"A bill to appropriate \$3,000,000 t supplement the available school funfor the fiscal year, (Signed.)

"A bill appropriating \$4,000,000 mid of rural schools, (Vetoed.)

"A bill appropriating \$50,000 with which to establish an Agricultural and Mechanical College in West Texas," (Vetocd.)

We have read carefully the letter from the Governor and do not approve of his action on all of the bills for the following reasons:

The bill carrying appropriation for the rural schools should have been signed the bill for the State University should have been vetoed. We are in favor of higher education, but opposed to sacrificing the rural schools for the benefit of the colleges.

The \$50,000 appropriation for a branch of the West Texas A. & M. College to be located in West Texas is a small matter, and we approve of the Governor's action in vetoing this bill for the reason that that amount would scarcely build a chicken coop after the necessary land has been bought.


