4-H Fair, Banquet Saturday

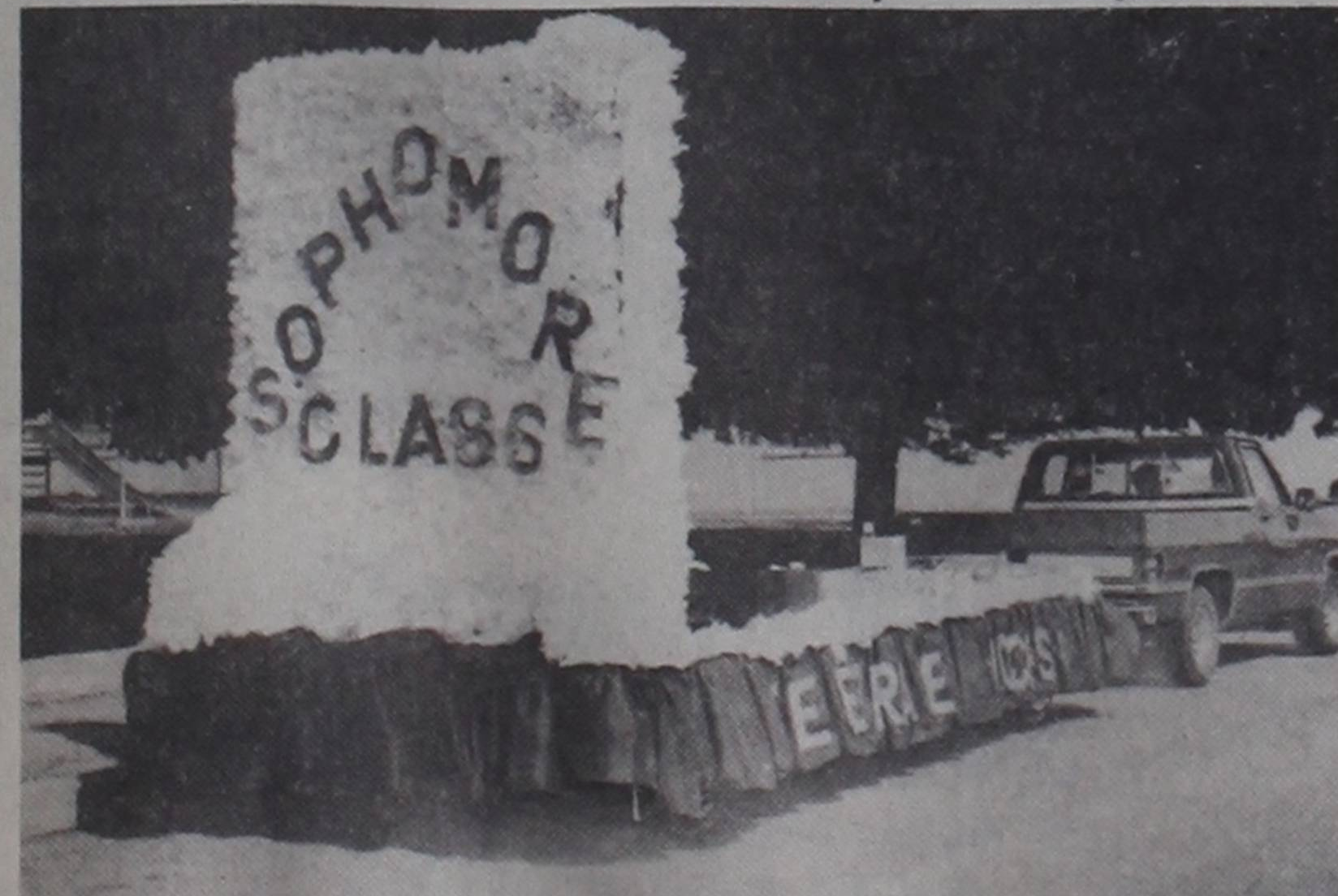
The 4-H Project Fair, Bucket Calf Show and Awards Banquet will be held Saturday, September 17. The activities will be held at the Friona Community Center.

