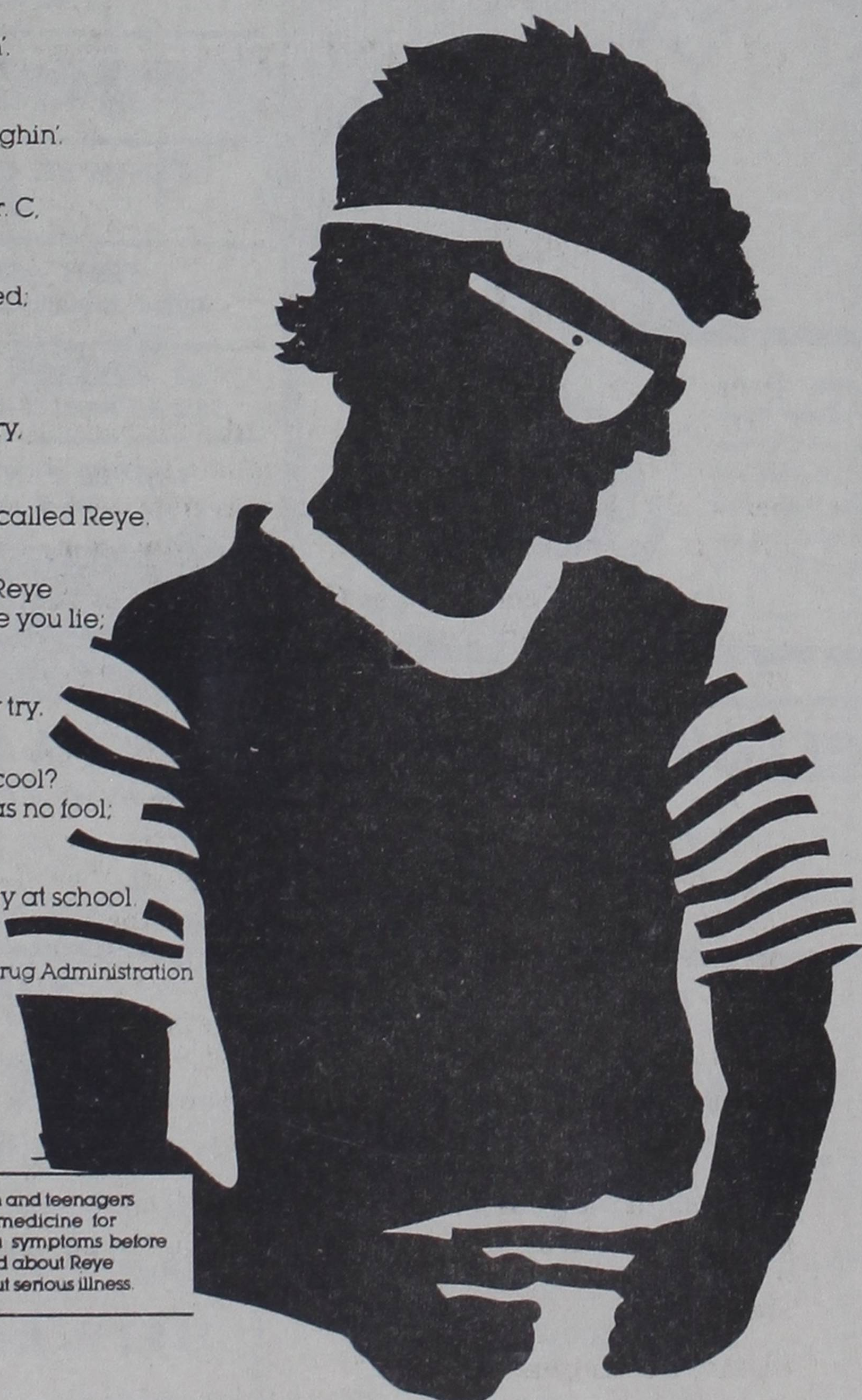

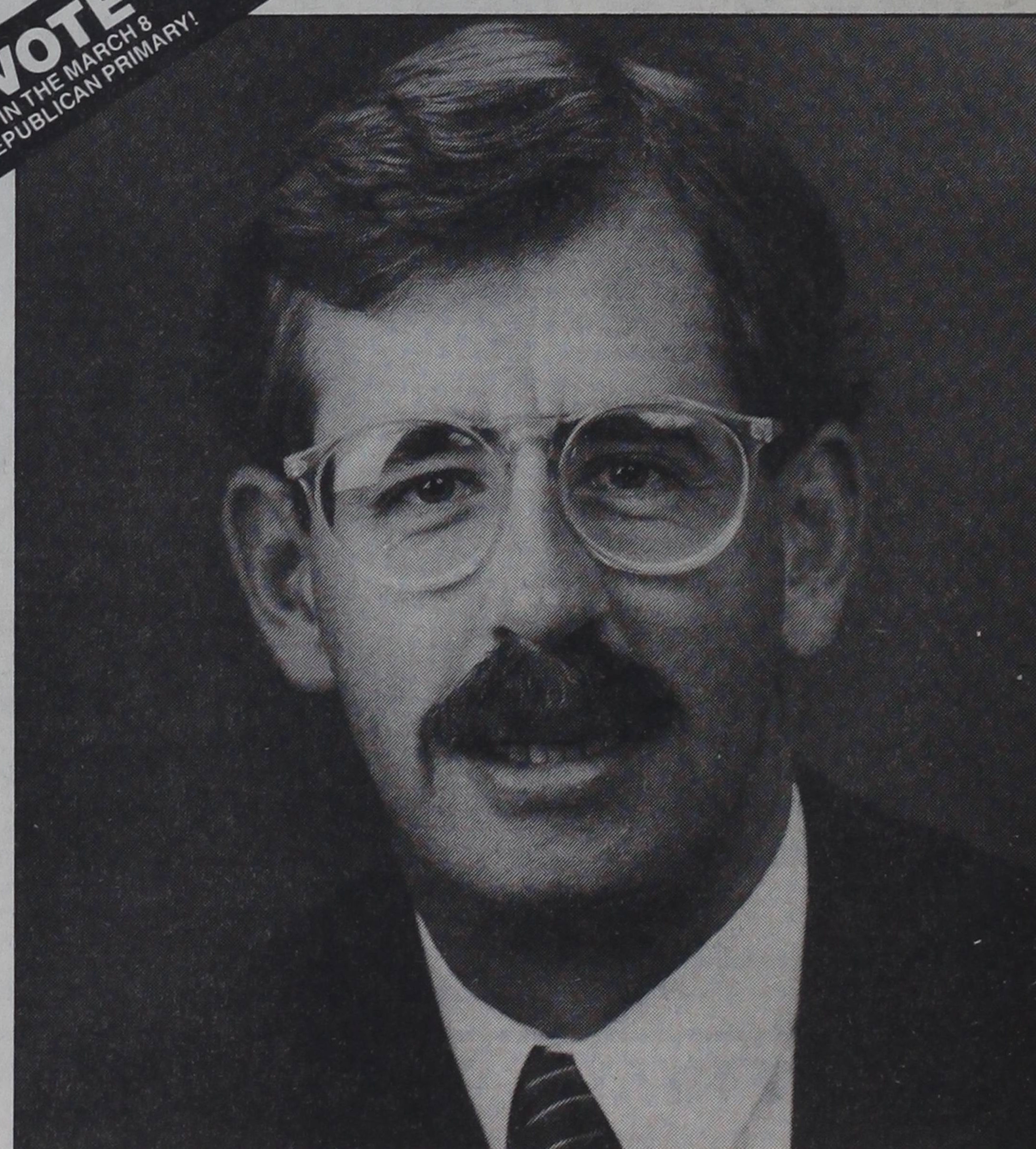

Due to the spring break, only about half of the team competed, but Coach Steve Williams said that those competing turned in some good marks for the first meet of the season.

