## Junior High Wins District UIL Meet

**THE FESTIVITIES** in Austin this month, celebrating the 100th anniversary of the state capitol building should spark more than just passing interest for residents of Parmer County.

This is due to the fact that virtually all of Parmer County was included in the three million acres of land that was swapped to Chicago businessmen in the 1880s, so that the capitol building could be constructed.

This is where you get the term "Capitol Syndicate Land," which is on all Parmer County property deeds.

It seems that in the 1870s, when our leaders first began planning for a bigger capitol building, at a special constitutional convention, it was decided to set aside three million acres of land in the Panhandle in order to pay for the building's construction.

The state's seat of government was housed in a "temporary" capitol for a number of years. This original capitol was destroyed by fire in 1881 and Governor Oran M. Roberts called a special legislative session to deal with the need to build a new capitol building.

It was then that the Texas Legislature struck a deal with Charles B. and John V. Farwell, Chicago businessmen (brothers) under which they agreed to build a capitol building which cost in the neighborhood of \$3 million at that time, in return for the three million acres of land.

The land which was traded later became known as the XIT Ranch, the largest ranch in the continental United States and perhaps the world. The fact that the ranch touched ten Panhandle counties is believed to have given the ranch its name, which reputedly stood for "Ten in Texas."

Cattle drover Ab Blocker, who drove one of the first herds of cattle into the XIT, is given credit for designing the first brand, which also was intended to make it difficult for cattle rustlers to change.

The red granite capitol building which was constructed as a result of the land trade is the largest (naturally) state capitol building in the United States.

The Farwell brothers borrowed money in England to develop the XIT Ranch, and began fencing their new acquisition in 1882. The first cattle started moving into XIT pastures in 1885 from South Texas.

The Capitol Freehold Company was created, and began selling parcels of the sprawling ranch in 1901, creating smaller ranches and townsites that were to grow into the present-day cities and towns included in the original ranch. The last of the XIT cattle were sold in 1912.

The last of the holdings of the XIT Ranch, a 39-acre plot, sold in the 1950s to Hurshel R. Harding. The land was industrial property within the city of Farwell. The deed to that property was passed to Harding by Hamlin Y. Overstreet, a nephew of Judge James D. Hamlin, the original resident representative for the XIT and the Capitol Syndicate.

The Parmer County seat of Farwell was named for one of the Chicago businessmen, John V. Farwell and his family.

Parmer County also holds the distinction of being the only one of the ten counties of the XIT land to have been completely covered by the original ranch, except for a one-acre block in the northeast corner, which was designated as school land.

As headquarters city for the XIT, Dalhart is planning a celebration on May 22 to commemorate the capitol centennial. But residents of Parmer County need to be aware of our area's tie with the red granite building in Austin.

Jeremy Reed, who played the Frog Prince, was named best actor, and Angela Cappa, as the

Pond Princess, was best actress. Erika Bermea, as Stepsister I, and Koby Rogers, as the counselor, both were named to the all-star cast.

Tabbed for honorable mention, all-star cast, were Marie Davila and Melissa Hand.

James Warren was a triple winner in the literary events. He took first place honors in number sense, science and spelling events. Teresa Taylor placed first in spelling and ready writing for the sixth grade division, and Shannon Gregory won first place in oral reading for sixth grade boys.

Mindy Johnson won second place for science, eighth grade; and also placed second in the ready writing competition.

Scott Houston placed third in number sense; Michael Cole was third in oral reading, and Jon Goddard was third in spelling, sixth grade, to add to Friona's point total.

Other point winners included Britt Conklin, fourth in oral reading; Kristin Holland, fourth in spelling; Chad Hamilton, sixth in ready writing; and Jon Parker, sixth in science.

Others participating included Jon Goddard, Audra Clark and Rena Mason in sixth grade number sense; Miss Holland in number sense, junior high; Joce Arias, Jaime Padilla, Misty Baxter and Adriana Casas in sixth grade oral reading.

Also, Angela Cappa, Jessica Alvarado and Christy Ichertz in junior high oral reading; Chris Davila and Misty White in sixth grade ready writing; Jason Wright, Susan Huckabee, and Shawn Cole in science; LeeAnn Ford and Terron Talley in spelling.

