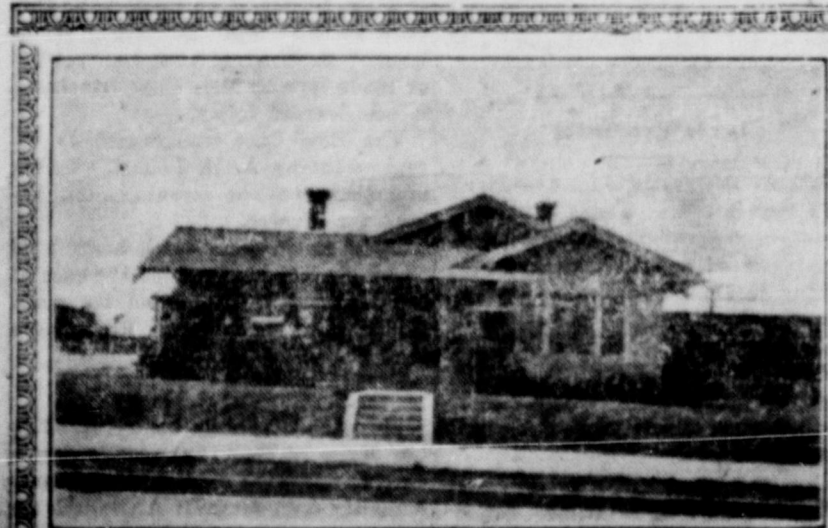

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO

In 1824—
Abraham Lincoln, a lad of fifteen years, was working on a ferryboat on the Ohio for \$6 a month.
The Marquis of Lafayette visited America, and was received with tremendous acclaim by crowds of cheering people wherever he went.
Steam ferries were operated for the first time between New York and Brooklyn.
An epidemic of yellow fever was raging in Louisiana.
The manufacture of flannel by water power was first started in Amesbury, Mass.
An English bricklayer named Joseph Aspdin, took out a patent for a material he called "portland cement," naming it "portland" because when it hardened it resembled a gray stone found on the Isle of Portland off the coast of England. The name has stuck ever since and the modern portland cement industry has been developed from Aspdin's discovery.
The Erie canal, connecting the Great Lakes with New York, was rapidly nearing completion. The first steamboat passed through the canal from Rochester to Albany.
Anthracite coal was used for the first time in New York.
The Colorado beetle, commonly known as the potato bug, made its first appearance in Wisconsin.
The first three-story brick house had just been completed in Brooklyn, N. Y. The town had a population of 7,000. The houses had just been numbered and some of the streets paved.
M. Niepce, a Frenchman, working with his countryman Daguerre, discovered the science that led to the invention of the daguerreotype in 1838.
There was much excitement throughout the country over the presidential election, due to the large number of candidates. John Quincy Adams represented the east, Crawford the south and Clay and Jackson the west.