School To Dismiss Earlier

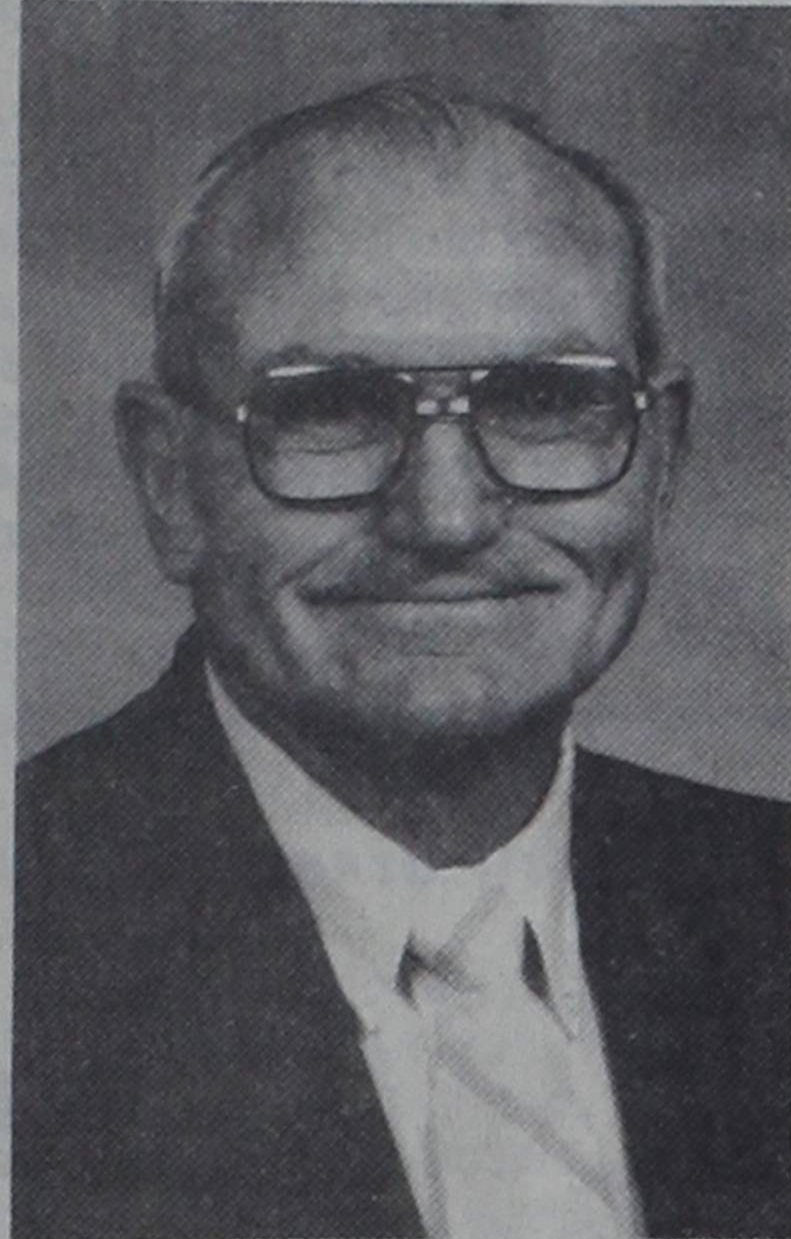

He was ordained as a deacon in 1966, and as an elder in 1968.

Hail Damages Crops In Hub Vicinity

The Friona area received its first general rain in quite some time Wednesday night, although the late summer thunderstorm also brought some unwanted hail to some areas.

O.L. (Mac) McMurtrey at Hub Grain said that the hail totally devastated some corn and cotton in an area about six miles long by three miles wide.

The damage reached at least to the John R. Cook farm four miles west of Hub, to two and one-half miles east of the Hub intersection, and battered farms on both sides of Highway 86.

A lot of the corn was knocked down. "I would say that a third of the corn is down in that area," McMurtrey estimated. The cotton was also prematurely stripped, with the bolls and leaves knocked off the cotton plants.

The rest of the area, although getting a smattering of hail, generally was spared the damage of the Hub area.

Friona's official measurement was 1.15 inches of rain from the Wednesday night cloud. It came in

Moss said he felt that Canyon was a lot like River Road, and that if FHS had all its players, they could do a good job against the Eagles.

"We'll just have to see," Moss concluded.

IN LAWSUIT

Hereford Firm Wins Settlement

(From the Hereford Brand)

Hereford Bi-Products Inc. and Southwest Hide Co. recently won an in-court settlement of \$5 million from Amarillo By-Products Inc., defendant in a civil trial in U.S. District Court in Amarillo.

Garth Merrick, president of Hereford Bi-Products, issued a statement on the suit Friday because of his "concern that the general public is not aware of the outcome of the suit nor the fact that his company is not related to the Amarillo firm."

Merrick added that an article in The Amarillo Globe-News this week brought his attention to the fact that area citizens--including some of his customers--were not aware of the reasons for the court case.

The Amarillo article reported that the Amarillo City Commission had ordered Amarillo By-Products to adopt an acceptable plan for treatment of its industrial waste and implement that plan by Dec. 1. The story also added that Amarillo By-Products had been a defendant in a Racketeer Influenced Corrupt Organization case, and that U.S. District Judge Mary Lou Robinson had announced settlement terms of a \$5 million payment to plaintiffs Hereford Bi-Products and Southwest Hide Co., with the payment to be hiked to \$15 million if the \$5 million was not paid by a certain date.

Merrick said the in-court settlement was announced on the fourth day of the trial on July 27. The suit filed by Hereford Bi-Products alleged, in part, that Amarillo By-Products "conspired to commit fraud and theft" of money and property against the plaintiffs and

others. Some of the others allegedly damaged included Caviness Packing, Palo Duro Packing, Great Western Meat Co. and 66 Pack. Southwest Hide, co-plaintiff, is based in Boise, Idaho.

The suit claimed that the RICO act applied because "the racketeering activities participated in by the defendants include: daily forgery of business records and theft of both rendering materials and animal hides, which has been perpetrated, concealed and carried out by the transmission of forged, false and fraudulent documents through the U.S. Mail...by transmission of false and fraudulent information over interstate telephone lines; transportation, receipt and sale of stolen hides and rendering materials taken out of interstate commerce and shipped across state lines...the emulsification of water and sludge into shipments of grease through fraudulent and false pretenses; fraudulent giving low render yield test results."