"We appreciate the good work accomplished by all of our contestants, and also the hard work by the teachers in preparing them for these contests," said junior high school principal Tom Johnson.

## Storm Test Warning Is Scheduled

A tornado test warning will be sounded on Monday, May 16 at 7 p.m., according to the Friona Fire Department.

The test siren will consist of three long blasts of 20 seconds each. Later, the "all clear" signal, of three short blasts of the siren, will be sounded.

Friona residents are cautioned not to confuse the tornado warning with the siren which signals the firemen's practice meetings, on the first and third Thursday nights at about 7:15 p.m.

When an actual tornado is spotted, the warnings will also be broadcast over Friona Cablevision, with an audio emergency message which will override any program you may be watching, including HBO.

## Clinic Set For May

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for May. Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella and mumps.

The clinic nearest Friona is at Hereford, Texas Department of Health Office, 914 East Park Avenue and will be May 12 and 26 from 8 a.m.-12 noon and 1-4 p.m.

**60 YEARS AGO--MAY 18, 1928**

Mr. Fahsholz is a "horny-handed son of toil," as the farming fraternity of the country are commonly known, he having been engaged in farming for the past several years.

**50 YEARS AGO--MAY 20, 1938**

Ray Landrum, proprietor of the Regal Theatre, is offering reduced rates to the public during this week, making it 15 cents for adults and 10 cents for children, and Ray has an unusually good program of pictures on for this week, too.

**45 YEARS AGO--MAY 21, 1943**

Funeral services for Capt. Ira Benger, 23-year-old son of John Benger of Friona, who was killed in a plane crash last Thursday, May 13, near El Paso, were held here Monday afternoon. The funeral was given with full military honors.

**40 YEARS AGO--MAY 21, 1948**

## Charleta Treider's Services Held Wed.

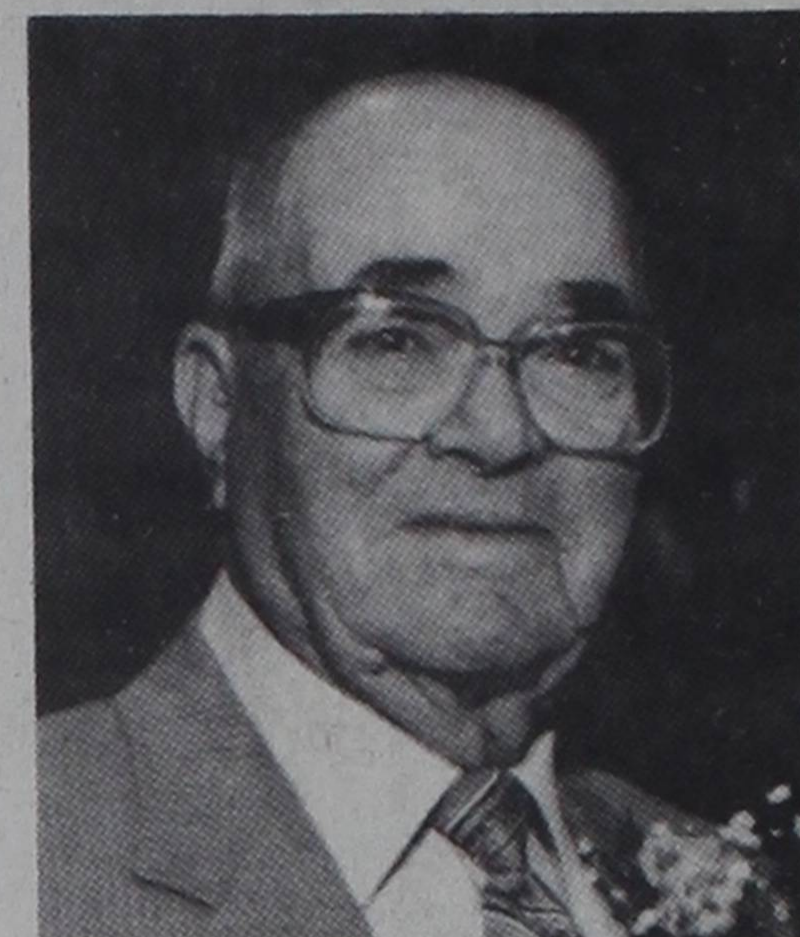

Honorary pallbearers were Ed Barrett, H.C. Claborn, T.A. Williams, Charlie Wise, Bud Kelley and E.H. Little.