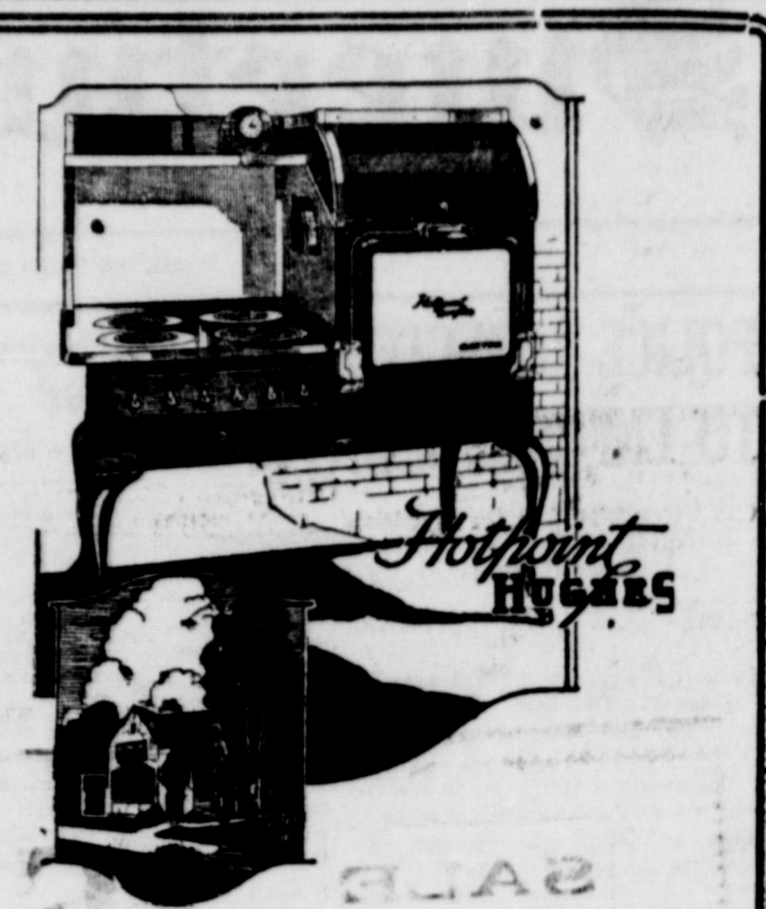

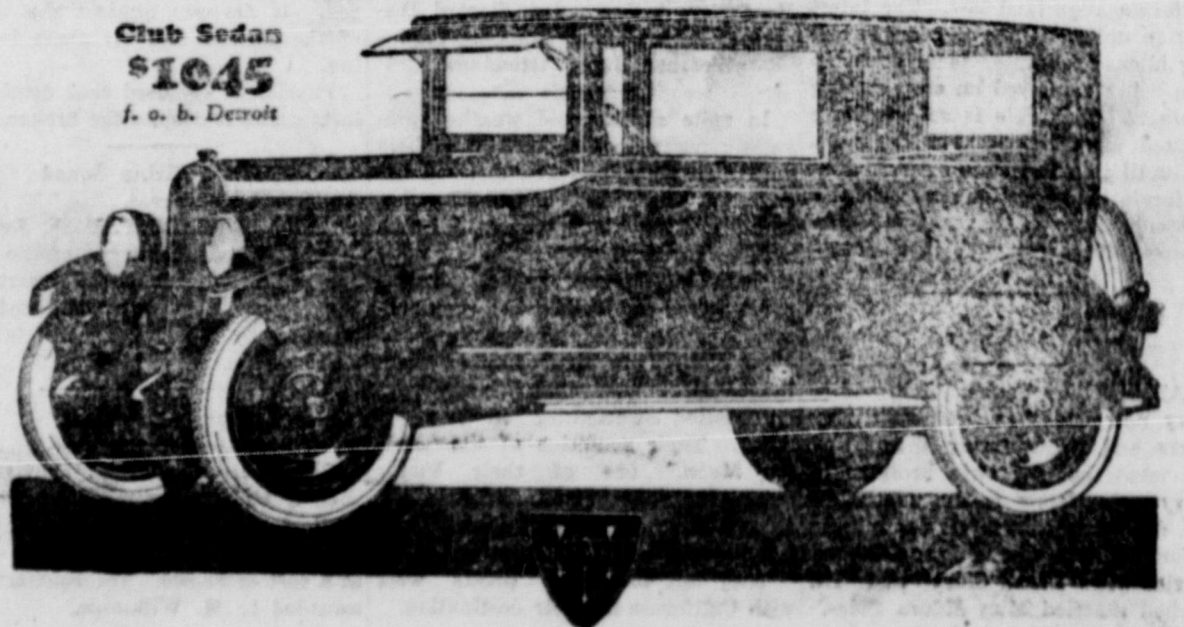

TAXES INCREASE

Department of Commerce Shows 34 Per Cent Increase On General Property Tax In Ten Years

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 18.—The Department of Commerce makes the following announcement of the principal financial statistics for the State of Texas:

The specified revenue includes (1) general property taxes; (2) special taxes; (3) poll taxes; (4) licenses and permits; and (5) special assessments. The revenues collected from these sources for the State and for the subdivisions of the State amounted to \$110,045,211, or an average of \$22.76 for each person in the State. This total was made up of \$94,889,866, general property taxes; \$1,485,772, special property taxes; \$2,033,721, poll taxes; \$10,559,616, licenses and permits; and \$1,076,236, special assessments for improvements. In 1912 statistics on revenue were not collected for incorporated places with a population of less than 2,500 and certain other subdivisions. There was an increase of 151 per cent for the civil divisions for which comparative data were available.

The assessed valuation of all property subject to general property tax was \$3,382,110,292, in 1922 as compared with \$2,532,710,050 in 1912, an increase of 34 per cent. The per capita assessed valuation increased from \$607.07 in 1912 to \$699.60 in 1922. The per capita tax levy increased from \$7.90 in 1912 to \$22.57 in 1922.
