WIND THREATENS HEAVY DAMAGES

South Ward School Unroofed And Sweetwater Refinery Suffers \$300 Damage—Many Trees Uprooted.

HAIL IS REPORTED IN FISHER

Heavy Wind, Rain, and Hail Damage Reported From Rotan, Roby, Sylvester—None Elsewhere.

Damage from hail in portions of Fisher County appeared to be the most serious result of the storm which struck this vicinity Saturday night about 6 o'clock and which leveled many trees, made outhouses look like the morning after Halloween and played various other pranks. It was a straight wind, however, and did not come out of the southwest from where most cyclones seem to originate. There was sufficient velocity, though, to have caused some interesting moments, if it had been the spiral twist of the true cyclone variety.

The roof was very neatly removed from the new South Ward school building, and the frame work for the new Magnolia Company Filling Station flattened out. The bandstand near the Hotel Wright had a pre-volstead slant and plate glass windows in the Prim's store in the Aycoy building will have to be replaced.

One of the heaviest sufferers appeared to be the Sweetwater Refinery where total damage was estimated by H. M. Shade at \$300. A receiving house and run down lines, were blown down and a hundred gallon galvanized tank took out over the hill for parts unknown.

The Southwestern Bell Telephone Company had several lines out of commission and so did the West Texas Electric Company. Several poles were blown down.

The disturbance did not reach as far north as Hamlin, but Roby, Rotan, and Sylvester reported heavy rains, with heavy hail and a wild wind. Damage from hail is expected to be rather heavy in the wake of the storm.

A heavy rain was reported east of Sweetwater, and especially in the White Flat district. Several automobiles were reported late Saturday as being stuck in the mud in this section.

High winds and subsequent sand storms were reported as far northwest as Lubbock, but there was no rain at Snyder, Post City or Slaton. Conditions west to Big Spring were about the same as in Sweetwater, but without much, if any, damage from wind in any of the intervening cities. Big Spring reported hail. Telegraph wires on the Texas & Pacific both east and west were out of commission Saturday night.

Abilene reported a light shower with a heavier rain at Trent but without wind. Blackwell and Bronte reported much the same conditions as prevailing here with a heavy shower at Lake Trammell. The telephone circuits south of Bronte to San Angelo were out of commission.

Much damage of a minor nature was reported at various points about the city, especially to shade trees. W. R. Hope is reported to have had a wind mill disintegrated and several barns wrecked.

A two-room house in the Orient addition was blown off the posts that formed its foundation. Many chimneys were blown off and barns and other out buildings were wrecked or overturned. Among these was a frame warehouse belonging to the Robertson Grocery Company east of town. No damage was reported on the Rural lines out of Sweetwater.

W. C. Calvert of south of Sweetwater, reported a very heavy wind in that community. The flue was blown off of one house and there was other slight damage.

Reports from the Walter Boothe ranch stated that there was a heavy shower there, but no damage was done by the wind. There was also a good shower at Lake Trammell. No damage from wind.

The local Tech Committee inspected Sweetwater's site Friday night, getting everything in shape for the visit of the Locating Board, July 21.

AUTO RACES SET

Big Card of Contestants Will Rear Over Finish Line At Abilene July 4th—Thrilling Events Promised.

ABILENE, June 30.—New speed records and new thrills for the greatest concourse of holiday spectators ever assembled in West Texas is the prediction for the 3rd Annual Automobile Rack Meet here on July 4th.

The entry list comprises 20 of the fastest cars and most daring drivers of the Southwest, gathered from all parts of Texas and Oklahoma. The track will be lightning fast, and with a newly enlarged and remodeled seating plant that will provide comfortable accommodation for 10,000.

The July 4th program will be ushered in at 10 o'clock in the morning with a big military parade composed of infantry and artillery of the National Guard units and the firing of salutes by a battery of French 75's. The racing program will begin promptly at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon. The gates will be opened promptly at 12 o'clock, noon, July 4th.

