IN CASE YOU HAVEN'T seen any of the publicity blurbs, work on the prehistoric mammoth skull unearthed last summer south of Summerfield in Castro County is progressing.

Eddie Guffee, curator of the Llano Estacado Museum in Plainview, plans to have the skull ready to display for an opening day April 14.

Crowds of area school children are expected to begin lining up to get a glimpse of the skull, which is believed to be about 25,000 years old.

The City of Plainview and the Plainview Chamber of Commerce have gotten behind the mammoth project, in an effort to draw tourists to Plainview.

The city donated \$10,000 to the project to aid in the restoration work. In addition, there has been considerable volunteer labor, services and loans of equipment, which helped in the excavation, transportation, restoration and mounting of the exhibit.

The City of Plainview also donated \$4,910 to the Chamber of Commerce's division, to promote the exhibit.

Guffee, who spoke locally to the Friona Evening Lions Club last year after the skull was unearthed, has been doing most of the restoration.

The mammoth skull has been placed right in the center of the museum on the Wayland Baptist University campus.

Guffee says the archeological find falls into the 10,000 to 60,000 year-old range. Mammoths were three to four times the size of a modern African elephant. A typical adult weighed about 40,000 pounds and stood 13 to 14 feet high at the shoulder.

The mammoths lived here before the last ice age, eating prairie grasses, and died out 10,000 to 20,000 years ago.

Guffee says that Frio Draw, on which the skull was located, was probably a swampy depression much shallower than it is now, when the mammoths roamed the area.

It is felt that the mammoths lived near the draw. It is also believed that there may be other such bones buried somewhere in the area, but discovering them might be like looking for a needle in a haystack.

It just happened that the Summerfield find was located in a drainage area that exposed the tips of the tusks.

There was nothing left of the bones from the rest of the animal. Guffee says the skull and tusks mineralized into calcium carbonate. Extreme care has to be taken with the brittle bones, to preserve them for the future.

The Friona area received some light moisture Monday night and early Tuesday morning when winter refused to exit gracefully, and stole a couple of days from the beginning of spring.

Residents awoke on Tuesday to find slick driveways and streets. The snow which started falling on Monday melted, then re-froze during the night. Blowing winds which accompanied the snowfall detracted from the usefulness of the moisture, although a total of .21 inch was the official moisture content in the official Friona gauge.

The mercury fell to a low temperature of 17 degrees on Tuesday, March 21, but modified to a high of 76 on Thursday.

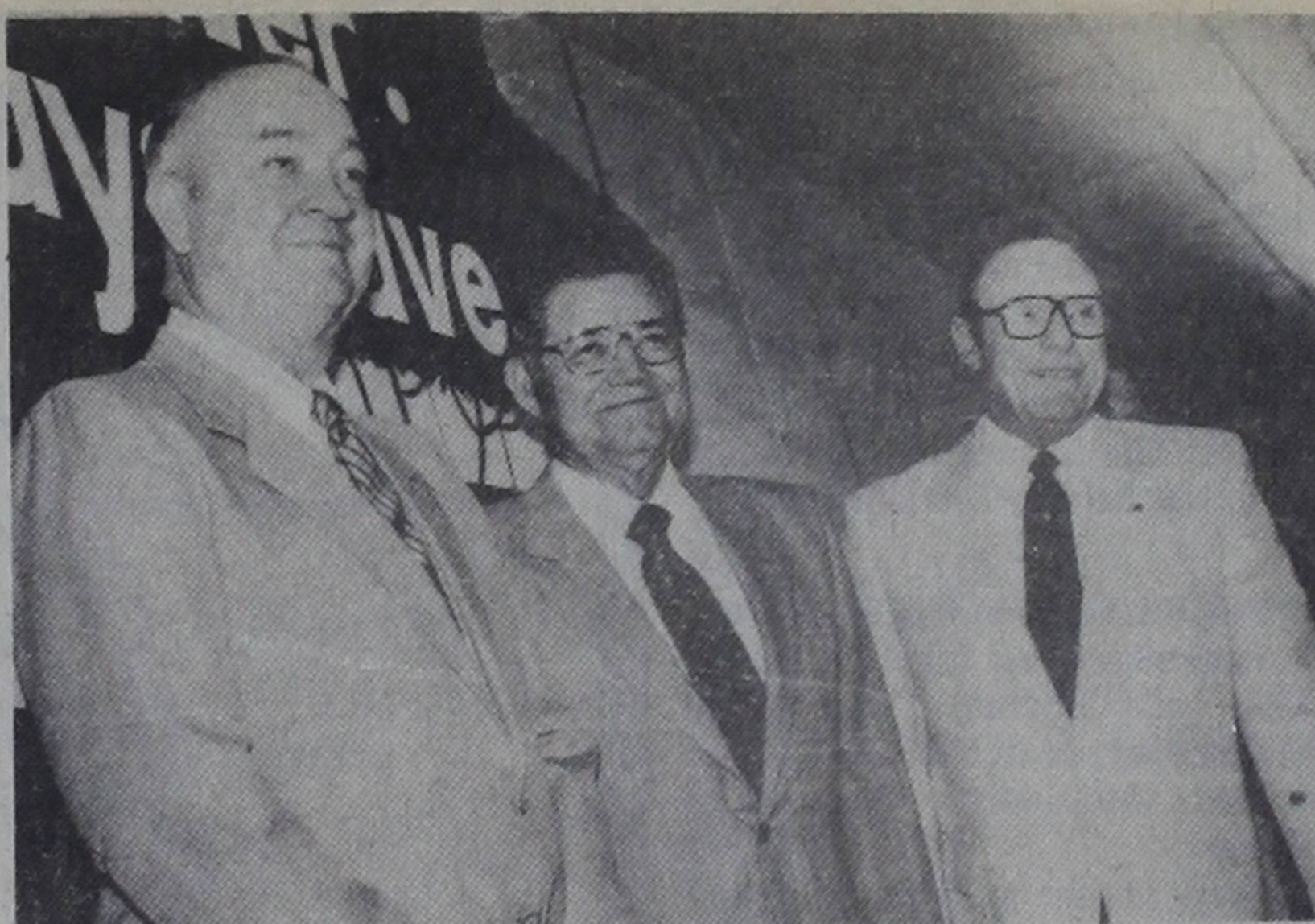
Contracts Offered By Board

Meals On Wheels In 5th Year Here

Friona's "Meals on Wheels" program is currently in its fifth year of serving meals to needy residents.