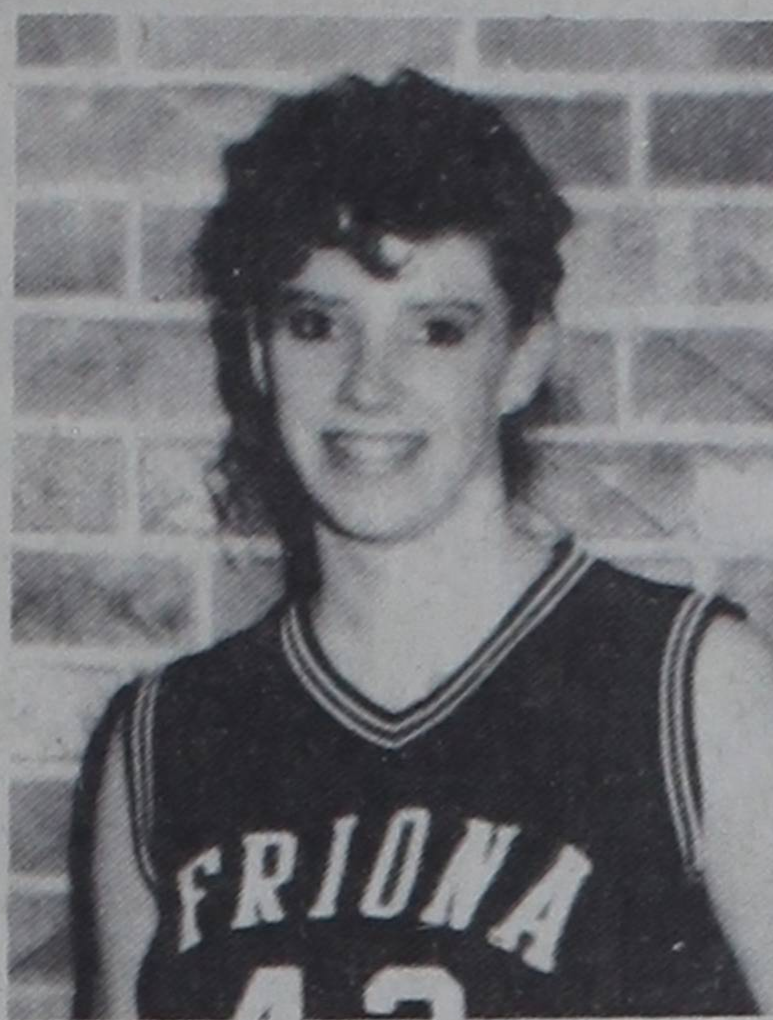
Stephen Thornton placed second in the long jump with a leap of 20-9. Thornton came back to place second in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles at 40.8.

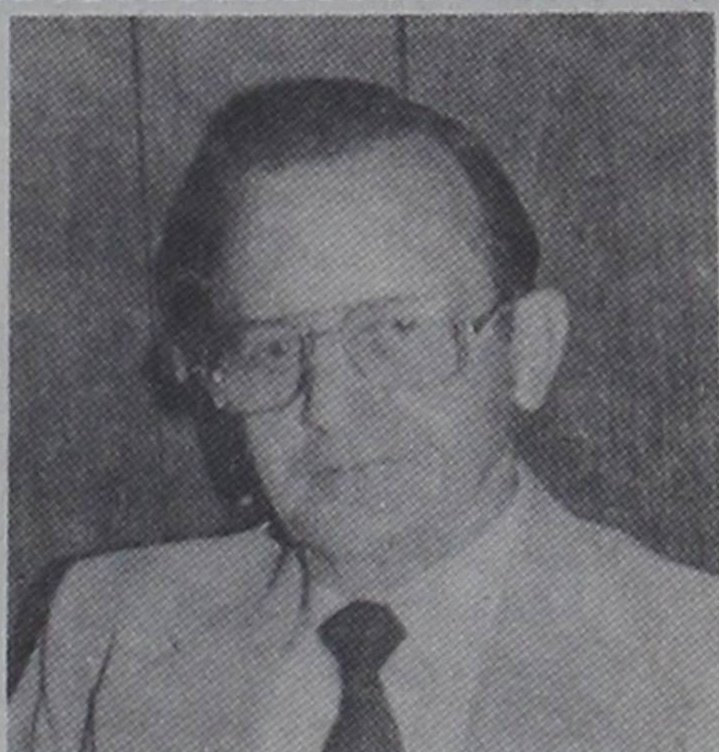

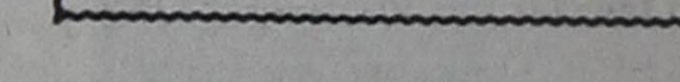