SCOUTS ACTIVE SEVEN LIVES ARE IN SWEETWATER LOST IN FLAMES

Nearly 100 Lively Boys Enroll in Three Troops Under Ben Daniels, Arnold Dressler, Luther Watson.

PLANNING LONG VACATION TRIP

Boys Have Baseball And Other Activities—Take Part In Clean Up Campaigns and Help In Many Ways.

Realizing the importance and significance of the Boy Scout movement and the good training and physical and mental development the movement means to the youth of the city, citizens of Sweetwater cooperated with the boys of the city and organized the first Boy Scout Troop some three years ago. But especially since the first of this year has the movement taken on new life in Sweetwater and being done things that command the commendation and respect of the city.

Troops 1 and 2 of Sweetwater are full, each containing 4 patrols or 22 Scouts. Troop 3, just organized, has about 20 members. This makes Sweetwater the home of about 84 Boy Scouts, a valuable asset to any town. Arnold Dressler is the Scoutmaster of Troop 1, Ben Daniels of Troop 2 and Luther Watson is Scoutmaster of the new Troop 3. The positions of assistant Scoutmasters for the three Troops are still open. They may be held by young men of 18 or over with good moral character and an interest in boys and the Scout movement.

The Troops meet every Friday night. Troop 1 and 2 in the basement of the S. D. Myers building and Troop 3 at the Baptist church.

Work on the different Scout tests is going on all the time, however there is only one boy in town, L. C. Patter, son of Troop 1, who is a First Class Scout. There are several Second Class Scouts in the different Troops but the majority have just completed the First or the Tenderfoot test.

The Scouts are always ready and willing to offer their services in any Civic or Community work. They took part in the city clean up campaign and also gathered up a car load of old clothes for the Near East relief.

Fifty-eight of the local Scouts, representing the Three Troops, attended the recent West Texas Chamber of Commerce Convention at San Angelo, staying four days and camping out while there. The Scouts will probably take their annual summer camping trip in the near future.

The Boy Scouts have their own baseball team composed of Scouts from the Three Troops, and they have games occasionally with neighboring towns. They have won ten games and lost eight this season.

Plans are being made now for the team to make a tour of West Texas and New Mexico, the players leaving about August first, and playing about 20 games. They will probably be gone 24 days.

The latest work taken up by the Boy Scouts here is the planning of a minstrel show, to take place here July 17th. Mr. Phelps, who put on the American Legion Minstrel two years ago, has donated his services to the Scouts. Plans are also under way to organize a Scout Band.

F. B. PERRY DIES

Funeral Services For Old Sweetwater Resident Will Be Held Monday Morning At Ten o'Clock.

Funeral services for F. B. "Brack" Perry will be held Monday morning at 10 o'clock at the family residence on Bowie street, conducted by Rev. D. B. Doak of the Methodist church.

Mr. Perry was 58 years of age and had been a citizen of Sweetwater for many years and was well known here. He had been in the dairy business. Apoplexy was given as the cause of his death.

Mrs. Perry, his wife, and three children survive. They are John Perry, with the Sweetwater Dry Goods Co., Fred Perry, Santa Fe telegraph operator, both of Sweetwater and a daughter, Mrs. Haie, who is expected to arrive from her home at Jacksonville, Fla., in time for the funeral.

LOSS AT ORANGE IS \$250,000

Fire In Boiler Room On U. S. Cruiser Williamson Costs Four Lives and Injures Four More of Crew.

DALLAS, June 30.—The body of Bert Burk was recovered from the ruins of the Texas Wheel & Body Co. plant which was swept by fire late today by firemen who were searching for the bodies of two negroes thought to have been caught under falling walls.

Eight firemen were injured in the flames which caused damage estimated at \$75,000.

Explosion in the paint shop is thought to have caused the fire.

DAMAGE AT ORANGE.

ORANGE, Texas, June 30.—One entire block was wiped out and the residence section of the oil district threatened by fire which started at 9:20 this morning. All large business houses were wiped out, with loss of merchandise and buildings estimated to be \$250,000.

