"The records will show that I have paid more money into the school funds of Mitchell County than any other citizen." Dr. P. C. Co'eman stated in an address Wednesday afternoon at a mass meeting held for the purpose of discussing the school cuestion. "I have never complained about taxes and in case it be necessary to carry on the schools here, I call upon the school board to double my present valuation of property, or increase it three times if necessary."

Mud Stains (Colored Goods)-Let | pentine, camphor or similar deterthe mud dry thoroughly, and then re- gents to remain on a polished surface move as much as possible by brushing When fully dry cover with a mixture of salt and flour and keep in a dry

If the stains are extensive place the garment in a large papr sack with a quantity of salt and flour well mixed, shake vigorously, tie the sack, and allow it to hang behind the stove for a few days. Afterwards

shake out the dust and press.

Mud Stans (White Goods)—Dip the
mud stains in kerosene before putting them in the boiler. Add kerosene to the boiling water.

To take Iron Rust out of any white goods, dissolve 5 cents worth of oxalic acid in about 3 teacups of warm rain water, let stand 24 hours. If there are still acid crysta's into bottom of bottle, pour off clear acid wat er and use that. Pour liquid through the stain and be sure and put in sun; if stains do not disappear repeat until they do Be sure and thoroughly ringe the acid out immediately after the stain disappears. May be used on the finest fabric, but be sure and put in the open air or in sunlight if possible Ink spots may be removed in the same way.

Salt and vinegar will remove stains from china.

To take berry stains out of table lin en, pour boiling water through the stain before being wet with soapy wat

Salt rubbed on the black spots on dishes will remove them, and salt placed over a fresh claret stain on the table linen will assist it to disappear when washed



### From Official Government Report Filed With Department Justice at Washington

The State of Texas,C ounty of Dallas

1, W. H. Graham, do hereby certify that at the instance of the Attorney General of the United States, I personally reported the speech made by Hon. Oscar Callaway at Comanche, Texas, on August 25, 1917; that I took same down correctly in shorthand and that I correctly transcribed same, and that the foregoing nineteen pages is the full, true and correct copy of said speech furnished the said Attorney-General in the Department of Justice of the United States, at Washington, D. C.

(The following are extracts from Mr. Callaway's Speech:) "They are taking me down here today. Do you suppose these men weren't sent here by somebody to take my speech for the purpose of getting me if they could? They want to take me up. \* \* . Haven't we got a right to discuss this thing?

"You pople can determine whether or not you want to carry this war on or don't want to carry it on. . . Do you know what the president says we are in it for?-To make the world safe for democracy. . . The world for democracy. You all eanot know how contemptibly tradulent that sounds to me. \* \* Oh, but they say it is treason to talk now. \* \* We know the difference between violating a law and opposing it. . . You can determine for yourselves. \* \* Every citizen in this country has been pinched. Everybody in this land knows whether he wants this or don't want it. . . If you don't act in unison in this country, you will be divided and

"Let us see what this thing means to us, this going out to make the world safe for democracy. (A voice: Hurrah for Wilson.) This going into this thing for no particular reason of our own or grievance of our own.

Then talk to us about economizing at the table. Haven't they been sending somebody around to tell you that? (A voice: "Eat twice a day.") (Another voice: "Yes, but they don't have much luck about it at my house.") Well you determine whether you want to do it or not. \* \* Be cautious that you do not come in contact with Federal officials. \* \* Determine what you are going to do and then reach for a lignumvitae club for these officers, loaded to scatter, get every one of them from constable to president of the United States,"