This week, officials in the program re-emphasized that the program is established for those with special circumstances and needing the assistance of receiving a prepared meal.

For most of the last year, the program has averaged 14 meals daily. The meals are prepared at Parmer County Community Hospital, under the direction of the hospital's dietician.

Some of those who have been receiving the meals have moved to Prairie Acres, and at the present time the number is down to just five recipients per day.

The meals are delivered five days per week. They are designed for people age 60 or over, or those with special circumstances needing the assistance.

Board members for Friona's "Meals on Wheels" include the three ladies mentioned above,

Officials stress that not only do they need names of those who need the assistance, but they need the community's contributions. The program receives no federal funds, nor does it receive financial support from any state agency. If a Sunday School Class would like to take on a project of a person who is unable to pay for their meals, it would be deeply appreciated.

All contributions are tax deductible.

Clovis Arrest Ties To Local Burglary

A Clovis, N.M. resident was arrested last Thursday night after guns were found in his possession that police say were taken from the residence of John E. Duke, 1101 West Fourth Street in Friona on March 13.

Capt. Bailey Roberts, spokesman for the Friona Police Department, said that in the burglary, four shotguns, one rifle and one revolver were taken, along with jewelry and some coins.

The estimated value of the property stolen in Friona was \$1,715, Roberts said.

The Friona Police Department worked closely with the Clovis Police Department to make the arrest last Thursday. Friona police had recovered the revolver that was taken from a Friona resident on Walnut Street.

The local resident gave the Friona police the name of Eric Dodgin, who lived at 831 Hondo in

Clovis. Roberts said that when Dodgin was arrested, he had three of the shotguns in his possession, having disposed of one shotgun, and the rifle.

"We feel that we may be able to recover the rifle," Roberts said.

Roberts also said that Hereford police have an 18-year-old male in custody who is a suspect in the Duke burglary.

As to whether those involved in this burglary were also involved in the burglary at Potts Gun & Ammo on February 4-5, Roberts said they plan to question those arrested regarding the earlier burglary, in which over \$16,000 in guns and ammunition were stolen.

In the action last Thursday, Roberts and officer James Rice of the Friona Police Department joined Clovis police detectives Randy Johnson, Darryl Rice and a canine unit which went to the

60 YEARS AGO—MARCH 15, 1929

Work on the new school building in the Jesko district, about twelve south of Friona, has been progressing recently to the extent that the walls are up and with favorable weather the entire structure will be enclosed. The building will contain two regular classrooms, and will be located just across the highway from the old building. Settlers are coming in all the time, and trustees are building with the view to the future needs of the district.

55 YEARS AGO—MARCH 16, 1934

The sixth number of the lyceum course will be presented Friday evening by the T-Anchor Cowboys. This group of college students from West Texas State Teachers College has carried the program to several communities outside of Canyon. The cowboys have arranged about 45 minutes of this program, and the last 45 minutes will be used for requests from the audience.

50 YEARS AGO—MARCH 17, 1939

Several of Friona's young people who are teaching school at various places were home to spend the weekend with the home folk. Among those who were here included Misses Lora Mae McFarland from Wellington, Reba Hill from Hale Center, and Mary Reeve from Pampa; also, Hadley Reeve from Snyder.

45 YEARS AGO—MARCH 10, 1944

Members of Friona Post No. 206, American Legion, cordially

invite all veterans of World Wars I and II and all who are eligible to become members of the War Dads to meet with them Wednesday night, March 15. That date will also mark the Silver Anniversary of the American Legion.

40 YEARS AGO—MARCH 11, 1949

"Why can't we buy license plates in Bovina and Friona?" was the question posed by a page one editorial on March 11, 1949. The editorial pointed out that Castro County had thought enough of the taxpayers of Summerfield (population about 70) to send an agent to the store there for the past ten years, while Friona and Bovina residents were forced to drive to the county seat each year.

35 YEARS AGO—MARCH 11, 1954

Indications are that three names will be on the Friona City Council ballot in April. Names currently on the ballot are the incumbent officials, Mayor Charles Allen, and commissioners Raymond White and H.K. Kendrick.

30 YEARS AGO—MARCH 12, 1959

The building will be erected on the property recently purchased by the PCA just south of the new building now under construction by the post office.

25 YEARS AGO—MARCH 12, 1964

The Friona High School Squaws, having swept to the Region I title last weekend in Lubbock, will put their 31-game winning streak on the line in Austin this weekend, in quest of the elusive state championship. On nine other occasions, the Squaws have sought the state title, in both "McKamie League" and UIL competition, but they have yet to bring home the title. The team faces a Class AAA school, Mineral Wells, who stands 33-1 for the year, in the opener. Friona is 31-0.

