Charles Albert McCurdy Buried At Austin Sunday Afternoon From The Presbyterian Church.

AUSTIN, May 14 .- Sunday morning the body of Albert McCurdy, of San Antonio, student of the Austin Pres. byterian Theological Seminary, who was drowned in the mouth of Bull Creek, a tributary of Lake Austin, last Thursday night, was found, near the scene where the young man lost his life.

The body was dragged from the bottom of the stream by a party of searchers who had been working in that vicinity, all of Saturday.

# TWISTER STRIKES NEAR SPADE; EXTENDS 24 MILES

List Of Dead Mounts As Work Of Rescue Continues-Sixteen Are Dead And Many Injured-Thousands Of Dollars Of Property Damage.

STORM CUTS A SWATH TWO HUNDRED YARDS WIDE

Righ Tension Transmission Lines Detween Sweetwater And Colorado Torn Up For Several Mundred Yards Telegraph And Telephone Wires Down.

The cyclone which struck Mitchell County between 3 and 4 o'clock this morning, caused a heavy toll of life, totalling sixteen, according to last reports received in Sweatwater.

COLORADO, May 14 .- Twenty-five persons are at least estimated to have been killed, and more than a hundred were injured, when a cyclone struck twelve miles south of here early today, according to W. H. Cooper, secretary of the Colorado Chamber of Commerce, who is making a check of the casualties.