Merrick explains that he did not seek publicity about the civil suit, "the news media did not pick up on the case and little publicity was seen or heard by the public." He added there seemed to be enough confusion on the name identity of the companies involved that he should make a statement.

Hereford Bi-Products has other plants in Plainview, Friona, Muleshoe, Stratford, Spearman, Clovis, N.M., Guyton, OK., and Amarillo Canning Co. in Amarillo.

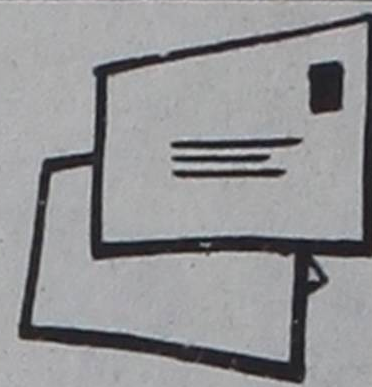

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Letters To The Editor



Dear Bill,

A week has come and gone since last I wrote a letter to the editor. Since that time, the Parmer County Commissioners Court has met and passed their budget for 1989.

On Monday, the Commissioners met to chart their course for the upcoming year. For this all-important meeting, our County Judge chose to be absent. The budget was set early in the day and a Public Hearing on that document was held in the afternoon. With the absence of a judge, Friona Commissioner Ernest Anthony presided.

Since the meeting, a common question has been brought up by many of the 25-30 persons attending the meeting, "Why didn't our Commissioner say anything in support of our request?" I don't have an answer as to why Judge Roberts chose not to be there. I guess everyone will have to ask them-Why? I would like to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to those persons who attended the meeting and expressed their concerns.

We were met with deaf ears. After having been presented facts as to where a large percentage of their tax dollars originate, the Parmer County Commissioners

continue to treat Friona taxpayers as if they weren't citizens of Parmer County. They still haven't answered the question, "Where are you spending the Friona citizens' tax dollar?"

The following are some comparative facts and figures I feel every taxpaying citizen of Friona should know:

1. Friona citizens will pay \$176,332 to Parmer County. Farwell citizens will pay \$62,928 to Parmer County. Bovina citizens will pay \$54,874 to Parmer County.

2. Of the total of \$294,134, Friona accounts for 59.9%, Farwell pays 21.4% and Bovina pays 18.7%.

3. To be fair to all, the \$12,000 allotted to the three cities should be based on the above percentage which would be \$7,188 to Friona, \$2,568 to Farwell; \$2,244 to Bovina. As it is, each will get \$4,000.

4. The Commissioners allocated a total of \$18,600 to the cities for ambulance service. Using the same percentages above, Friona should get \$11,113.50. Farwell should get \$4,028.76. Bovina should get \$3,457.74. As the budget was set, Friona will get \$9,600. Farwell and Bovina will each receive \$4,500.

It seems to me that Friona

continues to get the grease while everyone else gets the gravy.

The Commissioners seem to think that we approached them for a handout. Folks, the City of Friona doesn't need a handout. What we need is for the county to pay their way. Put some of our money back into our hands so that we can pay for the county services that we provide.

In 1989, we will find the means to purchase the required fire truck without any help from the Parmer County Commissioners. In 1989, we will continue to fight their fires for them. In 1989, we citizens of Friona, will continue to send our money to Farwell. In 1989, the Commissioners Court will spend our money in a manner which benefits everyone but us.

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
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

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PTA Guest Presents Program

Dr. Guadalupe Quintanilla is a woman worth listening to, says a spokesman for the Friona PTA.

A Mexican youngster brought by her parents to Brownsville, Texas, she quit school at the age of 12, after intelligence tests indicated she had an I.Q. of 64, some 30 points below average. This test was given in English when Dr. Quintanilla only spoke Spanish.

When her children needed her help to overcome the same problem, she wanted to go to school herself to learn how to help them learn. She then found out her records showed that she was "mentally retarded."

With alot of persistence, she did go back to school. Taking classes in basic English, basic math and typing at Texas Southmost College, she started her education.

Her appetite for knowledge was insatiable. Three days a week, she studied at Texas Southmost; two days she attended classes at Pan American University in Edinburg, 70 miles away. After three years, she received both her junior-

college degree and a Bachelor of Science degree, with honors, from Pan American.

She then cast her eyes on the University of Houston, where she could study Spanish literature. In 1971, she received her Master's degree; in 1977, her doctorate in education. In the years that followed, she became the first Latina to win the American Council of Education Fellowship.

The grade school dropout without a high school diploma is now Assistant Provost for the University of Houston.