20 YEARS AGO—MARCH 13, 1969

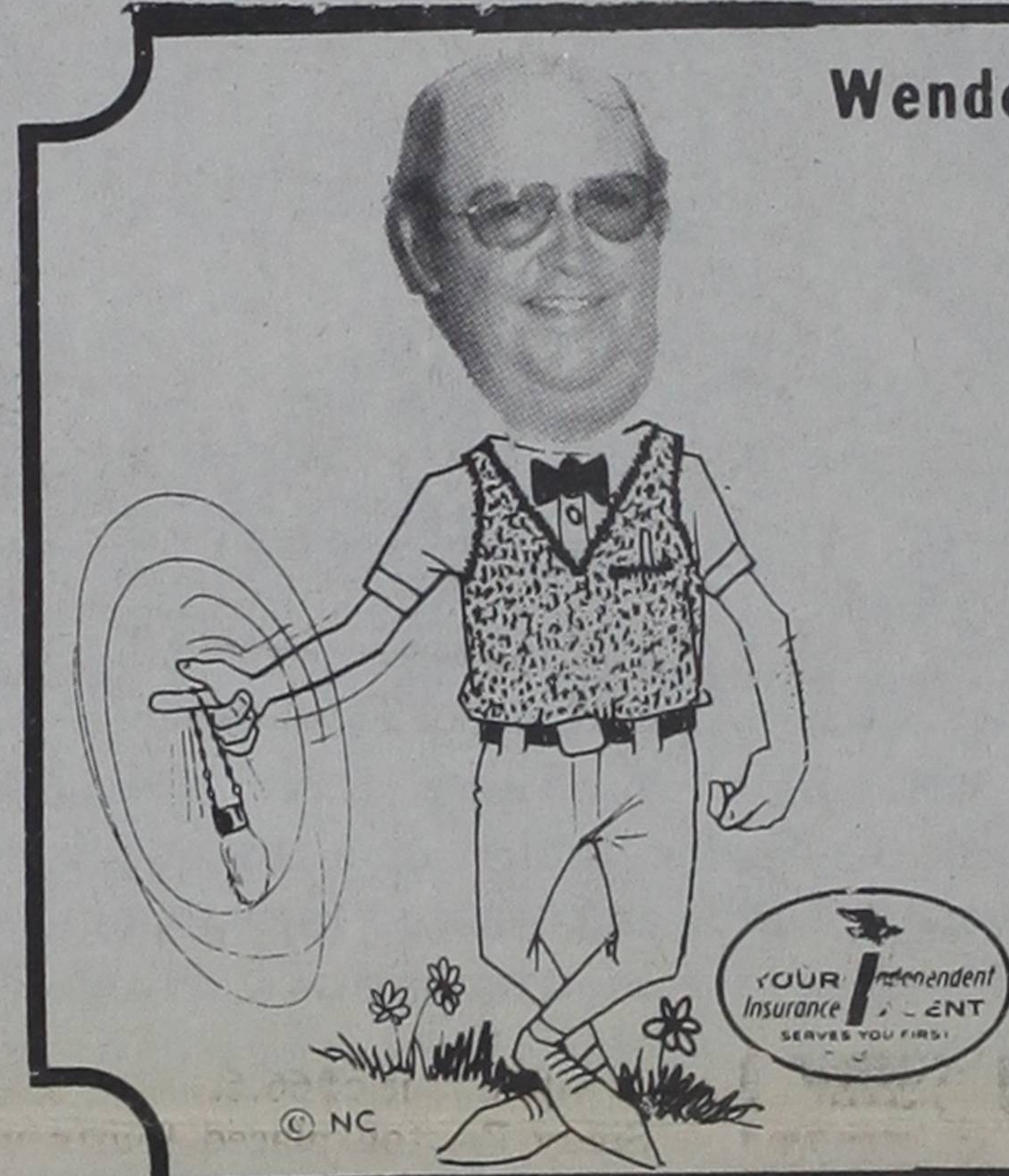

Former Residents Killed In Accident

A man and wife from Borger, both former residents of the Friona area, died last Wednesday after their vehicle was involved in a two-car head-on collision near Borger.

Billie Joe Eberting, 62, and his wife Eula Fay, 58, were dead at the scene, 1.6 miles west of Borger on State Highway 136. The driver of the second vehicle, Marilyn Tolbert, 36, died this week.

It was reported that an autopsy on Eberting, driver of his vehicle, revealed that Eberting died of a massive heart attack. A motorist who met the Eberting vehicle just prior to the crash, said that Eberting's head was slumped back against his driver's seat.

Funeral services for the couple were held Saturday, March 18 at the Keeler Baptist Church in Borger. Rev. Gary Miller officiated. Burial was in Westlawn Cemetery.

Eberting was born December 9, 1926, in Hollis, Oklahoma. He was a retired lab technician for Borger's Philblack plant.

Bill Eberting and Eula Fay Leach were married January 22, 1948 in Bovina.

Mrs. Eberting started school at the old Rhea school, and later attended school at Friona. Bill worked for Welch Auto Supply for awhile.

Eberting graduated from Bovina High School. He was a veteran of World War II, Eberting was a

member of Keeler Baptist Church, as was his wife.

Mrs. Eberting, born July 9, 1930 in Friona, was a member of the Choctaw National tribe.

Survivors are one son, Tracy Eberting of Borger; two daughters, Joy Braden of Borger and Claudette Atwood of Duncan, Ok.; and four grandchildren.

He is also survived by one brother, Denzil Eberting of Albuquerque; and one sister, Connie Jean Johnson of Happy. She has one brother, Gene Leach of Muskogee, Ok.; and two sisters, Maudie Daniels of Wagoner, Ok., and Vera Cash of Clovis.

All activities will be held in the Multi-Purpose Room of the Mabee Library Complex.

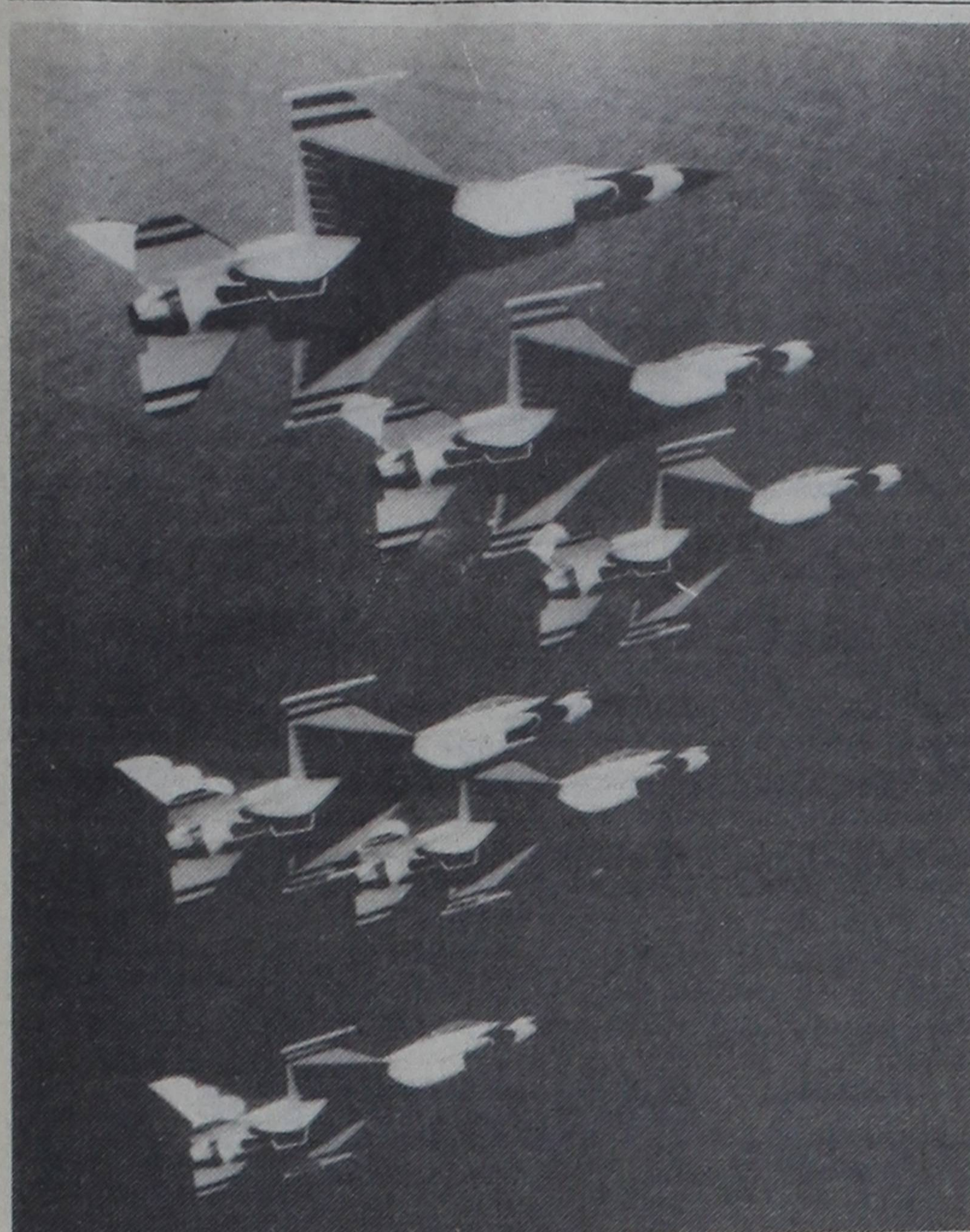
The event is open to all state-certified public school teachers as well as students who are scheduled to receive education degrees in May from any area college or university.