The fire in the business section was caused by a man striking a match in a tailoring shop. One woman was severely burned.

SHIP FIRE KILLS FOUR.

NEWPORT, R. I., June 30.—Four men were killed and four were seriously injured in the United States cruiser "Williamson" in a fire in the boiler room.

The dead and injured were removed to the naval hospital here. Details of the accident are lacking.

MANY TOURISTS

Campers Swarming Local Tourist Camp—Take Advantage Of City Lake—Fish And Swim Too.

From the scenes presented at the Sweetwater Tourist Camp, it would seem that a Ringling Bros. Circus, or some other large attraction was billed for an exhibition here.

No less than a dozen tourists cars were camped at this Park last evening. The tourists did not stand back because there were hundreds of people diving and swimming in City Lake which borders the Tourists Camp. The tourists were seen to be sneaking a quiet spot about the lake shores with hook and line in a daring effort to "land a big one."

One of the tourists approached a representative of The Reporter and said: "Do the Sweetwater folks fish in this lake much?"

"Yes, sir!"

"Do they catch any fish out of this lake?"

"I assure you they do."

"How big are the fish in here?"

"Well, Mr. Laney, the man who operates that cold drink and hamburger stand over there, told me that he had seen fellows leave here with nice ones weighing anywhere from 4 to 12 pounds."

The tourists lost no time in "picking out the best spot to fish."

Yesterday a black bass was caught in the City Lake which weighed about four pounds by a Mr. Jones, who takes a great delight in going out there every day or so and getting the pick of the lake. Mr. Jones has fishes for the sport there in it, and usually gives his catch to friends, according to Mr. Laney, Lake Keeper.

COURT SUSTAINS CONTRACT USED

State Supreme Court Holds Cooperative Marketing Association Contracts Are Valid And Enforceable.

LOWER COURTS ARE REVERSED

Waxahachie Cotton Contract Case Was "Test" Case Governing All Similar Actions—Orr At Merkel.

AUSTIN, June 30.—The validity of contracts used in cooperative marketing associations was upheld here today by the State Supreme Court in an opinion in the case of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association vs. J. C. Stovall, brought from Ellis County and regarded as a test case.

In passing upon the case the court reversed the opinion of the lower courts which favored Stovall.

In its opinion the Court held that "For various reasons we have concluded that none of the proposals urged against the enforcement of this contract are tenable and the Trial Court erred and also the Court of Civil Appeals erred in sustaining the judgment of the Trial Court."

ORR SPEAKS.

MERKEL, Texas, June 30.—Speaking to a large crowd here at the Merkel picnic, John T. Orr, president of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association, gave an outline of what this association has accomplished and what it proposes to do in the future.

"We are told by the government," said Mr. Orr, "that \$12,000,000 is absorbed on an average in the process of distribution, including cost of handling, profits, etc. We are also told that there is one complete grade difference between the cotton which the growers produce and which the spinners buy. In other words, somewhere between the spinner and producer, the cotton improves a grade, the value of which grade must be added to the \$12.00 per bale to make up the average cost of marketing a bale of cotton under the speculative system. One of the purposes of our organization is to eliminate all the unnecessary costs in marketing, thereby saving to the growers these unnecessary expenses in handling. We call these savings, along with the savings country damage, the immediate benefits of cooperative marketing."

Mr. Orr told of the improvements made by the association in their storage facilities and declared that \$156,495.16 had been saved in cost of storage, handling and insurance by concentrating the cotton at Houston where the association has the advantage of the most approved, modern triple "A" warehouses that there is in the country, according to Mr. Orr.

He also told of the advancement made in classing and said that this year the classing had been uniformly correct and satisfactory. He also declared that little difficulty was experienced in financing the organization.

"The average price for the various pools we made an average gross price of 26.58 cents per pound, or \$10.34 per bale, based on 525 pounds (10.34 interior," stated Mr. Orr.