Dr. Quintanilla will be speaking in Friona at the Junior High Auditorium, Euclid Avenue, on Monday, September 26 at 7 p.m. Friona PTA invites everyone to come hear about her experiences.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 8, 1988

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

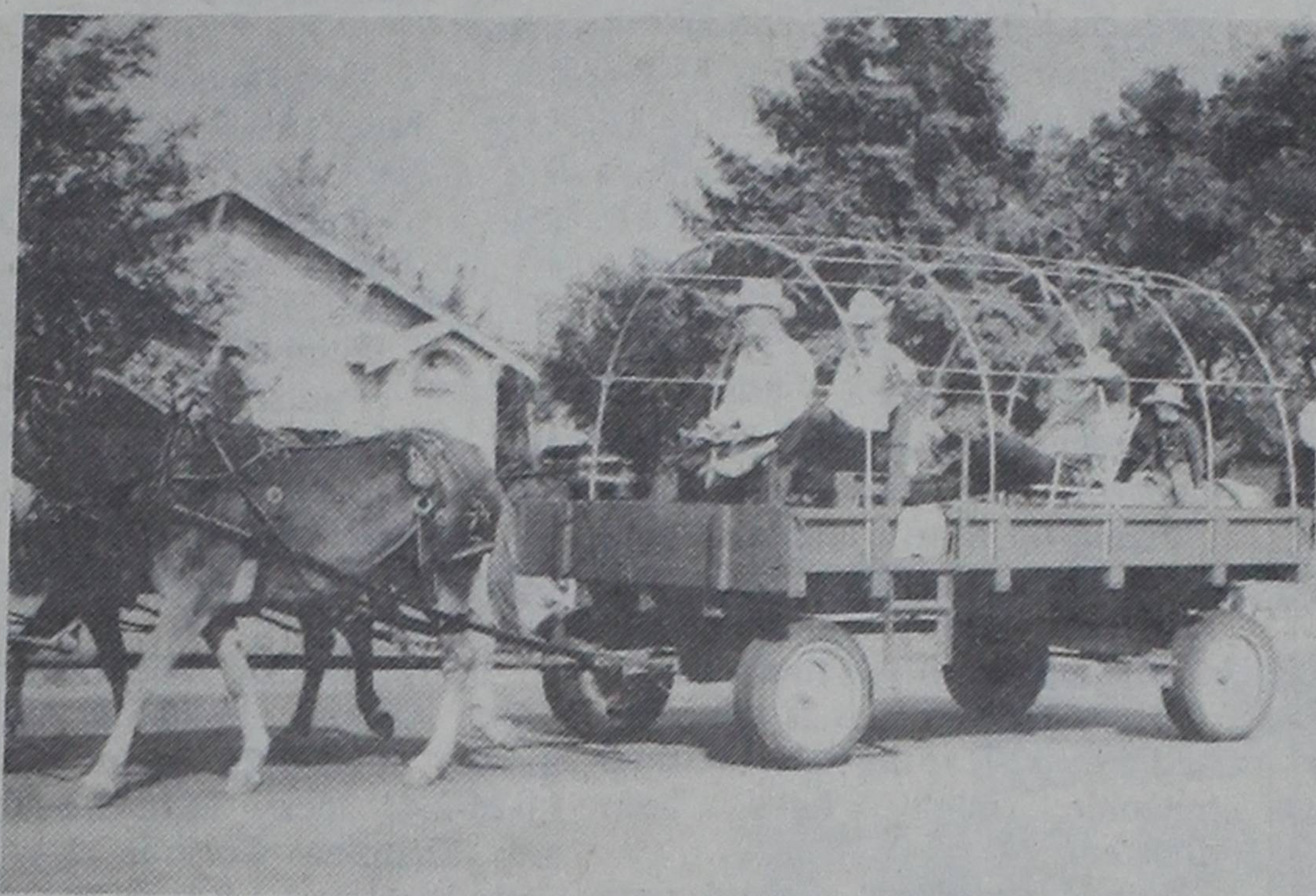

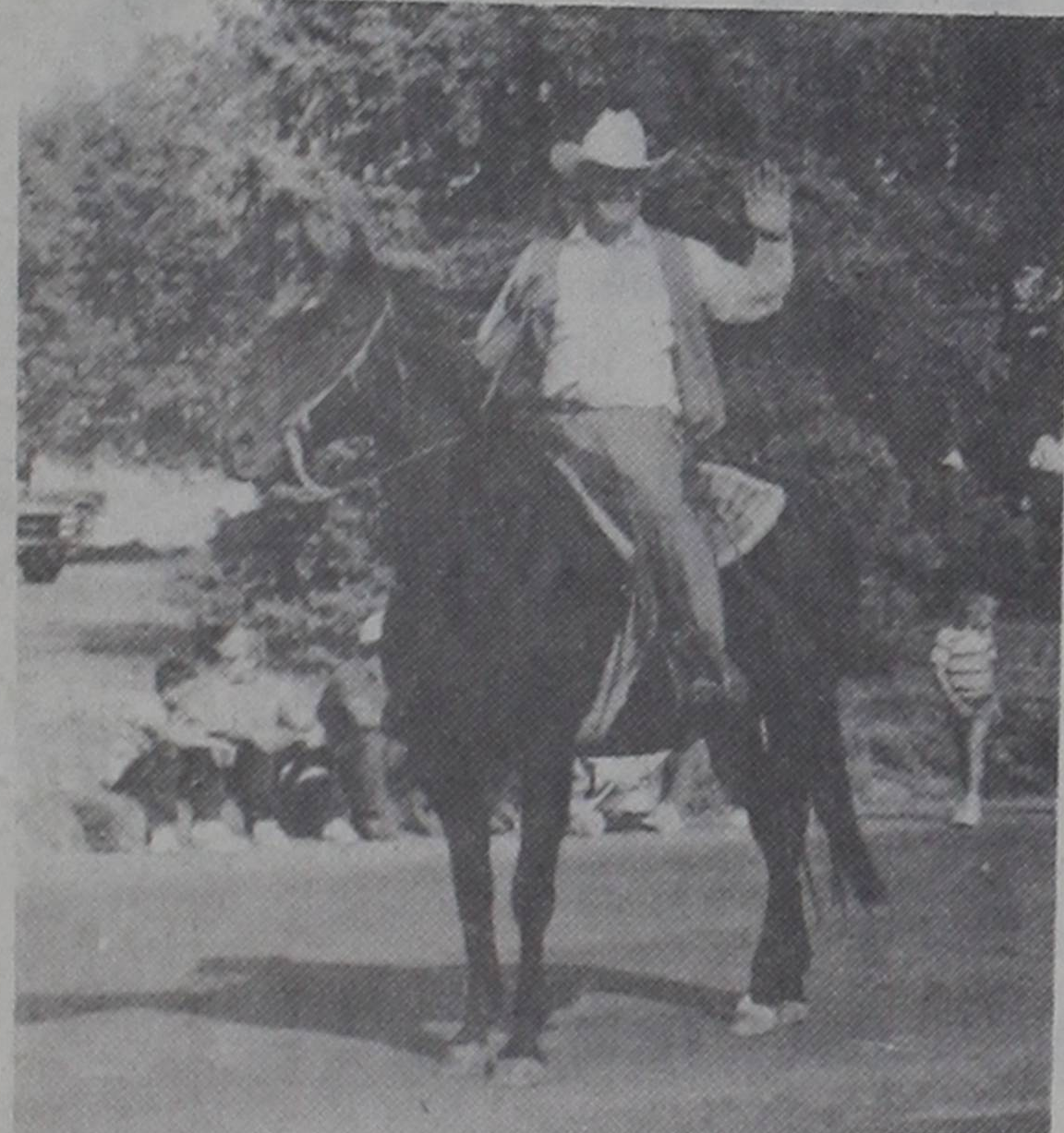

