ROOSEVELT MUST WATCH HIS STEP

BEING SON OF AN ILLUSTRIOUS FATHER SOMETIMES EMBAR. RASSING TO YOUNG MAN.

ALWAYS UNDER OBSERVATION

Took Another Step in Following His Father in Public Life When He Took the Oath as Assistant Secretary of the Navy.

ant secretary of the navy. In part, so far as public service is concerned, young Roosevelt has followed in the steps of his father. He was a member of the New York assembly, as his father was, and now he is assistant secretary of the pavy, as his father

Colonel Roosevelt perhaps is not entirely personally comfortable. He bears his father's name, and he looks like his father, and perhaps naturally the people look to him to make good, as his father did. This young man probably cannot help feeling that in sense he is under constant watch. He is a natural young man, but nevertheless, probably unconsciously, he is constantly on his guard, lest his feet silp. It must be irksome to know that everybody is taking such an interest in you, not always because it .s you, but simply because you are the son of your father. Under such circumstances how can a young man with proper ambitions always feel en tirely at ease?

Theodore Roosevelt is an entirely human young man. He has all the liking which his father had for out door life and for the public service. He is willing to work and no Demo crat, progressive Republican, con-servative Republican, or reactionary apublican ever bas entered denial of the young mun's Just for the strenuous life. is open to his speech. Wounded in Battle.

In the great war Theodore Roosewas wounded in battle; his brother Archibald was wounded three times; his brother Opentin was killed. while his brother Kermit, although in battle after battle, escaped uninjured, the only one of the family of four boys who was not a mark for a German bullet. In being wounded in battle, young Theodore Roosevelt went his father one better so far as record is concerned, although, if one chose to speak of a scratch, the elder colonel was wounded in the Spanish war when a bullet scraped the skin away from one side of his neck,

When Theodore Roosevelt, the elder, was assistant secretary of the pavy, he had unusual luck. It was one time during the absence of the secretary of the navy. It became necessary while the secretary was absent for the assistant secretary to act in a high matter. He acted promptly and effectively. It was due to him that Dewey had coal and ammunition enough to go to Manila and engage in the battle in the bay, and it also was due to Roosevelt that Dewey was where he his ships against those of the Span-



TO ASK FOR NEW CABINET PLACE

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND PUBLIC WELFARE IS PLANNED BY HARDING.

WOMAN WILL GET POSITION

Activities Planned for Dr. Sawyer Havs Close Connection With Plan for New Department-Doctor's Army Appointment Is Cause of Gossip,

Washington.—Members of the next congress seem convinced that President Harding will submit a plea for legislation to create a new branch of the government service to be known the department of education and blic welfare with a woman at its head who is to have a place in the cabinet.

There is some opposition developing to the plan and the chances are that it will be volced on the floors of the two houses of congress if the plan for he cannot see them as they open their the new department is submitted. There seems to be a feeling in both political parties, however, that, if the President makes a specific recommendation which of course amounts party majority in congress will heed his words and pass the legislation necessary to make the new place in the cabinet.

It has been known for a long time that some of the elements in the population were opposed to the creation of this new branch of government. Some of the churches have feared that under the new dispensation education in church schools might be interfered with and that, in effect, teaching might be wholly secularized.

Recently, however, some of the leading churchmen have said that their churches cannot be put in a position of opposition to anything which looks like the educational welfare of the country, and so it is possible that a part of the opposition has passed from the field.

All Will Be Heard.

Representatives and senators have said that everybody is to be given a chance to be heard by the committees when the hearings on the measure creating the department are held. It is promised that the legislation will not be passed hurriedly. If the President shall ask that the department be created, the measure for its creation when first formulated for committee consideration will be open to suggestions for amendment, and it is probable that a good many amendments will be brought forward.

The recent appointment of Dr. C. E. Sawyer of Marion, O., as a brigadler general in the reserve corps of the United States army has a close connection with the plan for a department of education and public welfare. General Sawyer is to make a survey of the field of things related to the public health and the public welfare, and under the direction of the President is to make a report thereon. This report, in part at any rate, is likely to be used as a basis for the new legislation. It also will contain many recommendations based on Dr. Sawyer's study, concerning the activities which should be undertaken by the various bureaus which will be brought within the new department. Service for the maintenance of the health of the public is closely connected with much of the work which the government is now doing in rather a scattered form.

If the new department is created, the woman's bureau and the children's bureau of the Department of Labor; the bureau of education and the Department of the Interior, and the war risk insurance bureau and the public health services of the Treasury department, will be transferred to the jurisdiction of the new cabinet officer. It is also expected that the federal board for vocational education and all other governmental agencies dealing with soldier relief will be concentrated in one bureau of the newly created department.

Gossip About Sawyer.

There has been a good deal of gossip in Washington over the commissioning of Dr. Charles E. Sawyer of Marion, O., as a brigadier general in the reserve corps of the United States army. It should be said that Dr. Sawyer's appointment will not in any way interfere with the promotion of other officers in the medical corps of the regular army.

One bit of gossip about the matter has its "medical connection." General Sawyer is a homeopathist and most of the medical officers of the army are of the school of allopathy. In fact, it might be said that the basis of practice in the regular army is allopathic. It is not to be supposed that there will be any trouble, but everybody knows that there is a feeling between the two schools and that it never has been entirely kept under cover.

Near Scott Circle in Washington there is a statue of Christian Friedrich Samuel Hahneman, the founder of homeopathy. 

INDIAN FIGHTERS MEET AT DINNER

GENERALS N. A. MILES, KING AND OTHERS AT ANNUAL FEAST OF PLAINS WARRIORS.