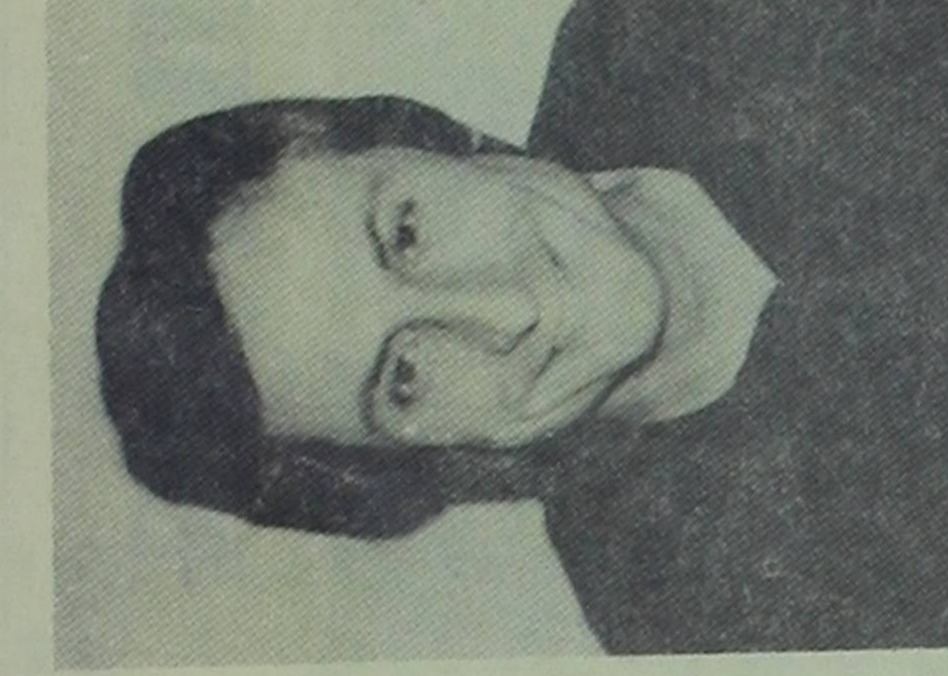
"I can truly say that after hearing you only twice, you have made a difference in my perspective of life."

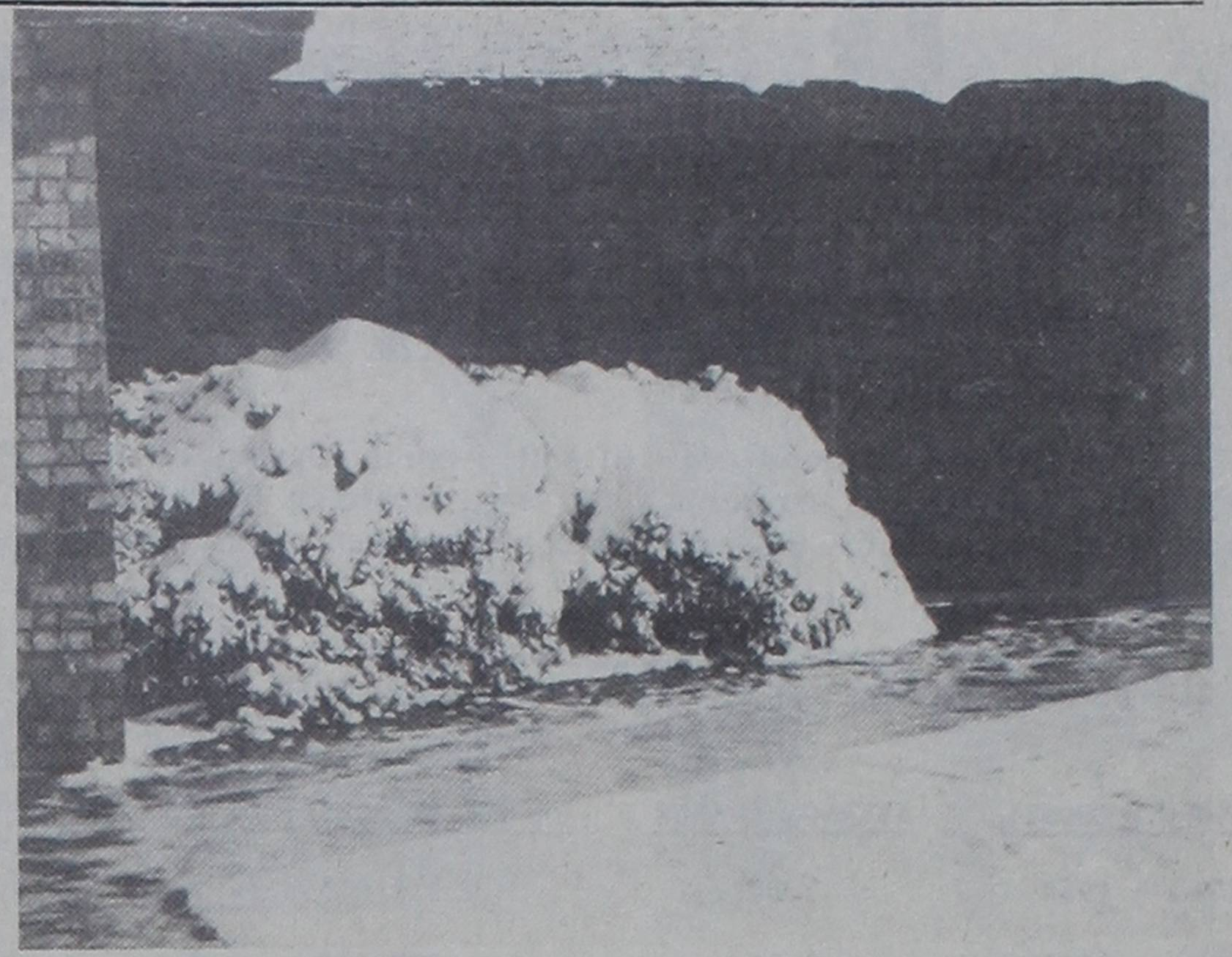
Dodgin's residence.

