CHARGE CRUELTY ON PRISON FARM

Former Convict, Graduate John Hopkins Medical School, Tells Committee Mutilated.

HELD ON ANTBED

Rendered Unconscious by Cruel Treatment-Prisoners Whipped Until Became Senseless.

AUSTIN, Feb. 7 .- A charge that he was mutilated for life by Dr. Bush, physician of the penitentiary system, was made today before the joint legislative prison Investigation Committee by Dr. John A. Hartman, a discharged convict.

Hartman is a graduate of John Hopkins Medical University and was sent to prison from El Paso in 1921 upon conviction of robbery with fire arms. The mutilation, according to his testimony, occurred last March when he was operated upon by Dr. Bush.

Hartman told the committee that he was released from the Ferguson prison farm after serving 4 years and 1 month. He was pardoned for good conduct nearly a year before his 5 year sentence was out. Hartman said that he was criticized for "trying to tell how the penitentiary should be run."

The ex-convict asserted that he was a victim of cruelty on various prison farms and told of one time on the Hyland prison farm when "various guards" held him on an ant bed until he became unconscious.

On this farm and others he was unable to get medical attention, he declared. It was a rule he said, that unless a prisoner had fever he wou'd be required to work in the fields. Convicts who became ill while at work in a field had no recourse except to work until the day was out, Hartman said. Hartman offered to submit to a physical examination if the committee so desired in connection with his tes-







Sweetwater folks who have been in ning to fires, must steer clear of fire trucks and firemen, and park their cars at the nearest right-hand curb when fire trucks approach, the city commission has declared.

The commissioners in session this week, passed an ordinance to this effect, and violation of the same will result in a fine of not less than \$5.00 more than \$100 upon conviction

This is a move to eliminate dangers of accidents as the result of cars celliding with fire trucks, and of removing all outside interferance with

The ordinance prohibits that no car shall follow within 300 feet of fire trucks, nor park within 300 feet of a fire. It also provides that all vehicles pertaining to the Fire Department shall have right of way over any other vehicle, and makes it unlawful for any cars, drivers, motormen, en_ gine or train to delay or obstruct a fire apparatus enroute to a fire.