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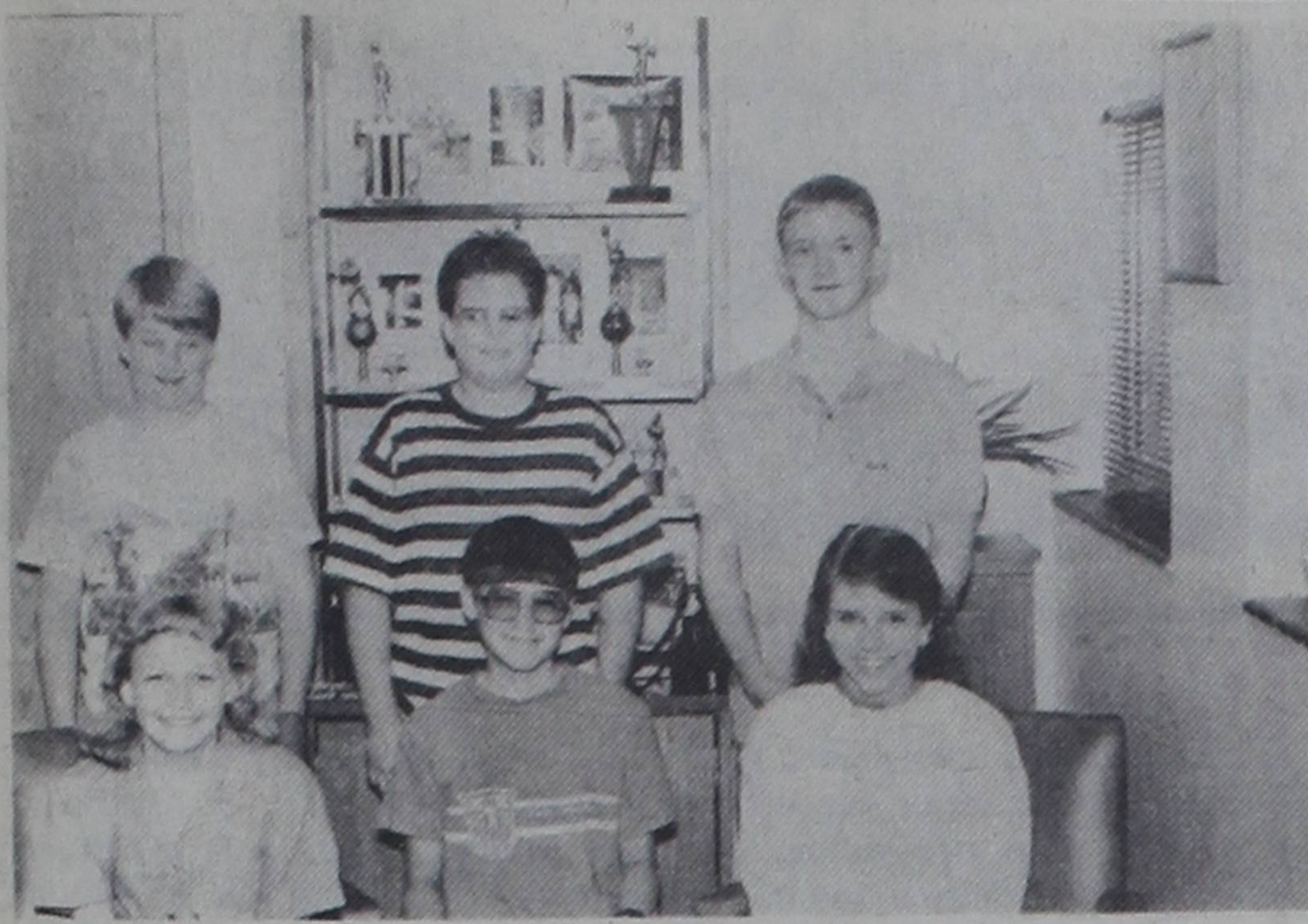

