East Texas Chamber of Commerce Joins Sweetwater Forces

FT. WORTH AND W. TEXAS CHAMBERS Texas Government Faulty, **ENDORSE MOVE TO FORCE RECOGNI-**TION AND TO GAIN EQUAL RIGHTS

Verbal assurance of the support of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has been made, while the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce has delegated a representative to attend the conference and pledge the whole-hearted support of that body in the fight.

as Claimed by Sweetwater, Says Star-Telegram Editor

"The State shall be divided into Senatorial districts of contiguous territory according to the number of qualified voters, as nearly as may be, and each district shall be entitled to elect one Senator."-Section 25, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas.

"The Legislature shall, at its first session after the publication of each United States decennial census, apportion the State into Senatorial and Representative districts, agreeably to the provisions of Sections 25 and 28 of this Article."-Section 28, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas.

"The Senators shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new Senate shall be chosen after every ap portionment, and the Senators elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of the second class at the expiration of four years, so that one-half the Senators shall be chosen biennially thereafter."-Section 3, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas.

"Taxation shall be equal and uniform. All property in this State shall be taxed in proportion to its value, which shall be ascertained as may be provided by law."-Section 1, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas.

"The United States shall guarantee to every State in this Union a republican form of government."-Section 4, Article IV, Constitution of the United States.

The State of Texas today is violating the letter and the spirit of all of these provisions .- Star-Telegram.

IMMIGRATION TO

CONGRESS WILL FIND BIG PRO-GRAM OF WORK READY FOR IT AT EXTRA SESSION.

FOR PEACE WITH GERMANY

Knox Resolution Expected to Show Its Head Early in the Senate-Navy Appropriation Bill to Receive Early

By EDWARD B. CLARK.

Washington.-Congress knows pretwell what duties it will be expected to perform, and the order in which they must be taken up, when the extra session comes into being. In truth, President Harding, in his inaugural address, gave some intimation of what be expects, although he did not go into specifications.

When the new congress assembles in April it probably will find waiting for some definite plan concerning formerelations. It is, of course, possible that the President and the secretary of state will not find enough time etween now and the convening of coness to set forth definitely their views ocerning the vexing question of our lations with the lands across the sea, but it is not believed that spring will be far advanced before plans are presented for action or rejection, although it can be taken for granted that, with the heavy Republican majority in both houses, no administration plan stands in much danger of dis-

The Knox resolution for immediate peace with Germany may show its bead in the senate within a day or two after the next session begins, although now there is some thought of postponing it. The high hope of some of the senators is that the President will recommend the coupling up with the resolution of a paragraph which will give to France a new evidence of our friendship for that country. No one can tell, however, as to how this will be, because there has been strong opposition in congress to doing anything with the Knox resolution except to pass it in the briefest possible form, a form which shall include nothing except a bald statement that peace exists with Germany.

Harding Gave Warning

In his innugural address Mr. Hard ing said: "There is no instant step from disorder to order. We must face a condition of grim reality, charge off. our losses and start afresh. It is the oldest lesson of civilization. I would like the government to do what it can to mitigate them. In understanding, in mutuality of interest, in concern for the common good, our tasks will be

Every President in recent years or taking office has said something in his Inaugural address to remove from the minds of certain kinds of people the thought that because an administration is changed instant relief from evil can be expected. Mr. Wilson said something of this kind when he came into office, and so did Mr. Taft and Mr. Roosevelt, and it may be that all the Presidents before their time had a like thought, and uttered a like note

of warning. It must be remembered that this is a Republican administration, Republican in the White House, Republican in both branches of conkress and Republican in all the executive departments. Consequently the Republican party is to be held responsible for everything that is done or that is left undone. The President has been hold-ing conferences with leaders of congress. Apparently the executive and the legislative branches want to make good, but it can be said without any animus whatsoever that some of the legislators, as has been the history of things ever since politics was, seem to want to make good in everything only if it can be done without injuring their

chances of re-election. Pass Immigration Bill.

The plan of the Republicans is for an immediate passing of the immigration bill which failed of passage at the last session. The President and a ma-jority of the Republican senators and representatives apparently want to have this bill put through in just the form in which it was passed at the last session, but influences have been brought to bear on some of the members and senators, and it looks now as If the percentage rate of immigrants who are to be allowed to enter the country is to be raised. Congress at the last session fixed the immigration rate at 3 per cent of the persons of any one nationality new residing within the United States. Now it is being urged that the percentage be raised per cent, and there are some mem bers of congress who would like to see it put up to a much higher point.

The immigration bill, however, will go through and it seems likely today that the only yielding that will come will be in the direction of raising of the rate of influe from 3 per cent to 5 per cent. At the 5 per cent rate about 4:0,000 immigrants will be admitted

Into the United States every year. The navy appropriation bill failed of passage at the last session of congress. It will be taken up immediately on the ceassembling of the lawmakers, and with its discussion will come a continuation of the debate on disarmament. The country is to hear a great deal more about the navy building program of Japan before congress finally acts on matters concerning our own fleets.
