Both the senators from that state joined in opposition to her appointment when a newspaper dispatch one day it was made to appear that her elevation to the bench had all been arranged, a thing as certain as anything ever is in politics. It is more than likely that the federal judiciary will manage to survive this blow. While Mrs. Willebrant has been one of the ornamental figures in that section of the department of justice which is specializing in prohibition enforcement, those who have kept in touch with Washington news have often wondered how she ever managed to perform any of the public service for which she draws her salary. She seemed always to be on the way to some uplift or political convention, or coming away from one. Her love of speech making and the prominence that springs from a constant flow of publicity seemed to keep her forever upon the platform, when she was not having an intermittent row with some other fellow district attorney. At one

time or another, it is told, she took shots at some 45 federal attorneys whose opinions concerning law enforcement did not agree with her own. And she did not always let her criticism take the form of a spoken word. She had a habit of writing letters, which bobbed up at most inopportune moments, one of them being a missive that saw service in the late campaign when the opposition party quoted a letter from her to the effect that even the exalted office of the presidency was not being conducted altogether as she would have run it, if she could have her own way. Perhaps it is just as well that the federal bench is not going to be elevated by her distinguished service, for how could she run a court and at the same time indulge her passion for making speeches upon the least possible invitation or urging? Seen in a while California politicians seem to know what they are doing. Their present inclination is that the amiable Mable is reasonably well off where she is, in the environ of make-believe law enforcement, and they do not propose to shift the scenery.

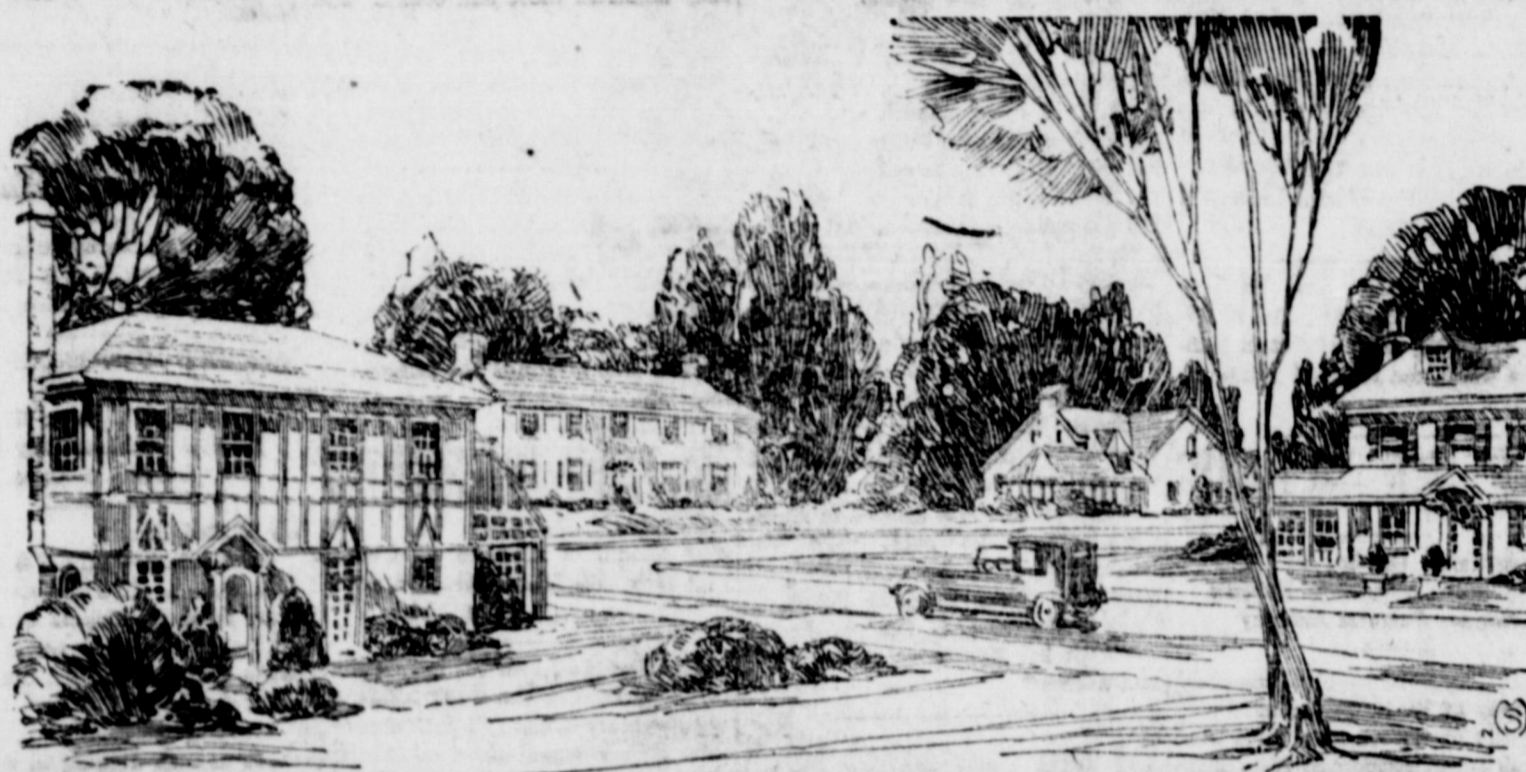

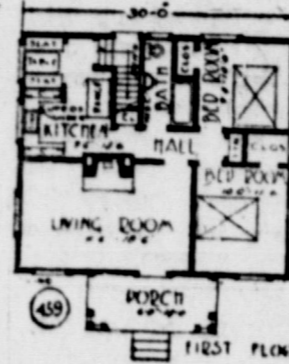

## SURVEY RAILWAY

Santa Fe Buy on New Line West of Lubbock County.