REVIEW THE OLD CAMPAIGNS

Tales of Valor and Hardships Told by Men Who Conquered the Red Men Even While They Felt Pity for

By EDWARD B. CLARK.

- The inauguration drew to Washington many men who had a secondary purpose in coming here, and this secondary purpose was not office seeking. There has just been held here the annual dinner of the Order of Indian Wars, and it certainly was a fine lot of old warriors of th plains who sat about the board and lived over the days when they were on the trail of the Kiowas, Commanches Arapahoes, Apaches, Sloux and Ner

Among those who met at this dinner were Gen. Nelson A. Miles, Charles King, Gen. William P. Hall, Gen. Anson Mills Gen. Charles Frederic Humphrey and Gen. Wilds P. Richardson, and a lot of other officers younger in years, but none of whom by any means could be considered a youth.

General King of Milwaukee, who known all over the country as a novelist and who began his "fiction founded on fact" writing when he was Captain King, told the story of the Sioux cam-paign of 1875-76. Today, in the overshadowing deeds of the great war, th deeds and hardships of the men who fought on the plains are apt to be for-It can be said, however, with perfect truth that no American soldier of the war which has just ended went through worse experiences than those of their elder comrades who, in broiling summer and freezing winter, hungry and half-clad, hung on the trail of the elusive red warriors.

Sympathy for the Indian. Before going any further, let it be said that all through the stories that were told at the Indian Wars dinner ran the notes of sympathy for the Indians whom these men had fought. It can be said that in this latter day these soldiers of the Indian wars who had been true to their duty, distasteful as it was, still feel resentment that it was necessary for them to engage in :

General King told of a command of troops which, although it had suffered at the hands of the Cheyennes, had such sympathy and admiration for the formen that the soldiers begged the Indians to surrender and not to continu the battle which meant virtually their

One story he told of an interview which he was trying to induce to return to the reservation so that warrior lives might not be lost in what must be the general, in a picturesque Indian way which cannot be reproduced here, St. Edward's. that once he had been in Washington to interview the Great Father and that the Great Father had promised that the white man should not go into the Black Hills country, for that was set aside for the red man forever. "I was lied to then," said the chief, "but you have never lied to me and I believe that if we go back to the reservation the fears of my men that there they are to be killed will be found false."

It should be said in this connection that presidents of the United States making promises to the Indians intended that they should be kept, but that adventurous and gold-seeking white men insisted on penetrating the Indian reservations and precipitating trouble. When whites were killed it became necessary, from the War department's viewpoint, to send forth an army, and promises which were made in good faith were broken.

Representative Charles Russell Davis of St. Peter, Minn., was present at the dinner. He was taken by his grandparents into Minnesota in the early 50s, and was reared in the heart of Siouxland. He was a witness of the uprising of 1862 which led to the killings at New Ulm and other places.



IS NOT PARTISAN MATTER

Influential Leaders in Congress Do Not Want Coolidge to Share With Cabinet Officers Official Intimacy With President.

in Washington, who perhaps know what they would like to have happen, who think that the lease of life of Vice President Coolidge as an outside member of the cabinet is likely to be a short one. In other words, there are some officials in legislative life who do not like the idea of having the vice president sit in at the cabinet meetings and who think that thereby some of their own prestige is to be lost.

So far as one who has been in this town a good many years can remember, there never has been an innovan of any kind which was entirely well received by all the legislative gentlemen who sit on Capitol Hill, and whose desire is to guard their prerogatives in any case.

This thing is in no sense a partisan matter. It is simply a human matter. The Democrats and Republicans alike have shown jealousy of extra powers newly conferred on government offi-cials and occasionally have taken it out in carping at what they call newfangled notions, generally predicting dire happenings unless reform speedily should be worked.

When President Harding, while yet candidate for election, said that he thought the vice president ought to have a more important place in the counsels of the administration, there seemingly was general public, or at any rate, party approval of the sugestion. There was no Republican legislator at that time who cared to raise his voice in protest, or even in mild criticism of the candidate's sugestion, for no party man with a desire for success of the ticket cares in the middle of a campaign to say anything direct or indirect in contrarention of an expressed thought of the standard bearer.

Leaders Find Fault.

Today things are a little different. The Republicans succeeded in carryng the election. Now with a big majority in either house of congress and with four years of the presidency to run, some few leaders are beginning to speak out a bit. Apparently the influential ones do not want Mr. Cool-idge to share with the cabinet officers official intimacy with the President of the United States which attendance at the meetings of the cabinet necessarily involves,

Why is this? The reason is easy. The Republican leaders in house and senate always have maintained they should be the first ones to receive from the President of the United States any intimation of a new legislative policy, or of the revival of an old one. They do not like to feel that any man except a cabinet officer, even ent of the United States, shall get advance information or that the leaders should be expected to receive their information from anybody but the Prest-

In President's Hands.

It must be said that it is likely that the outcroppings of criticism, and possibly jealousy, which have manifested themselves here recently in this matter of the vice presidential cabinet duties soon will disappear from the scene. Legislators, even leading ones, frequently like other people, are given to second thoughts on a sublect. In truth, the whole thing probably is in the hands of President Harding. There is no doubt about his desire to have the vice president take part in the administration's cabinet If a President of the United States, no matter what his party, makes it known to the leaders in congress that he desires a certain thing and intends to stand by his desire, the leaders generally recede from any advanced position which they may have taken and utter a word or two to the effect "we never meant it."

The vice president took part in the first cabinet meeting of the year, and Information came that his presence was satisfactory to all the members of the cabinet, and that the President was especially pleased because Mr. Coolidge, when his opinion was asked on any subject, gave it freely, and without any embarrassment arising

from the new order of things.