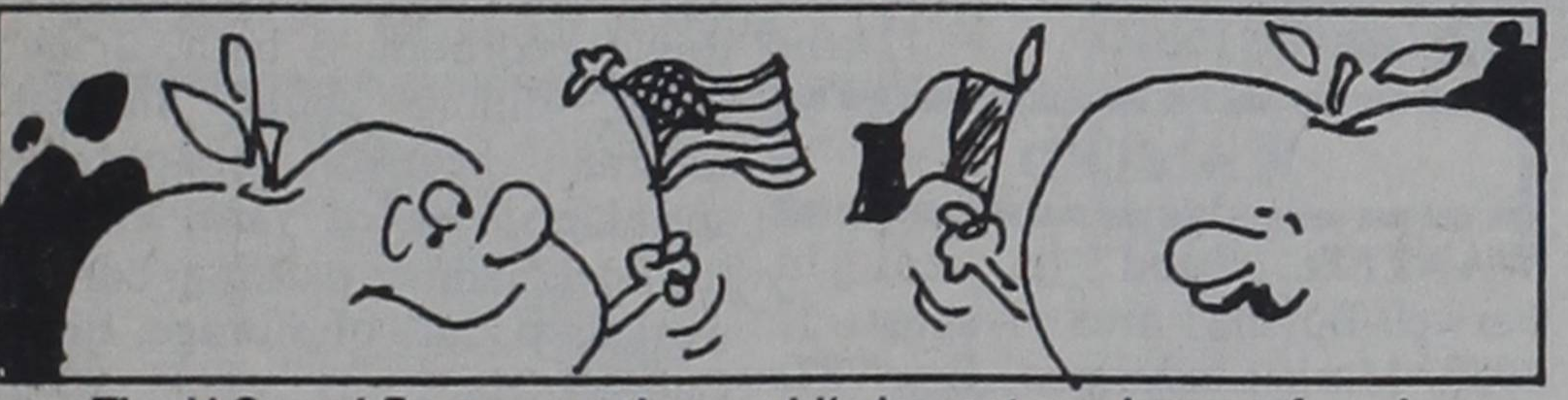

Ancira won the long jump with an effort of 16 feet, three and three-fourths inches, and the high jump, clearing five feet.

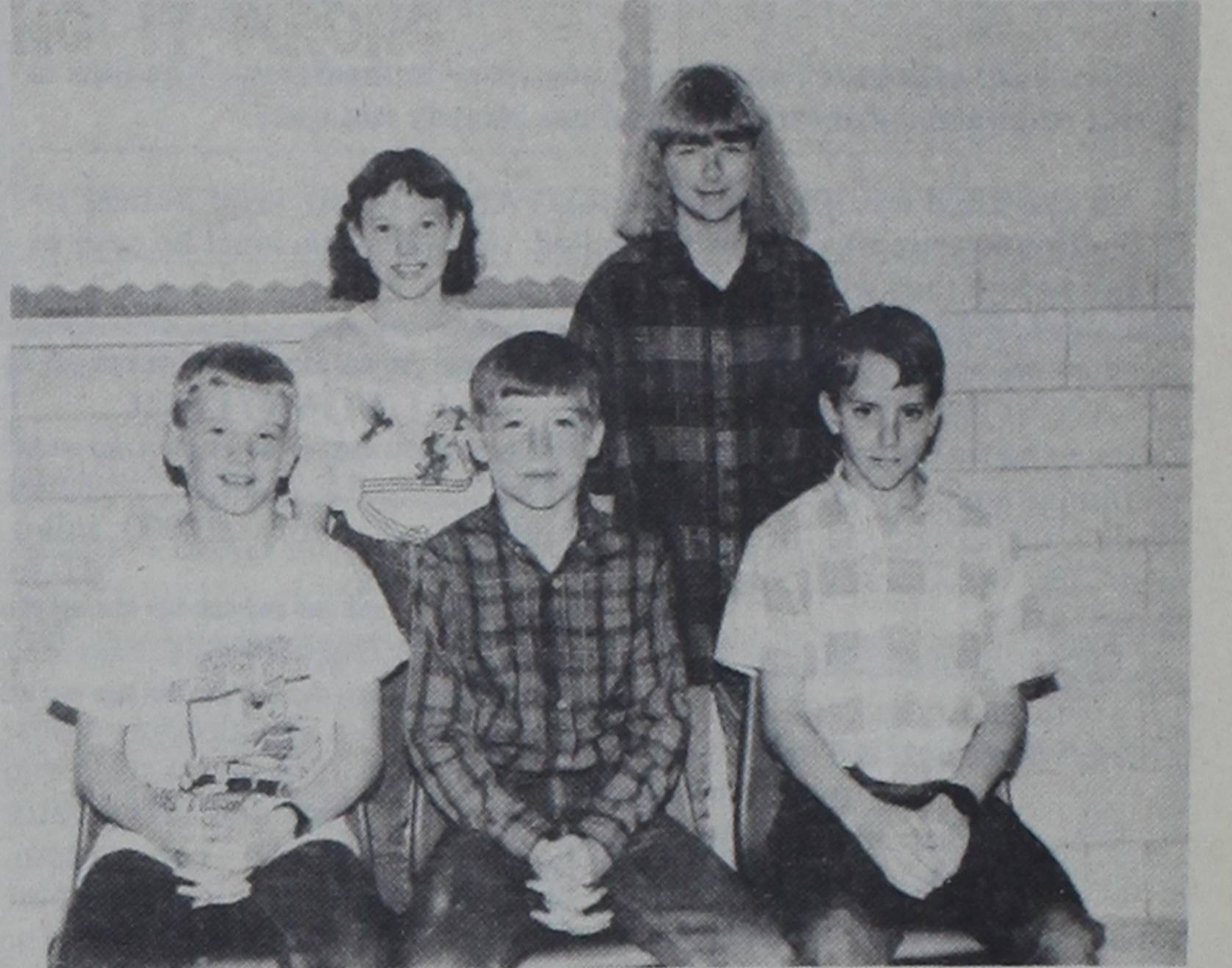
Lee Rios was third in the discus event with a toss of 112-5.

