Davis, Hays County Deputy Sheriff, in 1913, will be made before the Board of Pardons Tuesday by Davis' widow. Mrs. Davis left San Antonio Tuesday to appear before the board.

Davis was slain while attempting to quell a disturbance at a Mexican dance. Sabas Castillo, sentenced to 99 years for the same crime, was pardoned in June, this year.

Mrs. Davis has enlisted the aid of Hays County officers and friends in her fight to prevent the pardoning of Ybarro.

State Law Prohibits Making Home Brew

There seems to be some confusion about the provisions of the law in regard to the making of "home brew" and to enlighten citizens on this matter, and probably keep some out of trouble, County Attorney Chandler of Collin County has made the following explanation of the laws touching the matter:

"It is just as much a violation of the law to manufacture or sell "home brew" if the same is intoxicating or contains in excess of one per cent of alcohol by volume as it is to manufacture or sell whiskey. The State prohibition law contains two sections, the first making it unlawful to manufacture or sell any intoxicant whatever and the second section makes it unlawful to manufacture or sell any potable liquor, mixture, or preparation containing in excess of one per

cent of alcohol by volume. "Many people, no doubt, get the State law confused with the Federal law and think if they comply with the Federal law they are on the safe side. Such though, is not the case, as we have two separate and distinct laws,
