

A GLIMPSE OF TEXAS HISTORY

Texas was first claimed by Spain. The Spaniards based their claim on Caranodo's visit to the western part of the state when he was searching for the "Seven Cities of Cibola." Then in 1862 the Noble La Salle a Frenchman who claimed all the land trained by the Mississippi for Frane. By Missfortune he made a setlement in Texas in 1685. But this was a failure and again Spain took the lead.