"Costs of operation are \$3.59 per bale, general overhead expenses, and \$1.35 per bale interest, leaving a net income of 25.54 cents per pound, or \$10.85 per bale, based on a 525-pound bale," he said.

The big barbecue under the management of the Home Guard unit, was a success and the crowd was estimated at several thousand. The greatest interest centered in the night program and especially the Old Fiddler's Contest. Mrs. Mollie J. Starkey, aged 83 years, won the first prize, \$20, and T. W. Collins second prize, \$5. Mrs. Starkey is the mother of Mrs. H. R. Hicks and closely related to the Subletts here and at Sweetwater.

Among those present was G. A. Lackey, of Sweetwater.

AN ORDINANCE,

KEEPING OF HOGS WITHIN CERTAIN LIMITS OF THE CITY OF SWEETWATER, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR ITS VIOLATION.

Be it ordained by the Commission of the City of Sweetwater, Texas, that it shall be unlawful for any one to keep any hogs within the limits of that part of the City of Sweetwater, Texas, bounded and described as follows:

THENCE north along the east boundary of Block Number 19 in the Eastern Addition to said City of Sweetwater; THENCE North along the east boundary line of Halley Street to the Southwest corner of Block Number 16 in the Eastern Addition to the Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE west along the north boundary line of North Third Street to the Southwest corner of Block Number 7 in the Eastern Addition to said Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in a northerly direction along the East boundary line of Beall street to a point in the South boundary line of the old J. F. Newman home premises, same point being the Northwest corner of Block Number 7 in said Eastern Addition to the Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in a westerly direction along the North boundary line of Section No. 48, Block No. 22, T. & P. Ry. Company's Survey, to the Northwest corner of Block Number 5, in said Eastern Addition to said Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in a northerly direction following the East boundary line of said Hagland Street a distance of 425 feet to the Northwest corner of a 4 acre tract platted by J. F. Newman, a plat of which 4 acre tract was filed in the office of the County Clerk on June 27, 1883;

THENCE south 77° West to a point in the East boundary line of Crane Street;

THENCE in a northerly direction along the East boundary line of Crane Street to a point North 77° East of the Northwest corner of Block Number 77 in the Orient Addition to the Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in a westerly direction along the South boundary line of North 12th Street to the Northwest corner of Block Number 81 in the Orient Addition to the Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in a Southerly direction along the East boundary line of said Oak Street to the Northwest corner of Block Number 109 in the Orient to the Northeast corner of Block Number 111 in said Trammell & McCaulley Addition and along the East boundary line of Block No. 107 in the Original Town of Sweetwater to the Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE South 77° West along the North boundary line of Block Number 110 in the Trammell & McCaulley Addition to the Town of Sweetwater and to the Northeast corner of Block 111 in said Trammell & McCaulley

Eastern Addition to the Town of Sweetwater and on to the Southwest corner of Block No. 19 in said Eastern Addition, the place of beginning.

If anyone shall keep or permit to be kept any hogs within the above and foregoing limits such party shall be fined in the sum of One Dollar, and each day that anyone shall keep or permit to be kept any hogs within said limits, shall constitute a separate offense. Provided, that this ordinance shall not apply to the keeping of hogs in shipping pens maintained by the railroad companies for shipping purposes.

THENCE in an easterly direction and along the North boundary line of South Fourth Street to the Southeast corner of Block No. 45 in the Original Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in an easterly direction and along the North boundary line of B Street in the Mineral Wells Addition to the Town of Sweetwater, to the Southwest corner of Lot No. 5 in the Archer Addition to the Town of Sweetwater;

