United States Army Flight Around the World Gets Under Way Monday Morning at Los Angeles

MAY TAKE SIX MONTHS

Numerous Bases With Supplies Established at Various Points Around the World

CLOVER FIELD, Los Angeles, Calif., March 17 .- Leaving the field with a perfect take-off, the three U. S. Army airplanes connected with the round-the-world flight, sped into the air here at 9:32 a. m., today.

Heading his fliers, Major Frederick L. Martin in ship No. 1, was the first to take off. The big air cruiser sped down the field for a distance of 100 yards and after a slight rise at the end, "took the air" with grace and apparent as-

Close behind him was ship No. 3 with Lieut. Leigh Wade at the 'stick." Last to leave the field was Lieut. Lowell Smith in ship No. 2. Each of the officials handled his plane with all the certainty of their commander.

Flying in V-shape formation the ships circled the field twice before heading north on the first leg of the epoch-making journey.

Flight Starts By The United Press.

CLOVER FIELD, Santa Monica, Calif., March 17 .- A flight around the world, the dream of aviators since man first flew, starts today when three U. S. Army planes take off from Clover Field. A fourth plane will follow shortly. The airmen will fly northward and westward to cross 30,000 miles of territory and 23 countries on their journey which is expected to last four months.

"We have explicit confidence in our plans," Major Frederick L. Martin, commanding the world fliers, said just before the flight

"God willing, we will be back in Los Angeles next September."

Crowds gathered early at the huge airdome to witness the start of the epoch-making flight which had been set back to permit as many as possible to be present when the big planes, mechanically perfect, take the air.

The first leg of the flight was a jump to Sacremento whence the modern Magellans of the air will fly to Seattle, British Columbia, Alaska and across the Behring

Well Equipped

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 17 .-Four modern argonauts flung themselves into the skies today and were away upon one of the greatest pioneering expeditions since man's urge for conquest first sent him forth.

Not a military quest was this, but a pilgrimage of peace-the start of the United States Army Air Service airplanes on the first 'round-theworld flight ever attempted.

With motors tuned to the point of perfect adjustment and with the pick of the service's flying men snuggled into the cockpit, the four big Douglas world cruisers glided smoothly across the field and "took off" to a perfect

It was a gala day at Clover Field. Thousands of Southern Californians had motored to the spot to bid the airmen God-speed and witness the beginning of the flight which was to make history.

Police Object to **Automatic Phones** Prefer The Manual FILMS IS

LOS ANGELES, Callf., March 17 .-Plans to replace all manual telephones in Los Angeles with those of the automatic or dial type are not meeting BURNS with police department approval.

"Dialing" a number on an automatic telephone may be more efficient than calling the number to "central" on a manual telephone, according to Chief August Vollmer and detective lieutenants, but in times of emergency the direct connection with a human operator the moment a receiver falls from its hook on the manual phone frequently saves lives or aids in the capture of a criminal.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 17.—The Teapot Dome committee is approaching the end of the Senate investigation.

This is what the five-months' probe of the leasing of naval reserve lands by Former Secretary of the Interior Albert B. Fall, has accomplished:

First: Beginning of court action to cancel the leases and promise of criminal action against at least three of the principals. Government counsel has begun court action and are in Los Angeles to bring suit in the Doheny leases.

Second: Resignation of Secretary of the Navy Denby, who signed the leases and the investigation of the official acts of Attorney General Daugherty, by a separate committee.

Third: Testimony showing that Albert B. Fall, who leased the reserve, received big loans from Doheny and later from Harry Sinclair.