### Deadline Nears For FmHA County Committee Nomination

Parmer County farmers interested in election to the Farmers Home Administration county committee have until May 19 to get their nominating petitions signed and turned in, FmHA County Supervisor Weldon Rainey said.

One person will be elected for a three-year term to the three-person committee at the June 30 election. Rainey said anyone who has an interest in a farm in Parmer County as owner, tenant or sharecropper is eligible to run for the committee seat and to vote in the election. A spouse of an eligible

farmer also is considered to be a farmer for those purposes.

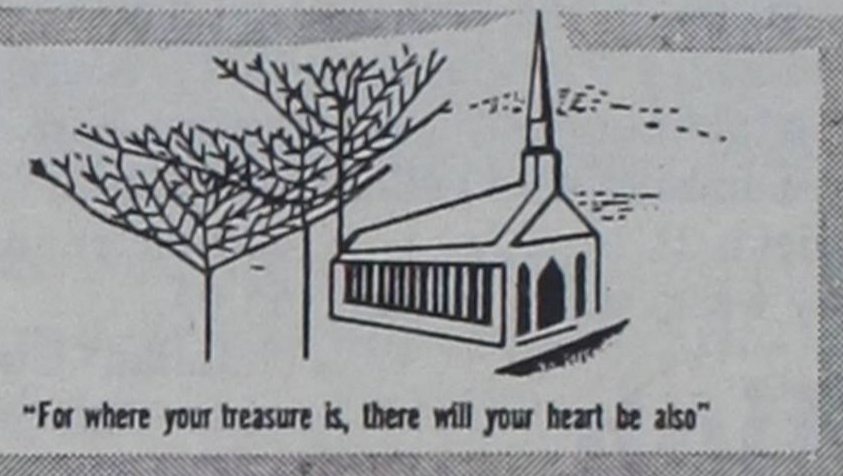

**8th Grade Braves Win District Title**

The eighth grade Braves won their district track and field title at the District 2-AAA meet last Friday at Muleshoe. It was the second straight district track title for this group of athletes, who won it last year as seventh graders.

Friona placed first in the overall standings with 133 points, followed by Muleshoe with 97; Floydada, 95; Dimmitt, 89; Tulia, 49; and Littlefield, 21.

Curtis Brady was a triple winner

for the Braves. He won the long jump with an effort of 18 feet, two inches, and the high jump by clearing 5-6. Brady also won the 100-meter dash in 12.0, and ran on Friona's two winning relay teams.

