ONE MAN IS KILLED

More Than A Score Injured-Relief Train Takes Victims to Burlington For Medical Aid

By bribery or some legal hook or crook, a syndicate gets possession of valuable public rights, organizes a holding company, to serve as a sort of fence for the marketing of the stolen goods, and straightaway the return of the property when the disgraceful transaction is found out is "an act that could be enjoined by any stockholder." It is time for government to end this fiction that stockholders in any corporation created by its own laws have a vested right in public property superior to that of the people from whom they were taken without their knowledge or consent, There is no vested interest in a stolen dollar; why a billion dollars' worth of oil?