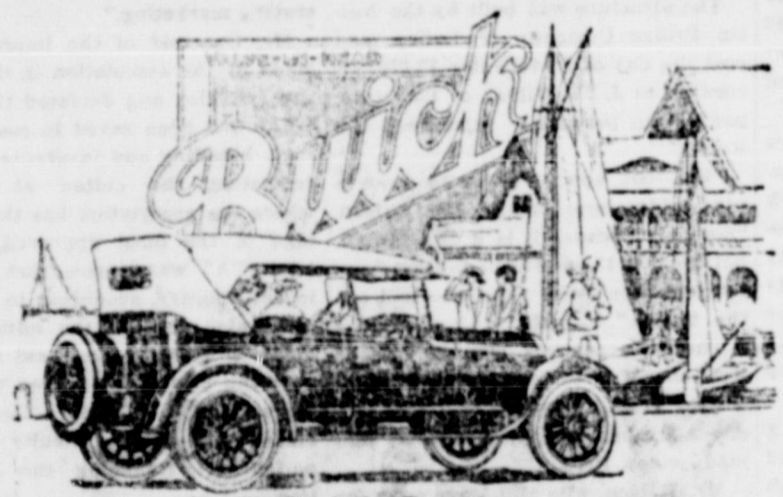
Our lives are either a source of influence for good to others or they are a force in the opposite direction. No one can live his life without an influence on others. This influence may not be noticeable, but it is always there.