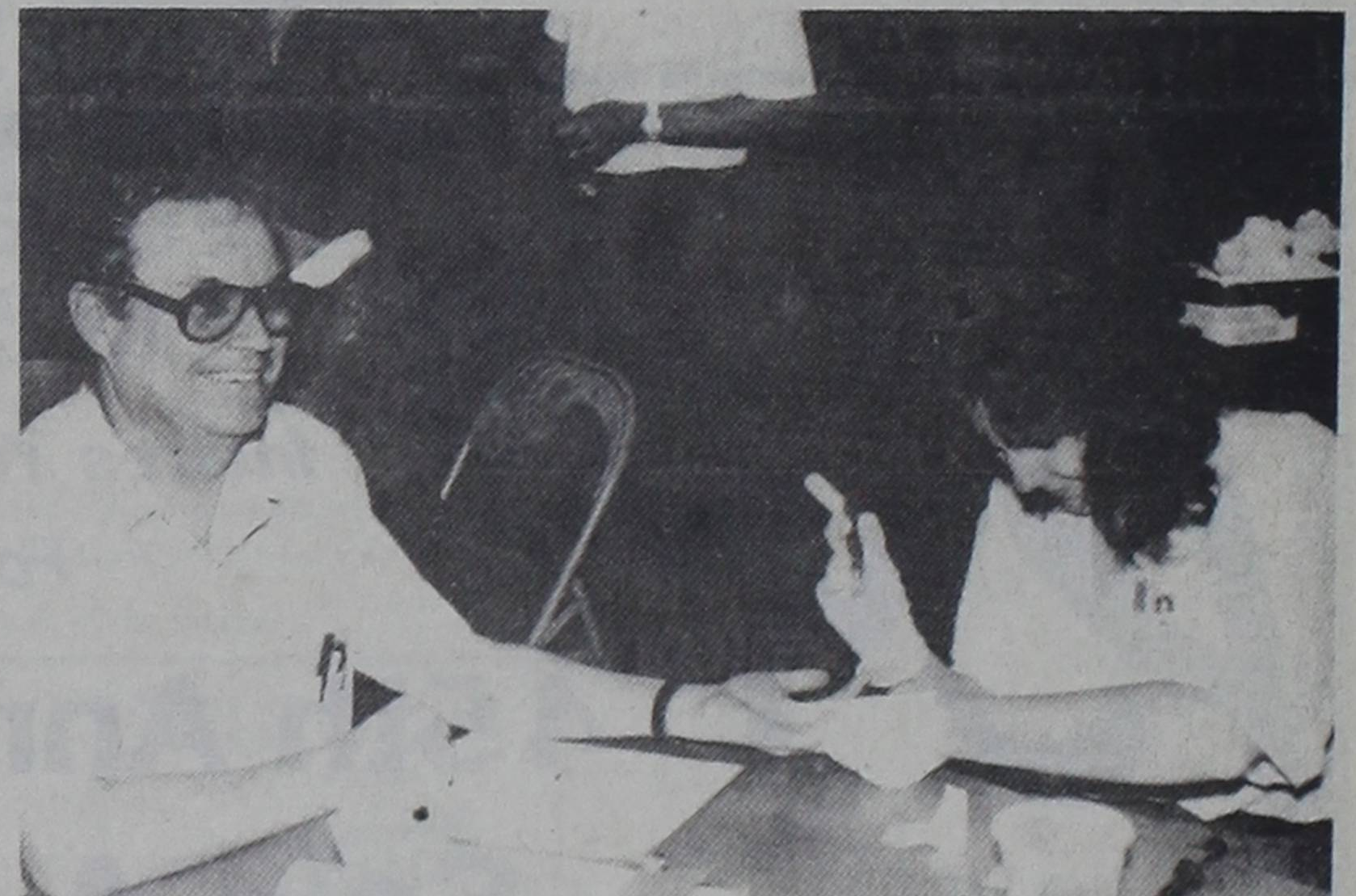

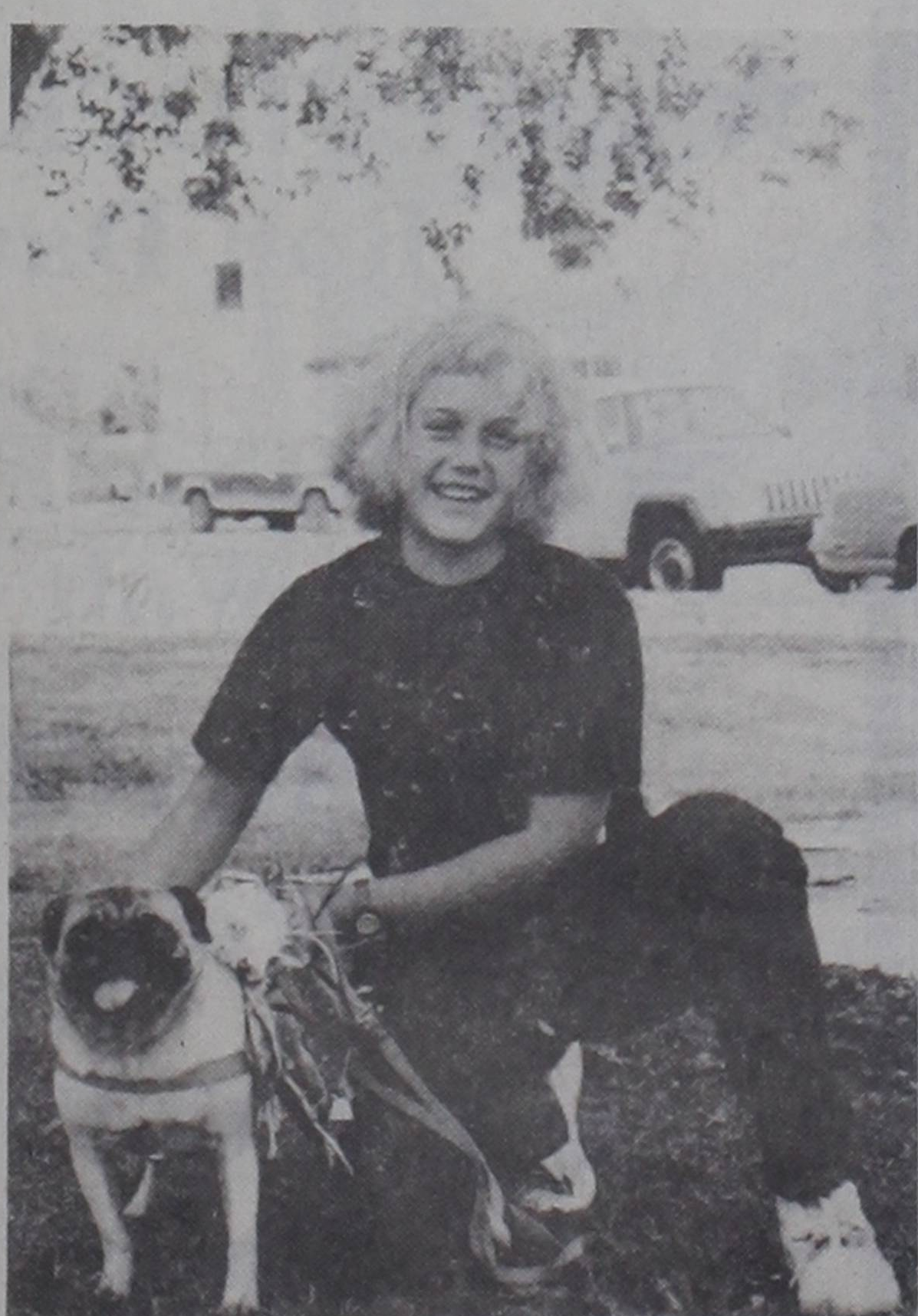

Chieftains Play Tough Against Potent Cubs

The Friona Chieftains survived a shocking beginning to play a commendable game against the Brownfield Cubs, the number one-ranked team in the area, last Friday night at Chieftain Field.

The Cubs scored an 18-0 win, but outside of a few plays were challenged on even terms by the outranked Chieftains.

Brownfield scored on the game's first play from scrimmage, a 61-yard run, on which Friona's stellar lineman Paul Trimmell was injured.

Play was stopped for a considerable amount of time while emergency workers tended to Trimmell and removed him by ambulance from the field. He was taken to Parmer County

Community Hospital and treated for a neck injury.