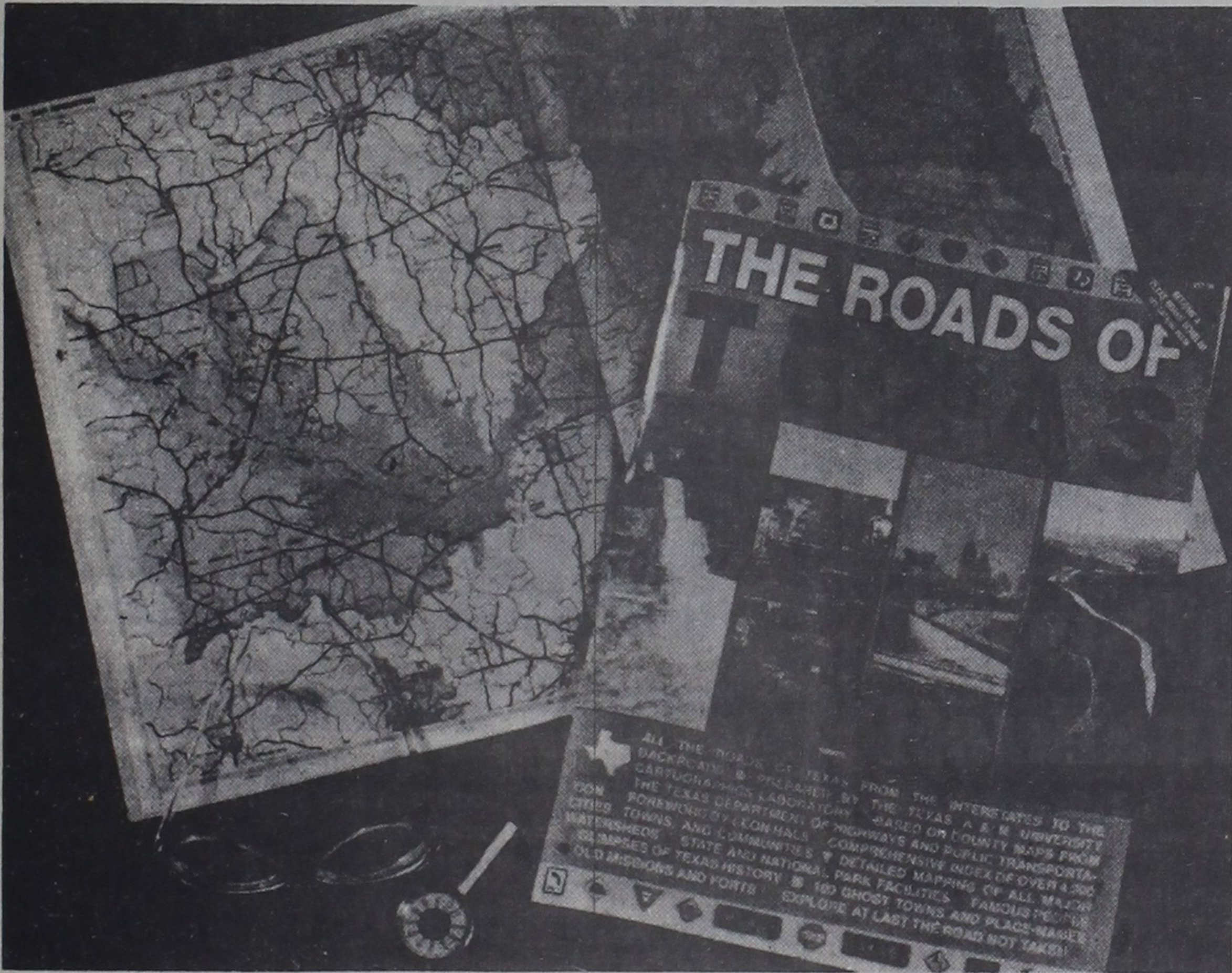

Parmer Co. Records Decline In Aquifer

Parmer County groundwater of water from the Ogallala Aquifer levels declined 1.24 feet, indicating last year, according to depth to a net depletion of 101,630 acre-feet water measurements taken from 97

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 observation wells within the county.

The average annual change in groundwater levels for Parmer County from 1979 to 1989 is a decline of 1.42 feet. Groundwater levels decreased an average of 0.79 of a foot during the five-year period from 1984 to 1989.

Groundwater levels in the Ogallala Aquifer declined an average of about one-half foot within the Water District's 5.5 million acre service area during 1988.

Very poor soil moisture conditions prior to spring planting, coupled with below average precipitation over most of the area during the growing season, caused irrigators to apply larger and more frequent irrigations than normally required. This heavier pumpage reversed the trend of the previous three years. Water levels were stable in 1985; rose 0.5 of a foot in 1986; and rose 0.9 of a foot in 1987.