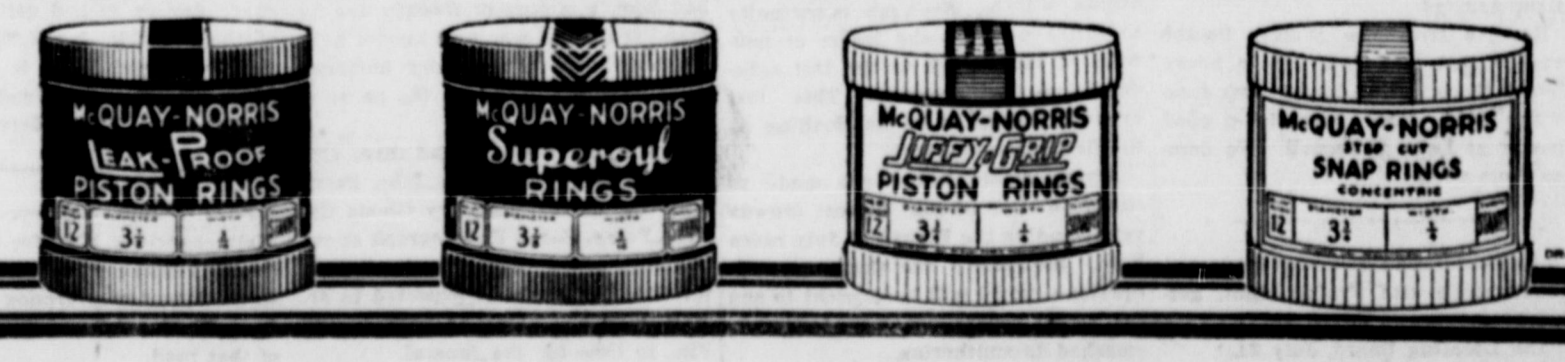

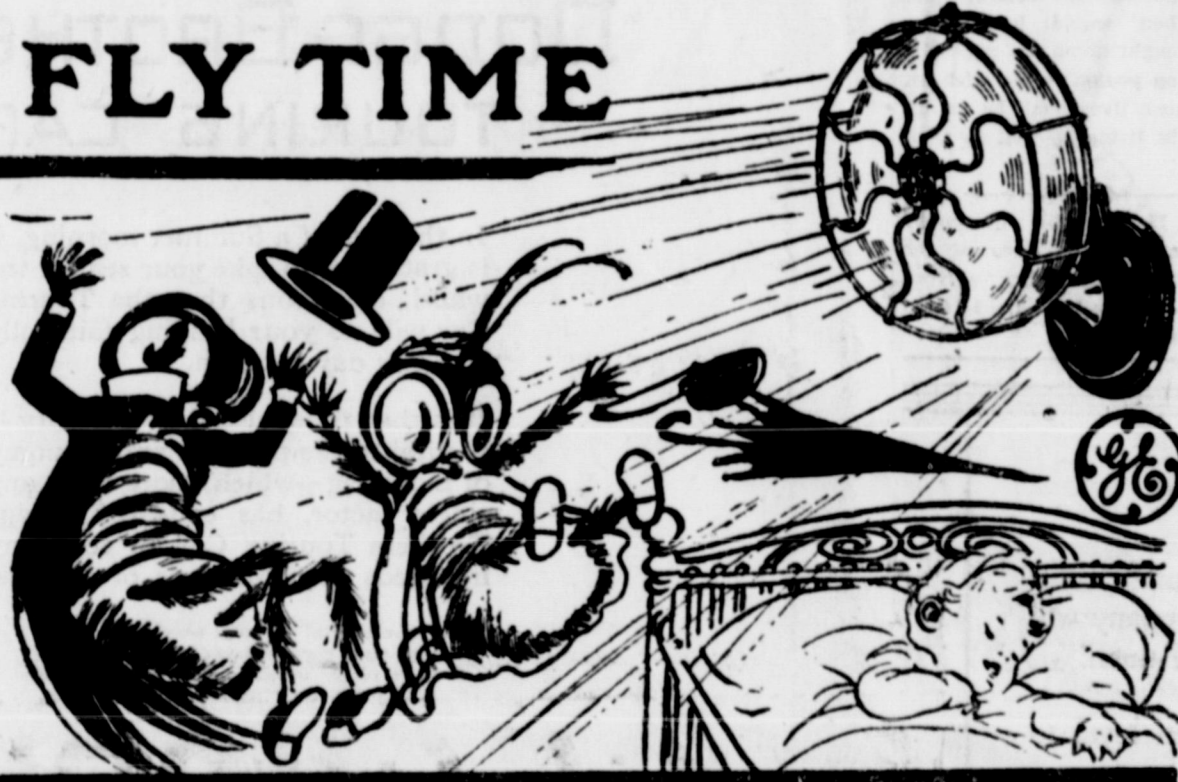

YOUR TOWN AND MINE

What does Sweetwater need? Right now the need is for more houses, and still more houses.

The need is for more paved streets and more sidewalks.

Not only does Sweetwater need these things but must have them and have them soon.

Within a short time there will be employees of the United States Gypsum Company coming to Sweetwater to make their home. Where will they live? Their company will house them of course if it has to, but out at the plant. Do the men who are interested in the welfare of this town and its growth care to have another town spring up out at the site where the gypsum mill will be built? Gentlemen, yours is the answer.

Aside from the gypsum project, families are knocking at the gate of Sweetwater every day, asking admittance. The head of a local cotton company advised this writer of three such families who failed to find the accommodations here that they wanted, and located elsewhere. One of them represented a \$150,000.00 company, establishing branch cotton offices in West Texas. Every day, nearly, applications come to the office of the Board of City Development. Seldom a day passes but what some one is in the office of the Reporter searching for the want ads for rooms, or other accommodations. Travelling men, many of whom may already live here, would like to make this town their headquarters owing to its very accessibility, rail out lets, etc. Where can they be housed? The town is already full up, running over. And what do people of this town propose to do about it?

Again, paved streets are demanded and sidewalks. People who buy property do not care to buy it thus unim-



proved. They ask these modern necessities, or go some place where they can be found.

This town must get over the idea that it can get anywhere without a definite concerted effort to get it some place. The idea has been to do the stranger good, in fact, to act as if the very idea of anyone coming to Sweetwater to reside, if not actually resented, still an idea that said stranger must be made to pay dearly for. There is nothing to be gained by mincing matters. There is nothing to be gained by concealing these things.

Every town in West Texas that is getting anywhere at all, faces the same problem of building schools, sidewalks, pavements, parks and every other public improvement nearly all at once. The town in West Texas that forges ahead is the one that solves all these problems quickest.

For West Texas is at the beginning of the greatest period of its development. Good land priced low, freedom from boll weevils, and the climate of this section are bringing people here by the hundreds. Sweetwater can get its share of this procession if it wishes. If it does not it can sit idly by and watch the procession go elsewhere, and some other city not so favorably situated as this town, become the metropolis of West Texas.