Scott Houston placed first in the 300-meter hurdles with a time of 44.47. Marcus Reyes won the 200-meter dash with a clocking of 24.57 and Ismael Rocha won the 400-meter dash with a time of 55.03.

Julian Colunga won the 800-meter run, timed in 2:14.64.

The Braves' 400-meter relay team won their event with a time of 47.38. Members of the team were Houston, Rocha, Reyes and Brady.

Friona's 1600-meter relay team also won, with a time of 3:49. This foursome was made up of Brady, Reyes, Rocha and Warren Duke.

Reyes also placed second in the long jump with an effort of 17-6½. Rocha was second in the shot put at 40-10¼.

Corbin Riethmayer was fourth in the 200-meter dash with a time of 26.41, and fifth in the 100-meter at 12.93. Ricky Madrigal was fourth in the discus with a toss of 118-3, and Tony Ibarra was fourth in the pole vault at eight feet, six inches.

Other point winners included Duke, fifth in the 800-meter race at 2:22.9, Colunga, fifth in the 400-meters at 58.02, and Garcia, sixth in the 1600-meter run at 5:44.13.

**Check Your Coolers**

Hot summer temperatures are just around the corner and it's time to get ready for the cooling season ahead. "Before you turn on your refrigerated air-conditioning system for the first time," says Nancy Sawtelle of the Texas Energy Extension Service, "have a professional heating and cooling service person check to be sure the system is working properly. Before the service person arrives, you should clear away any leaves, sticks, twigs, or other objects near the outdoor unit that might restrict air flow through the coil."

The service person's check should consist of the following:

- \*Oil the condensing unit fan motor.
  - \*Clean the condensing coil fins and condenser fan.
  - \*Check the condensing unit for refrigerant leaks.
  - \*Visually inspect the compressor start and run capacitors for leaks.
  - \*Clean the air supply fan motor housing and oil the motor at least once a year.
  - \*Check the fan control switch.
- The cost of an annual maintenance check is usually between \$25 and \$50. If you have any questions about saving on your cooling bill, call the Texas Energy Extension Service's Energy Hotline at 1-800-643-SAVE.

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# Frito Lay Sets New Crop Demo

Representatives of Frito-Lay, Inc., the nation's leading snack food company will meet with area farmers, extension agents and business people on May 17, 18 and 19 to demonstrate their interest in contracting additional acreage for canola and to promote it as an alternative crop for High Plains agriculture.

The meetings will take place at three Panhandle farms where contracted canola is currently being grown. Since this initial crop proved very successful, the company is interested in expanding its grower base and acreage for the 1988-89 growing season.

Attendees can view and inspect canola grown under different planting, irrigation and fertilization conditions at each site. Frito-Lay agronomists will explain the basics of their contract program and add farmers to a waiting list for the fall. Current growers and seed companies also will be on hand.

In essence, Frito-Lay is looking to contract direct with farmers who would plant certified canola seed and then sell the resulting crop direct to Frito-Lay at a fixed market cost.

According to Lane Burtz, director, oil purchasing for the company, Frito-Lay has contracted with farmers for over 25 years. "We currently contract with about 1,000 growers across the country for the corn and potatoes used in our snack foods," Burtz says. "Since we're looking for commodities that meet our specifications and high quality standards, we've found it easier to deal direct with our growers and they in turn have grown to appreciate the expertise our agronomists and researchers have provided in return."

Frito-Lay contracted with 17 farmers in the Texas Panhandle and eastern New Mexico last fall. Contracts were spread among growers in an area bounded roughly by Olton, Clovis, Sunray

and Wellington to test the crop's viability under a variety of conditions. Growers were given guidance as to cultural practices to follow, however, each farmer adapted his own equipment and land to the crop. The results will provide Frito-Lay agronomists with sufficient data to recommend the most effective production methods for use this fall.

Canola is planted in early September with harvest roughly two weeks before winter wheat, according to Burtz. The crop requires approximately the same direct costs and equipment as wheat, tolerates dry conditions, and demonstrated its winter hardiness during this past season.

Yields will vary according to farming practices and moisture received. Expected yields may approach 1,400 to 1,800 pounds per acre for dryland and 3,000 pounds per acre for irrigated land.