Special to The Reporter.  
LUBBOCK, Feb. 7.—The surveying crew for the Santa Fe railway company have completed the preliminary survey of the proposed line west from Doud, seven miles southwest of here, to the New Mexico line through Hockley county and Cochran county, and have started surveying the cross sections, notes on which will be used in letting contracts for building the right of way including making fill-ins and the cuts.

Progress on this feature of the work has been rapid, and the work has passed Leveland going West, and will doubtless be completed to the New Mexico line soon.

It is known that the Santa Fe owns a large tract of land in New Mexico, which will in all probability be traversed by the line. The company has just bought a large tract of land in Cochran county, where it is believed the Santa Fe will establish a town and endeavor to locate the county seat there.

AN ORDINANCE regulating traffic while the Fire Department is responding to fire alarms, and while engaged in fighting fire, and prescribing penalties for violations, and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the City Commission of the City of Sweetwater Texas.

SECTION 1. Upon the approach of any vehicle or apparatus of the Fire Department of this City answering an alarm of fire, the driver of any vehicle other than a vehicle of the aforesaid Fire Department, shall drive as closely as possible to the right-hand curb and stop, and shall not follow within three hundred (300) feet after the said vehicle or apparatus of said Fire Department has passed. No vehicle, except by direction of the Chief of the Fire Department or other officers of said Fire Department, shall approach or park within three hundred (300) feet of a fire at any time.

SECTION 2. All vehicles pertaining to the Fire Department of this City shall have prior right of way upon all the streets and avenues of this City, and it shall be unlawful for any person, owner driver, motorman, chauffeur, engineer, conductor, or any other person in charge or control of any buggy, wagon, carriage, street car, automobile, engine or train, or any other vehicle propelled by whatsoever motive power to carelessly, wantonly, willfully or maliciously delay any fire apparatus of this city in going or coming from any supposed or actual fire.

SECTION 3. Any person who shall violate in any way any of the provisions of this ordinance, or who shall fail or refuse to comply therewith, shall upon conviction be fined in any sum not less than \$5.00 or more than \$100.00.

SECTION 4. Whereas, public safety, and the free and efficient operation of the Fire Department of this City, demands the immediate passage of this Ordinance. Therefore, an emergency exists requiring a suspension of the rules providing for the heading of ordinances on two separate dates; such rule is hereby suspended and this ordinance is placed on its first reading and final passage, and shall be effective and in full force from and after its passage and approval.

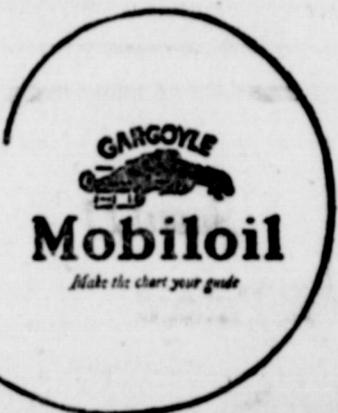

**SEA HAWK COMES**

Opens Important Amusement Week at Local Theaters—North Of 36 At End of Week.

It is not often that one week brings to Sweetwater such a large group of the really big amusement features that will be shown here beginning Monday with the "Sea Hawk," at the R & R Palace; "North of 36," the last three days of the week at the Palace with "Bal Masque" clever vaudeville, at the Lyric Monday night, and "The Bat" novel mystery play, at the Lyric Wednesday night.

Heralded as the greatest sea drama ever filmed, Frank Lloyd's production of "The Sea Hawk," a First National picture version of the popular novel by Rafael Sabatini, is scheduled to begin its showing at the Palace Theatre Monday 2 P. M.

**Curiosity Seekers At Fires to Risk Liability to Fine**

Sweetwater folks who have been in the habit of getting thrills from running to fires, must steer clear of fire trucks and firemen, and park their cars at the nearest right-hand curb when fire trucks approach, the city commission has declared.

The commissioners in session this week, passed an ordinance to this effect, and violation of the same will result in a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$100 upon conviction of the violator.

This is a move to eliminate dangers of accidents as the result of cars colliding with fire trucks, and of removing all outside interference with firemen.

The ordinance prohibits that no car shall follow within 300 feet of fire trucks, nor park within 200 feet of a fire. It also provides that all vehicles pertaining to the Fire Department shall have right of way over any other vehicle, and makes it unlawful for any cars, drivers, motormen, engine or train to delay or obstruct a fire apparatus enroute to a fire.