TRAINING

Over in Justice Court this week somebody's boy and girl were on trial—gone wrong. The hand of the law will deal heavily with them—but not so heavily as society. For they are

ostracized—beyond the pale. They will be shunned by all decent people and forced to associate with those of their own kind—lepers of society. Disease of the most loathsome nature and then dope follow inevitably and the savage bite of remorse of lives, blighted, misspent, wasted—of a life without hope, wandering wearily through the years until death brings a merciful relief from the barren desert of existence.

It would have been a good thing if the parents of children could have been present in that court room and have seen and heard the evidence—and peered into the future and watched the pitiful path of that couple as they try to escape the serpentine grasp of the consequences of their sins. It would have been still better if the coming generation could have seen the same spectacle.

Then would it have been realized how necessary the churches are and how necessary the schools. Not as pleasing architectural constructions of brick, and stone and mortar but as living factors in the lives of the present and especially the coming generation. Then would have been forcefully brought home the necessity of surrounding young people with instructors whose lives shall be an example of right living as well as their instruction.

OPEN MIND COLUMN.

Blackwell, Nolan County, Texas
Dear Mr. Hardworker:

I have perused with interest your letter of inquiry and the answer received; may I offer mine. First, Dear mother of five children; do not attempt to assist your husband by working at his side in the field, you are doing yourself and family an injustice without attaining the best results and using your energy to the best advantage. Your place is in the home, to save what is produced on the farm, have some chickens and market your earliest and first fryers when the prices are good, your family can eat chickens two weeks later; when the market is less. Have an early bean

patch, plant red beans in March if possible, they will give you early snap beans, you may even sell a few if extra early then later they can be dried and thrashed, and put up for winter use, when they alone will save dollars; for who can exist in West Texas without red beans? Have as large a garden as possible, and can, can everything you can can; if you have a surplus of fresh or canned vegetables take to your merchant and sell or trade your product for his. Be sure to have at least two good milk cows, one for summer, one for winter. If the calves are steers and market low; can them for your own use. Have a good brood sow, then persuade Mr. Hardworker to get at least two good mares and raise a couple of mules every year. After the first year you will have a span of mules to sell and all they will cost will be a little extra trouble in using the mares in making your crop.

Then Mr. Hardworker, don't plant all cotton, no farmer in West Texas or any other place can hope to raise enough cotton to buy feed (and the next year borrow the money to live on and perhaps have to pay interest on it too.) Then raise as much household provision as possible and be saving. Since the world began the man who manages best and saves the most is far ahead of the one who makes more, but cannot make it pay.

Then let the boys have a peanut patch, sell the peanuts at Christmas it encourages them and brings in money too.

Also Mr. Hardworker you are on the right track about this money from the Federal Reserve Farm Loan, it is surely worth the interest paid on any investment.

When the boys are old enough to manage the farm, perhaps the life insurance might be dropped, From a

woman who has stood in your little shoes, but is now some bigger.

INSTALLS NEW EQUIPMENT.

New Recharging Machinery Will Eliminate Long Waits—8 Hours.

The Sweetwater Battery Company last week installed an eight-hour battery recharging equipment.

Batteries are recharged at battery stations by one of two methods, the high voltage system or the low voltage Constant Potential. The high voltage system was the first method used. The batteries are placed in series, the current passing from one battery to the next, on down the line through all the batteries. The batteries are forced to take a certain amount of current. The rate of current flow is regulated by hand. It makes no difference in the flow of the current whether the batteries are small or large, sorted or discharged, reserved or charged.

A battery in certain conditions will be injured if forced to take only two amperes while a battery in good condition can take many times this amount without injury. As the high voltage system is not automatic, it is the duty of the battery man to take the batteries off the line as the re-charge is complete. Should he fail to do this the battery is damaged by over charging and excessive gassing.