The second time Brownfield had the ball, the Cubs completed a pair of passes to advance the ball nicely. Then tailback Craig Reed, who had scored on the game's first play, advanced to the Chieftain eight-yard line with an 18-yard burst.

However, a hard defensive lick against Reed separated him from the ball and Friona recovered at their own 12.

The Chieftains could move only to their 17, and on fourth down Andre Duran was called on to punt. He got off a nice kick, which with a good bounce, backed the Cubs up to their own 29-yard-line, a nifty 64-yard punt.

Once again Friona claimed a Brownfield fumble, and were in business in the Cubs' end of the field.

Quarterback Cody Burney gained nine yards, Friona recovered their own fumble, and a pass fell incomplete from the Brownfield 30. Burney's 48-yard field goal attempt was low.

Brownfield broke a couple of big plays, to get their second TD of the game with six seconds left in the first quarter. A two-point conversion attempt was stopped by the Chiefs, for a 12-0 score.

Following the kickoff, Friona made its best drive of the night. Jeff Stowers returned the kick to the Friona 28.

Duran gained nine yards, and Ben Osborn slanted for a first down to the Friona 41-yard line. Jackie Lafuente then gained eight yards on a reverse play, and Duran picked up the first down across midfield at the Brownfield 47.

On a big third down play, Osborn shook off tacklers on a 17-yard gain to the Cubs' 15-yard line, as it looked like the Chieftains would get their first TD of the season.

Burney gained two, Shannon Cochran four, and Duran two, bringing up fourth and two from the Cubs' eight. But Duran was stopped a yard short on fourth down and Brownfield took over.

Observers felt that if the score had been 12-7 at the half, the final outcome might have been different.

Friona benefitted a third time from a Brownfield fumble before halftime, getting the ball at the Cubs' 29.

Osborn picked up a first down to the 18-yard line, but once again the visitors' defense was equal to the occasion, and Friona was stopped at the ten-yard-line.

Those three drives turned out to be Friona's best chances to score in the game.

Friona had a goal-line stand in the third quarter, with a good defensive play by tackle Louis Dunnam on third down, but the Cubs finally went in on fourth down from the two for their third touchdown.

A pass try for points fell incomplete for an 18-0 score.

The Chiefs had a drive following the kickoff. Osborn picked up a pair of first downs with runs of six, eight and 11 yards, and Burney kept for three yards and a first down at midfield.

As the final quarter opened, Osborn ran eight yards for a first at the visitors' 40, and then Burney completed his only pass of the game to Cochran to the Brownfield 31.

But once again the Cubs' defense prevailed, and Brownfield took over four plays later at their own 35.

Osborn, who is the third leading rusher in the South Plains, gained 90 tough yards to lead Friona's offense.

"We came back (after the team's early adversity) and played hard. I was proud of the way the kids kept at it," said Chieftain Coach Tommy Moss.

Moss said it would have been easy for the Chieftains to have let down, and gotten beat real badly, but they kept playing hard.

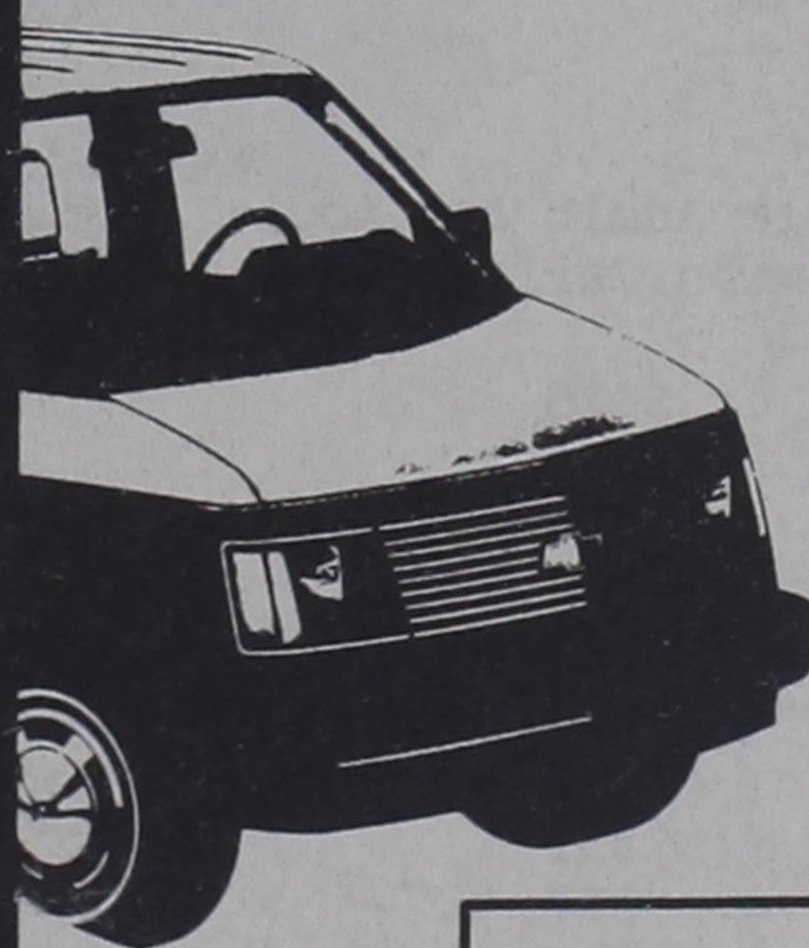

Parmer County will use the following rules and procedures to comply with its responsibility under the Indigent Health Care and Treatment Act for residents residing in Parmer County.