Depth to water measurements are taken from a network of 1,012 observation water wells scattered across the 15-county Water District service area and are used to determine the annual change in the quantity of water in storage within the Ogallala Aquifer. Since the majority of these irrigation wells are operational, Water District Technical Division staff members take depth to water measurements during January and February in an attempt to allow water levels to stabilize from the previous irrigation season.

By comparing the 1988 depth to water measurements with those taken from the observation well network during January 1987, staff members were able to note the change in groundwater levels.

The 1988 depth to water measurement data revealed

average annual declines in nine of the fifteen counties within the High Plains Water District. The counties are Castro, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hale, Lamb, Lubbock, Parmer, Potter and Randall.

The remaining six counties within the Water District showed an average annual rise in groundwater levels during 1988. The counties are Armstrong, Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Hockley and Lynn.

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 officials commend Parmer County producers for improving their water management, which has played a major role in showing the rate of decline from the Ogallala Aquifer.

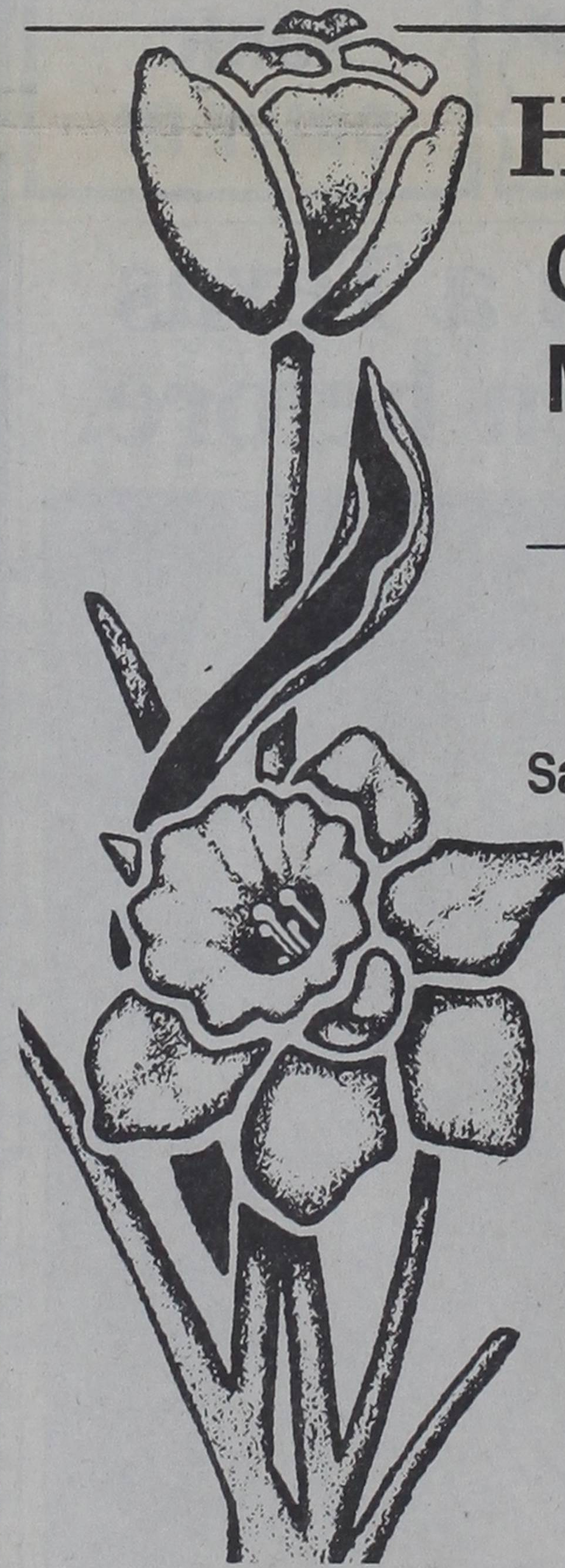

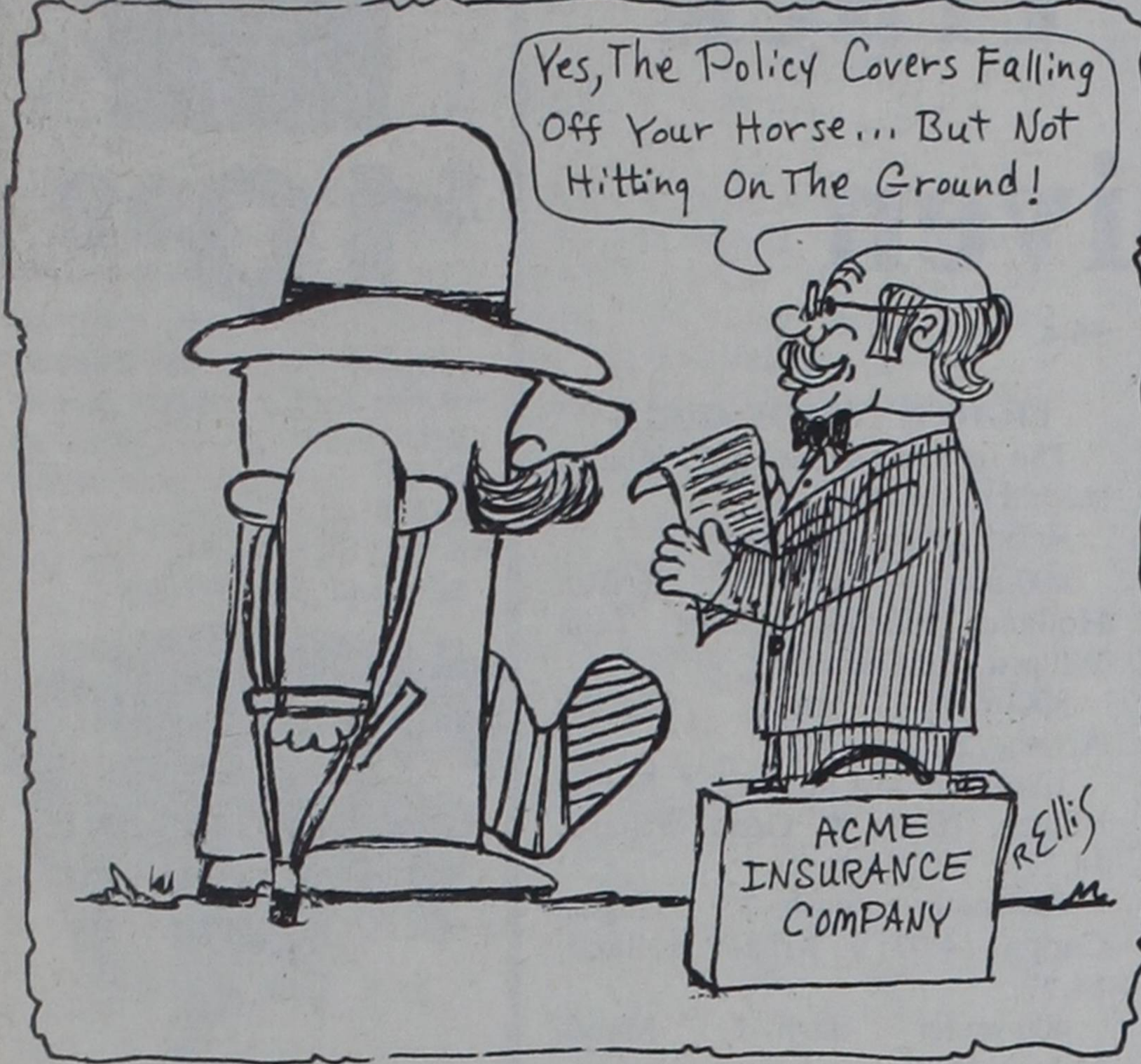

Water Management Is Important Factor Here

By JODY LEWELLEN, S.C.T.

In Parmer County, water management is becoming one of the most important conservation practices in the county.

Some of the questions asked by farmers are: How much water do I need to apply with my pre-plant irrigation? Should I water now or wait until next week? Can I skip this last watering and save \$ per acre or will it cost me more in reduced yields?

These and many other questions go through a farmer's mind before and during each growing season. Soil moisture monitoring is one way to help save water. Some of the ways that moisture monitoring

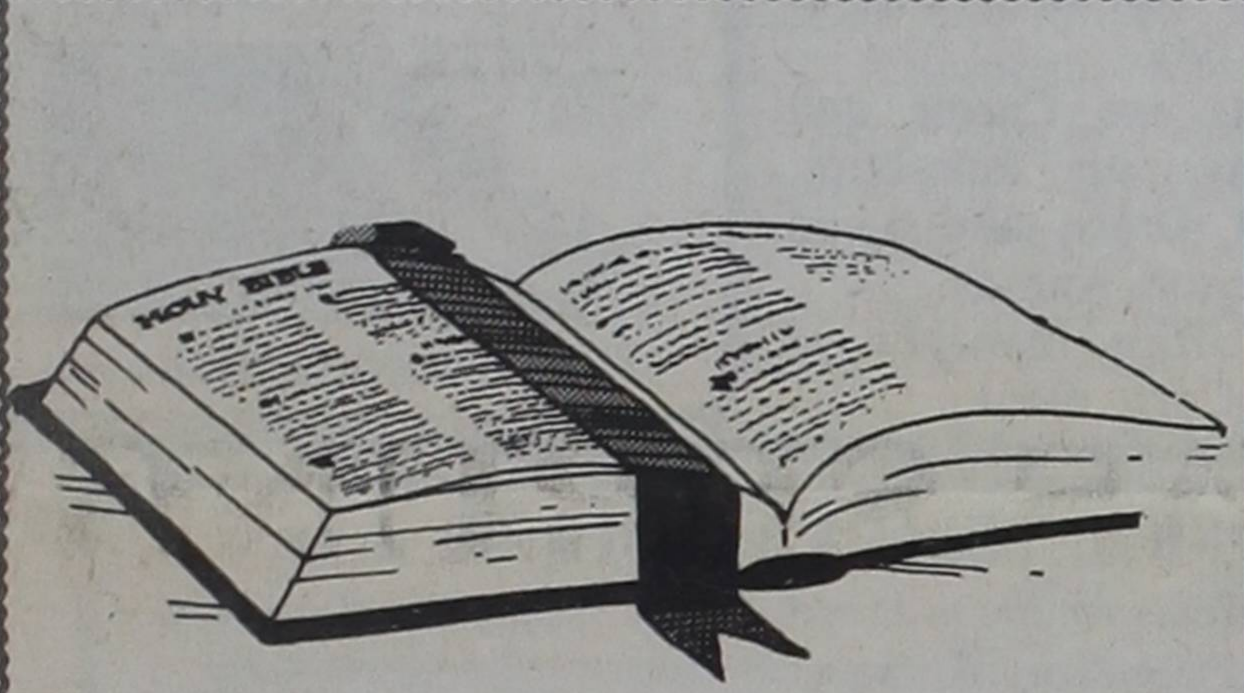
can be done are: moisture blocks, resistance meters, tensiometers and neutron moisture meters.

The use of surge irrigation on fields with such a slope that lower ends of fields do not retain a good supply of water can be very beneficial. Some of the other ways that water can be saved is by putting in underground pipelines instead of using ditches, going from row irrigation to sprinkler irrigation and cutting row lengths down to shorter runs so water can be better managed.