Frito-Lay will offer flat price contracts in July and August before the crop is planted. The exact price has not been set as the company wants to review this year's harvest results first. Establishing a price before planting is attractive to farmers, according to Burtz. "Flat pricing appeals to a grower who is a good planner and knows his costs," says Burtz. "He can pencil out an expected profit, obtain crop financing, and then go about concentrating on what he does best, growing his crop, and not be concerned about volatile fluctuations in commodity prices nor where to sell the crop when harvest comes."

Canola is a cousin of rapeseed, an oilseed grown widely in the cool climates of Europe, China and India. Canada, also a large producer, embarked on a breeding program in the 1960s to improve the nutritional aspects of the oil. The result was a seed so dramatically different that Canadians coined the new seed "canola" to avoid confusion with rapeseed.

Canola oil contains only 6% saturated fatty acids, less than half that found in corn oil. The oil is also 94% unsaturated, 62% of which is made up of monounsaturated fatty acids. Recent medical research indicates monounsaturates have a favorable impact on blood cholesterol levels in individuals who have reduced their intake of saturated fatty acids.

Frito-Lay operates an office and commodity storage facility in Hereford. Farmers interested in contracting with the company can contact the office at 806/364-3811.

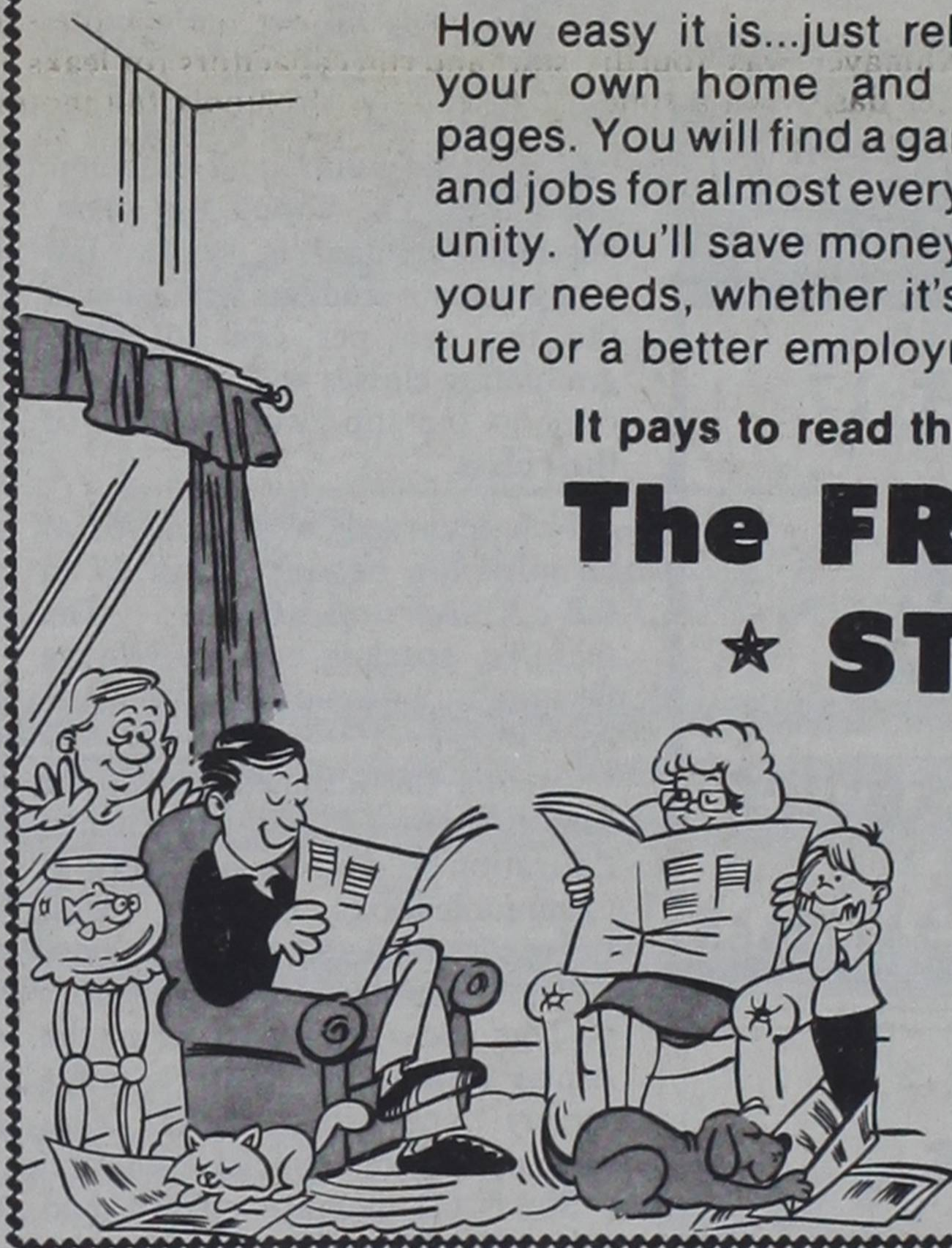

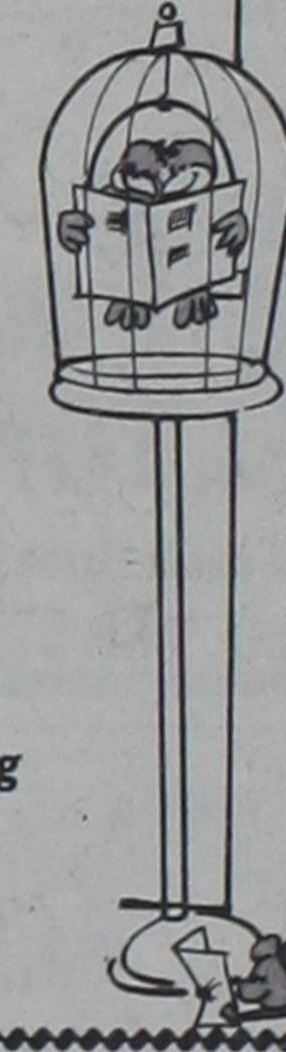

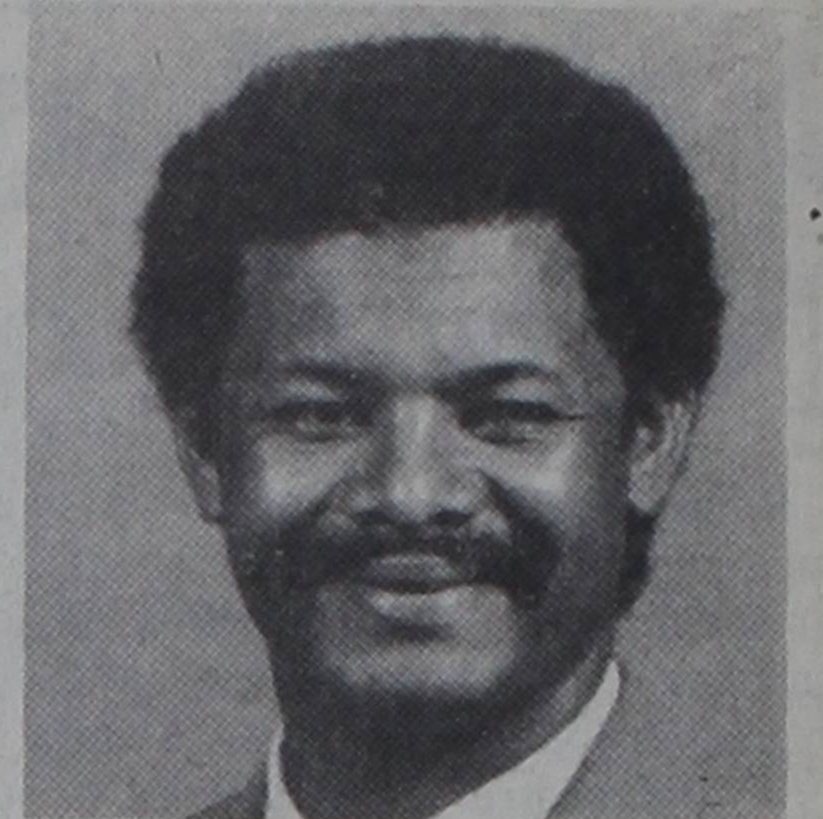
