Department Commerce Publishes Data On Three Deadly Diseases-Typhoid, Puerperal Fever, Diabetes

DIABETES DEATHS INCREASING

Discovery Insulin Came Too Late To Affect Figures For Year Quoted-Others Preventable

WASHINGTON Dec. 27.-Progress in the control of various deadly diseases is shown in reports of the Department of Commerce for diabetes, ty- Obregon, Reported to be Dickering phoid fever and puerperal fever. Heal thy decreases were shown in the case of typhoid and puerperal fever while discovery of insulin for the control of diabetes came too late to affect the figures shown but will provide interesting data for comparison another year.


· Control of the other two diseases mentioned is principally a matter of sanitation of milk and water supplies in the case of typhoid and of cleanliness and sanitation in the care of mothers in the other. The figures follow.

There were over 17,000 deaths in 1922 from diabetes mellitus in the registration area, which comprises 85 per cent of the population of the United States. Within this area the death the masses. rate from diabetes per 100,000 population was 18.4 as compared with 16.8 in 1921.

There were 6,981 deaths from Ty phoid fever in 1922 in the death registration area, which comprises 85 per cent of the total papulation of the United States. The death rate in 1922 from this disease was 7.5 per 100,-000 population, the lowest ever shown fo rthe registration area.

There were lower death rates of mothers from childbirth or puerperal causes in 1922 than in any year since 1916.


TOKIO, Dec. 27 .- Prince Regent Hirohito of Japan narrowly escaped injury this morning when an attempt was made to assassinate him.



MADISON, Wis., Dec. 27 .- Agricultural co-operation has grown in the last few years with an unusual rapidity.

It has come to stay and it is firmly implanted on American soil. A very important reason for this is that the investigations of the official marketing agencies have furnished definite facts in regard to the existing market ing practices which enable farmers to form a fairly definite estimate as to the chances of success of their prospective co-operative associations.

One of the principal objects of cooperation is to replace inefficient meth ods of marketing by more efficient result of studies and investigations make it possible to judge whether a particular marketing function can be more efficiently performed by a cooperative organization or whether it should be left to the initiative of private middlemen. In this way many failures are avoided.

NEW YORK, Dec. 27 .- The expectnent crude, which has been regarded as the turning point in the oil industry suffering from over production and price slashing, came today.

The Texas Company announced a new schedule of crude oil prices in the Midcontinent and Texas fields at an advance of 10c to 15c a barrel.