Application can be requested from the Panhandle Health Care Coalition office at the Pavilion of Northwest Texas Hospital, 7201 Evans Drive, P.O. Box 2168, Amarillo, TX, 79105. Assistance in completing the application will be provided if needed. Contact the Panhandle Health Care Coalition (806) 378-4692 or its Coordinator (806) 238-1366 at the Bovina Center for assistance.

Parmer County will use rules and procedures found in the County Indigent Health Care Program Handbook published by the Texas Department of Human Services. In summary, these are the rules:

1. Application forms must be completely filled out.
2. Verification of income, termination of income, residence, household composition, and resources is required, if questionable.
3. Following rule-approved gross income adjustments, net income cannot exceed:

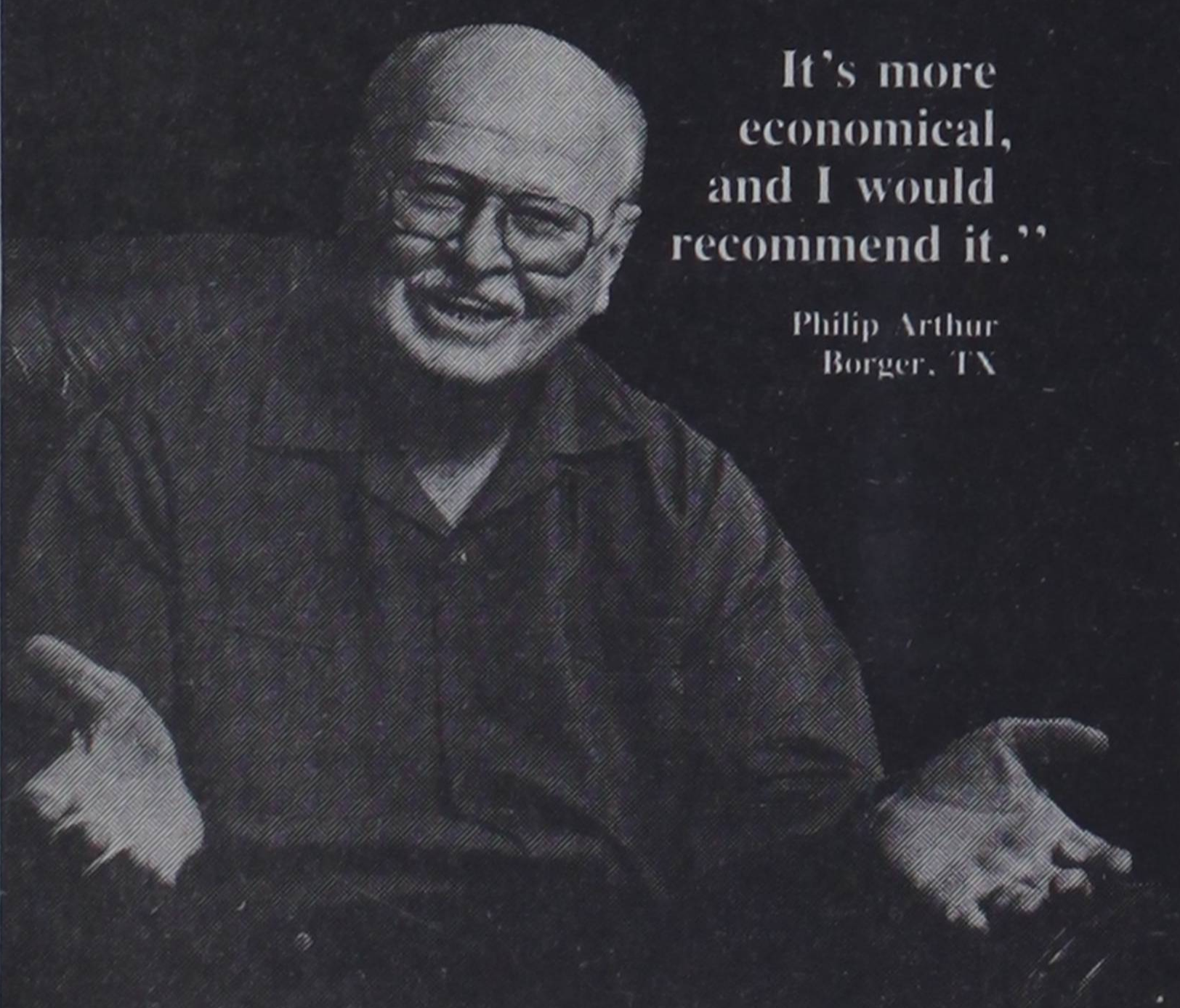

4. Liquid resources assets cannot exceed \$1,000. The equity value of a car greater than \$1500 is counted against the \$1000 limit. Personal property and homestead are exempt assets.
5. Higher Liquid resources assets and income may be accepted in special circumstances.
6. Eligible persons must be residents of the area of Randall County not included within a hospital district.
7. Applicants must provide all requested information and documentation requested or applications will be denied.
8. Applicants have the right to appeal adverse decisions.