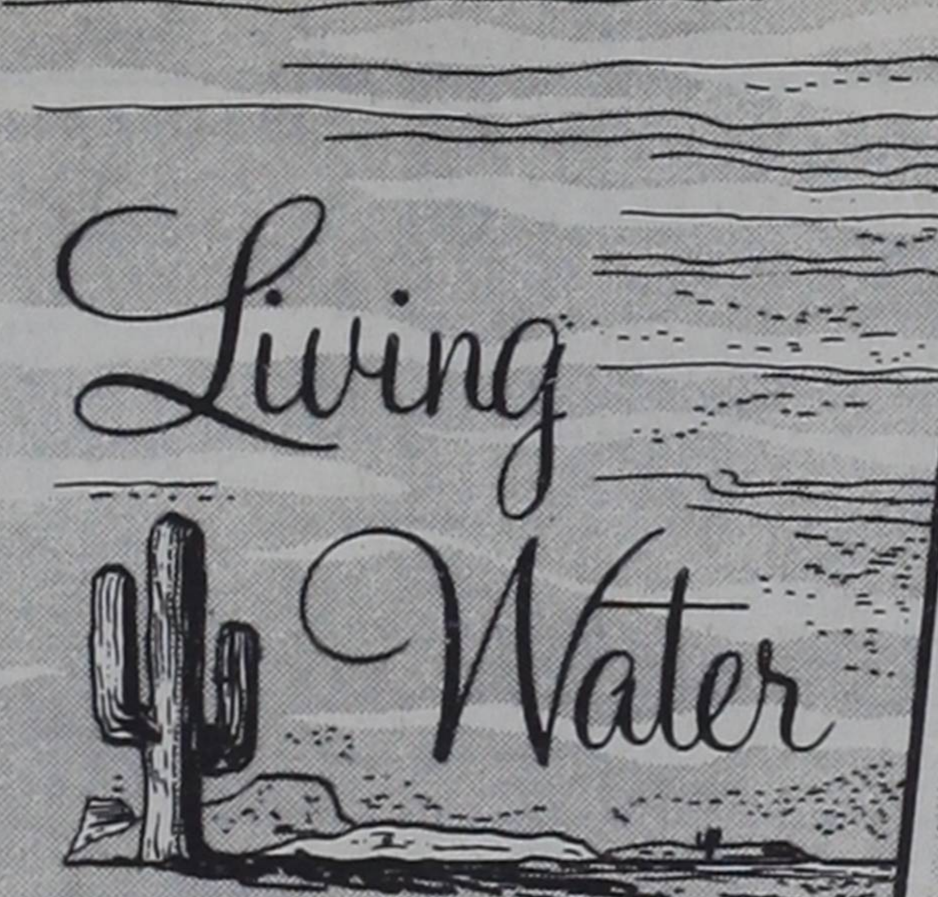

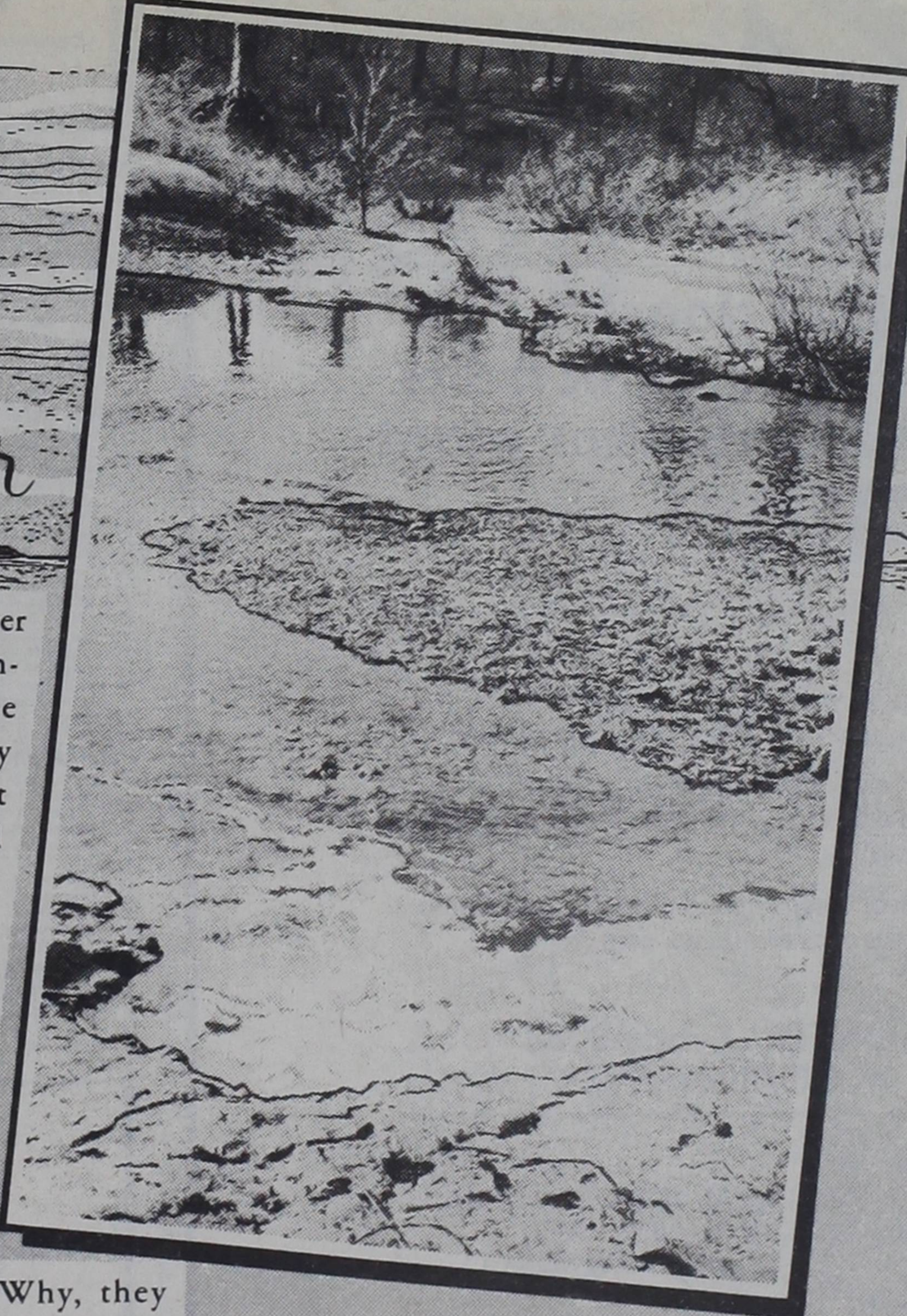

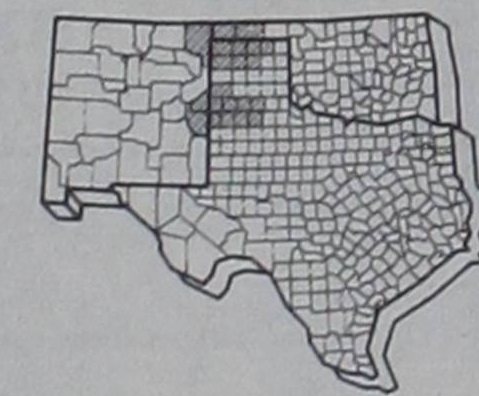
