## "GOING DOWN," IS **DIRECTION TAKEN** BY LOCAL PRICES

Sweetwater Merchants Have Reduced Groceries, Dry Goods, Etc., Recently.

How much has the cost of living been reduced in Sweetwater is the question asked by numbers of persous, especially since the war time prices have begun to tumble and the so-called "business depression" has brought near normal conditions back.

The Secretary of the Board of City Development has gone to considerable trouble to compile information relative to the cost of living and has come to the conclusion that Sweetwater merchants have reduced then products just as much as merchants at other places.

Groceries have declined, within the last twelve months all the way from 19 per cent on some to 1081/2 per cent on others. Following are the reductions in groceries and meats, commonly used, according to the report issued; Flour 25 per cent; sugar 621/4 per cent; meal 30; coffee 281/4; round steak25; eggs 75; butter 25; beans 30; syrup 521/4; potatoes 108%; canned sausage 30; shortening 61; tomatoes

The next line of merchandise in which the public seems to be most interested is dry goods, shoes and clothing. The following reductions have been shown in these lines;

#### America May Be Europe's Granary Even With Our Population Doubled.

By GUSTAVE MILLER.

Our nitrate situation is not one that we can look upon with equanimity. We must develop great electrical plants, which we cannot do by steam because of the increasingly serious coal situation, that will supply us with nitrates. The more nitrates we have the more food we can pro-

The average comparative yield per acre in bushels and crops in the United States and Europe was, prior to the war-no subsequent reliable figures being available-as follows: Wheat-Europe, 32 bushels; United States, 15 bushels; oats-Europe, 47 bushels; United States, 29 bushels; barley-Europe, 38 bushels; United States, 25 bushels; rye-Europe, 30 bushels; United States 16 bushels; potatoes-Europe, 158 bushels; United States, 96 bushels.

And the reason? Here it is: In Belgium they use 448 pounds, in Germany 214 pounds, and in this country 28 pounds of fertilizer per acre

In the long run our ability to compete with European nations will depend to a large degree on our ability to produce as much food per acre as they do. That cannot be done without liberal use of nitrates as fertilizer; and to produce nitrate in sufficient quantities we must have a large number of great hydro-electric plants that can be built at greatly reduced cost in connection with irrigation developments. Then the United States might be the granary of Europe, even when her population has more than doubled.

#### Man, to Fight the Influenza, Must Go Back to the Old-Time Nightcap.

By LOUIS SAINT MAURICE, French Physician.

Years ago, when nightcaps were universally worn, no one ever had colds, either in the head or in the chest. Lagrippe was unknown, influenza had never been hard of.

On the other hand, art and literature of the past, well up to the Eighteenth century, show that every one, rich and poor, young and old, men and women, all wore nightcaps. Toward the end of the Eighteenth century the nightcap began to fall into disuse, and in less than 100 years it has practically disappeared.

On the other hand, the need of protection for the head during the night has increased. The protecting shell of bone, the cranium, is getting thinner to make room for the larger brain.

Investigation proves that a cold in the head is the necessary setting for an attack of influenza. Further investigation shows that in an overwhelming majority of cases, a cold is "caught" during the night, while one is in bed. As a preventive against the Spanish "flu," there is not a better precaution than wearing a woolen nightcap.

#### Conflicts of Experts.

The sort of thing occurs in commit teen every time that any hearing is be ing held on subjects of high economic import. 




